For more than a century, a family farm

When Katie Hickman started her 120-acre farm north of Birkbeck in 1919, she might not have given any thought that her great-granddaughter would eventually celebrate its 100th anniversary.

That’s exactly what Lisa Shinneman Cross did in 2022, when she and her cousin Ronald Lord attended Ag Breakfast Day, in Springfield. The Hickman farm was recognized, along with 97 other Illinois farms, as an Illinois Centennial Farm, one owned continuously by the same family for at least 100 years.

Shinneman Cross was recently spending time working to get the homestead house in order, the farmhouse kitchen table covered with stacks of family photos going back decades. She divides her time between the farm and her home in Ft. Worth, Texas.

“This was my dad, Lloyd (Hickman), down at the old school,” she said, holding one of the photos. “I’ve got part of a board from it out in the machine shed.”

Lloyd was born in an upstairs bedroom of the house in 1922 and died in the house in 1996. Shinneman Cross’s mother, Dorothy, died at

the farm in 2014.

After the tornado of 1968, Hickman’s family, which had been living down the road, moved into the farmhouse.

“And, then, my dad bought 85 acres in McLean County,” Shinneman Cross said. “After that, they bought some more land west of Wapella.”

The last land her father bought was 40 acres in the Solomon area.

Navigator cancels pipeline

SPRINGFIELD — Navigator CO2, a Nebraska-based company specializing in carbon capture and sequestration, announced Friday it is canceling plans to build a 1,300-mile carbon dioxide pipeline that would have run through central Illinois.

The plan included several hundred miles of pipeline in Illinois which terminated at sequestration sites designed to store the greenhouse gas underground.

The company, which pulled its permit application at the Illinois Commerce Commission less than two weeks ago, said the cancellation was due to the “unpredictable nature” of the regulatory processes involved in permitting such a project.

The company recently had its permit denied in South Dakota and faced regulatory uncertainty in Iowa before ultimately withdrawing their application in that state.

“We are disappointed that we will not be able to provide services to our customers and thank them for their continued support.” Navigator CO2 CEO Matt Vining said in a news release.

The project was met with significant pushback from environmentalists and landowners in Illinois, who shared concerns about safety and the company’s request to use eminent domain to obtain land or usage rights if necessary.

Much of the work to oppose the project was organized through the Coalition to Stop CO2 Pipelines, which helped form a separate group to intervene in the state’s regulatory proceeding, attracting landowners and several county governments to its cause.

“This is, I think, the result of successful organizing,” Pam Richart, the coalition’s president, told Capitol News Illinois. “While we’re happy to hear it, there are a lot of federal tax dollars on the table for carbon sequestration.”

The federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021, known as the bipartisan infrastructure bill when it went through Congress, allocated \$12 billion in funding for carbon capture, utilization and storage projects.

“So, at one time, with the old (Farmall) Ms, they were farming, I think, about 1,300 acres. Plus, they had cattle and hogs, and, for a while, goats and sheep.”

Eventually, the Hickman’s were raising cattle only, in addition to crops.

“The steers were the last to go because it was getting too expensive to buy the steers and then feed them out of the cribs,” Shinneman Cross said.

Her father, Lloyd, was diagnosed with lung cancer at age 72, but he continued to work on the farm.

“When he was 74, he would go and sit to help with the augers,” Shinneman Cross said.

“And, then he died in September ’96. So, he did not want to give it up.”

“His legs got bad, so he couldn’t get into the tractor.”

With help getting into the tracker, her father would still drive.

“People would say ‘what if he dies?’ ‘Well, at least he’ll die happy,’” she said they would answer.

Today, the family cash rents the farmland to Steve Westfall.

Shinneman Cross, through the Hickman Trust, keeps busy maintaining the house and farm lot with help from area electrical, heating and plumbing, and lawn care contractors.

She is particularly proud of the barn.

“To me, it’s historical, because inside it has the logs,” she said.

Of the prairie style barns common in the midwest, it is a timber beam barn built with pegs, without the use of nails. Eventually, it was sided with cedar, so it would be more resistant to the weather.

The original scale house and weighing platform also remain, including the scale.

Katie Hickman bought the original 120 acres for \$33,300 in February 1919.

“Kate and her son, Byrl, by grandpa, bought the 120 acres in 1919,” Shinneman Cross said. “Byrl was 18 years old. They started with horses.”

The farm later became mechanized with the usual tractors, trucks and implements.

