Clinton's first Festival of Trees set for Nov. 25

Decorating will run from Nov. 19-24

CLINTON Decorating will begin on Sunday, Nov. 19 for Clinton's first-ever Festival of Trees. Coorganizer Nate Ennis talked to the city council about the festival during

the council's

night meeting. "I think I spoke to each of you about the idea a group of us came up with a few weeks ago to bring some Christmas cheer to the square," Ennis said.

Businesses organizations individual residents could enter a tree in the festival for a \$50 donation to the Clinton Festival of Trees. Tree decoration will take place from Nov. 19-24. The tree-lighting ceremony is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 25 on Mr. Lincoln's Square.

Commissioner Wise was impressed with the plan. He said he was familiar with a similar tree festival held by Lincoln each year.

"When you come up with something that's positive, it's really a great benefit for all of us," Wise

Ennis said 50 trees would be delivered to the square on Nov. 17 or 18.

"At that point, volunteers will set up all the trees," Ennis said. "Then, we'll open it up for the folks who donated to start decorating their trees."

Ennis said they would coordinate work on the festival with the city's annual lighting displays.

"The main point of the festival will be the lighting of the city's big tree," Ennis said.

He said the group was focusing on keeping the festival "small and controllable" the first year.

"Meaning, we're not going to have a lot of vendors or lots of different food, or anything like that," Ennis said.

There will be a photo booth and a free hot chocolate bar, courtesy of Coffee Corner. All the money raised from this year's festival will go toward growing the event next year, Ennis said.

Tractor Supply Co. donated power strips to the event, and the group has gotten advice from electrician Kelly Kinder.

The group has been gathering ideas from other area tree festivals. "In future years, this can

be as big as we're allowed to make it with your help," Ennis said. He said they would

accept help from any other community groups that would like to get involved.

The council will vote next meeting on a \$2,000 donation to the festival.

Victorian mansion, the centerpiece of the C.H. Moore Homestead DeWitt County Museum, is the former residence of Clifton H. Moore. One of DeWitt County's leading citizens, Moore acquired his fortune through a land speculation partnership with Bloomington's David Davis and was also a law partner, political supporter, and personal friend of



Losing it all in the St. Louis fire

On July 12, 1973, a fire in St. Louis, Missouri, at the National Personnel Records Center destroyed between 16 and 18 million military personnel files. My mother's file was one of those.

The files covered the period from pre-World War 1 to 1963. There began decades of veterans struggling to prove military service in order to access their benefits.

When I sent away for my mother's records, what I received back was a certificate, similar to a Little League participation certificate. It has the information that

I had provided: dates of

service, branch of service, rank, but not much more. Thankfully, I'd had enough information on hand to send them to prove service, including a copy of a newspaper photo taken as she took the oath.

But what of people who don't have even those things? What if you have ... nothing?

After the fire, the Records Center started a new rule for all military facilities: Save everything. No matter where in the country a record was likely to be found, it was to be saved and indexed. In this way they were able to index approximately 6 million files. When a

claim for benefits came in from a veteran whose file was burned, instructions were sent out to attempt to reconstruct the file from the pieces here and there.

The Veterans Affairs, Office of Inspector General was asked to audit the process of reconstructing a file. Here

is what they found: Last year it was taking an average of 450 days from time of claim to a claim decision, compared

to 146 days for a non-fire

Staff were not following the steps outlined in their instructions, thereby adding 73 days to the process.

Staff did not complete follow-up procedures 25% of the time due to lack of training.

If there's good news, I'll never have to send away for my father's military records. The man saved everything, and I mean everything: every transfer, pay stub, promotion notice, TDY order ... everything.

Perhaps you should do the same.



Stir-fry Yangzhou Chau fan

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights.

Forgive me. This article was supposed to follow the one dealing with "Chan fan" and prior to "Rice paper."

After learning to prepare Chau fan, we can continue with fried rice in the style of Yangzhou. This popular dish I hope you would like as well as I. It is relatively easy, but with sufficient challenge for the beginner.

