DES announces Child Care Scholarship Program for essential workers

PHOENIX - The Arizona Department of Economic Security (DES) announced a new program aimed at providing childcare resources to essential frontline workers combating Covid-19.

The Essential Workers Child Care Relief Scholarship Program will be open

First responders

Critical health workers

Essential government operations workers

Grocery store and food bank workers

Licensed/certified childcare workers

"Our frontline workers continue to protect and serve Arizonans — and we want to make sure they have the support they need," said Governor Doug Ducey. "The Department of Economic Security's new program will ensure Arizona's working families have safe and secure childcare while they work to protect public health. Thank you to all Arizonans who continue to help one another during the pandemic."

DES is partnering with

contracted childcare providers to offer childcare so Arizona can remain focused on keeping children safe and supporting families and providers. Participants will select childcare from DES contracted childcare providers. Arizona Child Care Resource & Referral can assist parents in finding and selecting care.

"Early in the pandemic, the Arizona Enrichment Centers were critical to providing first responders and essential workers with the childcare they needed to support our state through the public health emergency," said DES Director Michael Wisehart. "This new program builds upon this success and continues support for those bravely serving on the frontlines. We are grateful for Governor Ducey's partnership in the continuation of support for Arizona's essential workers."

In addition to qualifying as serving an essential function, parent eligibility requires the following:

Critical job functions cannot be completed remotely (telework);

Household income is \$65,000 or less annually:

The parent does not have access to childcare and/or in-person school services, or there is a health or safety concern with the child attending in-person school services

Individuals can apply for the Essential Workers Child Care Relief Scholarship at https://des.az.gov/ services/child-and-family/ child-care. All applicants will receive an email confirmation once their application has been submitted and received, and will be notified of the application approval by email. Upon notification of approval, applicants need to register their child(ren) at the childcare provider they selected in their application and follow the step-by-step instructions.






Ronald Chesley

AZGFD offers top winter fishing destinations in Arizona

Arizona is home to 128 lakes and five major rivers. With cooler weather comes some unique opportunities for anglers who are looking to cast a line during the winter months.

"Arizona has some of the best fishing, from the Colorado River to the White Mountains and everywhere in between," said Andy Clark, statewide sportfish program supervisor for the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD). "Winter months in our state make Arizona a whole new destination for anglers."

AZGFD has identified the best locations for anglers this winter:

Colorado River below Davis Dam

This portion of the lower Colorado River in Bullhead City offers some of the best rainbow trout fishing in Arizona, as well as a chance to catch some hearty striped bass. Trout stockings, which resumed in the fall, will continue through March. Anglers have some of the best luck catching trout on mealworms, nightcrawlers and PowerBait.

Lower Salt River

The Lower Salt River allows anglers to fish for trout in the desert, a rare opportunity so close to the Phoenix metro area. The river is stocked with trout throughout the winter months, offering excellent shoreline fishing. Anglers have some of the best luck with nightcrawlers, small spinners, Kastmasters and flies. Bass and sunfish also

can be caught in some of the deeper holes.

Dead Horse Ranch State Park lagoons

Just outside of Cotton-wood in north-central Arizona, Dead Horse Lake offers some of the best catch rates for rainbow trout and is stocked throughout the winter months. Anglers have some of the best luck on a variety of PowerBait colors, homemade dough baits and spinners. Fly fishermen also report great success.

Alamo Lake

Largemouth bass at Alamo are less active in the winter; however, the lake is known for some of the best crappie fishing in the state during the winter months. Minnows work well for crappie, along with crappie tubes, spoons and jigs for the more experienced angler. Remember, use light line and lightweight spinning tackle to maximize the enjoyment of catching these scrappy fighters.

Lake Havasu

Consistently ranked as one of the top bass fishing destinations in the nation, Lake Havasu offers anglers great opportunities to catch both largemouth and smallmouth bass. In the fall, tournament anglers caught several bass, with the largest weighing in at 5.65 pounds. Havasu is also home to some monster redear sunfish, including the worldrecord 5.8-pound redear that was taken from the lake in February 2014.

Patagonia Lake

Anglers often catch crappie, bass, bluegill, catfish and especially trout this time of year. Patagonia is considered a hidden treasure of southeastern Arizona, about an hour and a half south of Tucson. The lake was just stocked with trout in early December. Anglers

have some of the best luck with nightcrawlers and a variety of PowerBait colors and spinners.

cense. An Arizona fishing license is good for 365 days from the date of purchase.

