Mayor Schamberger submits resignation letter

AMBOY – There has been a letter floating around social media sites and in the mail.

The City of Amboy stamp at the top of the letter solidified John Schamberger will officially resign a year early in his second term as mayor on Monday, Dec. 18.

"It was not an easy decision. I've been and alderman and the mayor for 11 years," Mayor Schamberger said. "I grew up in the country and my wife (Meghan Schamberger) and I had a goal in mind to raise our kids in the country. An opportunity presented itself and we

decided to do it. I feel like it was time. I had a good run and did a lot of good things, but maybe it's time to let someone else come in.

"We have purchased a farmette in Marion Township and a farm in East Grove Township. Our kids will still be going to Amboy schools, and we'll still be in the area. We are looking to get into the cattle business and want to live a farm lifestyle."

As stated in his letter, the Amboy city ordinance requires the acting mayor to live within Amboy city limits. Since him and his family (wife Meghan and children Preston (5) and Lennon (2)) will not be in the city limits, Schamberg-

er is resigning.

The Amboy native and 2004 Amboy High School graduate, who spent 14 years in the National Guard, became an alder-

man in 2013 and represented Ward 2 for four years.

Through his time as alderman, an interest in becoming mayor arose.

Schamberger ran in

2017 in which he received 422 votes to beat the incumbent Tom Nauman's 219 votes.

"I'll never forget my time as mayor. I had the chance to work with people while being faced with issues," Schamberger said. "You rely on your team, your aldermen, and trusting them to come up with solutions. Sometimes you have to put your personal beliefs or opinions aside and do what's best for the city.

"I was fortunate enough to serve as an alderman with great people like Dennis Weidman. They were pillars of the community. I learned a lot from them, and you could lean on them as far as questions or just reaching out to them to discuss something we were debating. Those are the people that mentored me along the way.

"Looking back during my time as mayor, I always tried to treat people with respect, hear them out on their issues, and try to work with them and resolve it. I was very approachable. I just wanted to help people, work with them, and make Amboy a tight-knit community with the small-town feel where everyone knows everyone, and everyone helps one another."

Schamberger has been an ambassador of staying local as much as possible.

AMBOY – Nathan Shaw is a Shaw.

There may be many attributes to being a Shaw but one of them is giving back, service.

After he graduated from Amboy High School in 1997, he enlisted in the Army where he was deployed twice to Iraq, served a tour in Afghanistan, and had a 12-month rotation in Korea before retiring on March 1, 2019.

Shaw and his wife Rachel, married in January 1998, decided it was time to come back home.

They returned to Am-

boy in 2000 and Nathan Shaw joined the Amboy Fire Department during Depot Days in 2020.

"It means a lot to me to be part of the department. I view it as I'm continuing my service to my community," Shaw said. "I served my country for 20-plus years, so I figured I'd come back home and fill my time by serving my community. I've always kind of wanted to be a fireman. My father (Bill Shaw) did it for 30-plus years and he's still on the

Amboy Fire Department Board.

"I figured all the Shaws need to serve, so I came down to see what it was all about. Fire service has the same mindset, mentality as the Army. It's the comradery. You're serving the community, but you're also forming a family. You always want to make sure the people in the truck when you roll out are in the truck when you roll in."

Siren being used by Amboy fire department as public notification

AMBOY – Have you heard the siren coming from the Amboy Fire Department? As of Wednesday, Nov. 15, the AFD

began sounding the station's siren between the hours of 7:30 a.m.-7:30 p.m. if they're called into action.

The purpose of using the siren is to bring awareness to the community whenever the department has a call in its protection district when pedestrians are active in the area.

The awareness is for interest of public safety to make pedestrians aware of emergency vehicles impeding traffic.

"The purpose of the siren when it was initially installed was to activate firefighters to come to the station," said Amboy Fire Chief Jeff Bryant Sr. "Over time, it's

become a notification to the public when there is emergency traffic inbound and outbound from the station.

"The Number I goal is pedestrian safety. We want to make sure our citizens and guests are safe. If they're around the area, we want them to be aware of the traffic. We will not sound the alarm during bad weather months or situations. If it looks like there is going to be a storm outside, we're not going to use the alarm just like we wouldn't test tornado sirens during

that time."

Bryant Sr. added, the siren is not a wather siren and is not part of the weather siren system. Weather sirens are cycled differently and are not identical.

"Fulton Reynolds heard the call of his country and enlisted June 3, 1918, asking admission into the Marine Corps at Chicago, Ill. He passed all examinations and was called June 8. He was sent back until further notice, which for some unknown reason, he

never received. He registered at Charles City, Ia., June 5, 1917, and was called by the draft July 26, 1918, leaving Charles City on that date.



He arrived at Camp Gordon, Ga., July 28, 1918, being placed in Co. B Fifth Replacement regiment. On September 2, he received his overseas equipment, but on being recommended to attend non-com school was taken off the overseas list.

