

Gila County Public Health confirms increase in Covid-19 cases

Gila County Public Health has confirmed Covid-19 cases are increasing in our communities. Our public health officials have determined that the Delta variant has been detected locally. Nationally, this variant is responsible for over 80 percent of all new cases and is noticeably more infectious than previous variants. In the past few months, the majority of these positive cases in Gila County have not been vaccinated. Gila County Public Health is

offering free Covid-19 tests. We conduct in-house serology, PCR and antigen tests. We have the results in 10-15 minutes for each test.

As of July 20, 2021, our county has administered a total of 49,267 Covid-19 vaccines. Our population is 49.3 percent vaccinated. Gila County Public Health offers Pfizer, Johnson &







Keep an eve on the weather! Sudden wind gusts can blow sparks into vegetation outside your cleared area, causing unexpected fires:

Make sure your campfire is dead out!

Campfires and charcoal BBQs must be completely extinguished after use. Abandoned campfires continue to be a major cause of wildfires. Always keep enough water on hand and a tool to drown and stir fires. If it is too hot to touch, it is too hot to leave. More campfire safety and prevention tips can be found at Smokevbear.com.

Violators of regulations that prohibit abandoning a campfire are subject to a fine and/or imprisonment. If an abandoned campfire causes a wildfire, violators can also be held responsible for fire suppression costs.

Do you think you have a drinking problem? Alcoholics Anonymous CAN HELP! (928) 425-4557 inspect vehicles and trailers for proper maintenance, especially in relation to tire condition, brakes and wheel bearings. The Arizona climate is tough on tires and wheel bearings; tire blowouts or worn bearings can be very dangerous but can also cause wildfires. Take time to adjust trailer chains to avoid them dragging and sparking fires. Many tire shops and mechanics are available in the area to provide professional assistance in inspecting vehicles and often inspection is free.

Dr. Lawrence Hale Mellor, longtime local dentist, died Sunday, July 18, 2021 at his home in Globe, Arizona.

He was born on March 8, 1942 in Pocatello, Idaho, to Francis Lawrence Mellor and Gwen Hale. He was a mischievous vouth who found the straight and narrow. After graduating from high school he attended Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah where he met the love of his life, Sandra Millet.

Lawrence paused his education to serve a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day-Saints in Brazil from 1962 to 1965. Upon his return he married the love of his life, Sandra, in the Los Angeles Temple on July 16, 1965.



When it's time to call in a tutor

Busy schedules, hybrid learning and demanding coursework have affected students' academic performance over the last year-plus. The months since a pandemic was declared in March of 2020 have been unlike any other and confronting the academic challenges of the pandemic may have adversely affected some students' grades.

· Learning disorder: Certain students learn differently from others due to a diagnosed or undiagnosed learning disorder.

• Students "shut down" or say they "hate" school: Disinterest in school or expressions of hating going to school may be indicative of academic struggles in the classroom.

Tutors can be valuable resources for students who need some one-on-one attention to master general learning concepts or reinforce skills for key tests or projects.

There's just no way of getting around it, Jesus is God



Recently, my family and I went on a trip to Flagstaff. It was a nice little getaway. We spent some time resting at the cabin we rented, walked around downtown, saw a juggling show, and visited some local parks. At one park, a man began a conversation with me that ended up dealing with spiritual matters. As we talked he told me about his religious back-

ground, which was filled with all sorts of eclectic beliefs and philosophies. While the conversation was congenial, it unfortunately did not end as I would have hoped. In fact, as he walked away he told me that I was brainwashed.

What in our conversation made him come to this conclusion? I mean, this man said that he had some sort of belief in God and even in the Bible. His major objection was my insistence that Jesus of Nazareth was no mere man, prophet, teacher, or son of God in a human sense, but that Jesus is indeed God in the flesh. His rejection of this important, central, and historic Christian teaching is, sadly, not uncommon. There are many people, religious organizations, and even socalled churches that readily rebuke this teaching. It is unfortunate, however, because if you claim to hold to the Bible as the Word of God, you must believe that Jesus is God. Why? Because this is what the Bible teaches throughout its pages. There is just no way of getting around it, Jesus is God!

There are many helpful routes to take when trying to help an individual see the deity of Christ in the pages of the Bible. I often tell people that we are not looking for Jesus to stand up and say "Hey everyone, I'm God." That make the task simpler, but it wouldn't cover all the nuances and insights that the Bible reveals to us. Rather, I try to teach that when we are studying the deity of Christ (that Jesus is God) we are going to see how Jesus acted, what Jesus claimed, and how others responded to Jesus as a means of



building a complete case.

