Tonto Creek Bridge nears completion

Construction on a long-awaited bridge over Tonto Creek started Sept. 1, 2022 – and that bridge is now close to the finish line.

Gila County Engineer Tom Goodman told the Silver Belt that the Tonto Creek Bridge is 99% complete. The deck has been poured and crews were installing a safety handrail on the north side, getting ready to pour a sidewalk between the bridge and Tonto Basin Elementary School, and preparing to repave Old Highway 188 and other approach roads.

Its completion will reward years of effort by Gila County leaders and Arizona state legislators

to obtain funding for the Tonto Creek Bridge, which has been requested for decades. The project gained momentum in the wake of tragedy - the 2019 drowning deaths of three children whose parents tried to cross the flooded creek in their vehicle over Thanksgiving weekend, and of a 69-year-old man on December 7. "Let that never happen again," said then-U.S. Representative Tom O'Halleran at an October 2022 groundbreaking ceremony.

Since 1995, eight people have lost their lives attempting to cross in high water; not only that, but Tonto Creek divides the town of Tonto Basin, where residents are often trapped for days when flooding occurs.

The road crossing

Tonto Creek is closed approximately 25 days a year due to flood events.

On Jan. 8, 2020 then-Governor Doug Ducey requested federal funding for the bridge; a project that promises to save lives by giving drivers and pedestrians a safe crossing, and to allow the Tonto Basin Fire District to reach sites on the other side of the creek in the event of flooding. That September, the U.S. Department of Transportation awarded Gila County a \$21 million Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) grant for the bridge.

To finalize that grant, Gila County entered into an agreement with the U.S. Department of Transportation and the

Arizona Department of Transportation. A BUILD team was formed consisting of staff from the county, ADOT and the Federal

Highway Administration. At the county's request, ADOT agreed to bid, administer and oversee the project to completion.

ADOT also served as the grant recipient, with Gila County as sub-recipient.

Miami hosts Industry and Small Business Day

Last Thursday the Town of Miami and the Capital Readiness Program, a project of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Minority Business Development Agency, teamed up to celebrate industry and assist small business owners and manufacturers with the facets of developing a business.

Centered in Miami's former YMCA building and nearby Sullivan Street, Thursday's Industry and Small Business Day event offered a range of information and resources – including access to experts in business education, capital acquisition, marketing and much more.

Major area businesses including Freeport McMoRan and Resolution

Copper – both of whom were among the day's sponsors – set up informational tables. The event also drew local small businesses and representatives from community organization – people like Ray Webb and Elaman Rodriguez.

"I've been making tattoo machines for a number of years," said Webb, inventor and founder of NeoTat, whose shop is

located in Miami. "I've been doing NeoTat almost 20 years here; I started out in 2004." That, he said, is when he was inspired to create a quieter tattoo machine "plus get rid of the rubber bands and make it enclosed and clean.


"An old coil machine is very noisy; it vibrates a lot," Webb explained. He said his invention was "a really hard sell" at first because tattoo artists

were reluctant to embrace it. "They liked their coil machines; they liked the history, the feel, the raw element of the tattooing. It wasn't until I got this into a few hands that people were like, 'Wow, this is so much easier and better to use.' I got it into a few hands and more people were talking about it. Then all of a sudden it just took off like wildfire."

As time went on, Webb

added, he sought to create lighter, better-looking tattoo machines that were also easier to take apart. When his employees said one design was too light, he tested its durability by dashing it to the floor. "They couldn't get over the fact I'd spent the weekend making that and just threw it on the floor," he said.

Suspects in Miami-area abduction attempt located

In an April 10 press release, the Gila County Sheriff's Office announced that suspects in the attempted abduction of four girls ages 10-12 near

Miami High School had been identified and interviewed by law enforcement. The release stated that the suspects were local juveniles, and that interviews confirmed their involvement in the incident. It added that charges

would be forwarded to the Gila County Attorney's Office.

