Bixby Railroad Crossing Traffic Closure Feb. 24-26



Gila County Public Works' Engineering Department advises drivers to plan ahead for road closures and a detour next week when Arizona Eastern will be re-building the railroad crossing near Hoopes Road and Pinal Creek Road.

The road will be completely closed to traffic starting Monday Feb. 24 at 6 a.m. lasting through Wednesday Feb. 26 at 5 p.m. Expect closure from the intersection of Bixby Road and Pinal Creek Road to the entrance of Cemex Materials on Pinal Creek Road. During the project all local traffic will be detours through Pinal Creek road via Escudilla Drive at the Central Heights turnoff. Arizona Eastern is working under a right of way permit on a county road.

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





Gila County Recorder: Early Voting Began Feb. 19

Early voting for the March 17 Presidential Preference Election began Feb. 19: Gila County Recorder Sadie Jo Bingham sent a reminder this week with instructions for those who are registered to vote, and a note encouraging all eligible voters to verify their registration well ahead of future 2020 general election year dates and deadlines.

One deadline that has already passed was the Tuesday Feb. 18 cut-of date for voters to be registered as democrats in order to vote in the March 17 'PPE.' Registered Gila County Democratic voters are invited to visit early voting sites throughout Gila County to cast their ballots from now through March 13.

Early voting locations and hours are listed on the Gila County Recorder's page at gilacountyaz.gov; voters may east ballots at both of the County Recorder's Office locations in Globe and Payson. Both are open weekday business hours, but please note that the Payson of-

fice closes during the lunch hour from 12-1pm. Also, in a continuing effort to make 2020 elections as convenient possible for rural as and Tribal voters, Gila County Recorder Sadie Jo Bingham and her staff have arranged early voting outreach dates Feb. 25-27 and also in March (see below) especially for residents of San Carlos and also White Mountain Apache communities don't have to drive their ballot to Globe, or voteby-mail. And a reminder: the only voting happening during February and March is for the Presidential Preference Election March 17, which is limited to candidates of the Democratic party - and open only to voters who were registered as Democrats by the recent registration deadline Feb. 18.

Early Voting: Easy & Convenient Gila County Recorder

Sadie Jo Bingham and her staff added voters don't have to wait 'til election day to cast their ballots: early voting is both easy and convenient by mail or in person at vote centers during weeks leading up to 2020 elections. Want to vote by mail? Voters who have requested to be on the Permaneut Early Voting List (PEVL) will automatically receive a vote-bvmail ballot, make sure to watch for a yellow envelope in your mailbox. When voters receive their vote-by-mail ballots, your choices can be made thoughtfully and at leisure, in the comfort and privacy of your own home. Vote your ballot, follow printed instructions to place the voted ballot into the white ballot affidavit envelope, make sure to sign your name where indicated on that white ballot affidavit envelope, and drop it in the mail for speedy delivery back to the Gila County Recorder's Office.

ROOSEVELT – Learn about the wide variety of birds found at Tonto National Monument, including the Gila Woodpecker and the Turkey Vulture.

Ranger-led bird walks will be held on the following dates from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

Wednesday, Feb. 26, Thursday, March 12, Wednesday, April 1, Wednesday, April 22 Bird walks will begin at the Tonto National Monument Visitor Center. Park admission is \$10 per person unless visitors have an Interagency Annual, Military, Senior, Fourth Grader, or Access Pass. There is no additional cost to attend the bird walks and reservations are not required. Visitors will also have the opportunity to explore the Lower Cliff Dwelling after the program.

Bring dependable hiking shoes, binoculars, a water bottle, and your favorite field guides. All experience levels are welcome to attend. Novice birders can use limited binoculars and field guides supplied by the National Park Service for the duration of the

walk. Bird species spotted by visitors will be recorded and featured on Tonto National Monument social media.