Char sui, covered in the previous article, is called out in this recipe. Otherwise, simply use butt pork roast. Follow the slicing procedure given in the article on making Char

Part of your mise-enplace is to have 5 large eggs beaten with ¼ teaspoon of salt. Reserve. Combine 1 ounce soy sauce, 2 fluid ounces of rice wine, 1 ounce oyster sauce, 1 tablespoon sesame oil, and 1 ounce each of salt and sugar. Reserve. The other part of your

mise-en-place is to have the roast all sliced, cooked, and ready to go. If you do not already have rice



cooked, then cook some. 4 cups each of long-grain rice and water will give you approximately 8 cups worth of cooked rice. I chose long-grain since it is less starchy. Thinly slice scallions on a bias. Place the wok ring over

a stove burner. Put about 2 ounces of lard into the wok. Peanut oil can be substituted. Turn the heat up to high. As soon as the lard just begins to smoke, add 6 ounces of shrimp. The shrimp should be at room temperature. It is important to not cool down the grease. Stirfry until all the shrimp turns pinkish (about 30 seconds). At this point, remove the shrimp and reserve. Then pour off the grease and reserve.

Now that there is only a coating of grease in the wok, one must work very fast. Stir-fry the eggs until they just begin to solidify. In past articles, I cautioned about not over

cooking eggs. That holds true here. Slide the eggs off onto a cutting board. Slice into strips for eating with chopsticks.

Here comes the fun part. Return the wok to its ring and add 2 ounces of lard. When it again gives off whiffs of smoke, put in the ginger and cook for 5 seconds. No, this is not a typographical error. 5 seconds, not 5 minutes. Then add the garlic and cook 5 more seconds all the while stirring.


Next, add the pork and stir-fry for about 1 minute. Add the shrimp, rice, eggs, and the sauce concoction. Keep stirring. The scallions go in last. Add the reserved lard and you are done.


Yes, I know how most people feel about lard. It might not seem so bad if you recall my article regarding cooking oils. It is article 170 and published on April 17, 2020. But as stated above. you can substitute peanut oil in this recipe.



1911: The "Great Blue Norther" raced across the Midwest, bringing a tremendous fall in temperatures. Afternoon temperatures well into the 70s across Illinois fell into the teens by midnight. Ahead of the cold front, tornadoes moved across Cass and Mason Counties of central Illinois. The Cass County tornado, estimated at EF2 intensity, touched down near Arenzville and

moved through Virginia, where 100 buildings were damaged. 12 people were injured. In Mason County, a tornado moved from near Easton to the Logan/Mason County border west of San Jose. An infant and an elderly woman were killed in separate homes near Easton. Another tornado in the Chicago area tracked from near Aurora to Naperville, causing \$10,000 damage.





this deal, West trusted Declarer's bidding and found a brilliant shift at Trick 2. And Declarer trusted West's bidding enough to find a clever counter and bring home her slam.

On lead against 6♠, West cashed a high Heart and had to decide what to do at Trick 2. If he had tried to cash a second Heart then there would be no story to tell, as Declarer would ruff that, draw trumps and run the Clubs. But West was in a trusting mood, and concluded that Declarer was unlikely to have two Heart losers on this auction. So he found the fiendish shift of the Club Ten, knocking out Dummy's only side-suit entry before trumps had been drawn.

What should Declarer do now? One possibility was to hope for 2-2 trumps, in which case trumps could be drawn, ending on the board, and the Diamond losers then disposed of on the Clubs. But Declarer reasoned that West had done a considerable amount of vulnerable bidding and probably had 8 or 9 Hearts. That being so, it seemed more likely that West had a singleton trump. So, Declarer cashed just one trump on the board and started running the Clubs, pitching Diamonds. East ruffed the fourth round of Clubs, Declarer overruffed, returned to the board with a trump (drawing East's last trump in the process), and got rid of the last Diamond loser on another Club winner. Well bid, well defended, well declared
