Help residents by signing up for a sandbag volunteer team

Even if your home is on higher ground well above creek floodplains, you can help your lower elevation friends and neighbors who are scrambling this month to protect their properties from flooding and stormwater surges we've seen magnified in the aftermath of the Telegraph Fire.

How can you help? Fill sandbags at Gila County Public Works' self-serve sandbag filling station. Even better, muster a team of 10-20 volunteers – coworkers at your business, or family and friends – and sign up for a 'team day' spending 2-3 morning hours filling sandbags alongside Gila County Public Works staff. County staff have been working over the

past month to fill more than 30,000 sandbags, stacking them 50 per pallet, and delivering those pallets to central locations around Miami, Claypool, Globe, Dripping Springs and Tonto Basin, for residents who are dealing with flash flooding. Gila County Public Works' sandbag station is

at the lot near the Russell Gulch Landfill turnoff, at the crossroads of Russell Road and Besich Boulevard. Local residents may stop by anytime, day or night, to fill their own sandbags. Empty bags and a big pile of sand are there free for all who need to prepare for flooding. Can you muster a team

of 10-20 volunteers willing to work together, tie and stack 20-35 pound sandbags? If yes, please make sure to call and pre-arrange to schedule your group volunteer morning. Call ahead to make that arrangement, and Gila County staff will be there to run a front-end loader and sand-

bag filling machine for groups that pre-arrange a morning or afternoon. How about your group or 10-20 family and friends? Here's a great way to help, to volunteer right here in our community. 4H families were the very first group to volunteer, and they returned for another morning of volunteerism.

Globe High School Tiger football players and Boy Scouts signed up for their day – Resolution Copper Company employees have mustered a team, Carlota and Freeport mine workers signed up for their day – City of Globe and Town of Miami staff, too. Globe CrossFit owner Greg brought his athletes over one morning – other local gyms would be most welcome to muster a team, too! Groups usually start at 7 a.m. and volunteers are needed today, tomorrow, Friday and Saturday – or any weekday next week. 

‘Thank you -- Our Deepest Gratitude’ from Gila County Animal Care & Control

On behalf of our team here at Gila County Animal Care & Control, we extend our deepest gratitude to those who have provided support as volunteers, as well as donating supplies during the Telegraph and Mescal Fires. We appreciate your continued support to help us with displaced animals and assist their owners with supplies, compassion and a safe place for their animals.

When evacuations first began, we took in 72 animals within a 12-hour period, at which time the Arizona Humane Society sent reinforcements to Globe - a team of six emergency response personnel to assist with care of animals displaced by the fires. The Arizona Humane Society provided their time, supplies and experienced

assistance in caring for this rapid, unprecedented influx of animals. Governor Doug Ducey responded to our need for more space and generously donated \$100,000 towards the rental of two large, air-conditioned tents. The Central Arizona Humane Society and the Arizona Animal Welfare League (AAWL) brought approximately 100 large wire kennels. AAWL transferred six animals and Central Arizona Humane Society transferred four dogs and 12 puppies, who will all be adopted from their facility.

The Salvation Army also set up a Community Resource Center at the old Safeway building in Claypool, where citizens affected by the fire could pick up nonperishable food for both people and

pets, cleaning supplies and hygiene kits. Residents from Gila, Maricopa and Pinal Counties donated a variety of supplies to care for pets. Additionally, many Gila County residents have provided donations along with encouraging “Thank You!” posters for our staff members.

Businesses from Maricopa County such as Pet Planet College, Pet Plan Boardwalk and Tradition East have brought several donations from their stores. The Superstition Mountain VFW post in Apache Junction donated \$15,000 worth of supplies in addition to a cash donation of \$2,145. We had 10 volunteers and a borrowed trailer to assist with collecting, loading and unloading the supplies. Timothy Ralston,

with Capstone Mining Corporation’s Pinto Valley Mine, donated a generous \$50,000 for continued care. Doug Lara, with AGS Safety & Supply, donated four pallets of water and 200 plastic food and water bowls. Local businesses such as The United Fund of Globe and Tri-City Furniture collected donations from the public.

We are a small staff here at Gila County Animal Care & Control, and we are beyond grateful for the continued support from all who donated! Again, we say “Thank you!” to every person who has donated and shared their appreciation. It takes a community, and we have an amazing one!