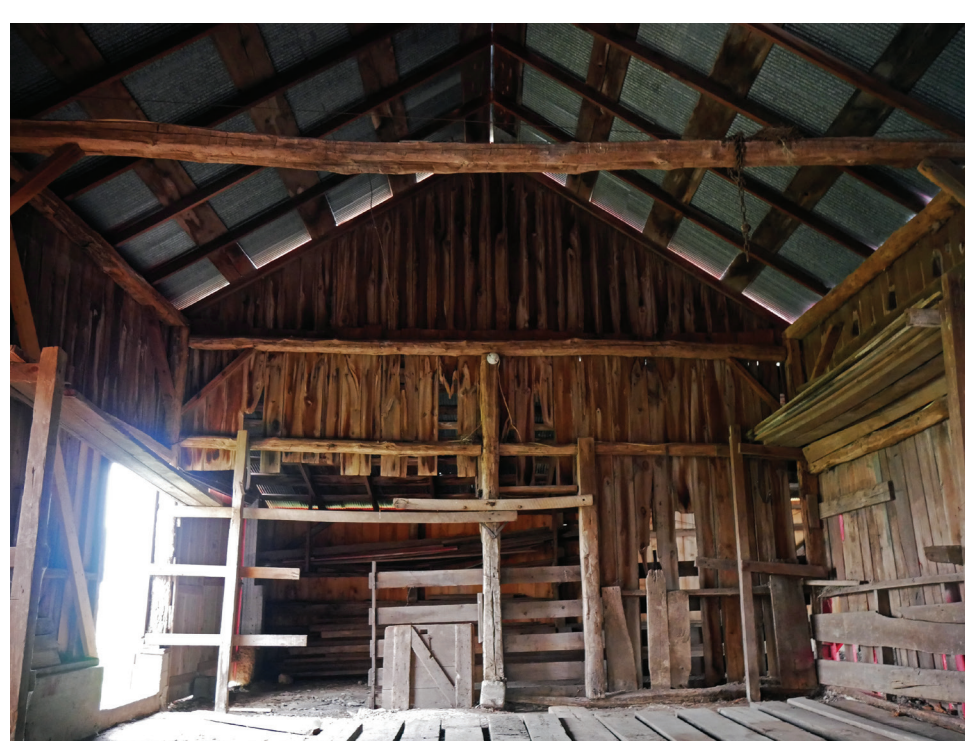
Her brother, David, gave up farming in the early 2000s. Today, the farm is in the hands of Shinneman Cross and her brother and will eventually pass to grandchildren.

“In my dad’s trust, it goes to David and I,” she said.

Grandchildren who inherit would have the option to buy one another out, keep the farm or sell.

Shinneman is proud of her family’s farm heritage and said it was a good way to grow up.

“For 104 years, it’s been in the Hickman name,” said Shinneman Cross. “A lot of changes have happened here.”



Patrick Brian Riggs

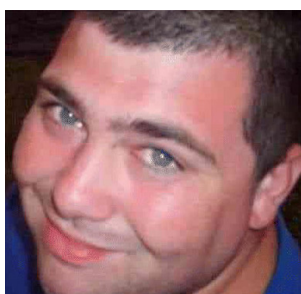

Richart said available federal funding would continue to incentivize companies to propose similar projects. Illinois’ unique geology makes it a natural candidate for carbon sequestration.

“If it’s not Navigator, it’s going to be someone else,” she said.

Richart said her group will devote more resources to combating other similar projects and advocate for state-level regulation of the carbon sequestration sector.

Currently, state regulators are considering a separate proposal from Wolf Carbon Solutions and Archer Daniels Midland Co. to build a pipeline that would transport carbon dioxide created as a byproduct of ethanol production and

store it underground in central Illinois.

That project has also been met with pushback from Richart’s group and others, leading some to call for state-level reform.

This spring, lawmakers introduced competing bills – one backed by industry groups and another by environmental advocates – that would create a framework for regulating the safety of this kind of project. Those bills were never called for a vote.

While Rep. Ann Williams, D-Chicago, told Capitol News last week that this subject was unlikely to come up in the upcoming two-week veto session, stakeholders continue to meet and negotiate with the hope of creating a bill that could become law in the future.

HISTORY ALMANAC

1911 - Chevrolet Motor Car Company was founded by Louis Chevrolet and William C. Durant.

1998 - A state-run newspaper in Iraq urged the country to prepare for to battle "the U.S. monster."

