Boyce Thompson Arboretum Announces Temporary Restrictions now in Effective

Visitation To Be Limited To 400 Guests Per day

SUPERIOR – Boyce Thompson Arboretum (BTA) announced today new, temporary limitations on visitation due to the national state of emergency over COVID-19. The limitations are effective March 26, 2020, and will remain in place until further notice; any changes to this policy will be made in accordance with guidelines from federal, state and local health

officials

The safety of visitors, members, staff and volunteers is of utmost importance, and BTA is adding the following limitations and restrictions to help prevent the spread of the virus:

Visitation is limited to 400 people per day, first-come, first-served. Members and visitors may make reservations by phone at 520-689-4546.

No more than twenty-five (25) guests will be allowed entry each half-hour. The Arboretum is open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Last entry is at 4 p.m.

Public bathrooms will be closed. Portable toilets are available. All buildings, including the Visitor's Center and gift shop, will be closed.

Anyone exhibiting symptoms of flu, cold or viral infection will not be admitted.

The Arboretum's leadership will continue to monitor the situation and make informed decisions based on information released by trusted sources, including the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, World Health Organization and Arizona Department of Health Services.

All walks, tours, activities, events, and programs are cancelled until further notice. Boyce Thompson Arboretum encourages all community members to follow the advice of the CDC when choosing whether to visit any outdoor venue.

CASA of Gila County issues a Call to Arms for volunteers in response to the predicted impact of COVID-19

CASA of Gila County is in critical need to increase the number of dedicated members of the community to step up and become Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) volunteers, and help break the cycle of abuse and neglect, through supporting children and families.

There are over 14,000 children in out of home care (foster care, relative placement, group home, etc.) in Arizona as of January 2020. Currently there are 1,200 CASA volunteers serving 2,200 children in the foster care system, which means roughly 12,000 children are left without a CASA to advocate for them. There is still a tremendous need for CASA volunteers, and the need is most critical now, more than ever. Reports of family violence in China, where COVID-19 (coronavirus) originated, have reportedly tripled since the pandemic began. It is expected we will experience the same phenomenon in the coming months. During periods of natural disasters, financial stress or global panics such as viral pandemics, studies show that abusers become more violent in an attempt to feel a sense of control.

CASA of Gila County is doing everything

we can to encourage our community to take notice and report suspected abuse, but we need to prepare for a significant increase in case numbers in the wake of this crisis.

We are making the plea to our communities to suit up and prepare to be the voice for the most vulnerable among us.


CASA volunteers, or Court Appointed Special Advocates, are everyday people who are recruited and specially trained to advocate for children in foster care and provide a consistent, reliable adult presence for them during a difficult time in their life.

Training will be provided to prepare CASA Volunteers to answer the call in the aftermath of the current public health crisis. We are currently offering a new flexible pre-service training in an online interactive virtual environment. There will be multiple options for class times, so you are able to pick the time that would work best for your schedule.

The online sessions introduce the participants to the key elements for CASA volunteer work, allowing you to interact with others, explore new ideas, and obtain tools for effective child advocacy. The virtual classroom sessions use case studies to introduce participants to a variety of dynamics including poverty, mental health issues, substance abuse, domestic violence, etc. By using this method, volunteers not only obtain experience with different types of cases but also learn how to gather information thoroughly.

Anyone 21 years of age or older, who can pass a thorough background check and complete 30 hours of free training, is encouraged to apply.

Efraim Pineres, M.D.

Efraim Pineres, M.D. passed on March 19, 2020 surrounded by his children and attended by his loving, loval wife Olga Pineres. Dad was 97 and accomplished so much in his long life. His youth was spent in Cartagena, Colombia, helping his father run their pharmacy, playing with his older brothers and sisters, and helping to raise many of his half brothers and sisters. In total, my dad had 15 siblings!

He attended college and medical school at The University of Cartagena, earning his medical degree in 1951. He practiced general medicine in Colombia, South America (serving as the town mayor during part of that time) before traveling to Chicago, Illinois, to complete a second residency at Northwest Hospital. It took courage to leave behind a comfortable home and a lucrative career in Colombia to start all over again in a new country, but Dad wanted better opportunities for his children, so he took that chance for us. After his residency, he practiced medicine for several years in Illinois and Indiana while raising a brood of nine children. Nine spirited, challenging children!

