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Floods hit Globe-Miami on July 4th weekend

After the devastation of the Telegraph and Mescal wildfires, fears of post-fire flooding came true over the Fourth of July weekend. Days of rain over the burn scar sent torrents of black water and debris down Pinal Creek. Flooding also hit Russell Gulch, Bloody Tanks Wash,

Claypool and Wheatfields. At least 15 homes were damaged by the rushing waters and mud.

The following Tuesday, Gila County Public Works Director Steve Sanders told the Board of Supervisors that the rain started Friday, July 2. He said a rain gauge in Six Shooter Canyon recorded more than three inches over the weekend, while gauges on Signal Peak and in Russell

Gulch recorded 1.89 and 1.54 inches respectively.

The CWG was formed in 2013 to engage people from the communities potentially affected by this prospective project. The intent of the group is to provide

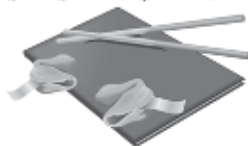
an avenue for people to learn the facts and myths, discuss, debate and better determine the truth by considering information and data from mine officials as well as other independent expert sources.

The CWG deals with social and environmental impacts, health, safety, natural resources, engineering, water quantity and

Boy Scout Troop 101 goes to Philmont Scout Ranch

Recently 10 members of Boy Scout Troop 101, sponsored by Globe-Miami Elks Lodge 489, traveled to Philmont Scout Ranch in northern New Mexico. The group spent 10 days backpacking from camp to camp on the ranch. The Scouts covered over 70 miles during their time on the trail. Each day found the crew at a different staffed camp, which offered a variety of activities for the Scouts. Some were based on themes of the mid- to late 1800's such as a logging camp and an 1870's homestead. More modern activities included 3-D archery and fly fishing.

Philmont Scout Ranch is owned and operated by the National Boy Scouts of America and is considered the finest High Adventure

Camp in the country. It is easily the largest youth camp in the world. It covers over 140,000 acres of the southern tip of the Rocky Mountains, known as the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, near Cimarron. Each summer approximately 22,000 Scouts from across the country and around the world experience Philmont's over 300 miles of trails.

Due to the popularity of the camp, Troop 101 had to make their reservations to attend almost two years prior to actually going this summer.

Donors needed for blood drive

Come on Globe-Miami, during one donation. Blood lets fill our next blood drive on Friday, July 16 at the Globe Elks Lodge on Maple Street near Denny's. Yes, giving blood is both safe and healthy. Face-masks are required, and pre-arranged appointments are also required in order to schedule the most efficient day possible. Sign up in advance and online, pick your choice from remaining appointment times at redcrossblood.org or call 1-800-RED-CROSS.

Appointments available July 16 are for regular whole blood and also 'Power Red' donations; the latter allows you to safely donate two units of red blood cells

during one donation. Blood is drawn from one arm by a machine that separates and collects two units of red blood cells, then safely returns the remaining blood components, along with some saline, back to you through the same arm -- and just one needle jab is required. A Power Red donation takes approximately 30 minutes longer than a whole blood donation, so plan on about 35-45 minutes in the chair. You're limited to donating approximately once every four months. New donors are welcome and urgently needed. Questions about giving blood, or a Power Red donation? Read more at redcrossblood.org.

Get your strength back. Get your fight back, be a warrior for God

How do you build a stronger spiritual life? Be a river, not a swamp...Identify blessings...Be like Moses—speak words of blessings...Nurture a shared prayer life...Take a step of faith...Be a grateful person...and share the journey.

Have you lost the kind of fighting faith that can move mountains? Are you overwhelmed, discouraged, wounded, and have lost hope in being a soldier of the cross? If this is happening to you, it is time to get up, dust yourself off, let it go, whatever is taking your focus off of God. You must remember that God is still on the throne and not one thing happens without His say so. This is the time to get back up and fight the good fight of faith. What happened yesterday is gone, we are here today, "This is the day the Lord has made let us rejoice and be glad in it!" Psalm 118:24

What does this mean? When you, as Christians, are rejected for your profession of faith, remember how Jesus was mocked, beaten, suffered, and died for you. Jacob had power with God despite his own sinful flesh! You see Jacob had deceived his father, Isaac, into giving the family birthright to him instead of to Esau. Years later, he thought he would pay for his deceitful act when he learned his brother was racing toward him with 400 rough riders, appearing set for revenge. Genesis 32:7. In that lonely hour, Jacob must have cried, "Oh Lord, I am about to lose everything. My very life is on the line!" 32:24 That same night of agony and dread, Jacob sought comforting words from God, the Lord came to wrestle with him, as if he were an enemy. "The man wrestled with him until the breaking of the day."

