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Forest Service reschedules prescribed fire burn north of Payson

PAYSON - Fire specialists will again attempt to burn 210 acres of vegetative debris piles, located about nine miles north of Payson in the vicinity of Shadow Rim Girl Scout Ranch, from Feb. 4-7. The burn was scheduled to occur Jan. 29-31 but was cancelled as a result of increased fuel moisture due to inclement weather. Residents and visitors to the area can expect to see and smell light-to-moderate amounts of smoke during the operation. Smoke will impact Shadow Rim, Verde Glen, and Rim Trail during the day. In the evening, smoke will impact Whispering Pines and Beaver Valley. Residual smoke may linger in these areas thru Feb. 9. To minimize smoke impacts, fire personnel will end ignitions by 3 p.m. each day. Signs will be posted on roads likely to be affected by smoke. The Forest Service urges motorists to use caution when driving through the area, and to slow down for the safety of firefighters working in the area as well as the public. These burns provide land managers the option of treating areas with favorable conditions, which helps to protect natural and cultural resources while decreasing danger to the public and firefighters. Firefighters closely monitor the growth, rate of spread, and smoke from prescribed fire burns. Aggressive suppression actions are taken if the fire displays behavior that does not meet resource management objectives. Tonto officials note that they received permission to conduct prescribed fire burns in specific areas on the forest despite the ongoing legal matter involving a court-ordered injunction on select timber management activities for New Mexico national forests as well as the Tonto National Forest regarding potential effects to the Mexican spotted owl. These burns enhance range, watershed, and wildlife habitat. Prescribed fires always are dependent on the right conditions which include temperature, wind speed and direction, fuel moisture content, and relative humidity.

Dollar Dump Day is Saturday

GLOBE — Winter hours are still in effect at Gila Countv's Russell Gulch Landfill: open Monday through Saturday from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. closed on Sundays and holidays such as President's Day, Feb. 17. Need to confirm the landfill schedule? Call 928-425-7470.

The next 'Dollar Dump Day' will be Saturday, Feb. 8, and landfill staff remind residents to tarp, cover and secure your trash and please make sure to bring coins or \$1 bill if you're hauling a load to the Russell Gulch Landfill on that special Saturday to take advantage of the once-a-month 'dollar dump day' special discount.

Arizona state and local laws require all loads must be covered or secured, that applies to residential haulers as well as commercial, and applies on 'dollar day,' too. As for the \$1-per-load deal, credit card fees and the excessive time spent to process a \$1 credit card transaction spurred this friendly reminder to please make sure you bring a buck, don't pay with plastic.

Gila County Public Works reminds landfill users that Dollar Dump Day




discount was created for residential users and proof of Gila County residency is required.

Commercial haulers pay regular landfill fees. and "most loads cost about \$7.50" according to landfill staff. Expect a slight surcharge, just over two-cents

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per pound, when loads exceed 320 pounds. And for all other waste (construction, mixed loads, metal, large brush) \$7.50 includes up to 280 pounds, with an additional three-cents per pound for heavier loads. Hauling a load of residential grass clippings, leaves, limbs and shrubs? That's considered 'green waste', and the fee is \$5 for 280 pounds or less, plus a slight surcharge for heavier loads. A 'brush rate' applies when tree limbs are larger than four inches diameter.

Range Day on Sunday, March 1 at 8 a.m. until finished at the Globe-Miami Gun Club, 2675 Bixby Rd. Students are asked to bring a sack lunch for the classroom days (28 and 29). Attendance all three days is mandatory.

Know that the online registration process is available statewide, SO don't procrastinate. Register as soon as possible to reserve your space. The class is limited to 30 students. Students will need a department ID number at registration. Call Arizona Game and Fish Department at 602-942-3000 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. to get a Department ID number.

There is a \$5 per student fee for this course payable on the first day of class. All classroom hunter safety education courses are taught by Arizona Game and Fish Department certified volunteer instructors. A student that is nine years old may complete the Arizona Hunter Education Safety Course. If a student turns nine by the time they graduate, they may receive a Hunter Education card. The card will not become valid until their 10th birthday. The age that they may hunt big game has not changed, only the age that they can graduate the course.

This will prevent the problem of a student turning 10 the day before the hunt and not being able to get in a class.



EPA SEEKS PUBLIC INPUT ON CLEANUP WORK AT MOUNTAIN VIEW MOBILE HOMES SUPERFUND SITE

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is reviewing its work to clean up the Mountain View Mobile Home Estates Superfund site in Globe, Arizona, This review—called a "Five-Year Review" —will see if the cleanup plan for the site is still working as it was designed. According to the Superfund law, EPA is required to review its site cleanup plan, or "remedy, every five years if a cleanup takes more than five years to complete, or, if hazardous waste remains on site.

