





PERIDOT - The San Carlos Apache Healthcare Corporation's (SCAHC) Dental Clinic recently held its second Annual National Children's Dental Health Month celebration in conjunction with the Native Connection's Strong Teeth Strong Kid campaign and the American Dental Association's Give Kids a Smile campaign.

The event was a collaboration between SCAHC's Dental, SDPI Community Outreach and Marketing as well as Public Health Nursing, Maternal Child Health, First Things First, Fire Prevention, Wellness Prevention and the San Carlos Unified School District #20.

Ensuring the atmosphere was child-friendly, a Disney themed event drew in over 300 participants.

"The event was a success," said Dr. Arcelia Gonzalez, DDS., one of SCAHC's pediatric dentist. "It was a fun event that was



also educational for all of the community kids. They received their fluoride varnish which is important for keeping their teeth healthy but they also had the opportunity to learn other ways to keep their teeth healthy. We were also able to familiarize them with the dental clinic so that they are more comfortable with each visit."

The event was an opportunity for the dental staff to screen patients and provide fluoride treatments. The dental assistants also used this time to familiarize patients with the different dental instruments like the water gun and air suction to show children that they have nothing to be afraid of when they visit our dental team.

The Strong Teeth Strong Kid campaign focuses on American Indian children between the ages of 1-5. This is because statistically they have the highest rate of tooth decay in the United States

Children with tooth decay may experience pain and infection, leading to difficulty concen-

trating and learning as well as missing school days and potentially undergoing oral surgery.

Poor oral health has also been linked to various diseases including diabetes, obesity and heart disease, the campaign's focus is to avoid all of those negative outcomes by teaching



GLOBE — Lean About Salado and Hohokam Sites with Jay D. Franklin, PhD


Need a dose of historical perspective during this election year? The Hohokam flourished throughout central Arizona for 1,000 years, approximately 300 - 1400 AD, settling across what we know today as 'The Valley' and along the Salt and Gila Rivers, during an era that coincided with the Anasazi, the Sinagua and the Mogollon people. For reasons that are still debated by archaeologists, all these relatively advanced cultures declined during a century from about 1350 -1450 AD, abandoning their cliff dwellings and publoes one a hundred years before contact with Europeans

March is Archaeology Month - and the Besh Ba Gowah Museum in Globe hosts a special guest speaker Saturday, March 21 at 2 p.m. when Jay D. Franklin, PhD narrates a slideshow and talk on: "Communities in Transition: Hohokam and Salado Archaeology Along U.S. 60 Near Superior, Ariz."

Dr. Franklin will explain archaeological investigations by EcoPlan Associates, Inc. along a four mile stretch of U.S. 60 just east of Superior -- explaining overall project chronology,



Interment will be in Northgate Cemetery.





Context, context, context

Some people enjoy strange food combinations.

My own tastes in food have certainly matured over the years. However, there are some I just don't understand. I recently saw an article lauding the amazing taste of a peanut butter and pickle sandwich. I don't think I'll be giving that a try anytime soon.

Some foods may be perfectly fine apart, but together they don't make much sense. For instances if I were to show you a picture of piece of pineapple you may think it looks tasty. However, if I were to zoom out that same picture to reveal that it is sitting on a pizza you may or may not change your mind. In other words, the context of particular food matters.

Similarly, in our current study of Bible interpretation (hermeneutics), the context of any given passage matters. In fact, if one does not take the context into consideration, you cannot truly understand what a passage is about. There are two essential contexts for a proper interpretive approach to the Bible: the literary context and the historical-cultural context.

This article will focus on the literary context.

Christians believe the Bible is the inspired word of God and God Himself is its ultimate author. Yet Christians also believe the Bible was written in ordinary human languages with the express intention of communicating ideas. Bible interpretation, then, must be aware of the common rules of grammar, syntax, figures of speech, etc., in order to rightly understand the author's intended meaning. Therefore, the literary context is about understanding a passage within its biblical placement and according to its normal literary features.

Perhaps you are familiar with these famous words from the Apostle Paul's first letter to the church in Corinth.

