20 for relief ranging from \$5,000 - \$500,000.

In June Governor Doug Ducey authorized \$100 million to address Arizona wildfires and aftereffects on the people of Arizona.

The AZ Department of Forestry and Fire Management is overseeing \$10 million of that total specifically dedicated to assist private

20 Ames Contracting employees who have been working on the nearby Pinto Creek Bridge replacement project. The Pinto Valley Mine also assisted ADOT by supplying boulders.

While both lanes of the highway are now open, ADOT encourages drivers to use extra caution on US 60 between Superior and Miami because of the potential for future flooding due to an adjacent burn scar. ADOT also recommends avoiding travel when storms

are passing through the area as well as at nighttime.

Motorists should plan for periodic lane restrictions and delays of 30 to 60 minutes in the coming weeks and months as ADOT makes longer-term repairs, including work on guardrail, pavement and drainage systems. When restrictions are in place, drivers should consider using SR 77 and 177 through Winkelman, a roughly 70-mile detour that includes a 10 percent grade and will significantly

increase travel time. Also, drivers can use SR 87 and SR 188 as alternate routes.

The closure is a reminder that many factors can trigger unplanned closures, including rainfall from storms. Real-time highway conditions are available on ADOT's Arizona Traveler Information site at az511. gov, by calling 511, downloading the AZ 511 app and through ADOT's Twitter feed, @ArizonaDOT.

and public landowners. Awards will be limited to a minimum of \$5,000 and a maximum of \$500,000 per award. Some projects may be offered only partial funding depending on the severity of demonstrated need and funding availability at the time of the request. The Arizona Post-Wildfire Infrastructure Assistance Program will allocate \$10,000,000 to support infrastructure

recovery efforts to mitigate the impact of Arizona wildfires. Awards will be limited to those applicants most significantly impacted, on a first-come, first-served basis. Applicants will be those whose needs were not met by other funding sources, such as insurance, federal agencies, etc. and who can demonstrate the DFFM Post-Wildfire Infrastructure Assistance Program is the payer of last resort.

Applications will be accepted starting Aug. 20, when links online at dffm. az.gov will be posted with application information and instructions. Once all funds have been expended the application period will close.

As a young man Dale was a wildland firefighter and worked in the copper



Obituaries

Robert Duber Sr.

Robert Duber Sr. was born in a farmhouse in Bridgeport, Illinois on March 1, 1929, to Isabelle Akers Freese and Joseph Freese. Soon after Bob's birth, Joseph was seriously injured in an automobile accident and died from complications from the accident. Isabelle moved to Arizona and Bob followed. Isabelle met and married John Duber. Bob legally became Robert Duber and was John and Isabelle's only child.

During his young years, Bob was injured in a fall. While receiving treatments and surgeries he walked using crutches. At the age of 18, a failed surgery left him impaired for life and he was told that he would never walk again. His willpower gave him the strength and determination to physically do the impossible.

His family life and activ-



ities included growing up in John's Tri-City Garage and Parts Shop where Bob learned about automobiles front to back, part by part. He was driving at the age of seven. Car racing was a hobby he loved and he built jalopies (called jalopies for a reason) and raced on the old race track on Highway 60, the Ellsworth race track in Globe, the Fodera track in Wheatfields, and other tracks outside this area. He would work on an old car all week to race to win a case of beer or an occasional \$25 purse which would pay for parts to get ready to race again the next week. That was until Bill Cheesbourg came to Globe-Miami to race.

When Bob was about four years old the family lived in a tent where a crew including John Duber worked for contractor Harry Hagen building the highway through the Salt River Canyon. Years later, Bob and a crew strung speaker wires across the canyon for an Easter Sunrise Service.

Bob's work life included driving the Globe Miami Stage and running the projector at the Miami theaters. He worked for Rhor Aircraft near San Diego, California, and learned to sandblast, but got homesick and returned to Globe-Miami. His police career started when he got a job as a radio dispatcher with Gila County Sheriff Jack Jones. He went on to work for the Arizona State Highway Department's road crew in Florence. Bob knew something about dynamite and was blasting a small area which resulted in him blowing up an entire guard rail. He then transferred to Driver's License in Florence, then to Phoenix, and back to Globe-Miami for Driver's License/MVD Enforcement where he retired as a supervisor (1957-1991).