The 17-acre site was once the home of the former Metate Asbestos Corporation's chrysotile asbestos mill. The property was subsequently used as a mobile home park from 1973 until 1979. In 1979, local health officials discovered asbestos contamination during an inspection of the mobile home park's sewage treatment plant. Asbestos mill tailings had been used as fill material and then been partially covered with topsoil. Small piles of asbestos mill tailings were found near the abandoned mill structures and adjacent railroad tracks. The air and soils were contaminated with asbestos, posing a potential health risk to the residents

Exposure to asbestos fibers has been eliminated by burying asbestos-con-taminated material under a cap. In addition, a Declaration of Environmental Use Restriction (DEUR)—a State of Arizona land use coverant—was put on the deed in December 2007 to prevent there being any future exposure to the asbestos. DEUR directs property owners on how the land can be used and any capticipant exposure have an development by land. The last used and any restrictions owners have on developing the land. The last Five-Year Review, done in 2015, found the remedy was working as intended and was protective of human health and the environment

Return of Cradle Board and Tus *Wesley family identifies returned items*

Recently, Barclay Brooks of Pennsylvania sent back a Cradle Board and Tus (pitched jug) given to them by the late Clarence and Alice Wesley in the 1950s. The children of Clarence and Alice, Kathy Wesley Kitcheyan, Ann Wesley and John Wesley, came to the Museum and looked at the Cradle Board and Tus, and they confirmed these two items were made by their mother.

Ann and John said when they were kids, they would go with their mother to the Yellow Jacket

area and cut juniper branches. The branches were cut at a slight angle and put in a can for the pitch to drip into the can, and later applied to the woven tus.

Kathy, Ann and John are of the Hai'aa'ha clan meaning Chiricahua Apache, and born for the Tugai Clan. They are direct descendants of Cochise and his

son Naiche.

They are Chiricahua Apache since their mother, and their maternal grandmother were Chiricahua.

This is how the Apache Clan System works, you are what your mother and maternal grandmother is, and your paternal grandfather's clan is acknowledged as to who you are born for.



Healthy Christians = Healthy Churches

Local churches, as a whole, become healthier when individual church members become spiritually healthy themselves. I firmly believe that God intends for every follower of Jesus Christ to play an active role in the local church. Pastor Thabiti Anvabwile states, "The health of the local church depends on the willingness of its members to inspect their hearts, correct their thinking, and apply their hands to the work of the ministry." In this article, I want to give vou a summary look at Anyabwile's book. "What Is a Health Church Member?" with the hope that we understand the importance of the church and our purpose within the body of Christ.

Anyabwile uses the idea of "marks" or signposts that are easily recognizable to Christians as to what should be a regular part of our lives in the church. Each mark is intended to reveal the nature of the Christian life. Anybwile gives the following 10 marks, stating that a healthy church member is a(n).

Expositional Listener
 Biblical Theologian
 Gospel Saturated
 Genuinely Converted
 Biblical Evangelist

6)Committed Member 7)Discipline Seeker 8)Growing Disciple 9)Humble Follower 10) Prayer Warrior The first two give a solid

foundation of truth to build upon. If church members are not able to hear and understand the word of God as it is presented throughout the Old and New Testaments, they will be unable to rightly live in light of God's truth. Likewise, the following three marks highlight the importance of a right understanding of the gospel message and biblical conversion. Church members who are not truly born-again or are not living in light of their salvation will be ineffective in service. He states, "Genuine converts to Christ grieve at their sin. They hate their sin, and they desire the light of life in Christ, which is to say they desire and work to walk in integrity and righteousness. Persons habitually and unrepentantly living in sin, who deny that they are sinners (1 John 1:8-10), are not genuinely converted."

The next two marks show that healthy church members are totally committed to the church, even in the midst of discipline. Living in a consumer-driven society has unfortunate-



ly affected the perspective of the church. Some think, "If this church doesn't fulfill my needs. I'll find one that does." This may be common; however, healthy church members buck against such thinking and instead are committed to living life with a local church in good times and in bad times. No longer can we allow the consumer mentality to permeate the culture of the church; rather, we must heed Paul's admonition that pastor-teachers are to "equip the saints for the work of ministry" (Ephesians 4:12). The ministry of the church is not primarily for church leaders but for all healthy Christians.

The final three marks deal with the continual growth that healthy church members should desire. Church members should seek to grow as disciples, utilizing the means of grace that God has placed within the local church. Healthy church members will seek to remain humble as they grow and learn, not wanting to "lord over" newer believers. Anyabwile concludes that healthy church members are prayer warriors and continually uphold the church in prayer to God.