Small business grant applications open Dec. 29 - Jan. 5

Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) has teamed up with Lowe's to distribute another \$18 million in rural relief small business grants. The next round of applications will be Dec. 29 - Jan. 5, with one follow-up application period Jan. 26 - Feb. 2.

Who is eligible? Only small businesses located in rural communities having a population of 50,000 or less. A community is defined as the city/town/village where a business address is located; mobile businesses such as a food truck or rideshare should use the address where the vehicle is stored during non-business hours. Non-profit organizations are ineligible for the relief funding program, but may be eligible for future rounds of funding. Applications are being accepted in "rounds," and a new application must be submitted for each round in order to be considered for funding in that specific round.

LISC and Lowe's will support small businesses and enterprises affected by Covid-19 across the country, especially those in underserved communities, including entrepreneurs of color and women- and veteran-owned businesses, that often lack access to flexible, affordable capital. Applicants are encouraged to review FAQs and grant information before applying.

Read more, find FAQs and applications at lisc.org/covid-19; connect at facebook.com/lisc.org. The page answers questions such as "What are the size of the awards?" Answer: "Grants will be made in amounts ranging from \$5,000 to \$20,000. LISC will use the funding to provide grants to businesses facing immediate financial pressure because of Covid-19."

What can the grant be used for?

- * Rent and utilities
- * Meeting payroll (to include the applicant)
- * Paying outstanding debt to vendors
- * Other operational costs

Does anything need to be repaid?


No, these grants do not need to be repaid. However, all taxes associated with the acceptance and/or uses of cash awarded are the sole responsibility of the individual grantee. Cash awarded will be reported by LISC to the IRS as LISC deems necessary according to applicable law. It is further the policy of LISC that all LISC grantees be advised to consult with their own tax professionals and/or legal counsel to ascertain the tax impact of the cash awards. LISC will issue a Form 1099 for any grant of \$600 or more. Local Initiatives Support Corporation

Gila County hiring contact tracers

Looking for a job that's a guaranteed conversation starter - or a career change likely to offer experience and training applicable to a wide array of other fields? How about a job you can take pride in: helping battle the Covid-19 pandemic? Gila County just posted a new job opportunity for a 'Communicable Disease Specialist.' It's a job you may have seen or heard more often described as a contact tracer in media reports about public health response to the Covid-19 pandemic over the past year. Don't let the job title scare you off; 'Communicable Disease Specialist' may have an inherent "ick" factor, but in this lively interview, Gila County's Stella Gore explains more about the job.

Gore: "Well, one person's 'ick' is another person's 'Cool!' Although the title says 'Communicable Disease,' the only disease my team investigates is Covid-19 and misinformation. Daily we receive names of Covid-19 positive cases in the state's communicable disease surveillance system. Our team contacts those people to complete interview regarding their health, the onset and progression or symptoms. While protecting people's privacy, we ask those who are Covid-positive who they have been around while infectious, in order to follow up and alert family, friends, neighbors or coworkers who may have

been exposed for their own health, their own testing and possible quarantine. That, in a nutshell, describes contact tracing."

Gore has worked for Gila County for the past five years in a variety of Public Health assignments - but laser-focused on Covid-19 for the past 10 months, studying the disease long before the Arizona Department of Health Services confirmed the state's first case of coronavirus on Jan. 26.

"This job is valuable

not only to Globe-Miami, Payson and all communities within Gila County, but to world health. The quote by Blaise Pascal sums it up best, 'The least movement is of importance to all nature. The entire ocean is affected by a pebble.' Although we are a small rural county, keeping our community safe helps to keep our state safe, which helps to keep our country safe. This is a job you can take pride in. I'm only half-joking when I remind my team that they should consider having a special closet to hang each of their superhero capes in at the end of the day."

On the job training

Gila County currently has five fulltime Communicable Disease Specialists, employees with diverse backgrounds and work histories, running the gamut from medical backgrounds to public health experience, even a few with customer service expertise. What

they have in common is passion to help mitigate the spread of Covid-19. The job description lists a bachelor's degree or applicable public health experiences such as interview skills and project follow-up in a clinical or medical service setting. But that's not a deal-breaker; an equivalent combination of education, training and experience could qualify the right applicant for the job.