The incident occurred on the afternoon of March 20. Initial reports described four male suspects in two dark-colored pickup trucks who drove up to the

girls as they walked along Ragus Road. One male subject threw items toward the girls in an apparent attempt to lure them toward the vehicle. A second vehicle, according to initial reports, then pulled up; a male passenger, covering

his face, called for the girls to come to them. The girls fled, only to encounter the truck again as they neared school grounds. The passenger began to chase one of them but gave up shortly afterward.

Investigators with the

Globe Police Department and the Sheriff's Office were later able to identify the vehicle – it appeared that only one truck was involved, seen at different locations and from different angles – and the suspects.

Miami Town Council begins work on 2024-25 town budget

Every year the Town of Miami must go through the lengthy and labor-intensive process of developing a town budget. All projected revenues and expenditures must be included, including possible grants. At a workshop preceding the April 8 Town Council meeting, Town Manager Alexis Rivera presented the preliminary numbers for 2024-25, which show increases in spending across all categories. Overall revenue estimates are lower than for the 2023-24 budget, but are more in line with what is shown by full-year projections based on actual revenues as of March 31, 2024.

Due to meeting quorum requirements, the meeting started late. Only the budgets for Administration (Mayor and Council) and the Police Department were discussed. Council focused on replacement of aging police vehicles, potential increase for hiring a police chief (current pay is set at \$59,995 a year), funding for raises, and the possibility of returning dispatch to Miami (this would cost \$1 million because re-establishment would require expensive new equipment and state licensing.)

More budget meetings are scheduled, with the final vote taking place on June 26.

A regular meeting of the Council followed the

workshop.

In his report, Rivera noted that Officer Richard Shaw will be retiring. The Town of Miami will officially recognize his service at the April 22 meeting. Rivera also said that Miami will advertise for the following three requests for proposal:

Sidewalk restoration for the downtown area (to be done during Fiscal Year 2025)

Veteran's Park wall, including an emergency gate for creek access (June 2024)

Community Pool fence, including a gate for creek access (May 2024)

Six speakers responded to the Call to the Public:

Jesse Bryant wanted everyone to know that the Miami 4th of July celebration will have a special guest. Retired Colonel and Globe native Larry Perino, winner of the Silver Star and a survivor of the 1993 Battle of Mogadishu (Black Hawk Down), will be visiting. Expect to see Col. Perino at the Cruise on Broad for First Friday and at other events.

Tim Gonzales, of the Gila County Ministerial Association, described ways that the group will be participating in the festivities for the 4th of July. Among the assorted events will be readings from the Scriptures, prayer, music (including a concert by the Centennial Band), and learning about the basis for our nation.

Evelyn Vargas spoke about the

accomplishments of HOME (Hearts of Miami Engaged). They included the idea of story-telling along the Keystone Stairs, donations to Miami events, and providing matching funds for grants.

Lob Instagon reminded everyone that Miami Loco Arts Festival is coming up on April 19 -21. Gil Madrid told Council that the M Hill project had been delayed due to legal description problems. Many of the old documents said that no survey had been done. However, the Gila County Recorder helped Madrid create new certificates.

Madrid emphasized that he needed to talk with Council to make sure there is agreement on what to do with the available land. James Mills, from a Civil War reenactment group, said he wanted to bring 2 cannons and fire them twice at the celebration on the 4th. He suggested that land at Bullion Plaza might work. He also would like to find a place in Miami where reenactments could take place.

Under New Business, Council approved street closures, use of Miami Veterans Park, and use of the Bullion Plaza Court and lawn for events on the 4th and 6th of July.

They also approved the scope of work for the flood plain management special studies, project management plan for the area from Bloody Tanks down to the wastewater plant, near the tailings pile.

BRIDGE: Construction project approaching the finish line

The project was boosted by an additional \$250,000 in BUILD funds, of which Gila County was notified by the Federal Highway Administration in September 2022. The County Board of Supervisors ratified approval of that funding just hours before the groundbreaking ceremony.

The new bridge is a 1,982-foot-long, 40-foot-wide, 15-span modified girder bridge. It will have two 12-foot-wide lanes, a six-foot-wide sidewalk and four-foot-wide shoulders on each side. In addition, the bridge will have concrete barriers and safety rails

on each side. The project also includes improvements to approximately 4,300 feet of roadway on both sides.

