Have not donated blood in the last 56 days

Weigh at least 110 pounds. Additional weight requirements apply for donors 18 years old and younger and all high school donors


AZ Speaks: Honky Tonks, **Brothels** and **Mining Camps**





If problems are detected, she can refer the family to any one of several agencies so that they are not locked into one Doctor or agency.

And what she would like most for everyone

to know is that they can make a positive impact on the lives of their children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews and even neighborhood children. Just listening and talking to them can cause good things to happen, as can intervening early before kids can fall behind in kindergarten.



ADOT MVD Commercial Driver License services now available at all full-time MVD offices

PHOENIX - The days of Commercial Driver License (CDL) customers only being able to go to a handful of MVD offices for those services are over.

The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division now offers most CDL services at all full-time MVD locations statewide. Previously, CDL customers were required to travel to a limited number of MVD locations. "As part of our continuous improvement efforts under the Arizona Management System, we're training all MVD Customer Service Representatives to perform commercial license transactions," said MVD Stakeholder Relations Manager Jennifer Bowser Richards.

She added, "That means someone who needs to get a CDL or most other commercial driver service doesn't have to go to a special CDL office anymore; they can be served at any full-time MVD office. The only exception is commercial driver road tests, which are available at many, but not all, MVD locations."

The expansion of CDL into more MVD locations is in addition to the existing CDL system. The existing CDL offices, some of which are separate from MVD locations, will continue to operate. This change means staff at all existing CDL offices now serve as examiners who are able to provide a larger number of skills tests by appointment.

"MVD is always looking for ways to improve customer service," Bowser Richards added. "Adding literally hundreds of employees who can serve commercial customers will speed up those transactions and make all of MVD more efficient."





Playground tradition fascinates me. I'm talking about those little games and rhymes that are passed down from kid generation to kid generation. "Eeny, meeny, miny, moe, catch a tiger by the toe, If he hollers, let him go..." I'm not sure if one could even trace the origin of some of these.

Playground tradition also entails "kid culture". There are particular bits of knowledge needed in order to be a kid on the playground. For instance, one learns early on what a pinky promise is and why vou must never break it. "No tag backs" is also vital when with a group of kids. Finally, when I was a kid, if you didn't know "ink-a-bink a-bottle of ink" you would most likely be "it" next. To make it on the playground, a kid must learn the culture of the playground. Similarly, to understand a historical text, like the Bible, one must have a grasp of the time and culture in which it was originally produced.

Last week, we looked at the importance of understanding the literary context of Bible passages. This week, we will explore the necessity of understanding the historical-cultural context of a Bible passage.

The historical-cultural context places each passage within the time, geographical location, and culture in which it was originally written. For instance, to rightly understand Paul's letters, you have to remember that Paul originally wrote his letters to specific people in specific places. While that doesn't mean that his letters don't have any significance today, it does mean

understand them the way the original audience understood them. In other words, a Bible passage cannot mean something to modern readers that it didn't first

mean to the original audience.

The necessity of the historical-cultural context is seen in Paul's instructions on head coverings in 1 Corinthians 11:2-16. Do the ladies in your church wear head coverings to Sunday morning worship? If not, are they being disobedient to Paul's words in this passage? While some Christian traditions have made head coverings an important aspect of the gathered church today, others understand that Paul's concerns had to do with specific practices within the Greco-Roman culture at the time of his writing.

Paul implores men to pray with their heads uncovered as opposed to the Roman men who prayed to false gods with their heads covered by their togas. Similarly, Paul implores women to pray with their heads covered, the proper cultural symbol of a wife's relationship to her husband, as opposed to the Roman women who flaunted their sexual rebellion by removing their head coverings. Therefore, in order to properly follow the teaching of this passage, one would have to ask: what parts of our culture do we need to keep out of our worship services and what parts of our culture symbolize sexual rebellion?

The Acceptable Motive

The converse truth is that love gives validity to my actions and makes them acceptable to God. I can seek my enemies' welfare so they won't harm me again. That's manipulation, not love. It's looking out for my welfare under the guise of looking out for theirs.

