Public safety gets CARES Act funds; small businesses left to struggle

“There’s not a lot of us left standing. I only have a couple of months more and I’m probably not going to be able to stay. It would be a blessing to know that my city would like to try and help me keep my door open,” said Cindy Phillips from Turn the Page Western Wear.

Phillips, along with Christie Cothrun from the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce, addressed the Globe City Council at the Nov. 10 meeting following a presentation from City Manager Paul Jepson on how \$843,484 of federal CARES act dollars was allocated for public safety use.

While city officials stand by their budgeting

decisions stating that funds were used for what they were intended for, small businesses shuttered for months by the

pandemic appear as an afterthought next to big-ticket items like a type 3 fire truck and five new police patrol vehicles.

According to Jepson, small businesses were not overlooked; it was a question of legality and concern about the state’s

gift clause that prevented the city from issuing reopening grants. A state law called the Gift Clause prevents cities

from giving money directly to businesses.

At United Jewelry in Globe, Kathy Bernstein Ryan recently displayed some of the store’s original sales day books on a counter - books that show some of United Jewelry’s first transactions, from 1920.

In 2020, United Jewelry is celebrating a

century in business and 75 years of operation by the Bernstein family of Miami.

A young baseball player from Memphis, Tennessee named Abe Bernstein came to Globe with his team around the time Joe Lefleur opened a saloon on Sullivan Street in Miami. Meeting a college girl from Globe, Kathryn

Frederick, Abe decided to stay. They were married in the city’s Methodist church.

When he wasn’t

of Sullivan and Keystone Avenue.

In 1920, Ray Bedilion bought Lafleur’s

Business owners question CARES funding allocations

Dear Editor,
RE: CARES Act Funding

I attended the council meeting last night. And although I am still disappointed that the City manager and council didn’t initially include the small business of this community in the budget for the CARES Funding the city received, I am grateful that it was determined the city could find more than a mere \$15k to help us.

That then led to the conversation as to determining how to distribute the money. Please allow me to offer the obvious suggestions.

1. No online business should be considered as they do not generate any revenue for our city.
2. No business that has continually been able to operate in the black. Although many businesses have seen a drop in revenue there are still many that continued to

operate at a profit while receiving other funding such as the PPA. A large percent of the businesses in this city are operated by owners that cannot afford employees and were not eligible for many of the previous grants.

3. Businesses that hold a current business license with the City of Globe.

And finally, how to determine who will distribute this money. As Ms. Cothrun explained, the other communities hired Local First Arizona to distribute this money so that there would not be any bias as that entity has no direct affiliation with any of the businesses but rather was created to offer assistance to businesses. It was suggested by the Mayor that the Economic Development Director be responsible for distribution. Absolutely NO. Ms. Oddonetto not only is involved in many boards and committees

but has a direct relationship with one of the most successful businesses in this city, therefore creating a clear conflict of interest. I might add that I and many others are extremely disappointed in the fact that our E.D. director wasn’t first in line fighting for funding for the small businesses in this town, that is after all part of the very definition of that position. The important distribution of these funds must be done by a third party not affiliated with city or local commerce. This needs to be done immediately! We needed the assistance yesterday not next year. Many of the small businesses have closed their doors and will not be able to reopen ever. Do whatever you can to help save the rest of us.

Dear Editor:

I am a single woman who is a small business owner in downtown Globe. I was not essential and therefore had not been able to operate during the closures of the pandemic. I did not qualify for any grants. I did receive a small loan from the SBA which I will have to pay back. I still am not able to operate at full capacity due to the guidelines set forth by the city and social distancing. I am behind on my rent and several other bills. At this rate, I will be forced to shut down in the next few months if things don’t improve or if I can not get assistance.

I watched the City Council meeting Nov. 10, 2020 to better understand what the city was going to do with the CARES Act funding. I was pleased to see that the council decided to bless small businesses with more than \$15,000 for the entire community of small businesses, and are looking to increase that amount to approximately 10 percent of the funding received. No matter the amount, it would definitely help my business and many others who are struggling as I am.

I believe the allocations should be done from an outside source like Local First to keep things in perspective and keep bias afar. I believe that my business is a perfect candidate to receive funds. I have a current business license, I am a live business and pay taxes to Globe and was a non-essential. I hope that the distribution of funds happens soon so no more small businesses, or myself, will have to shut their doors like others have.

Native American Basketball Invitational returns in 2021 after ‘devastating’ decision to cancel

PHOENIX – After a one-year absence because of the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, the Native American Basketball Invitational will return in July, showcasing indigenous basketball players from across the U.S., Canada and New Zealand at venues around the Valley.

