



Gouge directs the State of Arizona Children's Environmental Health Coalition efforts, which includes implementation of integrated pest management (IPM) in schools and child care facilities. She coordinates the Western Regional IPM in Schools Working Group, U.S. Department of Agriculture, which involves participants in 11 western states. She is the director of the Urban IPM Coordinating Committee (developmental). Her research efforts focus on developing biocontrol options and evaluating reduced-risk chemical pesticide options for management of venomous arthropods and disease vectors (scorpions, spiders, ants and mosquitoes). She supports state and government agencies regarding pollution prevention, pestrelated children's health issues, vector management and professional education, and supports Arizona law enforcement entities conducting medico-criminal investigations.

United Fund: Agencies that serve the community

This week, we look at St. Vincent's of Holy Angels and Cobre Valley Center for the Arts (CVCA), as part of our =ongoing series featuring 21 local nonprofits United Fund (UF) supports.

St. Vincent's of Holy Angels

"To provide service to people in need and to call the Church and others of good will to do the same." That's the motto and guiding principle behind St. Vincent's—a charitable ministry of Holy Angels Roman Catholic Church, in Globe.

It began in the 1950s helping fellow parishioners in need, later growing to include the rest of the community, says Director William Herrera, who joined 20 years ago.

Now, St. Vincent's has seven volunteers serving the homeless; disabled; unemployed; and those seeking work as well as those needing extra help with everyday necessities.

Through its programs, St. Vincent's is able to::

*Provide shelter for homeless families and individuals;

*Prevent evictions and utilities from being shut off;

*Assist with buying medications; *Provide lanches and food boxes from its food pantry.

in 2017, St. Vincent's expanded its services to include a clothing bank for those needing interview clothes or otherwise in need of clothing. Operating strictly from donations and grants,"when you give to us, you help us 'change lives and communities," Herrera says. "We are here to help people. Each year, St. Vincent's helps an average 380 households; serves about 1,000 lunches and distributes about 150 food boxes, he says. Additionally, St. Vincent's distributes a total 50 Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner boxes.

"The funding we receive from United Fund tremendously helps us in giving food and financial assistance--in terms of apartment rents and utilities fees--to people around Globe who are in need of help," says Holy Angels Pastor Rev. Albert Miranda. "And we serve them regardless of their background or faith affiliation, as long as we have funds to be utilized."

Herrera says, "We don't know what we would do without United Fund—they give us one-half of our budget. We really appreciate it." St. Vincent's serves lunch 11 a.m.-2 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 12:30-2:30 p.m. Friday, and distributes food boxes 12:30-2:30 p.m. Fridays.

Cobre Valley Center for the Arts

The Cobre Valley Center for thex Arts occupies the historical Gila County Courthouse structure which was built in 1906. Beautifully restored by CVCA members, the building is both a central landmark and the largest, most recognizable, elegant building in the area.

Established in 1984, with the original directive: to serve locals and visitors alike as the main setting for creative and expressive display opportunity, the CVCA is ideally located in historic downtown Globe. CVCA's priorities include: keeping the building open, maintaining safety standards, and historic preservation.

The CVCA has been open to the public for over 30 years. Community support through volunteers, paid memberships, grants, partnerships, donations ensure ongoing operations. From the area or passing through, participating in CVCA's sustainability is easy. Visitors may donate, purchase a unique item from the gift shop, purchase an original work of art, or obtain an event ticket.

Maintaining partnerships with Copper Community Players, Gila County Historical Museum, Globe Rotary and Globe Downtown Association and continually welcoming new ways to share this local treasure, the CVCA strives to connect with artists of all types.

While visitor numbers and donation dollars indicate a steady rise and confidence during this post-COVID period, the CVCA's grant funding from organizations like United Fund

allow more attention given to promoting our local artists.

During the pandemic, CVCA was able to adjust open hours, section off gallery areas and create a through-traffic route to encourage social distancing and to help visitors feel safe during their experience. Both in-person socially distanced experiences and increased digital opportunities continue to provide inspiration and access to the arts for local residents and visitors alike.

