## **Youth Mental Health First** Aid Program has gone fully virtual

Since October 2018 AZYP, partnered with Interfaith Community Services, has offered both youth and adult Mental Health First Aid training. The program has gone fully virtual, with available dates of March 17. March 31. April 6 and April 20.

Register for AZYP's Youth Mental Health First Aid program, where you can learn how to help out teens during a mental health crisis. Those 18 and up can visit the AZYP link to register and get more information: http:// ow.ly/yAMF50DFXub.

Youth Mental Health First Aid is designed to teach teachers, family members, caregivers, school staff, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health challenge or is in crisis. This program is primarily designed for adults who have regular contact with young people, and is an approved curriculum for the Arizona Department of Education-required Suicide Prevention Training. The course covers common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development and teaches a five-step plan to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Topics include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (ADHD) and eating disorders.

Adult Mental Health First Aid is appropriate for anyone at least 18 years of age who wants to learn how to help a person who is experiencing a mental health crisis or problem. Topics covered include depression, anxiety, psychosis and addictions.

There are many factors that can play a part in mental illness: genetics, brain chemistry or structure, experienced trauma or an underlying medical condition.





# CASA of Gila County celebrates National Social Workers Month

When children are in danger and families are in crisis, it's often up to the social workers of the world to find the resources and support to help. This is why during March, National Professional Social Work Month, CASA of Gila County applauds the social workers our volunteers interact with every day who are working hard to make a difference for children and families in Arizona.

"Social workers play a vital role in the child welfare system," said Emily Nader, CASA Coordinator. "They have a tough job and we are grateful for the work they do to help children



from our communities. We are grateful to work with them as a team for the best interest of the children we serve through CASA of Gila County."

Court Appointed Special Advocates are not social workers, but they are highly trained volunteers who act as the eyes and ears of the court on cases of children who have experienced

abuse and/or neglect. They visit with the children regularly and collect information that helps the court make more informed decisions. CASA volunteers work closely with social workers and other members of the child's team to ensure the child has their needs met while in foster care. When a CASA volunteer is assigned, a higher number of services are ordered for children and families.

# APS announces seasonal operation plans at Four Corners Power Plant

PHOENIX – Arizona Public Service Co. (APS), an owner and operator of the Four Corners Power Plant, has announced an agreement among plant owners Navajo Transitional Energy Company (NTEC), Public Service Company of New Mexico (PNM), Salt River Project (SRP) and Tucson Electric Power (TEP) to move toward operating the plant seasonally beginning in fall 2023, subject to necessary approvals.

The agreement comes as PNM announced plans to transfer its share of ownership to NTEC in 2024. The transfer of ownership, in combination with seasonal operations, will bring substantial environmental benefits and ensure continued service reliability for customers, especially during Arizona's notoriously hot summer months, as APS transitions to its planned exit from coal by 2031.

The shift to seasonal operations will reduce annual carbon emissions by an estimated 20-25 percent, furthering APS' commitment to achieve 100 percent clean energy by 2050 and the individual sustainability goals of the plant's other owners. The Four Corners Power Plant has already cut annual nitrogen oxide emissions by 88 percent since installing selective catalytic reduction (SCR) equipment on Units 4 and 5 in 2018.

"Four Corners has provided reliable and affordable electricity for almost 60 years, fostering economic growth and prosperity in cities and towns throughout the region," said Jacob Tetlow, senior vice president of operations at APS. "With seasonal operations, the plant will continue to be a critical source of reliable electricity when our customers need it most and enable a responsible transition to a cleaner energy future."

In alignment with APS' Coal Communities Transition, a \$144 million proposal focused on supporting coal communities including the Navajo Nation, the plan toward seasonal operations at Four Corners Power Plant takes into consideration reliability, customer affordability

and support for the Navajo Nation.

By moving to seasonal operations, Four Corners will become a more flexible resource that supports increasing amounts of clean energy, helping to compensate for the intermittent output of renewable resources. This change also helps ensure reliability of a critical energy source while reducing operations and maintenance costs.

Under seasonal operation, one of the plant's two remaining units will operate only through the summer season of June through October when customers' energy needs are the highest across the region. The plant's other unit will continue generating power year-round, subject to market conditions and planned maintenance outages.

The transition to seasonal operations will not require layoffs or furloughs of APS employees.

APS serves about 1.3 million homes and businesses in 11 of Arizona's 15 counties, and is a leader in delivering affordable, clean and reliable energy in the Southwest.