Bob was active in his community. He was Akela for Cub Scouts in Florence and was the PTA chairman as well. He coached Babe Ruth baseball teams to allstar competition. He was on the Globe Elks Youth Activity, Elk of the Month, and Elk of the Year. He was chairman of the Gila County Rodeo Committee and Globe Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Month. Bob is a Fraternal Order of Police member and current president of Gila Lodge #6. The lodge was constructed with the help of the local CBs and was the host of the Fraternal Order of Police state convention. For many years, the F.O.P. members operated the fry bread booth at the Gila County rodeo and horse races. Bob was

awarded the Fraternal Order of Police Outstanding Service award. Bob was a contributor to the History of Gila County for the Arizona Memory Project (discovergilacounty.com).

Bob enjoyed watching the Dallas Cowboys, Arizona Cardinals, A.S.U. football, Dale Earnhardt, Roy Rogers, John Wayne movies and Gunsmoke.

Bob was preceded in death by his parents Isabelle and John Duber and his daughter-in-law Carol Duber. He is survived by Ann, his wife of 71 years, his son Robert Duber II, daughter Kathy Bolinger (Jess), and four grandchildren John (Anastacia), Chris (Jeni), Lindsay (Jason) and Michael (Mandi). Bob also leaves behind his great-grandchildren Madison, Alexis, Patrick, Kadence, Charlotte, Lillian, Rhett, Adeline, Jase and Andrew.

Bob Duber's life was filled with complications, difficulties, success, friendships and many joys. He even considered writing a book but it just didn't happen.

Bob passed away on Aug. 8, 2021, exactly 39 years after his mother, Isabelle Duber, died (Aug. 8, 1982).

Step-by-Step Obedience

Abraham, originally known as Abram, was a man of great faith. Having faith comes more easily to some people than to others simply because of the way they are wired, but I don't think anyone is born with the tremendous faith that Abraham had. It has to be developed over time, as we see God prove Himself faithful in one situation after another. God gives all of us a measure of faith, but our faith grows over time, like Abraham's, as we learn to trust God to lead us one step at a time. We do have to face difficult and challenging situations, but they become the tools that God uses to stretch our faith to new levels.

Abraham's first step of faith was to leave his home and his family, not knowing where to go next. All God said was that He would show him the right place, and Abraham trusted that and obeyed. He had to do the first thing God told him before God would tell him anything else.

By the time Abraham's faith was truly tested, he had developed such complete trust in God that he was willing to sacrifice his own son-the son God had promised him with his wife. Sarah, and the son he had believed God for and had waited for, for a very long time. When God asked him to sacrifice his son, he obeyed. But before he could do it, God spoke to him and told him not to. He even provided a ram in a nearby thicket so that Abraham would have an animal to sacrifice instead (see Gen. 22:1-14). We have to wonder if Abraham would have had the faith to sacrifice his son had he not seen God prove Himself faithful on each step of his journey to that point.

Abraham's story is very dramatic when it gets to the part about sacrificing his son. I haven't heard of another story like that in history, but it is a great example for us as we walk the journey of healing in our soul. We would like for God to heal us instantly, but that's not the way it works. God strengthens and restores us little by little, one step at a time, and each time He does our trust in Him grows.

As God heals our soul, there are times He is gracious enough to take us forward in a seemingly miraculous way, but there comes a time for everyone when He requires us to walk through a difficulty because that is the only way we will gain strength. There are many people who simply refuse to take the first step until they see every step along the way. But the best way to follow God as He heals your soul is to take each step He leads you to take, when He leads you to take it, without questioning or hesitating. Once you take one step and see the faithfulness of God, you will have more faith for the second step than you had for the first. As the cycle continues, you will find yourself making great progress on your journey of healing.

Prayer Starter: Father, Your Word is full of truth, and examples of the wonderful faith others have had in You. Help me as I build my faith and put all my trust in You! In Jesus' name, amen.

It's time to forgive

Famed author C.S. Lewis once wrote, "To be a Christian means to forgive the inexcusable in others because God has forgiven the inexcusable in you." So according to Lewis, a Christian is a forgiven person who forgives others. This isn't a controversial idea at all as this is exactly what one finds in the pages of the Bible (Colossians 3:13). Being a forgiving person is a non-negotiable for a Christian.

However, things that may seem obvious and basic become a struggle when the pressures of life hit. I think this is easily seen when talking about forgiveness. I mean, can we get any more fundamental to how a Christian is to live than by saying we are to be forgiving people? Yet, this is exactly my point. We know, in theory, that Christians are to be forgiving people, but sometimes true forgiveness seems almost impossible. What can be done?