In 1974 Manuel and family moved to Globe-Miami where he joined Cities Service Company Miami Operations at its start-up of operations of at Pinto Valley. Manuel was hired as the foreman of the Instrument Shop where he excelled at problem solving, mechanical, metering, and flow operations essential to plant and production operations, where he retired in 1999 from the Pinto Valley Mine.

After retirement, Manuel and his friend and partner Rudy formed Globe Instruments and where they provided consulting and technical services for a number of utilities and water treatment facilities around the state. He took the time to explain how things worked to everyone around him, why they didn't, and how to fix them if they were broken. As he was explaining the details and diagramming them on paper, he would weave in a story

about his personal experience and the characters that were involved in learning the concept.

Manuel was hands on with everything he did and his skills included math, science, chemistry, carpentry, electrical, mechanical. automotive. He could fashion just about anything with a good rope, wire, a few nails, and put to use whatever was within reach. He never left the house without his Barlow knife and his tool pouch. He was also a master of improvising whatever was needed to get out of a serious jam out in the field and there were many while he was out hunting with his boys.

Manuel introduced his family to the value of not just working hard, but being true to any effort you engage in. He absolutely loved Arizona, the United States of America and living the tenets of his Catholic faith all the time - not just on Sunday.

He enjoyed watching sports with his family and his favorite team was the 1948 World Champion Cleveland Indians. Some of the lessons he emphasized with his children were to treat all people with respect, help people in need, not to swear, to do your best, and that life's virtues are found in honesty, love, prayer, and making things right between people when they aren't. Manuel Rivera was true to everyone in his life and his good deeds for others were plentiful. We regularly hear stories from relatives, friends, and complete strangers how our dad once helped them and impacted their life in a positive way.

In his final months and weeks with us. Manuel bravely endured several debilitating health issues. Through it all and during the 63 years of his marriage, he loved no other than his high school sweetheart, Lupe. They prayed together nightly by holding hands and leaning their heads together. With his loving family surrounding him in his final moments, Manuel peacefully left us to be with his Lord - "Forever in our Hearts".

March is Archaeology Month -Lean About Salado & Hohokam Sites with Jay D. Franklin, PhD

GLOBE — Need a dose of historical perspective during this election year?


The Hohokam flourished throughout central Arizona for one thousand years, approximately 300 - 1400 AD, settling across what we know today as 'The Valley' and along the Salt and Gila Rivers, during an era that coincided with the Anasazi, the Sinagua and the Mogollon people. For reasons that are still debated by archaeologists, all these relatively advanced cultures declined during a century from about 1350 - 1450 AD, abandoning their cliff dwellings and publoes one a hundred years before contact with Europeans March is Archaeology Month - and the Besh Ba Gowah Museum in Globe hosts a special speaker March guest 21 (Saturday) at 2 p.m. when Jay D. Franklin, PhD narrates a slideshow and talk on: "Communities in Transition: Hohokam and Salado Archaeology Along US 60 Near Superior, Arizona" Dr. Franklin will explain archaeological investigations by EcoPlan Associates, Inc. along a four mile stretch of US 60 just east of Superior -- explaining overall project chronology, culture history, and results of several kinds of analyses with attention to the pottery found.

The project uncovered both Hohokam and Salado sites along Queen Creek and examines the

social environments and interaction spheres of these populations during the period. This project provides new information on the upper Queen Creek corridor between the more intensely investigated Phoenix Basin and Tonto Basin/Globe Highlands. Jay D. Franklin, PhD, is Director of Cultural Resources and a Principal Investigator for EcoPlan Associates, Inc. headquartered in Mesa, Arizona. The Unfolding Nature of God's Word

I once had a teacher who started every class with an inspirational quote, joke of the day, or some random fact. Some of the most memorable things she wrote on the board were the strange laws that Arizona has had on the books. For instance, we learned that at one time it was illegal to allow a donkey to sleep in a bathtub. As students we would laugh at the seemingly silly laws, wondering what caused such a law to be created. Now, however, even if I may think such laws are silly. I try to think about them in light of the historical context in which they were created.