Gore describes it more succinctly - and with a grin, saying: "The ideal candidate for this job will have superior communication skills, be organized, energetic, and self-motivated. It would also help if they had a strong addiction to coffee - and like to geek out on new infectious diseases."

And how much training will the new hire receive before hitting the field? "Training is on the job; during the current resurgence of cases we have far too many to dedicate one specialist specifically to training. Our new hire will shadow experienced staff, observe and learn. It usually takes about a week for someone to begin their own case load, and they start investigating their own cases while being closely observed by more experienced members of our team. How much training? I've been doing this since February and I don't feel that I'm fully-trained. This is an ever-evolving pandemic; we learn new things every day."

Listed as Communicable Disease Specialist and with job code 20-064, the new hire has options to be based in either Globe or Payson, with Gila County Health & Emergency Management. The department is a great place to work, according to Gore

"Last month I celebrated my five-year anniversary with Gila County - just a small affair, party of one, properly social-distanced and wearing a mask of course. In the past five years I have had several positions and helped in multiple departments throughout Gila County Health & Emergency Management. I've had opportunities to work side-by-side with our public health nurses on immunizations, research in the vital records department.

Prior to this assignment I worked with prescription drug overdose prevention. These were all jobs I felt passionate about - I'm a Gila County native, born and raised in Globe. I love my work, because I love my community, and the idea that I am able to help protect and educate my family and lifelong friends - and their families and friends - that's a great honor. "And this is particularly important with contact tracing - for community members to know that they are speaking with local people, from right here in our community. To be contacted by people who understand the dynamic of a rural county because they were raised here; we live here - we're your neighbors."

"Our Covid-19 team

is amazing. I work with a fantastic group of people. This pandemic has been a rollercoaster, to say the least. We deal with a constant flow of information our team has been able to roll with the punches and stay on top of changing information. They work long hours, sometimes with seemingly no end to this pandemic in sight - and they have been able to remain positive and share a delightful sense of humor. And we're provided amazing support and resources by our department director, Michael O'Driscoll, and deputy director Joshua Beck. They've had few breaks from the pandemic over the past year, but are still always willing to help in any situation - readily available to help with any question or concerns I may not be able to answer for a community member."

There are good habits and bad habits. The bad ones usually are addressed in New Year's resolutions...but seemed to outlive our best intentions. Deeply intrenched, they become addictions without any help.

Dr. Frank Freed, a clinical psychologist and counselor, wrote a book titled, "Breaking Free." In it he stresses that it is in your power to break free from self-imposed traps. In a simple way it means that if we created it, we can remove it. We all must admit that there is at least one thing we would like to remove, but it took time to develop and will take time to "shuck."

What Do We Need During A 2020 Christmas? Immanuel!

Christmas day is almost here! If this were any other year, that statement would most likely fill us with joy and excitement. However, this is no ordinary year, and therefore this Christmas may be no ordinary Christmas. At least, it may be different than we are accustomed to. Welcome to Christmas 2020.

Unfortunately, many people will not get to spend time with all of those family members and friends we usually enjoy at Christmas. In fact, the joy of Christmas may seem less than joyful and this December 25 will perhaps be just another day at home. If this is the case for you, I am truly sorry. This is not how Christmas should be. You see, we are meant to be together with others. We are meant to be with family and friends. So what we really need this 2020 Christmas is not more gifts and treats, but contact.

While 2020 may seem grim, I do want to encourage you that Christmas doesn't have to be, even if you are alone this Friday. Why? Because Christmas is all about God coming to His people, about God making contact with us. Therefore, if you are a follower of Christ, you can be assured that you are not alone but that He is with you.

The Gospel of Matthew opens with the account of an angel visiting Joseph in order that he may have insight into Mary's pregnancy. As readers of the gospel we are told, "All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 'Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel' (which means, 'God with us') (Matthew 1:22-23). The child in Mary's womb did not come into existence at the moment of His miraculous conception. This is merely the moment He took upon Himself a human body and nature. The baby we celebrate at Christmas is God made flesh. He is Immanuel, God with us!

Yes, I recognize this is a huge claim, one many people will disagree with; however, this is the belief of Christians throughout the ages because it is the testimony of the Bible. And if this testimony is true, then the baby Jesus of Christmas is in fact your Creator, the Maker of heaven and earth. One way we ascertain the divinity of Jesus throughout the gospel accounts is by the response that others have when they encounter Him. What is the proper response when one encounters Jesus? Worship! And worship belongs to God alone.

