Mary Anne began her

health care career when

she graduated from Good Samaritan Hospital School of Nursing in 1962, and continued nursing in Tucson before coming to Gila General Hospital in 1966. Miami Inspiration Hospital in 1972, and as a school nurse from 1995-2000. Along the way, she continued her training by obtaining a Bachelor of Science degree (1986) and a Masters of Business Administration (1990).

Globe photographer J.C. Burge: "the neatest little gallery"

learned, but there is one unanswered question: Who took the cowboys' picture?

The young town had its share of photographers, including men like Charles Farciot and Cicero Grime. Both are stories in their own right, but neither was in Globe in 1883. Grime was in Yuma Territorial Prison, doing time for his part in an 1882 robberymurder; Farciot was even farther away, in Alaska. There is another possibility, though: a photographer who was definitely in town that year, J.C. Burge. "Burge...has some of the best views of Arizona scenery ever taken," the Silver Belt declared on April 14, 1883. In May, the paper called his studio "the neatest little gallery in Arizona." Whether or not he took the cowboys' group photo – that has yet to be established - Burge offered "a great diversity of stereoscopic views of

a highly interesting character (Arizona Silver Belt, Sept. 1, 1883)."

Joseph Campbell Burge, born in Virginia in 1838, captured several images of Apache scouts in the area. He also, according to the Silver Belt, went north to photograph the Arizona Mineral Belt Railroad and Tonto Natural Bridge. [Burge was listed under Photographers, doing business in Globe, in the 1884-85 Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Nevada, Wyoming and Arizona Gazetteer and Business Directory.] Burge left Globe for Flagstaff in April 1884, the Silver Belt reported. He eventually set up shop in

Southern New Mexico. Later, while in El Paso, Texas, he photographed the body of John Wesley Hardin after the latter was shot by John Selman in 1895.

tor of the Southern Gila County Economic Development Corporation, then added the directorship of the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce from 2002-2006.

She was a clinical instructor for the Gila Pueblo Campus of Eastern Arizona College until her retirement last year. Through the years, she was also an enthusiastic supporter of United Fund of Globe-Miami, Bullion Plaza Cultural Center & Museum, Gila County Historical Society and the Globe-Miami Area Memorial Foundation.








Globe salutes fall Citizen's Academy graduates

Tips to carve the perfect jack-o'-lantern

Jack-o'-lanterns are one of many indelible symbols of Halloween. It's hard to pinpoint the precise origins of jack-o'-lanterns, but many historians trace the tradition to 19th century Ireland. In fact, this instantly recognizable staple of Halloween decor actually gets its name from an Irish folktale character named "Stingy Jack."

Jack-o'-lanterns are ubiguitous in October, but a refresher course on carving one can help those who haven't dusted off their carving skills since last fall. Don't carve too early. Though it can be tempting and fun to carve a jack-o'lantern once the calendar turns to October, it's unlikely the finished product will make it all the way to October 31. Horticulturists indicate that jack-o'lanterns have a shelf life of roughly five to 10 days, though an especially cold October could shorten that life expectancy even further. If you want your jacko'-lantern to greet trick-ortreaters on Halloween, wait to carve it until a few days before the big day.

• Use a dry-erase marker to outline the design. It's easy to make mistakes when carving a jack-o'lantern, especially if this is your first time using a carving knife since last year. Use a dry-erase marker to trace the design onto the pumpkin before you make a cut.

• Avoid severing the stem. When many people envi-



sion jack-o'-lanterns, the image in their minds is one in which the top of the pumpkin is removed so candles or lights can be effortlessly placed inside. However, the custom pumpkin carving experts at New York-based Maniac Pumpkin Carvers note that removing the top cuts off the vine, which supplies the pumpkin with nutrients and moisture, even after it's been cut. A whole in the back of the pumpkin can provide easy access when placing candles or lights inside, and cutting here won't cut off the nutrient and moisture supply a pumpkin needs to avoid drying out.

• Scoop everything out. The interior of a pumpkin will be loaded with seeds, which can be removed and later roasted to make a savory snack. In addition to removing the seeds, be sure to get all of the pulp out. Pulp left in the pumpkin will soon get moldy and that can shorten the lifesCourtesy image pan of the jack-o'-lantern. In addition, when removing the interior, try scraping the front inner wall of the pumpkin thin, which may make it easier to carve.

 Avoid candles when lighting the interior of the jack-o'-lantern. Candles might seem like the most authentic and even spooky way to light the interior of the pumpkin, but the heat produced by a burning candle can shorten the life expectancy of the jack-o'lantern. An LED light won't give off much heat and will provide ample illumination. A few simple tips can help Halloween celebrants ensure their jack-o'-lanterns make it all the way to the big day at the end of October. TF21A381

Safe trick-or-treating tips



Halloween is enjoyed by people of all ages, but few get a bigger kick out of the holiday than children. There are costumes to be worn, time spent with friends and the opportunity to collect free candy and other treats.

Although Halloween can be a fun time, the Children's Safety Network warns that it's also a time when accidents can happen. According to the CSN, the most dangerous day for child pedestrians is Halloween, with two times as many child pedestrians dying on Halloween compared to other days. It is essential to prioritize safety on Halloween, and following these guidelines can help.

• Make sure costumes are short. Costumes that drag on the floor are tripping hazards, which can lead to injury. Be sure that costumes do not cover the feet or drag on the ground.

• Trick-or-treat in groups. Children are safer in numbers due to the increased visibility of a crowd and because, if something happens, others can call for help. Parents can use their discretion on what age they feel is mature enough to let children go out alone. Until then, children should be accompanied by adults.

• Improve visibility. It's important to be seen while trick-or-treating, and that can be achieved by making sure costumes and trick-ortreat bags feature reflective tape. Trick-or-treaters also can carry flashlights or glow sticks to improve visibility, and stick to areas with streetlights if going out after dark.

• Stay on sidewalks. Whenever possible, trickor-treaters should stick to the sidewalks and avoid walking on the roads. This may not always be possible in neighborhoods without sidewalks, where parents and youngsters must be especially careful.

• Eat before trick-or-treating. A meal or snack before trick-or-treating can reduce Courtesy image

the tendency to fill up on candy while out and about. All candy and other treats should be inspected by an adult before it is eaten.

• Keep pets locked away. Animals can become skittish when there are many people loitering outside of homes or ringing doorbells. Keep pets in a quiet room away from the action to prevent them from getting loose, injured or scared enough to bite or scratch someone.

• Avoid masks that obstruct vision. It can be hard to see peripherally with a mask on, so avoid costumes with masks that compromise vision.

• Test out makeup beforehand. All makeup used for costumes should be tested for allergic reactions prior to use. Heed the warnings on packaging and avoid putting makeup too close to the eyes or lips.

These are some safety strategies designed to keep Halloween fun and incident-free this year.
