Pinto Creek Bridge road closure updates

Motorists who travel between Superior and Miami should plan for daytime lane restrictions Monday through Friday along with a four-hour closure Thursday as part of the US 60 Pinto Creek Bridge replacement project.

The following restrictions and closures are scheduled for the week of Jan. 20: Wednesday, Jan. 22: Lane restrictions between 6:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

Thursday, Jan. 23: Full closure between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. Lane restrictions, if needed, between 1 p.m. and 4:30 p.m.

Friday, Jan. 24: Lane restrictions between 6:30 a.m. and noon.

Flaggers will direct traffic while U.S. 60 lane restrictions are in place. Drivers should plan extra travel time. When closures are in place, motorists will use a detour on state routes 77 and 177 through Winkelman. That roughly 68-mile route includes a 10 percent grade and will significantly increase travel time. Drivers may want to plan trips before or after the full closures because of the potential for long delays. During the full closure, all eastbound vehicles traveling to Globe/Safford will be redirected at State Route 177 in Superior, and westbound vehicles heading toward Phoenix should take SR 77 east of Globe. Westbound traffic with Globe/Miami destinations will be able to travel as far west as Miami. Traffic will not be allowed to queue at the closure locations. Drivers should proceed with caution, slow down and watch for construction personnel and equipment.



MVD helps you get ready for tax time 2019 vehicle fee and tax information




He had a love of the land and spent many years working it. He managed a cattle



Keep Your Eves on Jesus

Maranatha Baptist Church A familiar passage in the Gospel of Matthew is the Apostle Peter calling out to Jesus as he sees Him walking on the waves of the sea. "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." To which

Jesus responds, "Come." (Matthew 14:28-29) As Peter makes his way onto the water, things seem to be going well until he begins to look around; then being filled with fear, he starts to sink. As he cries out Jesus grabs him by the hand and pulls him to safety. Peter is questioned about his doubt while the disciples fall down to worship Jesus. What's the point? Keep

your eyes on Jesus! Sounds simple enough, right? Christians must live with their eyes fully focused on Jesus every step of the way. Similarly, Bible-believing churches must remain focused on Christ. However, it seems that is not always the case. Too many times professing Christians and churches have substituted something

other than Christ to focus upon. Whether we are talking about political agendas, humanitarian causes, or theological imbalances, we must recognize any "double vision" in order that we may call out, as Peter did, "Lord, save us!"

When the church gets sidetracked and loses focus, it is usually because there are important and worthwhile things to attend to. That is to say, even "good things" can become bad when they take the center stage position that belongs to Christ alone.

Likewise, an imbalance in our understanding of theology can lead to loss of Jesus-focus. Too many individual Christians and even whole churches can become obsessed with certain topics (usually secondary or tertiary issues) at the expense of the focus of the Bible writers, namely, Christ and Him crucified. The Bible tells us we are to teach the "whole counsel of God." (Acts 20:27) Nevernot give you an orthodox definition of the Trinity, they may be sinking.

We must keep our eyes focused on Jesus. We must remember that all that we have and all that we are is because of Him and what He has accomplished for us upon the cross. I echo the words of the Apostle Paul in second Corinthians 11, "I am afraid that as the serpent deceived Eve by his cunning, your thoughts will be led astray from a sincere and pure devotion to Christ." 



A Traditional Apache Dress Making class will be held on Feb. 4 to 6, at the San Carlos Apache Culture Center Museum in Peridot. Matilda Case Bowman, a member of the Deschiin clan, will be the instructor for the class. Mrs. Bowman says when she was young she use to sit outside on a canvas with her grandmother, Grace Mahsill Case. She continued and said, my grandmother had an old, foot pedal style sewing machine and she would tear the material/ fabric to make the Apache dresses.

The instructor recommends to bring at least seven yards of cotton or calico fabric since this cloth is the easiest to work with. She also said to bring threads that matches the fabric. If you have a sewing machine, you can bring it, otherwise there will be two sewing machines to work from.