In 1978, Dad again moved his wife and several children to start up a new practice as a small town,



family doctor in Globe, Ariz. Again, the courage that took! Dad cared for so many families in Globe, and, even after he retired, spoke fondly of his friends, employees, and patients. His children clearly remember his dedication to his practice. He had an office phone extension in his bedroom and that phone rang day and night. It was common to hear Dad and Mom chatting with patients, giving them medical advice, and scheduling appointments, even on Saturdays and Sundays! Patients would show up at our doorstep crying and scared, and Dad never turned them away. He was a wonderful doctor and loved his profession enormously.

Dad retired from medicine at 73 years old and spent the next 24 years with his wife in Gilbert, Ariz., enjoying the dream home they built together and their grandchildren. Their home was the core of our family, and it was always full of

people and laughter.

Dad was also very witty and funny. His was a dry humor, but he told his share of jokes, as well. His children can tell you that he laughed so hard at his own jokes that none of us got the punchline, but neither could we stop laughing!

But Dad's greatest accomplishment [by far] was us, his children. We are his legacy. Dad showed us endless love and sacrificed so much for us. He gave us our education, our indomitable wills, our sense of responsibility, our independent spirits, our ability to succeed in life, and our indestructible family bonds. Thank you Papi! We will love you and miss you forever.

Terence O. Wheeler

Terence O. Wheeler, former mayor of Globe and a leader in the Arizona cattle industry for more than half a century, died on March 25th in Globe, at the age of 84.

Terry Wheeler was born in Tucson on October 28, 1935 to Oswin and Catherine Wheeler. He attended SS. Peter and Paul School and graduated in 1953 from Tucson High School, where he was on the gymnastics team. He then attended the University of Arizona College of Agriculture, where he was one of the founders of the UA intercollegiate rodeo team, and received his B.S. in animal science and range/watershed management in 1958.

Terry pursued a career

in cattle and range management, starting with the Bureau of Indian Affairs at San Carlos after college. His career with the BIA took him to North Dakota and then to Chinle, Arizona, on the Navajo Reservation. He later was the University of Arizona cooperative extension agent for the San Carlos Apache Tribe and for Gila County. He subsequently worked as a consultant in range management and reclamation for ranchers, tribes, mining companies and other landholders throughout Arizona and the Southwest. Since the 1980s he was a leading advocate for the holistic range management methodologies developed by Alan Savory for reversing desertification and reclaiming grazing lands. These



activities took him as far afield as Lesotho and Niger in Southern Africa with the U.S. State Department's Agency for International Development and Jordan with the U.N. Food & Agriculture Organization. In more recent years he managed ranches in Colorado and Arizona as well as purchasing and operating the Jones ranch located just north of Globe. Following a total of nine years as a city councilman, Terry served as Mayor of Globe from 2011 through 2016.

He was a past president of the Gila County Cattle Growers Association and was a member of the Arizona Cattle Growers Association, the National Indian Cattle Growers Association, the Society for Range Management, Arizona Town Hall and many other local, state and national organizations. Terry was passionate about protecting the rights of Western cattlemen and public land use as he took many trips to Washington D.C. to meet with congressmen on their behalf. Terry was active throughout his adult life in the Gila County community, including volunteer organizations, his parish council, schools, little league baseball, and 4-H. He served in the U.S. Navy (Reserves and Active Duty) from 1952 – 1961.

Terry is survived by his wife Diana; by six children, Kevin Wheeler (Rebecca) of Chandler: Kathleen Ortega (Keith Cullen) of Tucson; Daniel Wheeler (Leslie) of Gilbert; Diane Kopf of Casa Grande; Nora (Dale Dallenogare) of Globe; and Eileen Terry of Globe; by 13 grandchildren; and by 6 great-grandchildren. Also surviving are his brother. William Wheeler (Patty) of Carmel, Indiana; his sister, Ellen Wheeler (David Nix) of Tucson; and his former wife, Anita Wheeler of Globe. He is also survived by three stepchildren, Frank Hardesty (Lee), of Globe; Shaunna Hardesty and her daughter Emily of Long Beach, California, and Marty Hardesty (Susie) of Valley Center, California.