# Happy St. Patrick's Day

# Enjoy corned beef and cabbage this St. Patrick's Day

Corned beef and cabbage might not be a part of many people's diet regimens throughout the year. But come March 17, it's not uncommon to find people from all walks of life indulging in this beloved meal.

March 17 marks the celebration of St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland. Over the years, the day has also become a celebration of the Emerald Isle. Such celebrations tend to feature corned beef and cabbage, even though the dish may have little to do with Ireland (and even less to do with St. Patrick). The precise origins of the link between corned beef and St. Patrick's Day remain a topic of debate, but some historians say the corned beef enjoyed today can be traced to New York City's Irish immigrant population in the 19th and 20th centuries, who popularized a salted meat made from brisket that was then sold by Jewish butchers.





Regardless of the authenticity of its link to Ireland, corned beef is delicious and many modern Paddy's Day celebrants wouldn't think of going without it on March 17. Those who want to cook up their own can try this recipe for "Corned Beef and Cabbage" from Arthur Schwartz's "New York City Food" (Stewart, Tabori & Chang).

#### **Corned Beef and Cabbage**

Serves 6 to 8

Cook a whole brisket with both sections together with all its fat. (You can trim off the fat after the meat is cooked.) Whole brisket and second-cut corned beef brisket are hard to find, but your supermarket should have first-cut corned beef vacuum-packed in plastic. Choose the fattiest piece in the case and treat it gently.

You can cook the cabbage and potatoes in the same water as the corned beef. Because the other vegetables need to be cooked in water that simmers more than the meat, scoop out water from the corned beef pot and cook the vegetables in a separate pot or pots.

1 - 4 to 5 pound corned beef brisket

1 teaspoon pickling spices

1 head cabbage

2 pounds boiling potatoes

6 to 8 small carrots (optional)

Parsnips (optional)

Turnips (optional)

Place the corned beef in a pot that holds at least 5 quarts of water. Cover completely with cold water. Place over high heat and bring to a simmer.

As soon as bubbles start to break on the surface of the

water, adjust the heat so the water simmers very, very gently. With a slotted spoon, skim off the residue that accumulates on the surface. When the residue stops coming to the surface, add the pickling spices.

Continue to cook, with bubbles just gently breaking on the surface, for 3 to 4 hours, until fork tender.

The meat can be safely held in its water for about 2 hours; reheat gently.

Cook the vegetables until fork tender in separate pots of boiling fresh water or, especially for the cabbage, use some of the water in which the corned beef was cooked.

Slice the corned beef and serve with mustard and/or horseradish on a platter, surrounded with some of the vegetables or with vegetables in a separate bowl.





# Happy St. Patrick's Day

# The significance of Croagh Patrick


Croagh Patrick is a steep mountain in County Mayo in Ireland. It is situated five miles from the town of Westport. The mountain's summit soars above the surrounding countryside and enables those who manage to reach the top a magnificent view of Clew Bay.

The mountain is significant in Irish history because it was both a place of worship predating the arrival of Christianity in the country, but also the place St. Patrick was purported to have completed a 40-day Lenten ritual in the 5th century. Croagh Patrick is considered the holiest mountain in Ireland.

Each year on the last Sunday of July, which coincides with the pagan festival of Lughnasadh, thousands of people climb Croagh Patrick, also called The Reek or Patrick's Sacred Mountain, to reach the summit. The Irish heritage resource YourIrish.com estimates that between 30,000 and 40,000 people make the pilgrimage each year, most of them barefoot. Most consider it an important spiritual milestone.

Weather may prevent individuals from scaling the mountain during the month of March, but visiting the site is something that many tourists and native Irish alike aspire to do at some point in their lives. According to the Croagh Patrick Visitor Centre, the first stop is the Saint Patrick's statue, which was erected in 1928 by Reverend Father Patterson. In addition to viewing the statue and taking in some amazing views, visitors can stop in the Visitor Centre, known as "Teach na Miasa," which means "house of the dishes." It is believed the monks of nearby Murrisk Abbey washed their utensils in the stream that runs alongside the road to the center, called "Bóthar na Miasa (road of the dishes)," hence the name. A restaurant and craft shop are housed in Teach na Miasa.

There are many sights to see and rich history to learn along the trek. An archaeological excavation performed during the 1990s at the mountain discovered the remains of a small chapel dating to the time of St. Patrick, helping to solidify the authenticity of his Lenten pilgrimage so long ago. Croagh Patrick is a symbolic place that heralds Ireland's Christian roots.