Love for God is the only acceptable motive for

about What Jesus' words the church to Laodicea? in "I know your works: you are neither cold nor hot. Would that vou were either

because you are lukewarm, and neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth" (Revelation 3:15-16). Now, I've heard these words used to teach that God would rather you be completely wicked than be an apathetic Christian. Is that right? "If you're going to be evil, go big or go home." Is that what Jesus is saving here? I don't think so. A look at the geographical location and historical context of Laodicea will give us some insight.

Laodicea was a city in the southwest of Asia Minor known for its great wealth. However, the city did not have a good water supply and piped it in from other places. Contrarily, nearby cities of Colossae and Hierapolis were both known for their useful water. Colossae had cold water good for drinking and Hierapolis had natural hot springs good for therapeutic baths. However, by the time the water was piped into Laodicea, it was neither cold (good for drinking) or hot (good for baths); it was lukewarm and good for nothing. Jesus is not saying to the church in Laodicea that if you are going to be wicked just go all the way. Rather, He is saying that in their current state of indifference they were good for nothing.

> obeying Him. This love may express itself in reverence for Him and a desire to please Him, but those expressions must spring from love. Without love, my apparent obedience may be essentially self-serving. I may fear God's punishment or His withholding of blessing, or I may conform to a certain standard of con-

duct because I want to fit in with the Christian culture around me. I might even obey simply because I have a compliant temperament.

All these motives may result in outward obedience, but not obedience from the heart. Only conduct arising from love is worthy of the name obedience

is a verb, not a feeling," the saying goes. Indeed, Jesus said we're to love our enemies (Matthew 5:44).

In another sense, however, love is not a verb but the motive that prompts and guides other verbs-certain actions. I love my enemies first by forgiving them for their harmful actions toward me, then by seeking

their welfare in appropriate wavs. Love needs other verbs

to give it hands and feet. This can be seen in 1 Corinthians 13 where Paul used love as a noun, the subject of a whole list of action statements: Love is patient, love is kind, it does not envy, it does not boast, and so on.



Finally, the historical-cultural context

helps correct previously misunderstood

passages. For example, in Matthew 19 Je-

sus explains it is hard for the rich to inherit

the Kingdom of God by using a visual il-

lustration. He says, "It is easier for a camel

to go through the eve of a needle than for a

rich person to enter the kingdom of God"

(Matt. 19:24). It has been a popular preach-

ing point that the "needle's eye" was a low

gate in Jerusalem that a camel could not get

through without kneeling. Therefore, the

rich could only enter in the kingdom if they

were truly humbled, as symbolized in this

kneeling picture. That sounds good, right?

The only problem is that no such gate ever

corrects erroneous information that has

been widely disseminated. When Jesus

speaks of a needle, He is speaking of a

needle similar in size and use to modern

day needles. The idea of the "needle's eye"

being a low gate in Jerusalem is merely fic-

tion. His point is that it is impossible for

the rich, like any other person, to enter the

kingdom of God by their own merit. This

is why Jesus next states, "With man this

is impossible, but with God all things are



Aebleskivers Makes about 3 dozen

- 1 Aebleskiver pan
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2teaspoon ground cardamom
- 1/2teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2cup sugar
- 3 large egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups buttermilk
- 3 large egg whites
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter **Raspberry or strawberry preserves Powdered** sugar

In a medium bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cardamom, salt, and sugar.

In another bowl, beat the egg yolks, vanilla and buttermilk with a whisk or handheld mixer until frothy. Stir the dry ingredients into the wet ingredients just to combine.

In another bowl, beat the egg whites until frothy and stiff peaks form. Gently fold the egg whites into the batter.

Rub a little of the unsalted butter into each indentation of a well-heated aebleskivers pan. With a paper towel, remove excess butter. Place about 1 tablespoon batter in each indentation, top with about 1/2 teaspoon of preserves of choice, and add another tablespoon of batter on top. Cook until the sides are set and bottom is golden brown, about 2 minutes. Using two wooden skewers, carefully turn the aebleskivers over to cook the other side. Cook for 1 to 2 minutes more. Transfer to a platter, dust with powdered sugar, and serve hot. Repeat with remaining batter.
