Sales tax presentation given 2024 fiscal year tax levy presented, vote next month

ROCHELLE—At its monthly meeting Monday, the Rochelle Township High School District Board of Education heard a presentation by District **Business Manager Kevin** Dale on the district's 2024 tax levy.

The levy will be up for approval at the board's Dec. 18 meeting. Dale said the levy will see a 2.56 percent increase (\$260,000) over last year's levy, which will not require it to hold a truth in taxation due to that number being lower than five percent. The district's equalized assessed value (EAV) saw an 8.9 percent increase overall.

"We're trying to keep our number down to keep the burden on the taxpayers down as much as we possibly can and still make sure we have the money we need to provide the best education we can for our students," Dale said.

Dale said the district surveyed other school districts in northwest Illinois and found that RTHS's levy was the lowest in the area. Board President

Tom Huddleston said the district is in good financial standing.

"This is a very reasonable levy," Huddleston said. "I think we've really saved a lot of money."

Sales tax

The board heard a presentation by Superintendent Jason Harper on the idea of a county schools facility sales tax. A law passed in 2007 to allow for a county-wide sales

tax in Illinois to benefit schools for expenses including facilities, security, mental health services and school resource officers. The sales tax must pass in a county by referendum during an election. That has not taken place in Ogle County, and the measure failed on the ballot locally back in 2013. There are 57 counties in Illinois that have the county schools facilities sales tax.

Harper said Ogle Coun-

ty school districts are looking at passing resolutions in support of placing a county schools facilities sales tax referendum on the ballot for a future election. To get onto the ballot, school boards representing more than 50 percent of students must pass support resolutions. The referendum would have to pass on the ballot county-wide.

The park district circulated a survey locally on what the community would like to see at the site, which received around 700 responses.

The concept plan for the site includes the football, baseball and softball fields remaining with continued enhancements, a fitness area on the southern corner of the property near The REC Center, a multi-sport court with a rubber surface for soccer, volleyball and basketball, a universal play space, a skate park on the northeast corner of the property, tennis courts and pickleball courts, a pavilion and restrooms, new parking, batting cages, a walking path and green space. The plans are not finalized, which is why the park district is holding meetings and seeking feedback.

"We're just at the infancy stages of this whole thing," Board Vice President John Dobbs said. "We're gathering information right now. We haven't really put together a budget. We're just collecting as much information as we can. The budget and a plan would be the next step."

The park district recently submitted an Open Space Lands Acquisition Development (OSLAD) grant application for the project for matching funds of \$600,000. The grant application status will not be known until sometime in 2024, which will impact the project's size, scope and timeline.

Park District Executive Director Jackee Ohlinger said the district isn't counting on the grant funds for the project and would be able to do it without them.

The board heard feedback Monday from organizations involved with both tennis and pickleball on what they'd like to see out of the Helms Park project. Helms Park is currently the site of tennis courts that are also used for pickleball.

Lauren Hintzsche presented on behalf of the Rochelle Pickleball Club, which has 40-50 members and has grown in recent years. She said the club would like to see six pickleball courts at the park from the project, and that tennis courts are not ideal to play pickleball on.

"When people ask how many pickleball courts you should have in your town, they recommend one court for every 1,000 people," Hintzsche said.

"We're a town of 10,000 people. I know 10 courts is a reach. If we could have six courts, I think we could feel very comfortable and accommodate what we expect to happen in the future and what we're already seeing."

John Prabhakar spoke on behalf of the group of residents that play tennis together. He thanked the park district for its work on the project. He said he'd like to see four tennis courts at Helms Park.

Five other residents spoke in favor of improved tennis and pickleball experiences at Helms Park.

"I would like to see Rochelle become a place that people come to for tennis and pickleball," RTHS Boys Tennis Coach Kristy Eckardt said. "We have the opportunity here to do something really great with the facility. To have four tennis courts as we do now and be able to add multiple dedicated

pickleball courts, it could be a central location for people all over Northern Illinois to come to."

Levy

The board unanimously approved its 2024 tax levy. Ohlinger said the tax rate will be 11 cents less than last year due to an increase in the district's equalized assessed value (EAV). The park district's levy covers operational expenses for the fiscal year of May 1-April 30.

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

LOCAL NEWS Chana School Museum installs new tribute bell

CHANA—The Chana School Museum Foundation recently installed a tribute bell outside of the 1883 Chana School to honor the hundreds of community volunteers who worked on this important restoration project. The cast iron bell is similar to the original bell now hanging in the Chana School Museum bell tower.