# Green rivers are St. Patrick's Day traditions

Even though the first color associated with St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was blue, eventually green became the hue of choice to commemorate his work and the holiday established in his honor. Because Ireland is dominated by green, rolling hills, the country is affectionately known as the Emerald Isle. And green clothing and decorations have become the standard each March during St. Patrick's Day festivities.

It is one thing to drink a green beer or paint a green shamrock on your cheek, but dyeing an entire river green is an immense and awe-inspiring homage to St. Patrick's Day. Since 1962, the vast undertaking of dyeing a river a bright



shade of green has been a St. Patrick's Day tradition in Chicago. Tom Rowan, a 76-year-old retired police officer, handles the task, and his methods are top secret. The Chicago River has been transformed into a verdigris waterway every year, with the exception of 2020, when Covid-19 halted holiday plans. However, someone other than Rowan

managed to dye portions of the river green in 2020.

While the Chicago River is the most prominent green river on St. Patrick's Day, others currently emulate the same

effects or have done so in the past. The Irish Marching Society decided to bring the tradition to Rockford, Ill., and dye Rock River last year. San Antonio, TX; Savannah, GA; Indianapolis, IN; Charlotte, NC; Tampa, FL; and Washington, D.C. all have dyed various rivers green. In 2020, city officials in Dublin, Ireland, intended to dye the River

Liffey green as well.

Nontoxic dyes and environmentally safe products are used to produce the green hues. Some stick around for a few hours, while others may last for days until they dissipate. While they last, green rivers can produce dramatic effects that are fun to behold.

We are born with built-in qualities and take them for granted. The question then might be, did Jesus come to earth with those same qualities?

Did He get hungry? Thirsty? The answer seems to be yes to both. His eating dinner with tax collectors and sinners was noted in the Scriptures and when He was passing a well, He asked for a dipper of water. Although He had heavenly status, it seems He had humanness also. We can thank God for that.

When speaking to a crowd of five thousand – which has been estimated to have been twenty-eight thousand as women and children were not counted in the tally – He had concern for the populace and ordered food be prepared.

The shortest verse in the Bible, which most remember, is "Jesus wept." That is a human trait and is indicative of the feeling He had when his friend died. I am sure that Jesus must have had a lighter side and probably laughed at appropriate times. When Peter stepped out of the boat and was walking on the sea until reality set in and he sank, Jesus must have at least snickered and wanted to say, "Didn't I teach you better than that?"

I have heard the saying, "Big boys don't cry," but I realize that men do. That's humanness.

# What Are You Building On?

"You can talk the talk, but can you walk the walk?" "This is where the rubber meets the road." "The proof is in the pudding." These sayings are common for a reason: they are true. Sayings like this point to the fact that testing reveals reality. In other words, it's not simply about appearance, but about performance.

This is also true when one considers his or her profession of faith. It's so easy for us to say things about ourselves, to make a claim to be a follower of Jesus Christ. However, how can one test his or her own self-identification? Is this even important?

At Maranatha, we have been systematically making our way through the Gospel of Luke. As we approach each passage, our goal is always the same: "Let the text speak for itself." That is to say, we don't want to put our own ideas and assumptions on God's word; instead, we want God's word to be understood as God intends. We took this approach to a section commonly called the Sermon on the Plain. In this passage, Jesus gives an extended address to the people who have been following Him. Throughout this section, one idea becomes very apparent: Jesus is only interested in the "real deal."

While it is easy to put on a religious persona, Jesus is more interested in reality, not external appearances. So as He ends His

sermon in Luke 6, Jesus asks this probing question: "Why do you call me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do what I tell you?" (Luke 6:46). It makes total sense, doesn't it? The title 'Lord' is used for someone who has power and authority over others. When one's Lord speaks, not only is listening important, but acting in accordance with the wishes of one's Lord is important. Calling Jesus "Lord" but not obeying His word is utter foolishness and should cause one to question if Jesus really is your Lord. What would you say to me if I said I loved my wife but then I only ever treated her like garbage? Would you really believe my self-professed love?

To be a Christian, to have Jesus as your Lord, is to live in obedience to Him. If Jesus is your Lord, you will not only be hearers of His word, but doers of His word (James 1:22). If Jesus is your Lord, you will produce fruits of love, righteousness, and faithfulness that show the reality of your heart (Luke 6:45; Galatians 5:22). If Jesus is your Lord, you will build your life upon Him and His word. If Jesus is your Lord, you will remain firm in the faith even in the midst of the darkest storms of life.