Ames Construction Inc., of Scottsdale, submitted the low bid in the amount of \$21.1 million. Ames has worked on such other projects as a 26-mile segment of the Loop 202 South Mountain Freeway in Phoenix and a new traffic interchange – including a wider bridge – at Interstate 19 and Ajo Way in Tucson.

Goodman said the new bridge was anticipated to officially open to traffic between late April and mid-May 2024. “The last two winters have slowed us down a little

bit,” he said. Substantial completion, when Ames Construction officially hands the bridge over to the county, was anticipated in mid-June. First, Goodman said, the construction site area must be demobilized and revegetated in accordance with federal standards. A ribbon cutting ceremony has been scheduled for June 22, 2024.

The project’s total cost is just under \$24 million, with Gila County’s share at \$2.82 million. The county set aside that amount from transportation excise tax funds and its share of state gas tax revenue. County Manager James Menlove said there were \$1.2 million in contingency funds, of



which only \$200,000-300,000 have been used. He added that there have

been few change orders on the bridge endeavor. Menlove credited the

bridge’s progress to “tremendous partners working together.”

For a further test, he drove over the machine with his truck – and when he plugged it back in, it still worked.

Webb said he was "not really known around town – I don't advertise much – but I'm well known in the tattoo world." NeoTat, he said, has worked with distributors around the globe.

He added that he came to Thursday's event to demonstrate his products and support the community. "I'd like to see more development come to Miami. I'd like to see more businesses. If we had more manufacturing and things like that, it would be a really good thing."

Tonto Creek Bridge more than 80-Percent Complete

Engineers predict traffic will begin crossing the Tonto Creek Bridge by the end of this month or early May.

As of this week construction is more than 80-percent complete, and Gila County Public

Works announces a ribbon cutting ceremony at 10 a.m. on Saturday, June 22.

"The Arizona Department of Transportation has been administering the contract for Gila County and done an outstanding job," says Gila County Engineer Thomas Goodman.

Funded by the county and a Federal Highway Administration grant, the bridge project began in September 2022 and is scheduled for completion in June.

"Other than some weather delays and additional environmental mitigation

measures back in late 2022 and early 2023, the project has been on schedule and within budget," Goodman explains.

With a total contract amount of \$21,094.933, the contractor Ames

Construction has been paid \$19,696,726 as of February 2024.

The Tonto Creek Bridge will officially open to traffic in late April or early May, though other minor work on the project will continue into June, says Goodman, adding that substantial completion will

take place sometime between Wednesday, June 12 and Monday, June 17.

The public is invited to the ribbon cutting ceremony, scheduled from 10 a.m. to Noon on Saturday, June 22.


The theme highlights the powerful role of county governments as intergovernmental partners that:

San Carlos woman recognized as community hero by Humane Society of the United States

Julie Cassadore, of San Carlos, Arizona, has been recognized by the Humane Society of the United States as a community hero for her efforts to ensure the well-being of people and their pets in communities lacking access to resources like pet food and veterinary care. She is one of three finalists selected nationwide for the More Than a Pet Community Hero Award, which honors those dedicated to advancing access to pet resources in underserved communities.

No matter the day or time, Julie assists the people and pets of the extremely rural San Carlos, Arizona, community. Three to five days

a week, Julie transports animals from the San Carlos Apache Tribe to the Desert Cross Veterinary Hospital, a drive that can take up to 90 minutes each way. She shows up at the clinic morning, noon and night, and not just with cats and dogs, but also goats, chickens and ducks. After founding her own rescue group, Julie expanded her skills. She now triages emergency cases, helps distribute pet food donations and always supports the human-animal bond any way she can. Julie is a true lifeline for her community.