Every devout Jew knows that worship can only legitimately be given to God. To



worship anything or anyone besides God is idolatry and in violation of the 2nd Commandment. God Himself says, "My glory I will give to no other" (Isaiah 42:8). The Apostle John. overcome with emotion when he is given great visions in the Book of Revelation, responds by falling at the feet of an angel in worship. The angel quickly corrects John, saying, "You must not do that! I am a fellow servant with you... Worship God" (Revelation 22:9). The Apostle Peter answered likewise when he entered the house of Cornelius, who fell down at his feet to worship Peter. "Stand up; I too am a man" (Acts 10:26). Peter could not abide anyone worshiping him in place of God. Yet Mary and Joseph say nothing when the magi come to visit the Christ child and

fall on their knees to worship Him (Matthew 2:11). If this child is not God in the flesh, then these "wise men" are actually very foolish. However, if He is, then they are doing what every soul on earth should be doing. They recognize that Jesus is Immanuel.

Jesus receives worship from many others throughout the gospels. How does Jesus react when people begin to worship Him? If He is only a great teacher or prophet, then His response should be similar to the Apostle Peter and the angel in the book of Revelation. However, because Jesus recognizes Himself to be the eternal God made flesh, accepting worship is proper and right.

On one occasion, Jesus' disciples were in a boat when all of sudden, they saw Him walking on

the water. Afterwards, we are told "those in the boat worshiped Him, saying, 'Truly You are the Son of God" (Matthew 14:33). No rebuke or correction from the lips of Jesus; the narrative just goes on with the assumption that Jesus accepts their worship. After Jesus' resurrection, John recognizes that Jesus truly has risen again, proclaiming "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:28). The women also, after they encounter the risen Christ, take hold of His feet and worship Him. Jesus responds, "Do not be afraid..." (Matthew 28:9-10). Again, no rebuke or correction. Jesus accepts the worship that is due only to God. Why? Because He is God and He is with His people.

So the reason why Christmas is so amazing is because God not only enters into His own creation to save it, but He does so in the most humble of ways. He "emptied Himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, He humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:7-8). This is an incredible statement. God became one of us in order to die for our sins and save us. So what is your response when you consider that baby Jesus lying in the manger? The familiar carol "Angels from the Realms of Glory" has it right as it ends each stanza with the words "Come and worship, come and worship, worship Christ the newborn King!"

Christmas is about God coming to His people. People who are lonely, lost in sin, struggling in this world can find hope and peace in the God who does not remain distant. Even today, followers of Christ have this assurance that Jesus remains with us. Some of His last words before He ascended up to the right hand of the Father included His promise to remain with His people. Hear these words this Christmas, "I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). This is why even a 2020 Christmas can be merry!

Croissant Bread Pudding Yields 12 servings

- large croissants (about 3 ounces each)
- 1 red baking apple, such as Jonathan
- 6
- 1/2 cup plus 3 tablespoons sugar, divided
- 2 cups half and half
- 1 orange
- 1/2 cup pecan halves, chopped
- 3/4 cup butterscotch caramel ice cream topping
- 1/4 teaspoon rum extract
- 1/2 cup golden raisins
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F. Lightly spray a deep baking dish with nonstick cooking spray. Slice croissants from top to bottom into 1/2-inch slices. Set aside 16 of the largest slices. Cube remaining slices and place in bottom of baker. Arrange reserved slices over cubes in an overlapping circular pattern. Core and slice apple, leaving peel on; cut slices in half. Tuck apple slices between croissant slices.



- 2. In a bowl, whisk eggs and 1/2 cup of the sugar. Pour half and half into a microwave-safe container and microwave on high 2 minutes or until hot. Slowly add half and half to egg mixture; whisk until blended. Carefully pour egg mixture over croissants. If necessary, lightly press croissants down to coat. 3. Zest orange to measure 2 teaspoons zest. Juice orange to measure 1/4 cup juice; set juice aside. Chop pecans. Combine remaining sugar, orange zest and pecans; sprinkle over croissants. Bake 30 to 35 minutes or until golden brown and set in center. Remove from oven to a cooling rack; let stand 10 minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, combine ice cream topping, rum extract, reserved orange juice, and raisins in a microwave-safe container. Microwave on high 30 to 60 seconds or until hot; pour into serving bowl.

Serve sauce over pudding.