You see, it's not good enough to come and hear about Jesus, you must do what He says. Jesus explains, "Everyone who comes to Me and hears My words and does them, I will show you what he is like: he is like a man building a house, who dug deep and laid the foundation on the rock" (Luke 6:47-48). Jesus describes the coming, hearing, and doing like a house built upon a firm foundation. Contrarily, Jesus says, "But the one who hears and does not do them is like a man who built a house on the ground without a foundation" (Luke 6:49). Jesus pictures hearing without doing like building a house on the ground, or "sand," as mentioned in Matthew's account (Matthew 7:26).

Why would anyone build a house on sand instead of a firm, solid foundation? Building on sand is easier, faster, and cheaper. Who has the patience to do the hard work of building a foundation, anyway? We don't want hard work, we want the path of least resistance. We want the benefits without any investment. We want the reward without any toil. Sound familiar? Jesus' point is that in the same way that it is work to properly build a house, there is work in maturing as one of His followers.



But a house is a house, right? Does it really matter what sort of foundation it is built on? Well, perhaps not in the beginning. On the outside, the houses look very similar. So what's the big deal? Eventually, as Jesus highlights in this parable, the storms come and the build will be tested. A foundation may not seem important until a rush of water begins to break against the house.

Jesus explains the outcomes, beginning with the house built upon the rock. "The stream broke against that house and could not shake it, because it had been well built" (Luke 6:48). When the time of testing came, all of the hard work of the past immediately paid off. Likewise, a true faith founded upon the foundation of Christ will continue to stand even when times of testing come. Sorrows, heart aches, and temptations may break against the servant of Christ as the waters break against the house, but because the servant's faith is firm and well-built, it will not falter, but grow stronger.

However, the one who has merely the appearance of faith, faith that isn't truly rooted in Christ, faith that doesn't act, is like the house built upon the sand. "When the stream broke against [the house without a foundation], immediately it fell, and the ruin of that house was great" (Luke 6:49). This, Jesus says, is a picture of the kind of false belief that unfortunately seems common in the United States. And here's the thing: times of testing will come and this kind of faith will not hold up. This is seen in those who walk away from the faith because of troubles, sorrows, because of unfulfilled expectations...whatever the excuse, it shows that one's faith wasn't truly in Jesus but in some other false idea.

So the big question must be this, "What are you building on?" If you claim a Christian identity, if you say that you are a follower of Christ, does your faith cause you to act? Does your faith manifest itself in prayer, Bible reading, sharing your faith, serving others? Or is your faith simply something that gives you a "good feeling" when you go to church or helps you feel better about yourself and the bad choices you continue to make? Will your faith hold up against the storms of this world? The storms will come. Prepare now, have certainty now, that Christ is your firm foundation.

Arizona Complete Health is committed to protecting the privacy and security of our members' information. On January 25, 2021, we became aware of an incident involving personal information. One of our vendors, Accellion, was the victim of a cyber attack that compromised Accellion's file transfer platform, and allowed a malicious party to view or download Arizona Complete Health data files from January 7 to January 25, 2021. We have mailed a letter and provided resources to all members whose information was involved in this incident.

The personal information involved in this incident includes name, and one or more of following: address, date of birth, insurance ID number, health information such as medical condition(s) and treatment information, and in some cases social security numbers.

We have no indications of inappropriate use of members' information. However, out of an abundance of caution we recommend that potentially affected members take reasonable steps to ensure the security of their information.

We are providing members affected by this incident with oneyear of free credit monitoring and identity theft protection services. Instructions on how to enroll in this service were included in the letter sent to affected individuals.

We have also shared a reference guide of recommendations from the Federal Trade Commission regarding identity theft including information on how to request free credit reports, security freezes and fraud alerts.

Upon discovering this incident, we took the following actions to correct this issue and prevent it from reoccurring:

- We immediately conducted an investigation into the incident and ceased using Accellion's services.
- We have reviewed our file transfer processes and tools to ensure that they are not at risk of a similar attack.
- We have removed all of our data files from Accellion's systems.

Accellion is coordinating their response with the appropriate law enforcement authorities.

Arizona Complete Health takes the responsibility of protecting our members' personal information very seriously. We sincerely regret any concern or inconvenience this incident may have caused our members and their families.