He attended the non-com school and was making good when he was taken ill and on Sept. 25, 1918 was taken to the base hospital. On October 18 he answered the final reveille. His death came as the result of pleural pneumonia. He served his country only a short time, but when he an-

swered the final call, it was just as glorious as though he had been on the battlefield. He made the supreme sacrifice. No man could do more. The lieutenant of his company describes his life in camp as being that of a model soldier.

The body was returned from Atlanta to Paw Paw, Ill., with military honors, was laid to rest in Wyoming cemetery."

In the years following the Great War, the Smith Reynolds American Legion Post 511 was named to honor the patriotism and sacrifice of Pvt. Fulton Reynolds and Lt. William W.

Smith, also of Paw Paw.




Light up a four-wheeler, car, truck or even a tractor and join the parade. Pre-registration is not required.



He said the city employees receive their city uniforms and clothing from Kaleel's Clothing. Christmas hams were purchased for city employees at Amboy Food & Liquor.

"I was here when we didn't have a grocery store. When we didn't have a grocery store, our downtown was dead," Schamberger said. "On any given day, there wouldn't be any cars downtown. Now, you can't find a parking spot because people are downtown.'

Schamberger is accredited with these efforts over the last seven years as mayor:

Beautifying downtown—new lights, new garbage cans, flower planter boxes, new roads, new sidewalks, supporting new businesses to keep downtown full.

Shelley Behrends. Updating community building—refinished floor, new lights, bought smart TV, new LED lighting outside, looking to update kitchen area.

Sewer lining – lining storm drains where water can get carried away instead of storing on top of sewer.

Grantto replace all of lead water lines intown. Pursued grant before they were ordered to replace water lines on the city's expense, tax payers, by the EPA. The grant is for more than \$1 million.

Water facility updates - computers to have more reliable water system.

Replacing valves so water mains don't break like they did at Depot Days two years ago. New water mains will shut down water where it's needed instead of all water in the city.

Built a new shop on edge of town by old junior high, maintenance facility, for all of the equipment to go inside. Also

purchased new equipment, new lawn mower, new sprayer, new plow trucks - update Amboy so do jobs efficiently with good equipment.

Junior Highproperty-purchaseditand going to make it into recreational area.

Schamberger joined Amboy government because of his love for Amboy. Now that he's served Amboy for

more than 10 years, he has decided it's time to focus on family and the farm. "I want to give a huge shout out to my wife, Meghan. I work at ComEd and I work ridiculous hours," Schamberger

said. "I'm gone for work and then to have to go to a city council meeting, it put a lot on her plate with raising the kids and keeping the fires burning at home.

"There have been times where there were difficult issues going on in town and maybe people weren't happy with decisions I made. She was there by my side."



One for the Money

When Janet Evanovich switched from romance novels to mysteries, she decided to use the TV sitcom as her model. "There were a lot of women in mystery then but they were hard-boiled. They were men in skirts," Evanovich recalls. "I needed to create a Jersey girl, a heroine that was real to me and still could function in crime fiction." She created Stephanie Plum, a wisecracking recovery agent, i.e., bounty hunter, who bluffs her way into outlandish adventures or rather misadventures. The Stephanie Plum series has had a long run, beginning with "One for the Money" in 1994 to "Dirty Thirty" in 2023. Evanovich has much in common with her heroine. Both are from New Jersey, both devour Cheetos, both have owned a hamster, and both have shared "similar embarrassing experiences."

A recently laid-off lingerie buyer, Stephanie Plum is in dire straits: She has no car, no food, and no prospects. She comes from the "Burg," a blue-collar, Italian neighborhood of Trenton, New Jersey, where houses are attached, cars are American, and pictures of the pope share pride of place with pictures of hometown boxing champ Benito Ramirez, who happens to be a homicidal rapist who brutalizes and sometimes kills women. In Stephanie's opinion, toxic waste, August heat, humidity, and hydrocarbons are all part of the great adventure of living in New Jersey. In her desperation, Stephanie talks her cousin Vinnie, a bail bondsman, into giving her a job. He gives her a week to nail Joe Morelli, a former vice cop on the run from a charge of murder one. Her cut would be \$10,000.

Highly motivated and wholly ignorant of the job of bounty hunter, Stephanie scrapes together enough money for a gun and a Chevy Nova. Joe Morelli, who grew up in the Burg, charmed Stephanie out of her virginity at age sixteen. Three years later, she jumped a sidewalk to run him over. Though she keeps finding Joe, she doesn't know how to nab him. During her search for Joe, Stephanie runs into sexual predator Benito Ramirez. She fearlessly stands up to him, and he retaliates by hanging on her fire escape the mauled body of a prostitute friend of Stephanie's. There is still potent chemistry between Stephanie and Joe, and eventually they strike a bargain. He will give himself up after she helps him prove his innocence.