These marks are the natural fruit of biblical discipleship. Anyabwile writes, "It is normal for Christians to grow, to work for growth, and to expect increasing spiritual maturity. Those who do are healthy church members." Disciples are made so that they may be a healthy part of the church. As Jesus is "the head of the body, the church (Colossians 1:18)", disciples are to be members of the body who perform the tasks God has given to His people. Anyabwile shows how the local church is where discipleship comes to life and is the proving ground for healthy church members. "A growing church member is someone who looks more and more like Jesus in attitude of heart, thought,

s p e e c h, and action. That's what we long to be and long for our churches to be." T w o primary in-

sights: 1) Healthy disciples/ church members grow and 2) All improvement only comes through the grace of God. Anyabwile reiterates that it should not be a strange or rare occurrence to see followers of Jesus Christ producing good fruits, growing and maturing in Christ. Yet we live in an age when some think that only "super Christians" will mature. However, all true followers of Jesus Christ, all biblical disciples will and must mature. Why? Because this is what God continuously tells us in His word (eg. Eph. 4:13; Col. 1:28). Anyabwile remarks, "The healthy church member is a growing church member. Specifically, s/he is a church member that grows in Christlikeness, holiness, and maturity... And most wonderfully of all, we will not stop growing until we reach the fullness of Christ!" Anyabwile leaves the

Anyabwile leaves the readers with a few conclud-

ing remarks that highlight the fact that all of the marks can become mere drudgerv apart from the grace of God. He writes, "The counsel of this book is offered not as a prescription to be taken independent of God's grace in the gospel of Jesus Christ." Everything we are called to be and do as the church is only possible through Christ. He Anyabwile reminds his readers that one must not take each chapter simply as a roadmap to be followed without trusting in God's grace. Rather, church members and leaders must heed the call to grow as disciples while trusting that the Spirit of God will empower one to do so.

Anyabwile's book is truly a gift to the evangelical church as we desire to mold and form who we are by the pattern of God's inspired word. The book's wise counsel, biblical insight, and practical advice will make it a helpful tool in the hands of pastors and leaders for years to come. Anyabwile put it well when he stated, "I pray this small contribution would play some part in increasing our love for the body of our Savior and in so doing would lead the church to greater strength, vitality, and health."

Individuals affiliated with hospitals, schools, churches, nursing homes or who have a responsibility for protecting others are also encouraged to become a spotter. Meteorologists from the NWS conduct storm spotter training sessions each year to help prepare spotters for the upcoming severe weather season.

Questions about the Presidential Preference Election March 17?

Did you know there's an election next month? With the holiday season behind us and 2020 election year dates and deadlines approaching, Gila County Recorder Sadie Jo Bingham and her staff are fielding more frequent questions about voter registration, and events such as the March 17 Presidential Preference Election. Feb. 18 brings a voter registration deadline and early voting; in this short Q-and-A, Gila County Recorder Sadie Jo Bingham shares a few answers to the most frequently asked questions.

Q. Who can vote in the March 17 presidential preference election?

A. "Only registered Democrats are eligible to cast ballots, because the Republican party is not holding a presidential preference election in Arizona. Democratic candidates are the only choices on the ballot, and only those voters registered as Democrats are eligible to vote."

Q. What's the deadline to register?

A. "Feb. 18, a Tuesday, is the registration deadline, one full month before the Presidential Preference Election, but – again – only voters who register as Democrats may participate in the 'PPE'. Independents or anyone who are registered with no party affiliation would have to change their party affiliation by Feb. 18 in order to vote. Voters have the option to change their party affiliation after the presidential preference election, too, well ahead of the nationwide general election Nov. 3.

Q. How do I register to vote, or change my party affiliation?

A. One convenient way is online, using the website servicearizona.com. Voters are welcome to register in either of my offices in Globe and Payson, too. Office hours are weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. A few other dates voters should be aware of: early ballots are mailed Feb. 19, the day after registration ends, and from Feb. 19 - March 13 voters may cast ballots in-person during early voting. March 6 is the last day to request a mail-in ballot, and the PPE is March 17. Election season will be heating-up next month, our state's PPE happens two weeks



after the so-called 'Super Tuesday' primaries in 16 other states across the nation.

ADOR Seeking Unclaimed Property Owners from Coconino, Gila and Navajo Counties

The Arizona Department of Revenue's (ADOR) Unclaimed Property program has identified approximately \$13.7 million that belonged to more than 56,100 people with last known addresses in Coconino County, Gila County and Navajo County. The agency is sending out notices to the potential property owners and their families to attempt to return the funds. Some of the property dates back more than 30 years. § In Coconino County, the department's unclaimed property team has found nearly \$7 million that would go back to more than 29,500 individuals. § In Gila County, the total is \$3.4 million from over 10,200 people and a review of unclaimed funds. § The review of Navajo County confirmed more than \$3.3 million belonging to approximately 16,300 individual owners. Unclaimed property generally consists of money due to an individual from sources like old bank accounts, uncashed payroll checks, tax refunds, credit balances, rebates, returned deposits and dormant safe deposit

boxes. Often property becomes unclaimed because the company that holds the funds has an outdated or the wrong forwarding address for its customer and in some cases, a person passes away with no family members aware of the assets. ADOR returns property to owners who provide documentation showing their right to claim the assets. Claimants must include with their claim form a valid photo ID, such as a driver's license or other applicable identification, and documentation linking them to the owner's last known address. Claimants must also provide documentation demonstrating a legal right to claim any property listed in another name. ADOR's Unclaimed Property program returned \$48.4 million to rightful owners in fiscal year 2019 (July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019). 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