Julie explains how she feels about helping animals: "Don't be afraid to take that step to feed

community dogs, don't be afraid to ask a neighbor how you can help. Just do it. On the reservation I saw a big need, and I wanted to find a way to help. I started by doing feeding stations and then from there found families to offer additional support. I want people to know that it doesn't take a lot to help. It can be as simple as making water available or buying a bag of pet food. Animals are sacred and we need to take care of them. We should have kindness and care for the animals. It helps the overall well-being of the community."

Amanda Arrington, vice president of access to care for the Humane Society of the United

States, said, "Julie's passion and genuine love for the people and pets in her community is remarkable. We hope her story inspires others to support

families with pets in their community. Whether delivering pet food or driving over an hour one way to get pets to veterinary appointments and

emergency care, Julie is honoring the love people have for their pets and ensuring her community has access to the pet resources they deserve."

The Gila Wilderness is Gila Apache Homeland - Part Two

This year marks the Centennial Anniversary of the creation of the Gila Wilderness. The Chihéne Ndé (Gila Apache) are the people from which the Wilderness is named. The tribe's ancestors, Gila and Mimbres Apache, signed treaties with Spain, Mexico, and the United States. Geronimo, who never signed a treaty, distinguished four different groups in his life story, "Bedonkohe, Chokonen, Chihene and Nednai, who were fast friends in the days of freedom...". Today, the families who never surrendered to the U.S. comprise a non-reservation tribe seeking federal acknowledgment – the Chihéne Ndé Nation.

In the 1848 Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, U.S. governing officials promised to prevent Apache incursions into Mexico. New Mexico Territory Governors William Carr Lane and David Meriwether negotiated with Chihéne Ndé Nation ancestors, who, in the 1850s, signed three treaties with the U.S. The last treaty, signed at Fort Thorn in 1855, ceded the

Gila region to the U.S. in exchange for a reservation in our homelands.

Unlike the 1852 Treaty of Santa Fe, the 1853 Fort Webster and 1855 Fort Thorn treaties were not ratified. But why? The land surveyed for the Mimbres Bands of Gila Apache reservation comprised most of present-day Grant County. The surveyor's findings, which included a mine on the proposed reservation, were reported to Washington, D.C. Potential commercial wealth and desires for a railway to California blocked congressional support. The 1855 reservation was not established. The Del Cobre, Hurley, Tyrone, Hannover, Georgetown, Pinos Altos, and Silver City mines are on the then-proposed reservation. In 1860, new lands were identified and reserved for the Gila Apache. These reserve lands are near the current communities of Cliff and Gila.

Even so, the reserve lands were not used. In 1871, it was decided the reservation should cover 600 square miles of the valley of the Tularosa River from Reserve north to Aragon in present-day Catron County. My

ancestor José Leyva and his family lived peacefully with other Apaches at the new Tularosa Valley Indian Agency. Internal friction among Apaches led to reservation violence. Bitterness and resentment created a political division between the two groups. The short-lived reservation closed in 1874, and my Gila Apache family remained behind in the Tularosa Valley. By choice, Apache Victorio and his followers, at peace with the U.S., relocated east to the Ojo Caliente on the Cañada Alamosa in present-day Socorro County along with the Indian Agency.

The Leyva and Eligio families in the Gila had kin in Mexico, and they sought peace with Mexican officials in July 1874. These were the same families who previously had received rations from the U.S. at Fort Thorn in the 1850s. While peace was being finalized, an Apache raiding party crossed into Sonora from the U.S. Feeling betrayed, military officials entered Chihuahua to search for Eligio's people, whom they believed had bargained in bad faith. The Sonoran military executed Eligio

and three Apache women in their mountain camp. In 1877, the relocated Hot Springs reservation at Ojo Caliente closed due to political pressure.

By 1879, Victorio, who had tentatively agreed to live at the Mescalero Reservation, fled with the U.S. military in pursuit. Victorio's time at Mescalero contrasts with the stories of my Gila and northern Mexico family. The 1880 U.S. Census records confirm José Leyva, Eligio (also spelled Elicio), and other families' ongoing presence in the Gila. José Leyva desired to purchase the land where he had remained. My digital copy of the land survey maps the "Leiva Ranch" within the now-defunct Tularosa Valley reservation. Leyva traveled to Santa Fe to purchase land at one dollar per acre. He was later charged \$435 for the land survey that included his ranch in what became the Gila National Forest, 100 miles north of the land reserved in 1860 for the Gila Apache.