First we must recognize what forgiveness is, as opposed to what we tend to make it out to be. Forgiveness is not simply saying the words "I forgive you" after someone apologizes. This may be how we begin to teach children about forgiveness. However, like many other areas of life, we need to grow beyond the basic concept. Therefore, we must start by acknowledging that forgiveness is more than words. True forgiveness actually changes the relationship between two parties. True forgiveness draws people together and brings healing to a fractured relationship.

Consider for a moment what happens when broken sinners come to seek forgiveness from God. We are the ones who must "apologize," who must recognize that we are in the wrong before our Creator and that God is the offended party. When forgiveness is sought through Christ, God doesn't forgive merely in word but through a process of transformation. God's forgiveness of sinners includes justification and adoption. That

is, God clares His righpeople teous in His sight and He brings them into a new relationship with Himself. God's forgiveness of sinners includes sanctification and



glorification. That is, God continues to mold His people into the image of Christ, making them holy and good, which eventually leads to that moment in time when God's people will be glorified with Him for eternity. God's forgiveness is more than words!

A heart that can truly forgive is a heart that has been truly forgiven. You see, one of the ways that Christians can have assurance of salvation, of forgiveness of sins, is by recognizing our desire to be like Christ, our desire to reflect back to the world what God has done in our lives. Therefore, the apostle Paul writes to the church in Ephesus, "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you" (Ephesians 4:32). Paul's exhortation to forgive comes from the reality of one having already received Christ's forgiveness. In other words, Christians are to be like Christ. And if we, who have received much forgiveness, cannot forgive others, then we have a big problem (see Christ's teaching in Matthew 18:23-25).

In fact, it must be understood that if one refuses to forgive it may be a sign that the person is not truly a born-again Christian. Jesus preached, "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you, but if you do not forgive others their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (Matthew 6:14-15). Jesus is not teaching that salvation is dependent upon our works--salvation is by grace alone (Ephesians 2:8-9); but one sign, a fruit of having received forgive-

ness from God, is the willingness to forgive others. If the willingness is not there, it is possible that true salvation is not there no matter what one professes about oneself.

Yes, forgiveness can be hard, especially when we have been wronged for an extended period of time by another person. Our natural inclination may not be to forgive but to seek justice for ourselves. We want people to pay for the way they have treated us and we want them to suffer through

it. Yet the Christian life bucks against our sinful human inclinations. Instead of holding grudges and seeking personal vengeance (Romans 12:19), God calls us to forgive and seek reconciliation. Now of course forgiveness will look different depending on the situation - but in an instance where one is seeking forgiveness, even after committing the same offense, Christians are called to forgive. In fact, Christians are called to forgive freely and often.

Consider this encounter that Peter had with Jesus. "Then Peter came up and said to him, 'Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times" (Matthew 18:21-22). Jesus is not telling us to be people who allow others to take advantage of us, but to live our lives with a better view of what matters. Forgiving others, in more than words and from the heart, is one way that Christians point people to the Gospel of Christ. Forgiving is saying, "I've been forgiven by Christ more than I can even imagine; therefore, I will forgive you and implore you to seek Christ."

So we must, dear Christian, be willing to forgive in a fuller sense and in doing so point people to the Savior who offers eternal forgiveness. Yes, it seems so simple on paper, but let's be prepared to take this theory and enact it in our lives by the grace of God. Think about any forgiveness you may be holding back. It's time to trust God and it's time to forgive.

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

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
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Preheat oven to 400 F. For pasta mixture, chop onion. In a 4-guart casserole, heat oil over medium-high heat; add onion and garlic pressed with a garlic

press. Cook and stir 2 to 3 minutes or until onion is tender. Stir in pasta sauce, tortellini, chicken, milk, water, peas, and black pepper. Heat until mixture just comes to a boil; remove from heat. Stir basil into pasta mixture.

United Fund: Agencies that serve the community

We look this week at Gila County Historical Museum in Globe and Bullion Plaza Cultural Center and Museum in Miami, as part of our ongoing series featuring 21 local nonprofits United Fund supports.

"A year of separation for all of us," is how Bullion Executive Director Tom Foster describes last year's Covid-19 shutdowns. Thousands of museums closed across North America, as well as the rest of the world.

While both our local museums have since reopened, many were not so lucky. As Foster points out in Bullion's 2020-21 annual report, either they will never re-open or succumb to continuing revenue loss.

This is the story of two local museums finding a way to not only survive but move forward with UF's help.

Bullion Plaza Cultural Center and Museum

Housed in a 1923 school building, Bullion is dedicated to "preserving, presenting and exploring" the culturally diverse history and natural environment unique to the Miami-Globe area.