Artists and our community unafraid to participate in art openings, the return of performing arts and the influence of new minds and talents clear the air and leave us feeling excited!

Snakebite or rabies vaccine? Mobile pet clinics scheduled

Gila County Animal Care & Control reminds dog owners that an up-to-date rabies vaccine is required for your dog to be licensed - and that annual license is required by law. A license is essential to prove ownership if your stray dog ends up at the shelter.

Are your pets microchipped? If they aren't, be aware that only two percent of lost dogs or stray cats without a microchip get reunited with the anxious owners who love them.

Low-cost vaccines, preventive care, microchipping and even nail trimming are all available from mobile clinics visiting Globe this month. Keep your dogs and cats protected and up to date on vaccines essential to guard against rabies, feline leukemia, bordatella and distemper. Did vou know there's even a snakebite vaccine that can help dogs survive being bitten by a rattler? Pre-treatment with the snakebite vaccine also reduces your pet's pain and suffering - and the overall cost of treatment if bitten, too.



Ghost Hunters 5-Hour Lockdown Events in Globe

Gila County's historic iail in downtown Globe is well known on the paranormal investigation circuit. Housing inmates from 1910-1981, could it be haunted by the vengeful spirits of murderers who spent their final days within the concrete and steel cells? The historic structure was spotlighted by the popular Travel Channel show 'Ghost Adventures' in January 2018, sparking monthly events where pre-registered guests can observe as seasoned paranormal investigators use equipment to sense the spirit world after dark. And it's just one of two allegedly haunted buildings participants get to explore when the Arizona Paranormal Investigation and Research Society returns to offer simultaneous 'Five-Hour Lockdown' events, each in downtown Globe. One team will start at the restored 1916 twostory train station depot, while the other begins at the historic Gila County Jail just a short walk uphill and nearby. Teams will switch locations halfway through the nocturnal adventure. The events are limited to pre-registered guests age 16 and older at each location; ages 16-18 must be accompanied by an adult. Tickets are \$50. Proceeds from the evening help pay for upkeep and building restoration - reserve your tickets in advance at azghosttours. org. Covid-19 safety guidelines apply, and masks are required. Read more and buy tickets at azghosttours.

org. Imagine sitting alone in a dark corner of either building . . . blindfolded and wearing noise-cancelling headphones. Is it true that fear or other emotions channel energy that increases paranormal activity or focuses your ability to perceive the spirit world?

Guides set up cameras to view locations throughout the jail, with EM detectors and other equipment available in hopes of evidence of the jail's spirits. The evening begins with a walking tour of the museum, providing historical information and tales of the paranormal. Afterwards, participants divide into teams and begin the night's investigation. Organizers add "there is no guarantee there will be paranormal activity." Guests for the evening may also participate in paranormal experiments such as an 'isolated spirit box session,' or the sensory deprivation experiment. Miami, Too!

Imagine sitting alone in a dark corner of the century-old 1917 YMCA in Miami, or the second floor of a 1908 Globe hotel/boarding house also reputed to have been a Broad Street brothel . . . blindfolded and wearing noise-cancelling headphones. Is it true that fear or other emotions channel energy that increases paranormal activity or focuses your ability



to perceive the spirit world? Find out for yourself when the Arizona Paranormal Investigation and Research Society returns to offer simultaneous 'Five-Hour Lockdown' events at two separate locations, one each

in downtown Globe and Miami, limited to pre-registered guests at each location. The sensory deprivation experiment is just one of the evening's options. Tickets are \$30 and limited to eight participants, age 16 and older, in order to assure proper and safe physical distancing. Ages 16-18 must be accompanied by an adult. Proceeds from the evening help pay for upkeep and building restoration - reserve your tickets in advance at azghosttours. org. Covid-19 safety guidelines apply, and masks are required. The Broad Street building was once a hotel, a boarding house and a brothel. Paranormal investigators say, "this location is filled with paranormal activity - spirit box responses, EVPs and interaction with our equipment. Multiple spirits have been encountered by our teams." As for equipment: "The tour guides will have a camera system set up to view various locations in the jail. If needed, tour guests will be provided free EM detectors and other equipment. A valid driver's license and credit card is required in order to be provided equipment; guests are welcome to bring their own equipment, too. Organizers add that these tours and investigations are for entertainment purposes only; information provided is accurate as provided by local historians - and there is no guarantee that paranormal activity will occur.