It was later discovered that José had been defrauded in Santa Fe and was forced to relocate. By this time, the U.S. motivations to establish a permanent reservation

had faded. The land set aside for Gila Apaches was returned to the public domain by 1882. The 1885 Report to the Board of Indian Commissioners by Merrill E. Gates describes José Leyva's situation. Gates asserted an agent informed him, "I knew a most deserving Indian who selected a ranch 100 miles from the reservation twelve years ago. He has lived there since quietly, raised seven children, and built a house and a corral. Four years ago, he went to Santa Fé to get a title to his land. He paid some scoundrel \$160 for a worthless paper, the man representing himself as the United States land agent. I reported these facts and sent the paper the Indian had received from this swindler to your office, but nothing was done. That sort of work discourages others who are willing and have both the desire and the ability to become independent men."

The surrender of Geronimo and the Chiricahua Apaches to the U.S. Army in 1886 exiled many families to Florida, where the U.S. imprisoned them. Author Neil Goodwin contends people believed "...all of the

Apache bands were supposed to be accounted for – either on reservations, or as were Geronimo and all of the Chiricahua Apaches... Only a few knew that there were Apaches who never surrendered." Apache families remained in New Mexico and were sequestered in the Upper Gila. Other families integrated into farming, ranching, and mining communities. Some reunited with family south of the U.S.-Mexico border, becoming refugees. My great-grandmother Praxedis Elías, who married a Leyva, descends from the Elías and Gardea families who lived in the Sierra Madre Mountains with the Leyva and Eligio families. My family continued to exist in the Tularosa and Mogollon Mountains and the Sierra Madres of northern Mexico. One family... One nation... One border... Silence.

Chairman Manuel Sanchez states, "We have the right to some space, a reservation. Like other tribes, we deserve the government's support for health, welfare, and education services. This begins with federal and state recognition."

Wednesday, April 10: The San Carlos Braves fell 32-6 to Palo Verde. (No statistics for San Carlos were available at press time.)

Thursday, April 11: The Tigers and Braves traveled to Chandler Prep for the Epic Tourneys Baseball Classic. Globe overcame Ray 6-5 in their opening match after trailing the Bearcats 4-2 going into the third inning. 





Joyce Meyer: Are You Wearing Your Armor?

When I read the Bible, I am always fascinated by how many times the Lord tells us to “put on” or “put off” different things. Ephesians 6 is a perfect example—and it’s one of the most well-known passages in the New Testament.

Ephesians 6:11(AMPC) tells us to “Put on God’s whole armor [the armor of a heavy-armed soldier, which God supplies], that you be able successfully to stand up against [all] the strategies and the deceits of the devil.”

The words “put on” are very important. I have never walked into my closet and had my clothes or shoes jump onto my body. I have always had to put them on—it’s a choice. So, what does God tell us to put on?

The Belt of Truth: Ephesians 6:14 says, “Stand therefore [hold your ground], having tightened the belt of truth....”

The belt of truth is the Word of God. And just like a physical belt holds everything together, God’s Word is our support and foundation. This means when trouble comes and you’re tempted to give up or blow up—that’s when you want to tighten your belt and trust the Word of God more than ever!

The Breastplate of Righteousness: Ephesians 6:14 (NKJV) says to “...put on the breastplate of righteousness.”

It’s sad how many Christians walk around feeling like something is wrong with them. For years, I was one of them. If I sinned, I would torment myself by allowing myself to feel guilty and condemned.

However, the Bible says we have been made right with God through Jesus’ death on the cross (2 Corinthians 5:21). This means we can have the mindset that says, “I am a child of God—He loves me, and I am

forgiven.” This doesn’t mean we can just sin and do whatever we want. But it means when we make mistakes, we can go to God, sincerely confess our sins, then receive His gift of forgiveness—no strings attached (1 John 1:9).

