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Take charge of your diabetes



DES announces new Emergency Rental Assistance Program

In a Feb. 9 news release, the Arizona Department of Economic Security announced that it will partner with Arizona counties to launch a new Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) to provide financial assistance and housing stability. Funding will be used toward direct payments for rent, rental arrears, utilities, utility arrears and other housing stability expenses incurred due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

The ERAP was established by the federal Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021. Arizona will receive a total of \$492 million from the U.S. Department of the Treasury to implement the program. DES was awarded \$289 million and will partner with 12 Arizona counties to distribute emergency rental and utility assistance. DES will serve Apache, Cochise, Coconino, Gila, Graham, Greenlee, La Paz, Mohave, Navajo, Pinal, Santa Cruz and Yavapai Counties. The remaining balance was awarded to municipalities with more than 200,000 people to distribute locally.

Several large counties and cities, including Maricopa, Pima and Yuma Counties, receive funding directly from the federal government. Those counties plan to launch their own rental assistance programs, which will be separate from the DES program. Renters residing in cities and counties other than those listed above are encouraged to contact their local jurisdictions for similar programs. The DES portal will also direct renters living outside these counties to their respective programs.

"Households across the state continue to face economic challenges due to the Covid-19 pandemic, and we are pleased to be able to provide this new assistance program alongside the other services we have to offer at DES," said DES Director Michael Wisehart. "We will work quickly and diligently to provide rental and utility assistance to those in need."

Emergency Rental Assistance Payment Details

Beginning Feb. 23, 2021, Arizona

households will be able to apply for up to \$3,500 in rental and utility assistance per month. Payments may also be made for rental and/or utility arrears. After their initial application, households may receive up to 12 months of assistance. After receiving 12 months of benefits, whether for arrears or future payments, the household may apply for a threemonth extension of benefits upon providing documentation of eligibility to the Department.

Payments will be issued directly to landlords and/or utility companies on the renter's behalf.

Eligibility Requirements

The ERAP is available to both landlords and renters. While both may apply for assistance, eligibility is based on the renter's address and ability to meet the following criteria:

The renter has a risk of homelessness, housing instability or unsafe living conditions demonstrated by the following: Eviction notice, utility shutoff notice, past due rent notice, past due utility notice, or any other evidence of unsafe or unhealthy living conditions or housing instability.

The renter or member of the renter's household is eligible for unemployment insurance benefits or has experienced a financial hardship as a result of the Co-vid-19 pandemic.

The renter's household income is less than or equal to 80 percent of the Area Median Income (AMI): Assistance priority will be given to renters with household incomes under 50 percent of the AMI and to those who have been unemployed 90 days or longer.

During their application, renters will need to provide a copy of their lease/ rental agreement, photo ID, electricity and/or gas bill, disconnection notice (if any), proof of income, eviction notice (if applicable) and proof of hardship, such as a termination letter.

The God who is with His people

Is God with you? Are you a follower of Christ who has the assurance of God's continual guidance in your life? It seems to me that if one looks to God's words in the Bible, then one must conclude that God is ever present with His people. Perhaps the Psalms are a good start to understand God's closeness.

The book of Psalms is a treasure trove of songs of praise, cries for help, and laments in dark times. The vast scope of human emotion is truthfully displayed as each of the Psalmists bare their hearts to God. At the same time, the book of Psalms teaches us who God is and how God acts. So much so that the great reformer, Martin Luther, called the book of Psalms "the Bible in miniature." Here we come to understand the human problem is sin and our only hope is God Himself.

One Psalm that is filled with such treasure also happens to be the 4th longest Psalm in the Bible, the 18th Psalm. In reading and studying this magnificently written song of deliverance, we see the heart of David, a man whom God used mightily and yet a man who was filled with flaws. We read of David reflecting on his past, reflecting on the difficult times when his life was being threatened. However, through it all David can see how God was the one who got him through; God was always with him (Psalm 18:48).

The retrospective eye is a blessing from God. We can remember the past, remember those times in life when we thought there was no way we would be able to get through, and yet by the grace of God, we did. However, in the midst of such situations, no one could have convinced us otherwise. Can you think of a time like that? Now, with the benefit of the 20/20 vision of hindsight, do you see how God got you through it? Do you see how God was there every step of the way and how He eventually led you through the "Red Sea," out of trouble and into His rest?

In Psalm 18, David speaks of literal battles he had to fight and yet when he reflects upon them, he speaks as if God's hand were David's own - as if God came down from the heavens and conquered as a great warrior. The retrospective eve of David sees that God was involved every step of the way and in every minute detail. God is not far off in the galaxy somewhere leaving us to our own devices. God is with us every moment and has His hand in every de-



tail. One of the blessings of reflecting upon the past is seeing that God was faithful then, so we can be assured that He will continue to be faithful in the future.

However, many people view God as an impersonal, distant being rather than the personal God portraved in the Bible. It turns out, perhaps not surprisingly, that many people have a view of Christianity that is not Biblical or historic, including teenagers who have grown up going to church. Sociologists Christian Smith and Melinda Lundquist Denton spent many hours interviewing approximately 3,000 teenagers only to discover that, although most of them selfidentified as Christians, how they expressed their beliefs opposed orthodox Christianity.