He writes, "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails" (1 Corinthians 13:4-8). Beautiful words! It is likely you have heard these words recited at a wedding. I've been asked to read these words at many weddings. But here's the big question, "What is the context of these words? What is Paul talking about?"

Since these words are so popular in wedding ceremonies you may immediately think that Paul must be addressing the love between a husband and wife. Or this could be talking about God's love for His



people. The Bible does say "God is love", right? Or maybe it doesn't even matter; it's just a call to be loving. What do you think?

I think the best way to fully understand these words is to remember that Paul didn't write these five verses in a vacuum. Rather. he was writing to a particular church going through particular circumstances at a particular time. So to understand these verses we must plug them back into the context. We do this by zooming out in order to get a better view of the bigger picture (like with the pineapple pizza).

The immediate context shows that, yes, Paul is explaining love; however, when one looks at the context of the full chapter, it is understood that Paul is explaining that one's use of spiritual gifts is meaningless if not done in a spirit of love. He writes, "If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing" (1 Corinthians 13:1-2). Basically, Paul is saying that it doesn't matter how "spiritual" you are if you continue to act like a jerk.

Similarly, understanding the passage in light of the entire epistle, Paul is not directly writing about marital love but of the loving-kindness that God's people should have amongst each other in the local church. Paul opens his letter by calling for unity among the people. He writes, "I appeal to you, brothers, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. that all of you agree, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same judgment" (1 Corinthians 1:10). You see. the church in Corinth was having some major personality issues (1:12) and wasn't reflecting the love

of Christ. With this in mind, Paul's admonition and descriptions of love make complete sense.

This is not to say that it is inappropriate to use Paul's words on love at a wedding. On the contrary, I think understanding the context strengthens their use at a wedding.

Most of the time when these words are recited they simply come across as "love-dovey" sentimentalism. Howev-

er, Paul is saying that being loving and spiritual is more than just the words we say. It's easy to love to your spouse at your wedding. but what about years down the road when you're having another argument about the same old things? The Corinthians can't just say they are spiritual, they must show it through their patience, kindness, etc. Likewise, a husband and wife cannot simply say they love each other, they too must show it because love is ... (read the list again).

Context is important. At times is can be important with food. However, it is always important when you are reading the Bible. Literary context helps us understand a passage by looking at parts within the whole. Next week, we'll examine how historical-cultural context aids our understanding by thinking about the place and time of the original audience. Both are equally valuable tools in the task of Bible interpretation.

When we encounter problems or have fears about tomorrow, we can recite those five words and know that we are not alone. The Lord of all is also my Lord and I need only obey. He is ever present and ready to respond. A...S... K... Ask, Seek, Knock. He will answer.



Arielle O'Connor: AZ Game & Fish Youth Conservationist of the Year

While it may be an academic subject to some high schoolers active with FFA, 'range management' was a far more personal, hands-on and sometimes daily experience for Arielle O'Connor, raised on the Y Ranch about 10 miles north of Globe, A 14,000 acre spread in the shadow of the Apache Peaks mountain range, it's where she spent her teens working alongside her parents and brother tending about 200 corriente cattle, sheep and other stock.

Arielle learned to differentiate grasses, name the surrounding canyons, creeks and other landmarks -- and recognize wildlife. She saddled-up to join her dad and U.S. Forest Service 'Range Con' monitoring staff for once-a-month treks into the chaparral, checking grasses to maintain appropriate forage percentage. She learned about fixing water lines, pipelines and tanks to assure reliable H20 for thirsty wildlife and livestock.

On Saturday, Jan. 25, Arielle traded jeans for something more formal to join a dozen other award winners at the Arizona Game & Fish Department annual banquet, where she was recognized as Arizona Youth Conservationist of the Year. **Taking Care of the**

Taking Care of the Land

"The award means a lot, I grew up on a Gila County cattle ranch and have learned how important range management is within the ranching community: taking care of the land while taking care of livestock such an important balance. As a high school freshman I learned about the annual FFA rangeland competition and immediately went for it - I didn't score well my freshman year, but it was a learning experience and I moved into the top 10 as I progressed through high school. In my senior year I placed second, and won a buckle at the Riggs Field Day competition down in Cochise County."