One of the critiques Bible-believing Christians often hear is the accusation of picking and choosing parts of the Bible to follow and leaving other parts behind. In the internet world, this is often done in "meme" form. If you are not aware, a meme is a picture with some brief information that is passed around and presented as foolproof truth. So a picture is presented with a football and some clams and states, "If you're a Christian and play football or eat shellfish you're a hypocrite." Why? Well, they give a Bible reference, the "nail in the coffin". Leviticus 11:18 says not to touch the carcass of a pig and Leviticus 11:11 says not to eat any sea creature without fins and scales. Oh no! They got me! Over 2,000 years of Christian


scholarship destroyed instantly by a meme. Right?

Not exactly. Last week I began a discussion on the important topic of Bible interpretation. known also as the study of hermeneutics. In Greek Mythology, Hermes is the messenger of the gods.

His job was to fly with his winged sandals and deliver messages from the gods to mortals. The term hermeneutics uses the same root, "herm-", and is associated with delivering or interpreting a message. However, in order to comprehend a message, we must allow the message to be understood in its given context.

While Christians believe the Bible is a divine book, many of same skills one would employ reading any other book apply. For instance, when engaging a novel, the reader allows for the progressive development of ideas as they read. Information presented in early chapters may take on new meaning as the story unfolds.

For example, as Dorothy adventures down the yellow brick road wearing her ruby slippers, she thinks she must see the Wizard to return to Kansas. But in the end she had her "ticket home" all along in the shoes. She didn't know



Now as an audience, we accept that unfolding truth without question. Why? Because that is the normal way we engage with a story. Similarly, we must allow the Bible to be read in it's given context as it unfolds throughout redemptive history.

The laws about pig carcasses and shellfish may seem strange upon first glance, yet in the bigger context of the story it makes complete sense. Moses has led the nation of Israel out of the bondage of Egypt and God is reestablishing a covenant relationship with the people. Part of this relationship involves the giving of laws in order that the people may know who God is and what their responsibility to Him is. The laws function in distinct ceremonial, moral, and civil ways, and show that this nation is distinct from the nations around them who worship false gods (e.g. Deuteronomy 4:8). In the midst of giving these laws, God declares, "For I am the LORD who brought you up out of the land of Egypt to be your God. You shall therefore be holy, for I am holy" (Leviticus 11:45). In one sense, these laws acts as a wedding band, a distinguishing mark that sets the people apart from the other nations in their covenant relationship with God.

"That still doesn't explain why Christians today don't follow those 'silly' laws." That's true, but it does give an explanation of those laws in their historical context. If we can understand the historical context, then we can begin to see how those laws either do or don't apply to Christians today.

With the context in mind you can follow the unfolding of the biblical revelation, and see that those distinguishing laws find their fulfillment in the person and work of Jesus Christ (cf. Matthew 5:17).

In other words, one of the purposes of the law is to show sinful mankind that we can never meet the holy standards of God, nor can we fully separate ourselves from the influence of the world Therefore, Jesus came to do what sinful people could not do; completely obey God's law. Jesus then makes those distinguishing or ceremonial laws no longer necessary for Christians. Training wheels serve a purpose for a time, but eventually they are no longer needed.

Christians do not pick and choose which commandments from God to follow and which to ignore. That is a nonsensical objection. Rather. Christians can read their Bibles and see the unfolding, progressive nature of God's revelation to mankind. Those parts that call for continual practice are retained (compare Leviticus 19:18 and Mark 12:31) and those parts that point to a greater, coming truth are not practiced but are studied in light of the coming of Christ (e.g. Leviticus 1:3).

If you want to know how to rightly interpret the Bible, start with these first two steps: 1) Remember that the basic message of the Bible is plainly understood. We call this the perpetuity of Scripture (which I discussed last week). And 2) Just read it. Read the Bible as an unfolding story that tells us who God is and what He has done for us.

Census in schools: Meet Miami Teacher-Ambassador 'Mr. M'

MIAMI — Why is the 2020 Census important to Globe-Miami schools?