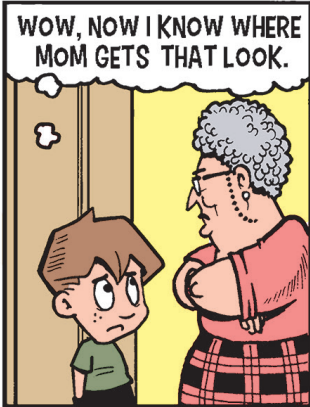
1998 - Minnesota elected Jesse "The Body" Ventura, a former pro wrestler, as its governor.

Protest rallies

Many of my generation are simply repulsed by the thought of those who engage in protest rallies. They view such rallies as anti-law and order.

Perhaps the situation is more complicated than simply objecting to those who violate a sense of proper public decorum. This country has had significantly contrasting protest rallies over the past few years. Take a look at the Black Lives Matter protests. Then review the January 6 insurrection protest. Now we are seeing the Palestinian Protests here and in other countries.

People are upset and believe that they need to voice their opinions in a public forum. They want attention provided to what they perceive as a public grievance that has not been addressed by our officials.

Lest we condemn the rallies too quickly, let's take a look at our nation's history. This nation started with a protest rally over the tax on tea at a Boston wharf. After that we had an armed resurrection which we refer to as the Revolutionary War. America as a nation is

steeped in protest rallies, even to the extent of a violent insurrection. We pretty it up in our history books and movies. However, the bottom line is that the United States was conceived in a violent rebellion.

Our founding fathers understood that and did not want another revolution to occur. That is why they wrote a Constitution with a Bill of Rights and the ability for the nation to amend those documents as needed as time progressed. These founding principles have served the nation well when we listen to them. They feared anarchy but acknowledged the right for the minority to object. The key difference from then to some of the current events is the process.

Our Constitution fully understands that the public will object to certain laws and want to enact new laws. People will rally to a cause and make their opinions known. The difference in the process is that a rally is not a riot. Much of the Black Lives Matter and defund the police events have been riots as was the January 6 Insurrection. Riots are



anarchy. Another way of looking at the situation is mob rule. With anarchy the rule of law is vanquished. What has set this nation apart is that concept of rule of law.

Our nation's laws are designed to meet the public's needs without the need for a riot or an armed insurrection. We have the ballot box and elected officials to address the concerns of the public. A change in law rarely occurs over night, but if change is warranted, it will occur under our system. Our system is designed to use the ballot, elected officials or a referendum to effectuate change. We are not designed to have law by riot.

Our system of laws allows for an idea to be vetted by the governing body or the public via a referendum. Many ideas simply fail when they are properly vetted. Legislative debate often finds the flaws or

weaknesses in an idea or concept. Sometimes the idea is worth tweaking to address its weaknesses or faults and often times it is simply determined to not be a viable concept and is discarded. Mob rule simply does not allow for that vetting process to occur.

Today we as a culture glorify immediate gratification in our computer age. We tend to dismiss the efforts it takes to enact meaningful legislation. The media gives great attention to the riot and says we have a problem. Rarely does the media provide a story on what legislation is before Congress or the City Council.

All three of the riot concerns listed above have elements of merit that need to be addressed by our legislative authorities. All three have aspects that are without merit and need to be cast aside. Unless we wish to become a nation guided by anarchy it's time to go back to governance as envisioned by Washington, Madison and Jefferson.

Educational benefits scam

You wouldn't think that a barber school would be a hotbed of scams and schemes, but apparently it can be. A barber school in a southern state was caught defrauding the Department of Veterans Affairs by stealing money from veterans' education benefits.

The Post-9/11 GI Bill program pays schools directly to cover the tuition and fees for veterans attending those schools. To be paid, the schools need to submit a thick stack of documents, including an initial application. Once approved, they then need to provide information about the courses, the number of hours per week,

the dates of enrollment, the costs and so on. Part of this is an agreement to charge veterans the same tuition and fees that civilian students pay.

That is where this particular barber school went over to the dark side. Where civilian students were charged \$2,400, veterans were charged \$22,400 for the course. Not only did the owner charge more for veterans, but accurate records weren't kept, and worse, the students weren't given their certificates of completion when they finished. The total scammed was in excess of \$235,000. The government is seeking treble damages,



three times that amount, as penalty.