Shoes of Peace: Ephesians 6:15 (NLT) says, “For shoes, put on the peace that comes from the Good News so that you will be fully prepared.”

As a believer, one of the most important things you can do is stay in peace. Peace is your position of power! I encourage you to keep your peace at any cost. If someone upsets you, take a few moments to walk away and ask God for His help. Talk to Him and say, “Help me to stay calm, Lord. Help me to keep the peace.” Because in your battles against the enemy, peace is power.

Shield of Faith:

Ephesians 6:16 (AMPC) says, “Lift up over all the [covering] shield of saving faith, upon which you can quench all the flaming missiles of the wicked [one].”

Faith is something that God has given us, but it must be released in our lives—through *praying*, through *saying*, and through *doing*.

During a crisis, it’s easy to run to a friend for help, and sometimes we need to talk to other people. However, our first reaction to a problem should be to run to God and *pray* for His strength, guidance, and deliverance.

Our words are also extremely powerful. In fact, the Bible says, “The tongue has the power of life and death...” (Proverbs 18:21 NIV). When we line up what we *say* with the Word of God and declare His promises over our lives, we are speaking faith-filled words that improve our situation.

Finally, what we *do* makes all the difference. Sometimes our circumstances can feel pretty scary. But those are the times when it’s most important to step out in faith and do what God has placed in our heart to do.

Helmet of Salvation: Ephesians 6:17 tells us to put on “the helmet of salvation.” I believe God is saying that we should think like a child of God.

First Corinthians 2:16 (AMPC) says “we have the mind of Christ.” This means we can line up our thoughts with God’s Word and think like God thinks—good, positive, hopeful, believing thoughts.

Don’t be a garbage dump for the enemy’s thoughts. Keep your helmet on...and keep believing!

Sword of the Spirit: The Sword of the Spirit (Ephesians 6:17) is the Word of God, and it’s our primary offensive

weapon against the enemy. As I mentioned, our words carry tremendous power; and when we speak God’s words out of our mouths, we are combatting the enemy and helping to bring to pass God’s good plan for our lives.

When you’re under attack, speak out God’s Word. When you’re overwhelmed and feel like giving up, declare, “I can do all things through Christ Who strengthens me” (Philippians 4:13 NKJV).

When it looks like things aren’t going well, purposely choose to say what God says about you—things like, “God has a good plan for my life—plans for me to prosper...plans to give me hope and a great future!” (Jeremiah 29:11.)

As you do, you will be clothed and ready to meet every single battle that comes your way. You will go out with God’s full armor and be dressed for battle.

for later, thinking we’ll get back to Him when we have a minute. But it’s easy for time to get away from us before we make good on our intentions.

In what way do you feel God inviting you to give Him your time? What does it look like to give Him your affection? Is there some part of your life that the Lord is yearning for you to share with Him? Let us be like David and give God our best, not just what’s left over.

God will provide all you need for living peacefully in the chaos life can produce.





Summer hours (May 25-July 28) will be 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. - 8 p.m. Starting July 29, the pool will be open Monday-Thursday from 4 p.m. - 8 p.m., and Friday-Sunday from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. - 8 p.m. With the pool heated, the city also expects to have a longer swimming season. Fletcher said they were currently hiring lifeguards.

The city waived user fees for the pool's first season back after being closed for about 10 years; that will change this year. For the coming season, swimmers age 18-54 can purchase a day pass for \$2, a monthly pass for \$30 or an annual pass for \$60. Children 17

and under, and seniors (age 55+), can get the day pass for \$1, monthly pass for \$20 or annual pass for \$50. Family passes will also be available for \$50 (monthly) and \$100 (annual).

Pool facility rental fees for up to 149 people will be \$250 for the first hour and \$150 for each additional hour; for 150 or more people, these fees will be \$350 and \$250.

Further improvements are also planned for the pool's future. "We're looking forward to opening the concession stand. The plans are in place and currently funding is being worked on," said Fletcher. She added that the city is looking into the addition of swimming lessons and water aerobics.






