Summer Heat Warning for Pet Owners

As the summer sun intensifies , Gila County Animal Care & Control is issuing an urgent reminder to pet owners: protect your animals from the dangers of extreme heat. With temperatures climbing above the 90s and into triple digits, officials are warning that even a short time outdoors can pose serious health risks for pets. "If it's too hot for you, it's too hot for them," the department stressed in its seasonal safety advisory. Each year, Animal Care & Control responds to multiple calls about animals in distress due to heat exhaustion—many of which are preventable with proper care.

Here's What Every Pet Owner Should Know:

Never leave pets in a



parked vehicle — It only takes minutes for a car's interior to reach deadly temperatures. On a 100°F day, a car can heat up to 130°F in just 15 minutes— even with the windows cracked.

Provide shade and fresh water — outdoor pets must have constant ac-

cess to clean water, food, and a shady spot to escape the sun.

Avoid midday walks – Exercise pets early in the morning or later in the evening when temperatures drop and pavement is cooler.

The Bible commands believers to live by faith (Hab. 4:2; Rom 1:17; Gal. 2:20, 3:11; Heb. 10:38). Faith is the key element to a successful Christian life. Without it, we could not touch the divine and interact with the power of God. God has chosen the medium of faith to work through us. It is, without a doubt, the key Christian.

But what does it mean to live by faith? There are many different explanations and illustrations stand this concept. It is so very nuanced that it would take entire books to even scratch the surface. Faith is the avenue of spiritual growth, so there is so much more to it than this simple article. Nevertheless, let's see if we can simplify it. But God kept bugging me, asking if I really trusted Him.

so on. Could I afford that? up, and that's when I realized that if I really trusted Him, I could risk that money, the uncertain move, and much more. If I really believed that God wanted me in this area,

to really pastor the First Baptist Church of Miami, then I should be willing to risk something of myself and resources.

So I did! And not two weeks after moving to the Miami-Globe area, we had two offers in a single day to purchase my old house! Wow! I can see God sitting on his throne, blowing on His knuckles and giving me the I-told-you-so look. Yeah. I get that a lot.

I often am reminded that living by faith really does involve some risk on my part. Without that risk, I don't see the miracles or the blessings like I want. The more I live by faith, the more of God's power I witness and interact with. Living by faith is scary. I went back and forth on this decision for quite some time, until it finally came down to the answer to a very simple question: did I really trust God?

So here I am, watching God work miracles in my life that can't possibly be coincidental. Scary...but a whole lot of fun, too!

GLOBE, AZ – Cobre Valley Regional Medical Center (CVRMC) is excited to announce the future opening of its much-anticipated "Highway 60 Clinic," a walk-in clinic located near Cal Ranch and Walmart. This new facility is set to provide essential healthcare services to the community, offering a convenient option for those seeking immediate medical attention without the need for an appointment.

The journey to establish the Highway 60 Clinic has not been without challenges. The initial plans for the clinic encountered an unexpected delay when it was discovered that the proposed location fell within a designated floodway.

Determined to bring this vital service to the community, CVRMC worked with local and federal agencies to reassess the flood maps that impacted the clinic's location. Through extensive modeling, updated maps were drawn to better reflect the actual conditions of the area. CVRMC then submitted a request for a Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), requesting an official change to the flood designation.

On July 29, FEMA issued a LOMR, paving the way for the new clinic. The new facility will offer extend hours to walk-in patients, providing a convenient, affordable option for healthcare services. While the specific timeline for construction and opening is still being finalized, the team is working diligently to bring the project to completion as swiftly as

CVRMC is committed to keeping the community informed as progress continues. Updates on the clinic's development will be shared regularly, with a focus on ensuring that residents are aware of the new healthcare options that will soon be available.

The opening of the Highway 60 Clinic represents a significant step forward in CVRMC's mission to provide comprehensive, accessible healthcare to the region. The medical center looks forward to welcoming patients to this new facility and continuing its tradition of high-quality care for the community.







- 7. To reduce the risk of strangulation, keep your blind cords at the shortest length possible and avoid tying your curtains with decorative
- 8. Consider installing a home security system, and make sure all doors and windows are securely shut and locked before you leave home or call

Always prepare for the unexpected! Make sure your family has an evacuation plan and easy access to important phone numbers (police, fire department, poison control, family members, trusted neighbors, etc.) in case of an emergency.