Overnight closure of US 60 between Miami, Superior scheduled July 21

A full overnight closure of US 60 between Miami and Superior is scheduled the night of Wednesday, July 21, for work on the new Pinto Creek Bridge. The road will close to all traffic between 8 p.m. and 4 a.m. to pour the remaining portion of the bridge deck. The road is scheduled to reopen at 4 a.m., however, alternating lane closures with flaggers may be required after 4 a.m., if work extends beyond that hour. In the event of inclement weather or unforeseen circumstances, the night of Wednesday, July 28, has been scheduled as a tentative backup date. During the closure, all eastbound vehicles will be redirected at State Route

177 in Superior, and westbound vehicles will be redirected at the west end of Miami. Traffic will not be allowed to queue at the closure locations. Motorists with a destination between SR 177 and Top-of-the-World west of Pinto Creek or between Miami and Pinto Valley Mine Road east of Pinto Creek will be allowed to pass, however no vehicles will be allowed between Top-of-the-World and Pinto Valley Mine Road. Traffic will be detoured to SR 177 in Superior and SR 77 in Globe. The detour includes a 10% grade and will significantly increase travel time. Motorists should proceed with caution, slow down, watch for equip-

ment, and follow the directions of flaggers and law enforcement. More information about the project is available at azdot.gov/PintoCreekBridge. Schedules are subject to change based on weather and other unforeseen factors. 

Confidence in God

As God heals our soul, one thing we notice is that we become stronger and more confident. With every step of healing He leads us through, we see that He is faithful and trustworthy, and this increases our confidence in Him. Life is much easier and more enjoyable when we are confident than it is when we feel hesitant or unsure. When we are confident, we believe and feel certain we can do something, and that belief empowers us to live with courage, joy, and hopeful expectation. A confident person can look in the mirror each day and say, “You and God together can do anything you need to do today.”

The most important thing about confidence is to know where it comes from. Some

people can develop an attitude of confidence in themselves, thinking, I can do this! and I’ve got what it takes! But as believers in Jesus, our confidence comes from Him. Anyone can feel confident in certain areas, but we can be confident in all areas of life as we find our confidence in God. He gives us not only confidence in what we can do, but also in who we are. Our ability to be confident comes from the fact that He loves us, He fights our battles for us, He is always leading us to victory, and we belong to Him.

If we put our confidence in ourselves, we will eventually be disappointed. Writing to fellow believers, the apostle Paul declared that we “glory in Christ Jesus and put

no confidence in the flesh” (Phil. 3:3 ESV). When we trust in God with confidence, we no longer struggle with stress, worry, or fear of what will happen if we don’t do everything right.

The Old Testament prophet Jeremiah understood, as Paul did, that we cannot place our confidence in ourselves. He wrote, “Cursed is the one who trusts in man, who draws strength from mere flesh . . . But blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose confidence is in him” (Jer. 17:5, 7 NIV).

An important point I like to make is that in Christ we can be confident even when we do not feel confident. We cannot trust our feelings because they can change at a moment’s notice and without

warning. Instead, we can put our confidence in Christ.

God’s Word is full of powerful truths we can trust and depend on, truths that will build a firm foundation of confidence in God for our lives. People may cause you to change the way you feel about yourself, especially if they do or say something that undermines your confidence or makes you wonder if you are weak. But no one can change the truth of what God says about you or who He is in your life. So put your confidence in Him!

Prayer Starter: Father, Your Word is full of truth, and I know I can always trust in You. Help me as I build my confidence and put all of my trust in You! In Jesus’ name, amen.

The Bible: Our Final Authority

“Experts say...scholars agree...” Have you heard these phrases before? Many times, as a news show discusses a difficult topic, in order to bring closure to the issue, they often bring in an “expert” to give the final word on the matter. After the “expert” speaks, the conversation is over (at least to some). What do you trust to be the final word on any given issue? For followers of Christ, that authority is found in the Bible alone. This is an important aspect of the Christian life; that true followers of Christ submit to the Bible as God’s authoritative word.

Please notice that I specifically wrote that believers “submit” to the Bible, not simply “believe” in the Bible. Why is that an important distinction? There are many who claim to believe in the Bible, who claim to care about what the Bible says; however, upon closer examination their actions and life speak contrary to their profession. The Bible is often treated as a fortune cookie where an individual randomly opens to a page, reads one verse out of context, and then imagines they’ve received some special guidance. This reminds me of an old joke where a man, seeking direction, randomly opens up his Bible, places his finger on a verse: “He went and hanged himself” (Matthew 27:5). Thinking that that couldn’t be right, he did it again, “You go, and do likewise” (Luke 10:37). Distraught, he tried one more time, “What you are going to do, do quickly” (John 13:27). Obviously, this is not the way we should treat the Bible.

At Maranatha we hold to an historic confession (the New Hampshire Confession of Faith) that reminds us how God’s people have viewed the Bible down through the ages. The article is as follows: “We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, the glory of God and the salvation of man for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by

which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.” Not only do we believe this statement but we submit ourselves to the Bible of which it speaks.

