## Superior celebrating 13th Prickly Pear Festival

On Saturday, August 24 Superior will host a daylong celebration of the "nopal" as the annual Prickly Pear Festival returns for its 13th year.

The morning will begin with prickly pear foraging from 7 - 9 a.m. at the Superior municipal air strip, located just off US 60 and Apache Leap Road. This will be hosted by the experienced foragers from Aravaipa Condor, who will demonstrate how to safely harvest prickly pear and how to remove the cactus spines to prep them for processing.

Afterwards, the down-

town Street Fair will get underway on Main Street - beginning with a pancake breakfast (with prickly pear syrup) fundraiser hosted by the Superior Fire Department. They will share space with the Farmers Market, inside the Senior Center at 360 Main St.

Throughout the day, starting at 9 a.m., guest speakers will be giving demonstrations and presentations on food education, foraging and plant medicine. This will be at the Chamber of Commerce office at 165 Main St. Speakers include John



for gluten-free cookies. Teams will be judged on more than just the appearance, aroma and taste of a fresh-baked cookie, too. Inspired by the annual 4-H Beef Cook-off held each April, this club-wide event helps Gila County youth develop their skills at working in teams, organization and even public speaking.

"The 4-H youth are required to complete a set of personal development skills and one involves a presentation and public speaking," said Galt. "Also, this helps develop a life skill because

we are engaging them to go beyond just boiling water for a box meal. They have to follow a recipe and work as a team. When I attended the Beef Cook-off. I was amazed at the dishes that were created. I'm really hoping the kids will so the same at the Bake-off. I picture animal sugar cookies with coconut shaving that have been dyed in green that will represent grass. Or a large cow and mini chocolate chip cookies as the 'cow patties' left on the ground. Sounds really involved? Well, you never know which one of these

kids could be the next entrepreneur and open a restaurant here in town!"



# Kenneth "Ken" Vargas

Kenneth Edward "Ken" Vargas was born in Flagstaff, AZ on Sept. 28, 1959 to Coach Richard "Dickie" and Stella Flores Vargas. He was the second son of six boys followed by a sister at number seven. At the age of one. Ken and the Vargas family moved back to Miami. AZ where his dad, Dickie, accepted a teaching position with the Miami Unified School District. This is the point where the Vargas coaching legacy began.

Ken attended Miami schools, was Homecoming King, and graduated from MHS in 1977. Throughout his high school years, Ken played varsity basketball for three years, varsity football for a year and a half and devoted most of his high school off-time preparing himself physically for the basketball season.

Ken knew he wanted to coach basketball since he was in the second grade. What a vision for a seven-year-old. He spent a lot of his youth in the gym with his father, and his mother, Stella, always made sure he got to the YMCA on time and ready to play youth basketball. You could often find Ken shooting baskets at all hours at the Miami Gardens outdoor court. His training included strapping his 64 Ford to his shoulders and using it as resistance as he pulled the weight to increase his strength and speed.

Some accomplishments in football include being



named to the1976 First Team All-Conference for the offensive roster; but Ken's place was on the basketball court. His honors included a 1975 Conference Championship. 1975 State Runners-Up title, named to the Second Team All Conference in 1976, and in 1977, Ken was named to the First Team All-Conference.

Ken graduated from Northern Arizona University with degrees in Business Administration. Accounting, Secondary and Elementary Education, and minors in Math and Physical Education. Upon graduation in 1985, he accepted a junior high teaching position where he taught math and P.E. for 17 years at Lee Kornegay Junior High and was named Teacher of the Year in 1991. His lifelong dream of being a coach materialized as he became the seventh-grade basketball coach, winning 14 championships in 17 years.

Coach Vargas then moved to the high school, teaching math. He coached with his father for his first year and moved to the varsity position 3 years later. Dur-

ing his 17 years as head coach, Ken won several runners-up trophies for local tournaments, won 5 Conference Championships and was named Conference Coach of the Year 4 times. He was very humble but took pride in his "2015 Spirit of Cotton Fitzsimmons Award - for the Demonstration of the Best Qualities of a Coach" award.

He cared deeply for all

his students, often coming in before school, during lunch and after school to tutor math. His place was in the classroom and that is where he felt he made a difference. Ken often spent time just visiting with students who needed some extra encouragement or just needed time to talk. In the quiet of his heart, he bought shoes, meals, clothes, and even took beds for athletes who did not have a bed to sleep in. Ken was an exemplary co-worker, and because of his tenure, he was often called on for advice and guidance, always willing to help.

On Dec. 16, 2023, "Vandal Gym" was renamed to "Vargas Gymnasium" by the MHS Alumni Association and MUSD in honor of Coaches Dickie and Ken Vargas. These two Miami High graduates had 89 combined years of teaching and 71 years of coaching the Miami Vandal Basketball programs.

Ken is survived by his wife of 45 years, Evelyn; his children Aubrie Vargas-York (Ben), Ana

Vargas-Tarango (Michael), and Andrew (Sydnie); his grandchildren Brooklyn and Braxtin Gameros, Isaiah and Aubrey Tarango, and Dierks, Eisley, Remy, and Timber Vargas; four brothers, Lenny (Clydene), Richard. Steve (Angela) and Chris; and sisters-inlaw. Penny Remodini and Becky Guadiana.

Services for Ken Vargas have been set for Friday, August 16 at Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament Church (OLBS) in Miami. Visitation begins at 9 a.m., Rosary at 10 a.m., with Mass of Christian Burial beginning at 10:30 a.m. Burial will take place at Pinal Mountain Cemetery in Central Heights and a luncheon to follow at OLBS.