Reformed according to the Word

There are some moments in history that seem to stand out among the rest. We set aside particular days to remember various historical events. Holidays such as Independence Day and Memorial Day are intended to focus our attention on the past events that have shaped our present reality. A day that has become increasingly significant to me as I view the vast scope of world history is October 31, 1517, a day we now refer to as Reformation Day. This is the day when Augustinian monk Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the church door in Wittenberg, Germany, kicking off the Protestant Reformation.

As a Christian, I find the time period of the Protestant Reformation to be an especially fascinating era to study. Not because I believe the Reformers came up with new ideas or forged new territory, making progressive leaps into the unknown. Rather, the strength of the Reformation was in pointing people back, not to a time or system, but to Jesus Christ. The Reformers' desire was not to start a new church or type of religious insurrection, but to see the church and her leaders move back to the Bible; back to what God has said, not what men and their traditions have

As we take a closer look at some of the issues that the Reformers were dealing with, we will see that they were not simply matters of church politics but were issues that touched to the very heart of the Gospel. "How can a sinful person be made right with a holy God?" The Reformers struggled with questions like these, to which they found no satisfying answers within the traditions of the Roman church.

However, when the Reformers. guided by the Holy Spirit, opened their Bibles, everything began to change. The truth of the Word of God that had been kept from the average per-

son, that had been locked up in the dead language of Latin and forbidden to be translated into the common tongue, began to burst forth into the hearts and minds of the Reformers and overflow into society as a whole. The impetus, then, for the Protestant Reformation was not political or economic, but Biblical.

The dark times of Biblical ignorance were coming to an end, as the Reformers diligently taught the Bible, translated the Bible, and made sure the average person understood the Bible. Post Tenebras Lux --- after darkness, light! This brief Latin phrase became their battle cry as Martin Luther, John Calvin, John Knox, Huldrych Zwingli and other Reformers saw the glorious Word of God shine forth, breaking the darkness of the false Gospel and doctrines of Romanism. The chains of religious bondage that held people down, the rule of the papacy that contradicted the authority of Jesus Christ, and the selling of indulgences that cheapened the Gospel of grace were all seen for what they were in the light of God's holy, inspired Word, the Bible.

We are now separated from the beginnings of the Reformation by over 500 years. However, that does not mean the Reformation is over. In fact the cause of the Reformers, and the need for the light of God's Word to go forth, is stronger than ever. We live in a world that is increasingly hostile to truth; a world of spiritual apathy, where religious bondage increases, sin is glorified and hope is elusive. What is the answer?

While many may jump into a political, social or economic tirade, the answer is that we need "the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ" (2 Corinthians 4:4) to break out into the dark

corners of our world. We need the Bible to be heralded as the banner of truth. We need to pray that God's grace would extend to the hearts of those who are trapped in religious bondage, cultic systems and New Age spiritualism. We need to pray that the Holy Spirit would draw to Himself those stuck in addiction and sinful life patterns, that they may be convicted of their sin and see their need of the Savior.

No, the Reformation is not over. In fact, the Reformation will not end until Christ comes again. Until that day we must be constantly reforming every aspect of our lives to the revealed Word of God, the Bible. So open your Bible today and hear the Words of your Creator. If you find yourself in darkness, open the words that bring light. "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105).

God has united you with Christ Jesus. For our benefit God made him to be wisdom itself. Christ made us right with God; he made us pure and holy, and he freed us from sin. Therefore, as the Scriptures say, "If you boast, boast only about the Lord."


