

Teddy Roosevelt in 1907, the park protects two cliff dwellings built and occupied between 1300 and 1450. Built into alcoves in the Superstition Mountains, these remarkable structures are among the finest examples of the Salado phenomenon. Using materials within walking distance, the people of that period hand-built walls of rock, adobe, and wood from the riparian area of the park. The people who occupied these dwellings produced exquisite polychrome pottery and weavings using local natural resources and items obtained through trade in the Tonto Basin.

This outstanding example of resiliency and adaptability to the Sonoran Desert is echoed in the use of the natural resources available to the people who lived here from 1300 to 1450. Evidence of corn cobs, squash stems, beans, and Agave quids was found within the cliff dwellings. Trade with local communities was evident from the seashells and turquoise adornments discovered when excavating the park. It all spoke to a rich culture connected to the land and the people who occupied the Tonto Basin.

Celebrate Arizona Archeology and Heritage Awareness Month at Tonto National Monument by visiting these archeological amazing sites. Experience the cliff dwellings and surrounding biodiversity once part of a thriving community. Stroll the half-mile hike to the lower cliff dwelling, open 7 days a week from 8 am to 5 pm. The visitors center includes a gift shop and park films. Access to the trail lower cliff dwelling closes at 4 pm, giving visitors plenty of time to hike and enjoy it. March weather offers spring conditions with warm days in the 70s and the start of spring blossoms. It is the perfect time to plan your visit to Tonto National Monument.

Your Words Speak Louder Than Your Actions

Normally, we hear that our actions speak louder than our words, that we need to put our money where our mouth is, so to speak. But the reality might be exactly the opposite. Our actions are important, but the reason they are important is that our actions are psychologically used to judge the truth of our words, and judging the truth of our words is an act of judging who you are as a person. Be careful what you say.

Take a parent who says, "Do what I say and not what I do." A child looks at the action, realizes that the words are empty and vain, and doesn't listen to what you say. Interestingly, the child will hold the words against you more than the contradictory action. Most people point out the hypocrisy of the words much more than the action. Words are important. They define us in the eyes of people more so, sometimes, than our actions.

People, even God, will use your words as a benchmark to measure your character and personality (Matthew 15:17-20; Matthew 12:36-37; Proverbs 23:7). While Jesus was being judged, it was not His deeds that they used to ultimately condemn Him. It was His words (Matthew 26:60-61; Matthew 26:65).

The words you speak define who you are — even lying. Lies tell a lot about the character and personality of a person. The willingness to lie about an action is something that will be held against you, once found out, more than the action itself. Just ask any politician caught in a lie.

When our deeds and our words contradict, people usually believe that our actions are closer to the truth than the words we say, but people will judge you more on the words you used, words used to either cover up an action, to change people's perception of an action, to flatout lie about an action, or to be honest about the action. The words you allow to come out of your mouth define you in the eyes of people more than the ac-

Your words give validity to the action. If a person hauls off and hits a guy and turns around and walks away, no one knows why. No one understands. But if, after punching the guy, he declares, "You ever look at my ten-year old girl again, I'll do worse!" Suddenly, the action makes sense to people. He is cheered. The words define the action. The words define the person.

Politicians fall into this trap all the time. Many political figures can live down a mistake, but they rarely live down a lie. The very fact that you try to deceive with your mouth tells volumes about you. So yes, it is more the words you say than the deeds you perform that define you in the minds of people.

Naturally, if your words are true, you ought to let your actions verify them. That's the kicker. Our actions serve to verify our words, and our words serve to define our actions, and in so doing, we define ourselves to people. Words don't verify our actions — it is the action that verifies our words. Our words, however, define the action. So ultimately, it is the words we speak that define us.

Can you think of a time when you felt like, "What in the world is going on in my life? Why did that happen to me? When will I finally get what I've wanted for so long? Why, God, why? When, God, when?" If you've been alive very long, you've probably some point.

The truth is God loves us and He has good plans for our lives, but that doesn't mean life is always easy. We all go through difficult times and things happen that aren't fair.

In fact, Jesus tells us in John 16:33 (AMPC), "In the world you have tribulation and trials and distress and frustration." It's so important for us to understand this so we won't be confused and lose our faith in Him when life is hard

Thankfully, Jesus goes on to say, "But be of good cheer [take courage; be confident, certain, undaunted]! For I have overcome the world. [I have deprived it of power to harm you and have conquered it for you]." This is amazing assurance that if we trust in Him, everything is going to work out the way it should in the end.

I know what it's like to hurt had an experience like this at so much you're not sure you can stand it any longer. And there have been times when I didn't understand how God could allow me to go through some of the things I've been through. My father sexually abused me from the time I

was about three until I left home at 18, and I remember praying many times for God to rescue me from that situation. Then, years later, I was diagnosed with breast cancer and had to have surgery to get rid of it.

I like to figure out how to fix problems, so it was difficult for me when I couldn't understand why God allowed me to go through those circumstances. But I can say now that God did a lot of good things in me through those hard times. And He can use me to help others because of it.