Our battle is never with people—not with co-workers, not our neighbor, nor our unsaved loved ones, but with God himself. You see, as we settle things with the Lord, making our lives right before Him, everything else falls into line. It won't matter what other battles you face in life. All the demons in hell cannot make a dent in what God wants to do through the fight he put in you.

How many Christians have been tested by trials? We hear so much talk about prayer warriors, but sadly many of them have never been in true battle. When hard times come many Christians quit the battle. The deep tested Christians are leaders in God's last-day army. He causes them to wrestle mightily with Him, and through the work of His spirit they emerge as warriors tried and tested. The more intense the trial, the greater the work he has planned for them to do.

Bethel, where Jacob wrestled with the Lord, is a symbol of our prayer life, the place we go to meet God. At Bethel, Jacob declared, "Surely the Lord is in this place, and I did not know it." Genesis 28:16

Bethel means "House of God," a place to meet the Lord. And His words to Jacob there apply to every generation: "Behold, I am with you and will keep you wherever you go." Genesis 28:15

Bethel is our secret closet of prayer, the place we go in our time of uncertain times of fear, disappointment, discouragement. Every time you call out to Him, He will meet you there. Shut yourself in with Him, block out all other voices and noise and you will hear His quite still voice. Tell Him, I will not go until I hear from you. I need you, Lord!"

Rise up and lay hold of His promises. If you have to wrestle with Him until He gives you an answer, and when you feel peace which overwhelms you, you know you are in the presence of God.

Called to be a faithful and obedient witness

Being an “authentic” witness a l s o

He was dead. They knew He was dead. Yet now He was standing right in front of them, giving a command. “Go therefore and make disciples...” (Matthew 28:19) Jesus’ followers must have been overcome at this experience. Why? Because dead people don’t usually come back to life! In fact, Matthew writes that as they were worshipping the risen Christ some still doubted even as He stood before them (Matthew 28:17).

After three years of training, and now experiencing the resurrection of Christ, still some had a hard time believing even as He stood right before them. You see, we are prone to disbelieve, prone to question and even prone to wandering from the truth of God. However, we must listen to what Jesus says and how He says it in order to be who we are called to be; disciple makers. If you have experienced the grace of God, you must share it with others.

All followers of Christ must heed and act upon the command Christ gives in Matthew 28. The task of evangelism is not solely the job of the pastor or overseas missionary, but for all who know the gift of saving faith in Christ. We are to be so overwhelmed by what God has done for us that we must tell others. As it has often been said, we are merely beggars showing other beggars where to find bread. To do this effectively, we must be authentic, vocal witnesses in our everyday lives.

Being “authentic” means we have been truly born again by the Spirit of God. You cannot share what you do not have. Testing our own hearts to see whether or not we are in the faith (2 Corinthians 13:5) is vital for anyone as they begin the pursuit of evangelism. It is only from this place of assurance in Christ that we can effectively and passionately “proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light”

means we sincerely care about those to whom we are witnessing. The gospel is not a hammer we use to crush others who have different beliefs. Rather, we speak the gospel boldly because we have a sincere desire to see them come to a saving faith in Christ. The Apostle Paul cries out, “We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God” (2 Corinthians 5:20). Paul gives this bold admonition not out of a place of anger but out of love and concern for the many people in Corinth living their lives apart from God. Likewise, believers today must be intentional vocal witnesses because we desperately wish to see as many people as possible come to understand the depths of their sin and the riches of grace that God mercifully bestows upon those who come to Christ in repentance and faith.

We cannot think we are actually being witnesses if we are not opening our mouths. Yes, we can be good examples by our daily attitudes and actions. And yes, this is a way to glorify God (1 Peter 2:12). However, in order for people to truly know how we are changed by Christ, we must speak. In fact, the Apostle Paul makes this very clear. “And how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching?” (Romans 10:14). The gospel is the good news of what Christ accomplished for His people upon the cross of Calvary and like every message it must be spoken. Therefore, to be an effective witness of Christ we must vocally speak the gospel to those who need salvation.

Thirdly, our witness needs to come in our everyday lives. For some reason, we’ve decided in the American church that we must go to other countries on mis-

sion trips in order to be vocal witnesses. The reality is that God calls each of us to be witnesses wherever He has placed us. When Jesus calls Peter and Andrew, He says, “Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men” (Matthew 4:20). Professor Ren Broekhuizen points out that before Jesus calls them, Matthew states that Peter and Andrew are fishermen. Why is this important? Because Jesus is calling them to serve Him right where they are. He is not saying they must be something they are not, but to be vocal witnesses as fishermen. Similarly, when Jesus calls us He calls us right where we are. Whether you are a teacher, business owner or police officer, you are called to be a witness in your sphere of influence.