These large school bells were once in the bell towers of most of the 225 one-room school houses located throughout Ogle County before school consolidation closed them down starting in the 1940s and 50s. The large tribute bell gives visitors and students coming for school living-history field trips the opportunity to see the bell up-close. ED Etnyre & Company of Oregon painted the bell, and they also donated the custom laser-cut steel sign. Paul Steingaber of Mt. Morris did the limestone base masonry work.

The Chana School Museum was restored and is maintained by the all-volunteer Chana School Foundation who saved the historic school from demolition 25 years ago. The building was moved

from its original location in Chana seven miles to Oregon Park East in 1998. Then after five years of countless hours of hundreds of community volunteers, the building was totally restored to how it looked in the 1890's and opened to the public in 2003. The Chana School Museum was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2005 as the only two-room wooden schoolhouse in Illinois.

The Chana School Museum is located at 201 North River Road at Oregon Park East and is open for school field trips and unique events. The Chana School Museum's Oregon Ganymedes Vintage Base Ball Club plays early-rules historic baseball games on the lawn of the museum from May to September.

The sales tax can be a maximum of one percent in quarter-percent increments.

If the district and other county school districts wanted the sales tax issue on the next election in March, the deadline is Jan. 2. The Rochelle school boards each have one more meeting before that deadline.

The additional sales tax would apply to items that are already taxed, with the exception of vehicles and unprepared food. Based on the most recent numbers, a county facility sales tax could net RTHS \$443,491 per year. Along with facilities, security, mental health services and school resource officers, the money can be used to abate property taxes and make rates lower for property owners within the district. Due to RTHS having a school that is 20 years old,

Harper said the "facility needisn't present" for funds from a county facility sales tax.

"We're one of the fortunate ones in our county to have a near-brand new building," Harper said. "Something along the lines of offsetting the remaining taxes would seem to make sense."

Harper and Huddleston made it clear that the issue will be up to voters if it does make it onto the ballot. School boards can only place it on the ballot. The board will look at taking action on a resolution of support at its meeting next month. Harper said no school boards in Ogle County will take action until next month. "I think it's inevitable that it's probably going to be on the ballot," Huddleston said. "And it will be up to voters. I think there's a majority of school boards

that are going to want it that represent over 50 percent. If it goes to the voters and it does pass, then we have the opportunity to put our voters back in the same position they are today by just abating that amount off the real estate taxes."

ESSA

RTHS Principal Chris Lewis made a presentation on the school's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) designation, which is commendable. ESSA summative designations include exemplary, commendable, targeted, and comprehensive & intensive support. ESSA designations are made up of a number of factors, including graduation rate, chronic absenteeism, and proficiency in different education areas. RTHS's score was 70.37, and to be exemplary it would have had to be at least 91.24. Lewis said the graduation



The board unanimously approved a fiscal year 2024 school maintenance grant application to help offset the cost of upcoming paving work. The grant will match up to \$50,000, Dale said. The board will look at bids for the paving work at its December meeting. The board unanimously approved a memorandum of understanding with the RTHS Education Association for tuition reimbursement for its teachers that receive certification to teach dual-credit courses to students that want to earn college credit early.

RTHS is able to offer college credit courses for a cost of \$50 or less, and more of those courses to students.

"I think the only thing that's really impeding our ability to offer more opportunity is the number of teachers we have that are qualified," Harper said.

Teachers that receive the tuition reimbursement would agree to a service obligation contract for the future.

Consider this: Aches and pains

MALL aches and b pains begin to show up. Nothing to be worried about, usually. In the morning, or maybe once per week, depending on your method of choice, you fill up your prescription containers with many more pills than you thought you'd ever be taking. You always thought that your parents or parents-in-law were taking too much medication. But you just noticed that the number of meds you are taking now outnumbers theirs. Mainly because, but not limited to, the fact that more meds come on the market and it's easier to prescribe than to correct. It's also easier to prescribe than to do more research on over-the-counter meds.

You also notice that when you fall, even if it's a very short fall, things hurt more than usual. Maybe for a short time only, but in the past, that type of event didn't hurt at all. As you are gardening, raking, shoveling, and performing other previously simple tasks, you notice you get tired more quickly. You might even get a bit dizzier as time goes on. Your legs

and/or shoulders might get sore. At night, when driving, you notice lights have these streaks shooting out all around them. The lines in the road, though usually only the ones that need painting, become hard to see. You might even decide to limit or stop driving at night.