Thankfully, not all schools engage in scams and theft like the barber school. Most are probably legit. If you want to go to school, the VA might pay for it if you qualify. Take a look at www.va.gov/education/about-gi-bill-benefits/post-9-11 for the dates and number of days of service required. On this page you'll also find information on benefits such as payment for tuition and fees,



Making rice paper

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights. Banh uot is an interest to many although it is not common to the western world. What is Banh uot? I did not know until I became a chef. It translates to "rice paper". It is a very thin disc of pulverized rice made by steam cooking a batter made of rice flour and water. It is used as a wrapper. Food items are wrapped and then eaten. I will cover two cooking methods for making rice paper.

This first method would be in the manner of western methods in using a flat shallow pan or griddle plate. The second method that I will cover is the Asian traditional method using a cloth steam pot. It is this second method that I prefer.

The batter is very simple. Sometimes, it is the simple things in life that are the best. The batter consists of 1 cup Maida with ½ teaspoon of salt mixed in. 1 cup of water is gradually worked in thoroughly. Then is added 2 tablespoons of oil also thoroughly worked

in. The oil of choice is generally vegetable oil. However, it can be most any neutral oil such as olive oil or peanut oil.

If using a flat round shallow pan, then get the diameter size suitable for your purpose. The first few attempts are to discover the amount of batter needed for evenly covering the surface of the pan. In a nonheated pan, pour in a little amount of batter and tip the pan all around to spread the batter evenly. Add more batter if necessary.

In a pot, have some water simmering. Hold the pan over the steam and allow the batter to cook. Very quickly, you should notice the batter getting translucent. That is a sign that the rice paper is sufficiently cooked. Remove from heat. Very carefully, use a tool to loosen the edges first and work slow toward the

center until you can lift the rice paper out. Put it on a flat rack to dry.

What is Maida? It is not made from rice. Therefore, the rice paper we just made is a counterfeit. Maida is milled wheat with a consistence of cake flour. Now for the real thing.

Take a cup of long-grain rice and soak it in water overnight. Then work the rice with your hands and rinse. Do this three times. And then add 2 cups of water and pour into a blender. Use this blender to pulverize the rice in the water to a batter. There is a more extended method that I prefer.

Make for yourself a cloth steam pot. Use a tight woven cloth that does not stretch and has never been bleached. It must be tightly held down covering the top of a large pot. Once up to steam, ladle some batter onto the cloth. Spread it around with circular motions using the back of your ladle.

Weather History

November 3
1880: November of 1880 still stands as the coldest November on record in parts of central Illinois. Peoria's average temperature was 30.2 degrees, and Springfield's average was 32.3 degrees.

November 4
Radiosondes are weather instruments that measure temperature, humidity, and barometric pressure of the


atmosphere. These instruments are carried into the atmosphere using weather balloons, filled with hydrogen or helium. When inflated, the balloon is about 4 to 5 feet in diameter and several feet high. However, as the balloon ascends, the decreased effects of barometric pressure cause the balloon to expand. It will usually pop at an elevation close to 100,000 feet off the ground. By this time, the balloon is about the size of a garage.







West leads the ♣Q, won in Dummy. You are playing a duplicate event, meaning that an overtrick will be well rewarded in the scoring. What is your Plan A for making as many tricks as possible? When Plan A doesn't work, you'll need to follow up with a well-reasoned Plan B.

Plan A must surely be to set up the Spades. If Declarer can lose a Spade, ruff a Spade, and draw trumps ending in Dummy, then there are 10 tricks (assuming that Spades are 4-3 and trumps 3-2), with a valuable overtrick in the offing if the ♦K is inside. But Declarer cannot draw trumps before playing on Spades, she needs the ♥A and ♥Q as later entries to the board. So, Declarer loses the ♦K to West's Ace, after which West cashes the ♠J and exits a trump, won in Dummy. Declarer ruffs a Spade, cashes a high trump and crosses to Dummy's last trump. But that well-timed play comes to naught when Spades turn out to be 5-2

Goodbye Plan A, hello Plan B. This requires playing Diamonds correctly, with Dummy's ♦J98 opposite Declarer's ♦AQ6, and with ♦KT732 somehow distributed between the defenders. There are two certain tricks here, but what's the best play for three? Should you finesse the ♦Q and cash the Ace, hoping that East has ♦Kx? ... or should you lead the ♦J, playing for East to have Kxx and West to have ♦Tx? As West has the long Spades it makes sense to play for East to have the longer Diamonds. With that in mind, Declarer plays East to hold ♦Kxx rather than ♦Kx, which means that leading the ♦J from Dummy is the route to the coveted overtrick