Submitting to the Bible means that whatever the Bible says, we are to believe, to follow, and to be changed by it. Our ideas, beliefs, and traditions all need to be molded by God’s Word. Even firmly held beliefs that have been taught for years and years need to be reexamined in light of God’s revealed word. Why? Truth matters! I don’t want to base my life on a lie or my own misconceptions. If I believe that the words in the Bible are the very words of God, then I must be in submission to them. I must constantly reassess myself and my ideas by what God has said.

“All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work” (2 Timothy 3:16). Do you believe this? Does your church believe this? The Bible is the only book on earth that is written by God, literally “breathed out” by Him and given to us so that we may be complete. I am very confused by people who say they believe this about the Bible, but do not spend time reading it or desire to have it shape their daily lives.

Again, having the Bible, reading the Bible, or even saying you believe in the Bible is not enough. Unfortunately, there are many “churches” who do each of these things but they don’t actually submit to it. How can I say such a thing? They admit it themselves! Claiming the Bible is merely

a product of mankind, many spend most of their time explaining away the truths of the Bible until everything becomes relative and the Bible no longer has any meaning. I have often asked people who belong to such groups, “If you wouldn’t keep a map that contained wrong directions, why do you hold on to a Bible you don’t trust?” I’ve never heard a good answer...

Don’t get me wrong, the Bible is not the simplest book and it does take some explanation and study but on the whole, the Bible is clear on the most foundational issues. This is what we call the perspicuity of Scripture. Perspicuity is just a fancy word meaning that the Bible is clear. You don’t have to go to Bible college or have a degree in linguistics to understand the basic message and teaching. The Bible is written to the common, everyday people, and when read, it can be understood.

I recognize that churches have understood minor topics differently throughout history and even today; however, when it comes to the non-negotiable aspects of the Faith, that which separates true Biblical Christianity from counterfeit christianity, true churches find agreement. Counterfeit churches don’t like what the Bible clearly teaches, so they do “theological gymnastics” in order to undermine its teaching. In fact, counterfeit churches love to undermine the trustworthiness of the Bible because this makes the people dependent on false teachers and their organization. “You can’t possibly understand the Bible without us telling you what it means.” This tragically rips the Bible out of the hands of the everyday people.

True Christians and true churches submit to the Bible as God’s perfect word. Therefore, everything we do, believe, and teach must come from the Bible. The Bible is the final authority on all matters of faith and practice. The Bible is the final word on every issue, and when rightly understood, we should be conformed to its words. The Bible alone is the “expert” that comes in to end the controversy. So I encourage you, please, read the Bible today and heed what it says!



Expand your grilling horizons

Grilling is a great way to cook many different types of foods. Burgers, chicken or steaks may be grilling staples, but many other foods are equally at home cooking over an open flame.



Shrimp grills up perfectly and can be enhanced with mesquite, oak or pecan wood. Wrapping shrimp with a spinach leaf not only increases the wow factor when plating, it also helps keep the shrimp tender and moist during cooking. Such is the case in this recipe for "Wood-Grilled Shrimp and Yellow Peppers" from "The Gardener & The Grill" (Running Press) by Karen Adler & Judith Fertig.

Wood-Grilled Shrimp and Yellow Peppers

Serves 4

1/2 cup moistened wood chips or dry wood pellets

1 1/2 pounds large shrimp (18 to 20 count), peeled and deveined

30 medium-size spinach leaves

2 yellow, red, or orange bell peppers, stemmed, seeded, and cut into quarters

1/4 cup olive oil

Kosher or sea salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

Prepare a hot fire on one side of your grill for indirect cooking.

Wrap each shrimp loosely with a large spinach leaf. Place the shrimp in a disposable aluminum pan. Lightly season with sea salt and pepper, and then drizzle lightly with olive oil.

For a charcoal grill, throw 1/2 cup moistened wood chips or dry wood pellets directly on the coals right before you want to grill. For a gas grill, enclose the wood chips or pellets in a foil packet with holes poked in the top; place the packet on the grill grate over the heat source.

When you see the first wisp of smoke from the wood, place the shrimp on the indirect side of the heat and the peppers on the direct side. Close the lid and grill for 8 minutes. Open the lid and turn the peppers. Grill for another 8 minutes. Open the lid and turn the peppers. Grill for another 8 minutes, then open the lid and transfer the peppers to the indirect side. Close the lid and transfer the peppers to the indirect side. Close the lid and grill for 15 to 20 minutes more, or until the shrimp are cooked through and they have a pleasant, smoky aroma.

To serve, cut the peppers into strips, arrange on plates, and top with the shrimp.