But you are doing okay. You're still tough and most of the time you feel like you could work much longer. If you have water with you in the summer and something to cover your face in the winter, all is well. You're ready for that next project or job. You feel young AND you are NOT getting old.

That's the way I felt this summer. I am 72 and was ready for anything. Well, almost anything. But the unexpected snuck up from behind and bit me. It started Aug. 8 when my family and I took my grandson out for dinner. As I walked to the table in the restaurant, I fell hard on my right hip and shoulder. The only feeling I could remember is that my right foot seemed to get stuck, almost felt glued, to the carpet so my right leg wouldn't come forward. This hurt my pride more than anything. So, I sluffed it off as quickly as I possibly could.

A couple of weeks later, I was mowing the lawn and decided to stop and move something back into place. As I stepped up to get on my riding mower (hey, I have a big yard), I fell over the platform off the front of it. I started laughing, telling myself how clumsy I was. I fell again on the same hip and

shoulder and because of the metal, I was hurting a bit and my ego damaged. I thought about what caused this. I remembered that my right foot didn't raise enough to step onto the mower,

so I fell over the mower.

I blamed the first fall on new shoes with too much grip. This second time on my just being me. Still not willing to give in to a much different kind of answer because it had to be a simple one. You know, those that explain away anything too personal.

So, again a couple of weeks later I fell at home. In the bathroom walking next to the counter. This room has tile floors and rugs. I fell on my right side again on the tile, of course. Now I started to think that there is something more going on. I made a doctor's appointment and told them that I must have dizziness caused by something like vertigo. I even thought that I might have, somehow, forgotten how to walk.

At the appointment the doctor said it could

> be something like vertigo, but he couldn't answer without some test-They took ing. x-rays at the doctor's office and sent me on to the hospital for a CT scan and an MRI. The CT was for my

head and the MRI for my lower back. Walking to the MRI room I fell again on the concrete floor on my right hip and shoulder. I had failed to tell the malfunction. nurse why I was having the MRI, and I just went down. They immediately had me in a chair checking

me over, making sure I The CT was normal. Not much there and no

hint of anything that would cause the dizziness. The MRI, however, showed I needed to talk to a spine surgeon. Many bulging disks in the lumbar area and at least one pushing on my spinal cord very hard. All the rest but one, I believe, were bulging into nerves. How in the heck did this happen? I have no idea, but I thought back to another fall in a bathroom on a vacation trip.

Sitting with the spinal surgeon I was educated on all the problems I was contending with. The major one was the spinal cord intrusion. It was restricting my spinal fluid which was probably causing my lack of equilibrium since the spinal fluid is used, along with some many other bodily functions, for stability. The others, in pushing on my nerves, could be causing my receptors (receiving movement signals) to

I have fallen another four times. My right hip is still sore, my right shoulder is good. My feet and chins are getting numb but throughout this whole ordeal, I have had no pain other than immediately after falling. Why? I have no idea! I began using a cane after that first MRI and did okay for a while. My last fall was on my left side, and this bruised my ribs. Now I am using a walker until surgery. But you know as well as I do, I am NOT getting older!

I tell you this story because this, and many other things, can happen in a split second. Sometimes without pain to tell you it's worse than you thought. I have now updated my will, and my health directives. I have left notes for my children where to find things if something should happen. Yes, this may sound gloomy and very negative, but you just never know. And no, I don't plan to be anywhere but home after my surgery. And be around for many years ahead. Yet I don't want my children to go through what my sister and I had to when our mom passed last year.

This is just my way of suggesting that by getting things done now, you may feel much better if something happens down the road. At least you will be ready to focus on just that one thing.



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



RTHS Boys Bowling JV Hubs earn sixth-place trophy at Don Carter Lanes Alanis, Mortensen earn team MVP honors in Guilford Survivor Tournament

ROCKFORD — The Rochelle Hub varsity and JV bowling teams competed in the Guilford Survivor Tournament at Don Carter Lanes on Saturday. The JV Hubs brought home the sixth-place trophy, while the varsity Hubs finished 13th out of 22 teams in the tournament. Senior Jon Alanis was named the MVP for the varsity team and sophomore Caleb Mortensen was named the MVP for the JV team.