Evanovich's debut novel was a huge success. In the course of her writing career, Evanovich produced many novels besides the Stephanie Plum series. The number of books she has sold has amounted to well over 200 million.





\$7.2 million in funding released by Pritzker administration for new emergency vehicles in Illinois

Springfield - Illinois State Fire Illinois," said Illinois Finance Author-Marshal James A. Rivera and Illinois Finance Authority (IFA) Executive Director Chris Meister issued nearly \$7.2 million in no interest or low interest loans to emergency responders across the state. The loans are made available through the Fire Truck Revolving Loan Program and Ambulance Revolving Loan Program.

"Our emergency responders put their lives on the line every day to keep our communities safe, and they need safe and reliable vehicles to get the job done," said Governor JB Pritzker. "That's why I'm proud that my administration is ensuring that fire departments across the state can purchase the fire trucks and ambulance they need to save lives."

"Without programs such as our Fire Truck and Ambulance Revolving Loan, many departments would have to continue to repair vehicles that are not reliable anymore and never be able to afford a new fire truck or ambulance," said Illinois State Fire Marshal James A. Rivera. "The OSFM thanks Governor Pritzker for his commitment to our first responders and safety of our state's residents."

"A staffed fire truck or ambulance must be available to service time-sensitive emergencies in every community in ity Executive Director Chris Meister. "Economically beneficial loans are one path to help meet this essential need. We thank Governor Pritzker and Fire Marshal Rivera for the opportunity to help finance the vehicles needed by first responders across Illinois." The Fire Truck Revolving Loan

Program (FTRL) and Ambulance Revolving Loan Program (ARLP) are designed to assist departments or cities in purchasing emergency vehicles that they may not otherwise be able to afford. Under the FTRL program, fire departments, fire protection districts and township fire departments may apply for up to \$350,000 in low interest or no interest loans for purchase of a fire truck or brush trucks. The loans must be repaid within 20 years.

Under the ARLP program, units of local government (city, town, village, township, fire department, fire protection district) and not-for-profit ambulance service providers can apply for no interest or low interest loans of up to \$200,000. These loans must be paid back in 10 years.

Festive facts about often-misunderstood fruitcake

Certain sights and sounds are ingrained in the holiday season, from twinkling lights to carols piping over retailers' sound systems. Amid the shelves of holiday wares and delicacies, fruitcake makes its annual appearance.

Fruitcake, sometimes referred to as plum cake or Christmas cake, can be prepared in various ways. However, a dense bundt-type cake dotted with dried, candied fruit and often soaked in rum or brandy has become the standard. Loathed or loved, seldom anything in between, fruitcake is typically mocked as the ultimate regift. But just like Charlie Brown's scant Christmas tree, which was initially mocked, it's time to see fruitcake in a new light. Consider these fruitcake fun facts.

· The texture of fruitcake can vary from

cake-like to more of a sweet bread like brioche. Italians dig into panettone, Germans delight with stollen and Jamaicans serve black cake.

The first fruitcakes weren't eaten. According to historians, fruitcakes were initially made by ancient Egyptians, who tucked the desserts into the tombs with their dead so a sweet treat could be enjoyed in the afterlife.

Fruitcake gained popularity as military rations, as everyone from Roman soldiers to Crusaders found fruitcake provided a diverse array of nutrients and an energy boost in battle. Fruitcake also stores well, which can be beneficial for military personnel in battle.

Fruitcake seemingly is indestructible. While it likely cannot last forever, Tastemade says if a fruitcake is kept in an airtight container and stored in a dark, cool place, it could be reheated years after being baked. Starch crystals and dried fruit in the cake will release stored water when warmed, rehydrating the cake.

· Historical accounts indicate Romans were among the first people to eat fruitcake, which they might have enjoyed as early as 100 A.D. A version called "satura" was made by mixing stale bread with pine nuts, pomegranate seeds, raisins, and then soaking it in a barley mash and an alcoholic beverage brewed from honey.

Fruitcake became a popular dish to serve at British royals' weddings. Queen Victoria, Princess Diana and Prince William served fruitcake at their receptions.

· The Smithsonian Air and Space Museum

in Washington, D.C. has a fruitcake on display. It traveled into space on Apollo 11 in 1969, but was never eaten.

Seth Greenberg, who worked in his family's New York City bakery, attests that fruitcake is delicious when made with the right ingredients. The neon-colored, dry and overly sweet fruit that many bakers use is the problem with poor cakes. But proper ingredients like brandy, glace cherries, apricots, figs, and dates can make for a delicious fruitcake.

The average fruitcake weighs between two and three pounds. However, the heaviest fruitcake on record, according to "The Guinness Book of World Records," came in at 9,596 pounds. Despite the hefty weight of this cake, it's only around 92 to 160 calories per serving.