It houses exhibits on minerals, local mining, ranching, Native Americans, area dignitaries, medicine, the military, and Slavic and Hispanic cultures.

Foster said, after Bullion was shuttered from March

2020 to the new year, "Even with other funds, we would not have been able to keep going without United Fund. All our events were canceled one by one. The revenue loss was horrendous, made worse by loss of gift shop sales and donations at the door."

Though closed to the public, Bullion didn't settle for "resting on its laurels."

Visitors were allowed appointments, and two special volunteers—Tom Meredith and Pilar Carbajal—worked on exhibit improvements and building maintenance, Foster said.

With help from UF, Foster kept staff busy researching, digitizing and doing whatever it took to keep Bullion "running, viable and relevant."

Through other funding, Bullion partnered with Miami Memorial Library, Tonto National Monument and Razor Thin Media to produce educational and informative videos.

"As are most museums in the state, we are constantly evolving," Foster said. Not content to merely think outside the box, the Museum is removing it entirely, "eliminating the boundaries. Bullion is not just a stationary, exquisite building."

Bullion re-opened in January with limited hours—Wednesday-Friday, 11 a.m.-2 p.m.

"We missed the people and they missed us," Foster said. "We are here to educate and inform people and make them smile—or cry," as often happens when Bullion visitors learn about their family history.

Along with corporate meetings, which aid the area economy by hiring local caterers, Foster plans to host in-person events and programming this fall.

"Without United Fund, it wouldn't be happening," he said.

Gila County Historical Museum

Housed in the 1920 Mine Rescue Station, the Museum is "all about history and service." Its research library is the place to find everything from lost relatives to local mining history.

History greeters ensure a fun-filled visit, while research volunteers help people find information they seek.

"Our associates really enjoy meeting people and doing research," said Gila County Historical Society President Vernon Perry.

With the museum also shuttered by Covid-19 in 2020, staff and volunteers kept busy answering research requests online.

A pandemic in our own time prompted requests for information on the Spanish flu of 1918. Cemetery and newspaper records reveal that some families lost several members at one time, many of them children. "We want to preserve those times." Perry said.

The Museum also answered the Arizona Histori-

cal Society's call to collect Covid-19 stories for future generations.

"We got some really interesting ones," said Perry. They can be seen at www.gilacountymuseum.org, where visitors are invited to add their own stories as well.

Receiving UF operational grants, the Museum is eligible to apply for others, such as a recent technology grant for upgrading its server and storing higher quality photos, Perry said.

The Museum re-opened in March with limited hours—Tuesday-Saturday, 11 a.m.-2 p.m.

Perry said that United Fund and the Museum share a goal of getting people to Globe. "We want to get them in the door, and then sell them on Globe."

To that end, the Museum invites one and all to "celebrate Arizona's Golden

Age" at the Fourth Annual Old Dominion Days, Sept. 9-11.

Gila County Assessor: Apply for Senior Freeze Program by Sept. 1

Gila County Assessor Joe Williams and his staff remind property owners age 65 years or older to apply by the September 1 deadline for tax relief under the state's 'Senior Freeze Program.'

How does it work?

If you're approved, it will soften any increase in your tax bill because your assessed value will not increase each year. If you apply and are approved the freeze lasts for three years, at which time you can re-apply. If you remain qualified for the program and renew your application every three years, you can keep the same assessed

value frozen in perpetuity. Bear in mind that approval does not freeze your property taxes, as each taxing jurisdiction you pay into is subject to change their individual tax rates each vear. Income eligibility limitations are adjusted by the Arizona Department of Revenue each year, so if you don't qualify this year, try again in 2022. For 2021, the average of your last three years' income cannot exceed \$38,112 for one owner or \$47,640 if there are two or more owners on title. For more information, or to request a copy of the application, please call the Gila County Assessor's

Office at (928) 472-7973 in Payson, (928) 402-8714 in Globe, or download the three-page application from the Assessor's Office pages at gilacountyaz.gov. Freezing the assessed value on which taxes are based, the program reduces year-overyear increases on property tax bills. Administered by the Gila County Assessor's Office, the program is designed to prevent residents on a fixed income from being "taxed out of their house." To be eligible, at least one owner must be 65+ years of age, as stated before, and you must have lived at the residence as your primary residence for the past two years or more.

To qualify, submit a completed application along with proof of all income for all owners on title for the past three years. Federal tax returns work best, if you file taxes.

Applicants must also show proof of age and proof of residency -- a copy of your driver's license satisfies both requirements if it shows your home address and was issued at least two years prior.

Assessor's Office staff will tally your gross income for all three years and determine the average.