Finally, as we boldly proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ we must remember Jesus’ promises. As Jesus gives the Great Commission, He assures us, “Behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age” (Matthew 28:20). Jesus does not leave us alone as we try to witness. He comforts us and empowers us to be effective and fruitful in our endeavors. God, speaking through the prophet Isaiah, says, “My word that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it” (Isaiah 55:11). Our job is only to be faithful and obedient witnesses. God is the One who saves, not us. Therefore, when God’s gospel goes forth we can rest in His sovereign hand to save.

“All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me...” (Matthew 28:18). Jesus is the King of kings and Lord of lords. When He speaks we must listen. When Jesus commands us to “go,” we must go. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth” (Acts 1:8). He has called us, empowers us and remains with us. The question is, “Will we obey?”

Whether they know it or not, Valley residents live an easy 90-minute drive from cooler temperatures, historic destinations, outdoor recreation, charming shops, and much-loved local eateries.

If they don't know it now, they soon will, thanks to the City of Globe's multi-level marketing campaign, "#SmallTownSummer."

For the first time, the City is promoting itself out of town by "target marketing," using strategically selected markets and demographics in partnership with the Phoenix New Times in print, digital, and multi-platform social media.

For more than 50 years, Valley readers have eagerly searched its pages, seeking timely information on the area's arts, culture and events.

Now, nearly 1.8 million readers will learn about the many reasons to visit Globe this summer and fall.

Even if only a small fraction of those readers make the trip, both the City and local businesses will reap the benefits from increased tourism dollars and bed tax revenue, says Linda Odonetto, the City's economic development director.

The City's contract with the New Times includes print and social media ads and a website dedicated exclusively to Globe.

In addition, the "#SmallTownSummer" campaign will include billboards in the Valley and banners on Broad Street of historic downtown Globe.

The City is marketing Globe as a day trip or weekend destination, not just a brief stopover on the way to somewhere else, says Melissa Steele, who is also with the City's

Economic Development Department.

The slogan "Go to Globe" means "Go to--not through--Globe," she explains. Be sure to check for the City's "Go to Globe" Facebook page, which was set to "go live" last Thursday. While the City anticipates that its campaign may soon result in a wave of visitors, an even bigger wave may hit Globe when Phoenix hosts the Super Bowl in 2023.

As Valley hotels and restaurants fill up for the big game, some visitors will be looking for an authentic Arizona adventure. Our plan is to market the Globe area as that ideal experience. When that happens, local businesses will be able to take advantage of the increased visitor traffic.

**Refreshing the Pinal Creek Trail*

One of the many outdoor recreation amenities the City is working to develop is the Pinal Creek Trail.

Also known as the "Cobre Valley Rail Trail," it is a 9.4-mile multi-use path connecting the Tri-Cities along creeks, railways and downtown corridors.

According to a study conducted by the Arizona Depart-

ment of Transportation, the concept of turning Pinal Creek, which runs through the City, into a functioning urban greenbelt has long been the dream of several area citizens.

At an elevation of 3,500 feet, the scenic corridor boasts features including a wooded greenbelt; access to historic downtown Globe and local parks; the Community Center and the Gila Pueblo Campus of Eastern Arizona College.

On June 22, staff presented the City's Recreational Master Plan as part of the 2021-22 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) budget.

In addition to the Community Center pool, new playgrounds, game field upgrades and a splash pad, the proposed master plan includes Phase I of the Pinal Creek Trail Project.

Odonetto explains that Phase I will include the stretch of trail from the Community Center, at 1370 S. Jesse Hayes Rd., to the new Pinal Creek Bridge (locally known as Connie's Bridge).

The timing could not be better, as the recent Telegraph Fire has renewed the focus on clearing the creeks and washes in both City and County areas before this summer's monsoon season, Odonetto says.

Baked Peppers With Rice Stuffing

Serves 6

3 tablespoons olive oil
1 large chicken breast, diced
5 ounces lean pork, diced
4 ounces ham or smoked bacon, diced
7 ounces short-grain rice
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
2 pounds ripe tomatoes, skinned, seeded and chopped
1 green bell pepper, finely chopped
3 tablespoons corn kernels
2 teaspoons paprika
Pinch powdered saffron
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
6 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
6 large red bell peppers



Heat the oil in a large saucepan and fry the chicken, pork and ham or bacon until colored on all sides. Take the pan off the heat and reserve.

Meanwhile, cook the rice in plenty of boiling salted water until done — usually about 15 minutes, but follow the instructions on the package. Drain and reserve the rice.

Add the garlic, chopped tomatoes, green bell pepper, corn kernels, paprika, saffron, salt and pepper, and parsley to the pan containing the meat. Let the sauce simmer and reduce the volume of liquid by about half. Stir the rice into the sauce.

Oil a deep ovenproof dish big enough to take all the peppers. Cut off “lids” at the stalk ends of the peppers and remove the seeds. Stuff them with the meat and rice mixture and replace the lids. Tuck the peppers into the dish, cover with foil, and bake at 325 F for 1 1/4 hours.