Smith and Denton were forced to coin a new phrase, Moralistic Therapeutic Deism. This basic premise says that a god does exist, created the world, and wants everyone to be nice and happy. However, this god doesn't really need to be a part of your life unless you need help with a problem. And finally, good people go to heaven when they die. Unfortunately, it has been my experience that it is not simply teenagers who believe this, but the vast majority of people who have even the smallest form of a religious background. Albert Mohler comments, "Let's be very clear, Moralistic Therapeutic Deism is religion, but it isn't Christianity. It's nowhere close to biblical Christianity." Yet, it seems to be the assumption of many people that

these teens were espousing,

the above ideas do accurately reflect Christian belief

While many people will never use a term like Moralistic Therapeutic Deism to describe their worldview, it seems to be that the basic tenets are widely held by people. manv "Yes. I believe in God, but I believe don't He is with me or

cares about how I live." In the past, I have simply regarded this type of thinking as irreligious or indifferent. Yes, they would say they believe in a god, but they simply couldn't be bothered by this god. Yes, they would pray if they were in a bind, but to join a group of like-minded people seems preposterous. Yes, they think that they deserve to go to heaven when they die, but solely to be with lost loved ones in some type of paradise existence, not to be with God. According to this mindset, life is primarily about one's self-fulfillment and happiness. There is no sense of the intimate nearness of God.

Regarding this thinking, two primary ideas must be considered. First, knowledge of God is ultimately

sovereign hand. Knowing God is what Christian salvation is all about (cf. John 17:3). Therefore, one must remember that growing up in a Christian church and having Christian family members does not make one a Christian ipso facto. Secondly, Christians must strive to be even more clear about the truth of God and the gospel as revealed in the Bible. We must not allow traditions or culture to get in the way of what is truly Biblical.

only achieved through His

The end goal of Christianity, then, can be summarized in the words of the Westminster theologians of the 17th century who insightfully wrote, "Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever." We enjoy God by being with God. The God who is daily directing the steps of His people. Our God is with His people always (Matthew 28:20).

Do you believe this? If you are a true follower of Christ, I know you do! Therefore, while the world may lose hope, you must be encouraged today as you look back at hard times of the past, seeing how God has brought you to this day and knowing that He who kept you then knows how to keep you in the future. This is the God who is with His people!


AZYP is saving lives with Naloxone kits

Better Business Bureau warns of pop-up wedding planner scam

Countless brides and grooms have changed their wedding plans throughout the pandemic. Many have turned to securing their nuptials with nontraditional services that are convenient and less expensive. Unfortunately, scammers have found a way to take advantage of this sacred event.

As reported to the Better Business Bureau Serving the Pacific Southwest (BBB) Scam Tracker, consumers have fallen victim to a pop-up wedding planner. They allege the company advertises to plan the entire wedding and conveniently drops everything at a chosen destination. Fees are requested up front, but the company becomes unresponsive after initial communication. As swiftly as the so-called service arrives it vanishes, leaving disappointed brides and grooms short on cash and stranded on their wedding day.

While legitimate companies with this model exist. it's important to research and choose a trustworthy business. Always read the fine print and contracts before signing, request a receipt and understand the company's policies. Ask for references of previous clients for feedback to ensure a company has an honest track record. BBB advises consumers to research companies on bbb. org before doing business.

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

A "knuckle sandwich" worth eating

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Dessert means different things to different people. Some may prefer a piece of cake, while others consider a cup of coffee to be the ideal capper to a delicious meal. Sandwiches may not be the first thing to come to mind when the dessert tray is rolled out, but this delicious recipe for a "Knuckle Sandwich" from Bob Blumer's "Surreal Gourmet Bites" is sure to please dessert lovers who want to expand their horizons.

Knuckle Sandwich - Yields 12 bites

- 1/2 cup whole hazelnuts, ideally blanched (skinned)
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 pears, skin on, cut into 1/8-inch-thick slices, then cored
- 1 store-bought pound cake
- 6 tablespoons Nutella or other chocolate-hazeInut spread

Preheat oven to 350 F.



Put hazelnuts on a baking sheet and bake for 12 minutes, or until they begin to brown. If hazelnuts are still in their skins, bake until skins begin to darken, or for blanched nuts, until they turn golden. Remove from oven and let cool. If hazelnuts are still in their skins, place nuts in the center of a clean dish towel, fold the towel around the nuts, and rub vigorously between both hands for 15 seconds to release the skins. Discard skins and reserve the nuts.

In a sauté pan over medium heat (err on the low side of medium), melt butter and sauté pear slices for approximately 5 minutes per side, or until they begin to brown. Reserve.

Cut 6 slices of pound cake, 1/4-inch thick. Toast the pound cake in a toaster oven, or on a baking sheet in a 300 F oven. (It will fall apart in an upright toaster.)