One of my favorite ways in which to show the deity of Christ is to talk about worship. I start by asking the question, "Who should we worship?" Right away the response is clear, "God!" Yes, Christians are called to worship God. In fact, our whole lives should be characterized by our worship and adoration of our great God and King. Throughout the Bible, we are told that if we bow down and worship anything besides God, we are in great sin. When God reveals the 10 Commandments through Moses, we are warned about worshiping false gods and idols. "You shall not make for yourself a carved image... you shall not bow down to them or serve them" (Exodus 20:4-5). Later, God's people are told that the glory of God is for God alone. "I am the LORD; that is my name; my glory I give to no other, nor my praise to carved idols" (Isaiah 42:8).

This same idea is carried over into the New Testament revelation as we are reminded that worship is to be for God alone. When Jesus is tempted in the wilderness, the devil shows Jesus all the glorious kingdoms of the world saying, "All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me." To which Jesus responds, "Be gone, Satan! For it is written, 'You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve" (Matthew 4:9-10). Again, Jesus points out that worship belongs to God alone.

Finally, after the Apostle John sees all the visions that he will record in the book of Revelation, he is overcome with emotion and begins to fall down and worship the angel who is with him. The angel rebukes John, saying, "You must not do that! I am a fellow servant with you and your brothers the prophets, and with those who keep the words of this book. Worship God" (Revelation 22:9).

We have established that people are called to worship God alone. Only God is worthy of worship.

Yet, as we read through the pages of the New Testament, we find that people worship Jesus and no one stops them or corrects them, not even Jesus Himself. For instance, when the Wise Men come to visit the baby Jesus we are told that they "fell down and worshiped him" (Matthew 2:11). Mary and Joseph were good Jews who know that worship belongs to God alone, and yet they do not stop this from happening. Why? Because they recognize that this baby is no ordinary child, but God in the flesh.

Throughout the ministry of Jesus we see moments when individuals fall down and worship before Him, and yet Jesus never stops them or corrects them (c.f. Matthew 14:33, 28:8-9, 17, Luke 19:38, John 12:13, 20:28). Theologian Millard Erickson points out that in Matthew 26:63 when Jesus is being questioned by the religious leaders. He has a great opportunity to correct any misunderstandings that people may have had about Him. "He could have avoided execution simply by denying that He was the Son of God, but He did not do that. Either He desired to die, albeit on a false charge, or He did not respond because the charge brought against Him was correct." Jesus would not lie about His true identity.

So should Christians worship Jesus? Most definitely! Worship belongs to God; therefore worship belongs to Jesus. The deity of Christ can be seen in a number of ways throughout the pages of the New Testament, this is only one of them. We worship Jesus because He is the eternal God made flesh.





You shouldn't dispose of unused or expired medications by flushing them down the toilet. Chemicals from prescription medicines can damage vour town's water treatment system - or your own septic system, if you're off the grid. Instead, bring your expired and unused pills, powders, patches and ointments to a prescription medication take-back event Saturday. July 31 at the Miami Police Station. 740 W. Sullivan St., from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. There's no need to even leave your

car at this convenient family using opioids. drive-through event.

Medications, pills, powders, patches and ointments are accepted - but do not bring needles, inhalers or liquids. Drug overdose deaths in the United States continue to rise at an alarming rate. Just last week the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported a 29 percent spike in deaths over the past year - an estimated 93.331, including 69.710 involving opioids. The risk of overdose doubles for young people who have

Most people who misuse prescription drugs get them from family, friends and acquaintances. You can make a difference by keeping track of the medicine you have, rethinking where and how you keep your medications in your home, and safely disposing of any unused medications. Don't share: keep track of vour legally prescribed controlled substances that is, count your pills so you always know how much you should have and so you know when to take

action if any go missing. With controlled substances, sharing is not caring. You could be putting your loved ones at risk and unintentionally contributing to drug misuse, drug addiction or a fatal drug overdose. Limit access. Everyone knows to keep medicine out of the reach of children, but adolescents and teens can reach all the medicines in vour home and they know exactly where you keep what. Many people keep their medicine in easy to reach, easy to access cup-



boards, medicine cabinets, drawers, etc. So put vour medicine somewhere that only you can easily find and access - locked up, if possible.