Varsity

Rochelle compiled a team score of 3,612 over four games. The varsity team scored 831 in the first round of the four-game tournament. Alanis rolled a 189, while sophomore Levi Waddle added a 170 for the Hubs, who shot an 821 in the second game before rolling team scores of 1,014 and 946 over the third and fourth games.

Three Rochelle bowlers fired scores over 200 during the third game, with sophomore Andrew Powell shooting a 226 while Alanis and Waddle followed with respective scores of 215 and 212. Waddle's 201, Alanis' 198 and Powell's 195 were the high individual scores for Rochelle in the fourth game. Alanis finished with a team-high 778 series, while Waddle and Powell recorded 743 and 736 series scores.

JV


The JV team scored 2.896 over four games to qualify for the trophy rounds. Mortensen shot a team-high 658 series with high scores of 185 and 182, while senior Christian Thorne added a 597 series with a high score of 186.

Sophomore Wyatt Worthington followed with a 565 series and a high score of 172. Sophomore Declan McGee shot a 556 series with a high score of 180.

Sycamore

The Rochelle Hub varsity bowling team nearly rallied for an Interstate 8 Conference series victory on Thursday evening, when the purple and white faced Sycamore at Mardi Gras Lanes. SophomoreAndrew Powell rolled a team-high 608 series, while seniors Christian Thorne and Sam Tracey followed with respective series scores of 580 and 574 as the Spartans outlasted Rochelle 3,269-3,248.

Sycamore took the series lead after defeating the Hubs 1,087-1,010 in the first

game. Tracey spearheaded the charge for the Rochelle side, shooting a series-best 204 while sophomore Levi Waddle followed with a series-best 199. The Spartans scored a narrow win over the Hubs (4-2, 1-1 Interstate 8) in the second game, edging Rochelle 1,089-1,055 despite a series-best 226 from Powell.

The Hubs saved their best effort for last, scoring a 1,183-1,093 victory in the third and final game of the series. Four bowlers on the Rochelle side threw scores over 200, with Thorne bowl-

ing a series-best 226 while Tracey totaled a series-best 222 and senior Jon Alanis recorded a series-best 212. Powell added a 211 for the Hubs.

South Beloit

Sophomore Andrew Powell enjoyed a careerbest performance for the Rochelle Hub varsity bowling team during Tuesday evening's nonconference match against South Beloit. Powell fired a team-high 758 series, averaging over 250 pins per game as the Hubs rolled over the Sobos

3,534-2,827.

The Hubs crushed South Beloit in the opening game, winning 1,258-833. Five Rochelle bowlers threw scores over 200 including Powell, who rolled a team-best and series-best 265 in the first game. Senior Sam Tracey scored a series-best228, while junior Logan Frye followed with a series-best 207. Senior Jon Alanis and sophomore Levi Waddlerecorded series-best scores of 204 and 200.

Rochelle extended its series lead with an 1,150-967 win during the second

game, where Powell bowled a 256 to lead the Rochelle side. Frye and Waddle totaled respective scores of 191 and 190 in the middle game for the Hubs, who clinched their series sweep with an 1,126-1,027 win in the third game. Powell's 237 and Waddle's 199 were the high scores for the Hubs in the final game on Tuesday.

Waddle ended the match with a 589 series and Frye finished with a 583 series for the Hubs. Tracey recorded a 598 series after rolling scores of 183 and 187 over the second and third games.

Morris named I-8/KRC Blue Lineman of the Year


ROCHELLE—From the moment head coach Kyle Kissack called on him to play varsity football as a freshman, Rochelle lineman Kaiden Morris has risen to the occasion and been a difference maker on offense and defense. It was rare enough that the Hubs had a freshman starting on the varsity level, but the two-way standout went a step further by earning All-Conference honors. Morris finished his freshman season as the starting right guard while also adding 13 tackles, four sacks and one fumble recovery on the defensive line. Morris returned for his sophomore season and earned All-Conference honors a second time, starting at right guard once again while recording 36 tackles, three sacks and two fumble recoveries in a nine-win season. Now a junior. Morris not only achieved the rare feat of earning All-Conference honors for a third consecutive season, but he was crowned the Interstate 8/Kishwaukee River Blue Division's Lineman of the Year for the first time. Morris compiled 22 tackles, two sacks, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery on defense. to do this," Morris said. "I told him I was all in and it was nerve racking toward the beginning, but I trusted my teammates and was great this season and I was surprised when I found out I was the Lineman of the Year because I think everyone on our line could have earned it. 

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
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