Dear Christian, It's Time To Speak Up!

We find ourselves in uncertain and troubling times. Many are living in fear as the world changes around us. People need hope. People need good news. And you, dear Christian, have been called by God to announce to your family, friends, and neighbors the

true Good News, the Gospel of Jesus Christ! How are you going to do that? What message will you share with them? I think this is a vital question right now, as there is much confusion over what the Bible says we are to say when sharing our faith. Are we to tell people that God has a wonderful plan for their life? Perhaps we should encourage people to ask Jesus into their heart. What should we say?

When sharing the Gospel message, we must faithfully explain the law of God, the penalty of sin, the grace of God in the work of Christ, and we must call a person to repentance and faith. Recognizing that God Himself is the one who makes the message effectual, believers must trust that God will accomplish His desired outcome.

First, the unbeliever must recognize the depths of his sin. He must see he is lost in order to see his need of the Savior. Millard Erickson explains, "The beginning of the Christian life requires a recognition of one's own sinfulness and a determination to abandon the self-centered way of life." This is done through sharing God's law.

How is the law a part of sharing the "good news"? Isn't the law something that condemns us? Yes, the law leaves us helpless because we are all guilty of breaking God's law. "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). It's one thing for us to say, "Sure, no one's perfect." But quite another thing to look into the perfect law of God and see exactly what "falling short of the glory of God" looks like. To see that falling short doesn't mean we're almost there, and we just need God to give us a little push. Rather, it is to see we don't come close at all, that we are without hope by ourselves.

The Apostle Paul says, "If it had not been for the law, I would not have known sin" (Romans 7:7). Very simply, we understand what sin is by looking to God's holy standard. Sin separates us from God and the law shows us what sin is. Therefore, to be faithful witnesses we must share the law of God. This can be done by pointing people to the moral law as stated in the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20).

Second, we must point out that because we have broken God's law, we deserve eternal punishment. Some non-Christian groups, who claim to use the Bible, think that through following laws they can earn salvation. What's wrong with that idea? It goes against what God has said is the purpose of the law! We were given the law so "that



every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God" (Romans 3:19)" We must show that following the law cannot save us. Paul continues, "For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin" (Romans 3:20). If we understand God's law, we will understand

our moral and spiritual failings and that we deserve the just wrath of God.

Third, when the recognition of sin and judgment has been grasped, we then share what God has done in Christ so that broken sinners can be forgiven and receive eternal life. "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved" (Ephesians 2:4-5).

We must share that God became flesh in the person of Jesus Christ, lived a holy life, and died the death that we deserve. We must share that God doesn't wait for us to become "good people" before He begins working on us. No, God enters in while we are dead in our sins. "God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). We can sing "Amazing Grace" because God's grace towards us in Christ is amazing when we've seen, by looking to God's law, the depths of our sin and what our just punishment should be. However, we don't receive that punishment when Christ becomes our Savior.

Finally, the last important part of sharing the Gospel message is calling people to turn from their sins and to turn to Christ. It is at this point we take this message of grace and call the hearer to action. The Gospel call is a command from God to be reconciled through the finished work of Christ upon the cross. "[God] commands all people everywhere to repent" (Acts 17:30). Our message then must implore the hearer to heed the call and to surrender fully to Jesus.

Every day is a gift from God. No one is guaranteed tomorrow. Thousands of people wake up each day unaware they are living their last day on earth. The big question is, "Are you ready to die?" This is not intended to be a morbid question, but an urgent question coming from a place of love and concern. Dear Christian, hear my plea: do not let another day pass without telling your loved ones, your friends, your neighbors about the amazing, saving work of Jesus Christ. Urgency in this endeavor means we do not put off sharing the gospel, because another day may never come. Charles Spurgeon once said, "If Hell must be filled, let it be filled in the teeth of our exertions, and let not one go unwarned and unprayed for."




