# Broadband internet service 'challenge' comment by May 14

Are you satisfied with local internet service? Does your community lack access to broadband? Arizona Commerce Authority has invited comments by the Tuesday, May 14 deadline, described as a "Challenge process" to verify whether a particular location or community is not adequately served with broadband internet access. Local and Tribal governments may submit a challenge; so can nonprofit organizations. Gila County residents are also invited to report service issues and test their own

internet speed using an online challenge portal. Find complete information, and links to the online speed-testing portal, at https://www.azcommerce. com/broadband/arizonabroadband-equity-accessdeployment-program/the-

Residents from Saguaro Drive to the Stockyard, Central Heights streets and Russell Road: check the schedule below and mark your calendar ahead of chip-sealing scheduled during the month of May.

Gila County Public Works Roads Division will be improving roads with chip-seal on top of the existing pavement, followed by a surface seal on top of the chip-seal. A chip-seal consists of a petroleumbased binder that seals the existing pavement and a 3/8" aggregate, "chip," that will provide a

new textured surface to drive on.

To ensure the success of this project, Gila County is requesting that all residents who live in the following areas scheduled for this year's chip-seal to not have anything parked within any road right-ofway from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. for the duration of the project. This includes, but is not limited to, vehicles, boats, and trailers. This is to ensure we can cover 100% of the paved area and avoid damaging anything parked too close to the construction area.

There will be no road closures, but drivers should expect one-way traffic and/or temporary rerouting, small delays, flaggers and traffic control.

"More than \$993 million of federal funding is available for the state of Arizona to achieve universal internet access. This empowers local residents to add depth to the maps and data that will identify regions lacking reliable broadband infrastructure and service."

Challenge categories may include broadband availability, speed, latency, data cap, business-service only; whether qualifying broadband service is available or not.

Hoping to tap nearly \$1 billion of federal funding through the BEAD (Broadband Equity Access and Deployment) program, the Arizona Commerce Authority will determine the unserved, underserved, and served status of homes, businesses, and 'community anchor institutions' in the state. Unserved and underserved locations will be eligible to be connected through BEADfunded projects. Arizona's broadband navigator map is online at https:// az.BroadbandNavigator. com/map. How to test vour internet speed, chalor submit а lenge? Register at az.broadbandnavigator. com, then select your location associated with the challenge and identify the challenge type (availability, speed, etc.); upload evidence to support your challenge by the deadline Tuesday, May 14.

She saw Globe evolve from dirt streets and cattle drives down Broad Street to, presently, today's electric cars traveling Broad Street. She hand-wrote accounting ledgers in her businesses, but then learned to create computerized spreadsheets, have a Facebook page and use a cell phone.

Carmen was an entrepreneur from an early age with her husband Alfred. Together, they owned and operated "Slough's Market." Later. she and brother Edward co-owned and operated Carm-Ed's Men's and Boy's Clothing store for 47 years.

Carmen was a guintessential pragmatist. After the death of her husband, as a single mom, she raised and college edu-



cated her beloved son. who became an educator and coach. She believed in hard work, in navigating life's difficulties, and she always did so with her characteristic grace and elegance. Carmen epitomized the term "iron fist in a velvet glove" and she proved her courage, strength and stamina in all her challenges and undertakings.

Carmen became iconic in Globe as a local celebrity who was often seen working in her garden, participating in the local Elk's Emblem Club, at community plays and musical events.