Arielle graduated Globe High School last spring, worked for Gila County during the summer months and headed for Tucson as a University of Arizona freshman last semester. Her Globe High dedication to FFA and Southern Gila County 4H along with solid academics, spurred the community's FFA alumni to nominate her for the award. They wrote on her nomination: "beyond the classroom and her community activities. Ms. O'Connor is a hardworking ranch-hand assisting her parents and brother in operating their family business while consistently grand-champion raising lambs for the Gila County Fair. Arielle's leadership in FFA began when she was in eighth grade as Greenhand President. Her servant-leadership continued throughout high school where her efforts supported the Globe FFA program in its growth and engagement of new members. Globe FFA includes both classroom, hands-on work, independent projects, travel



within Arizona -- and to Indianapolis. Arielle consistently represents herself, her family, her school, her community, and the state of Arizona well in all she does."

Raised caring for cattle and sheep, Arielle also grew up hunting – learning alongside her dad, with a keen appreciation for Grand Canyon State wildlife.

Raised to Hunt, Too

"I have hunted ever since I was legally old enough for a license: deer, elk, javelina. My favorite overall is probably deer - but the memory I'll always cherish is my first, and so far my only, javelina hunt up near Payson. My dad had tags for the same unit, so that was a father-daughter hunt. Its such a thrill to see wildlife, over the years I've seen bears - and just once I saw a mama bear and her cubs together up near a water hole, and watched the cubs climb up a tree."

Being chosen AZGF's Youth Conservationist of the Year adds to Arielle's ability to be an exemplary role model for Grand Canvon State vouths involved in rangeland or wildlife management. After adjusting to Tucson's urban environs and settling into rigorous course load during her first semester at UA, she's eyeing a possible internship with a Natural Resource Conservation District, or the U.S. Forest Service: possibly joining UA's range management club or the Society For Range Management. She would quickly prove

to be an asset: Arielle was a leader of the 2018-2019 Globe FFA Wildlife Career Development Event team.

Nominators wrote: "Arielle possesses both textbook and hands-on expertise in the areas of wildlife and habitat management, GPS map and compass navigation of wildlife habitats, ecology and natural resources, soil and water management practices, range management practices, and wildlife management practices. In the Hands-On area, Arielle successfully identifies 76 species of birds, 53 species of mammals, 32 species of reptiles, 39 species of fish, 10 species of amphibians, and 32 common invasive species. Her skills include identifying an animal by its: hide or feathers, tracks, skull, antlers/horns, scat, sounds, pictures, mounts, and other tracking signs."

Academic Leadership

"In addition, Arielle's test scores at the State level in Arizona Association FFA Wildlife CDE show her knowledge about habitats, life zones, biology, breeding information, special needs/characteristics of wildlife. Competing at the state level. Arielle successfully demonstrated the ability to both complete a subject-matter test on wildlife, individual expertise in the area, and the capacity to successfully plan and complete a group activity. Ms. O'Connor first learned from older students and, as a senior, embraced a leadership role in the team.

Beyond wrangling livestock, Arielle has valuable 'people skills,' too. Here's an example of her talent for networking: during her senior year at Globe High she connected the FFA Wildlife team with guest experts who could coach the students in specific skills - for one, Gila County District 2 Supervisor Tim Humphrey. A lifelong outdoorsman and accomplished hunter, he shared his wildlife knowledge - and brought along 'hides and horns' Arielle and her teammates studied for hands-on knowledge prior to the competition.

And she's quick to give credit to those who have been a positive influence.

"I really want to give a shout-out to John and Susan Sutphin, the owners of J Bar S Ranches; where I was raised - and my family still manages for them, but now up in Payson. Without them, and without my family, I would not have had the opportunities that I did through High School. Justen Ollendick is another I want to thank, he nominated me for the award, and has been a role model and influential person in my life.

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

Students in foster care often require special education services from the school. It is important that those who support students in foster care understand the special education process.