The championship games will take place at the newly renovated downtown arena of the Phoenix Suns and Mercury.

The decision to cancel the 2020 tournament crushed organizers.

“We cried. We had tears when we had to cancel because we know how important the event is to the kids,” said GinaMarie Scarpa, founder and president of the NABI Foundation, which formed in 2002 to organize the event. “And then, of course, news stories started coming out about the cancellation and how devastating it was to our tribal youth across the country.”

It is another blow to a community that has been disproportionately impacted by the coronavirus. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention reports that Native Americans are 5.3 times more likely than the white community to be hospitalized due to Covid-19.

The NABI is considered the premier basketball tournament for indigenous youth, and was the first to become certified by the NCAA (2007), according to the organization’s website.

While basketball brings the athletes – boys and girls ages 14 to 19 – together for the tournament, the NABI Foundation’s ultimate goal is to teach athletes the importance of education and provide opportunities through scholarships and educational seminars. The program has provided more than \$250,000 in scholarships.

During the invitational, NABI hosts a college and career fair. College scouts are on hand and a training camp is offered. High

school teams that participate can bring one freshman player for a free training camp and an educational youth seminar with guest speakers, who are often tournament alumni.

“We expanded our educational seminar to a full-blown educational youth summit,” Scarpa said. “We had 36 presentations in 2019. We had great speakers. So they really come to learn and we use basketball as a tool.”

While there is hope that the pandemic will be under control by July, the NABI is planning ahead in case it is still a threat. A Native American youth summit will be held online and organizers will strictly follow protocols recommended by the CDC and the State of Arizona.

“The NABI Foundation will continue to monitor the situation and amend the program according to imposed safety guidelines closer to the program dates. A full schedule of events will be released mid-June,” said Lynette Lewis, Director of Basketball Operations & Program Development, in the statement released by the NABI when the return of the event was announced.

One of the organization’s board members will play an important role in preparations.

“We have a wonderful kind of diverse board of directors, and one of our board of directors just happens to be one of the owners of a PPE (personal protective equipment) company,” Scarpa said. “So, he’s committed to providing everything we need for all the gyms, all the kids. I really think we will bring it back to normal.”

“I think if we do allow a big sporting event, it might be limited seating ... masks are going to be mandatory, there will be sanitizing stations. We are going to do everything possible to keep our kids safe.”

While the tournament didn’t happen last summer, organizers were still at work. One avenue for

raising funds at the tournament is the sale of merchandise during the event, and there are now plans to make items available beyond tournament week.

“Usually we’re like, ‘Nope, you have to buy it this week and then it’s done.’,” Scarpa said. “And so, we are now in talks with another big sporting company who wants to take the NABI line nationally and online.”

“Not only will it be sold at NABI during NABI week, but it will be sold all year around. We’ll have designers (and) have access to the graphic designers in their marketing department – all that fun stuff that goes with it – and also producing our own native theme for the uniforms for the teams.”

The NABI Foundation and tournament were started in 2002 by Mark West, the former Suns center and current team vice-president for player programs; Scarpa, who is the former executive director of the charitable foundation of another former Suns player, A.C. Green; and the late Scott Podleski, the former ticket director of the Arizona Rattlers who passed away from cancer in 2010.

Their enthusiasm for the project has carried on, and drives organizers still.

“I think it’s just the passion, and it’s my staff that shares that passion,” Scarpa said. “They love it. They love working with the kids. They love to see the outcome.”

Now with the NABI tournament set to return in 2021, Scarpa is hoping the event will continue to serve its purpose for years to come, providing educational opportunities for young Native American athletes as well as indigenous hoopers from Canada and beyond.

“It’s really the backbone portion of it, to load them up with opportunities,” Scarpa said. “The goal is (when they) leave NABI and NABI week, they’re really thinking seriously about a higher educational plan for their lives.”

In this war, there's both offensive and defensive equipment. With our weapons we fight the enemy. And we are protected from him by our armor. Both are vitally important to our success.

Colossians 3:12-14 (NIV) says, "Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over

all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity."

These verses reveal the weapons and armor of our spiritual warfare. We defeat the enemy's tactics every time we forgive instead of hold a grudge...every time we have patience with someone rather than rush them...every time we speak with humility rather than arrogance.

Ephesians 4:25 says to "put off falsehood and speak truthfully to your neighbor...." Verse 31 goes on to say, "Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice." These are things that will hinder and weigh us down