Population results of the once-every-10-years nationwide census determine how much money communities receive for critical resources children and families will depend on over the next 10 years — basically, an entire childhood. Food assistance. HeadStart. child care, housing support, public schools, early intervention services for children with special and children's needs. health insurance - these resources and more can be impacted by census data.

Knowing how many children live in Miami, how many in Globe, and communities throughout Gila County is essential to fair distribution of services and programs.

Surprisingly, kids under age five are often missed – for example, preschoolers who don't live in the same home as both parents sometimes go uncounted. When newborn babies and young children aren't counted in the census, support for programs such as health insurance, hospitals, child care, food assistance, schools, and early childhood development is impacted.

Numbers are important to Miami math teacher Sreevelmurugan Vamadevan, who moved from India to the United States in 2016 – helping alleviate our nationwide teacher shortage here. Despite a heavy course load, he volunteered this year to serve as a 'Teacher Ambassador' for the 2020 Census - helping raise awareness of the count. which begins next month when local residents can officially begin to log on to 2020census.gov and self-report; conveniently online for the first time in U.S. history. Watch your mailbox for a 2020 census postcard reminder with login instructions.

"Teaching is my passion, and here at Miami High school I am handling Pre-Algebra, Algebra, College Algebra, Robotics and Sliding Math - which is a credit recovery class designed by our dear Principal Mr. Lineberry. My grandfather was a renowned Sanskrit scholar and teacher; and I have followed his example as a teacher born, raised and educated in India. I am devoting my career and my life to education. My objective is to become an accomplished teacher, so that I can help construct the next generation in a fruitful way. During this past year I learned about the opportunity to volunteer as a Teacher Ambassador for the U.S. census; this is one way that I can be of service for this great nation -- and teaching about the census also offers a super tool for designing my lessons in mathematics, as well as lessons for other teachers who are collaborating with me -- and within our

entire school."

Any teacher (home schooling parents, too) can download curricular and lesson plan suggestions from the extensive website 2020census. gov; try a search using keywords "statistics in schools" and you find a range of activities designed for kids from pre-K all the way through soon-to-graduate seniors.

Creatively using numbers, words, song and animation - lessons help students understand the census and learn from it. Search online to find:

• take-home flyers for preschoolers to give to parents, explaining importance of the census

• sing along to the lyrics of 'Everyone Counts!' while the video plays online

• play games such as 'I Count, You Count' (find instructions online)


• Everyone Counts story and activity book

• preschool educator flyer

• Various animated videos explain why the census counts everyone in your home -- your neighborhood, and across the USA.

"I'm excited that 'Mr. M' has embraced 'Statistics in Schools' with such enthusiasm - SIS is one of the 2020 Census's key programs," said Havala Schumacher, the U.S. Census Bureau's Partnership Specialist for Gila County.

"Teachers are often

surprised to learn that these materials aren't just for math teachers - they incorporate census data into additional subjects such as geography, history, sociology, and even language arts! We hope that teachers across the county explore these materials during 'Statistics in Schools' week March 2-6 - and throughout the school year."

In Miami, math teacher Sreevelmurugan Vamadevan has already begun to engage his students.

"Before I introduced

the concept of the census through different small activities, more than 95 percent of my students – almost all of them were completely unaware of it.

But once I explained the importance and the positive points of being counted, now these same kids are even speaking sometimes like a statistician -- I am impressed!"

"We studied data collection and analysis activities in class, and expanded to a more broad discussion within my classroom about the census and we have gradually spread the lessons and awareness by sharing information and handouts provided by the U.S. Census Bureau. I am also planning to conduct a 'family night' to build even more awareness about the Census 2020."

Part of his job as an educator is to dispel myths about the census, and misinformation.

"Some people need to be reassured that this is a government policy, in fact the United States Constitution requires a new census every 10 year to keep track of America's growing population: where there are more people, and what that means for future planning. With those who need to be convinced, I spend more time with them and make a teaching session with facts and figures likely to help their understanding of the census."


