Injury made Medellin think nail art was over

Winning contest dispels any doubt

MENDOTA – If you ask Blanca Medellin how her last year has been, she'll say rough.

The Mendota native's right forearm had 23 stitches applied as she went through right flexor carpi ulnaris tendon repair, right flexor digitorum profundus repair, right ulnar artery repair, and right ulnar nerve repair after glass tore into her tendon and nerves in an accident on Oct. 2, 2022.

Medellin, who is attending Nail Inn Academy in Joliet and interning at Expression Salon in Mendota, thought her days of being a nail tech were numbered.

"A year went by so fast. I thought I was never going to be able to move my hand again," Medellin said. "I didn't think I was going to be able to work on nails and that I would have to find a different career. I couldn't use my right hand at all at first. I'm still not 100-percent healed. I don't have certain muscles and my right hand is thinner, smaller than my left."

"If I want to pick up a gallon of milk, I can't. It still hurts my hand. I couldn't do everyday things like cooking or brushing my hair or my teeth. I would get frustrated and would get down on my-

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Growing monarchs

Gibson has perfected a butterfly habitat over the last six years

MENDOTA – When the clock strikes 5 p.m. on a weekday, Tammy Gibson leaves Eureka Savings Bank in Mendota.

She leaves from one set of duties she has enjoyed for the last 21 years to another line of responsibilities she has partaken over the last six years – growing monarch butterflies.

"I raise monarchs by hand from egg. The first time I saw a monarch chrysalis, I didn't know what it was, but I watched it and learned what it was," said Gibson. "When that particular butterfly was born, it was born deformed. I did a lot of research to see why that monarch would be born deformed. There are so many factors that go into creating a perfect monarch. That butterfly just happened to have OE (Ophryocystis Electroscirra), which is a parasite that infects monarchs by other monarchs."

"When I find a monarch egg, I cut the egg out and I put in on a leaf that I've washed and scrubbed, so then when a baby is born, it's on a leaf that is purely clean. I can have over 100 eggs at one time that I'm hatching. All eggs and small caterpillars are kept in my kitchen."

"Once they reach a certain size, they go out to my butterfly habitat. Each evening, I have to go out and pick fresh milkweed to feed all of the caterpillars. It's a daily chore. It's cleaning up, so I feel like a maid and a janitor because I feed caterpillars and I clean up caterpillar poop. Sometimes I'm caring for them from the time I get off of work, 5 p.m., until midnight."



The full-scale butterfly process from larvae to a ready-for-flight butterfly is approximately four weeks.

Gibson grows milkweed, the plant caterpillars consume, but she also searches ditches and waterways throughout the Mendota country for eggs, baby caterpillars, and any other finding that will help her habitat.

"I rely on farmers in the area and have worked with several of them. They let me pick milkweed from their ditches and their waterways," Gibson said. "I have to make sure the milkweed the caterpillars 'my babies' eat doesn't have chemicals. This is my sixth year doing this on a large scale. Before then I was doing one or two when I would find an egg. I've raised over 1,000 butterflies in the last six years. This year, I think, I grew and released 500 butterflies."

"When we moved to the two-acres of property that we have outside of Mendota, my partner Jack (Webb) and I decided we were going to put in pollinator gardens with trees for not just butterflies, but for bees and other insects. That got me started."

"I had caterpillars and chrysalis, and I got real interested in the problems they were having because

monarchs are close to extinction. Things just kind of blossomed. I raised my first butterflies in a mesh clothes hamper. Then I went to a small greenhouse before Jack built me my butterfly habitat."

Butterflies, like humans, have personalities and show when they're nervous.

When Gibson is in the habitat, the monarchs are content and happy, especially when she plays music.

But when someone else is on their turf, they get anxious and bounce off the walls or one tree branch to

the next. Gibson tries to keep the habitat quiet to keep the monarchs at ease.

The habitat is cleaned from floor to ceiling and wall to wall every May to begin looking for eggs and restarting the growing process.

The summer is the busiest time for monarchs.

"In the summertime, I can't take a day off because everyone has to be fed. Jack has been great," Gibson said. "He bought me a Mud Hog. It's a supped-up golf cart."

staining does occur, do not dry the affected clothing as this will "set" the stain. Clothing should be kept wet until laundry aids that can remove the staining are applied.

Fire hydrant flushing is an important part of the Mendota Water Department's maintenance program of the water distribution system. The most important aspect of this program is the assurance of properly operating fire hydrants in the event of an emergency. Unfortunately, during this necessary maintenance procedure, discolored water can occur. The Water Department

"It was a really good experience. We worked hard for this. We were able to show what we can do,"



\$10 million in grants available to strengthen mental health services in schools, agencies

CHICAGO—Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) announced the State of Illinois is accepting grant applications from schools and agencies that support child and adolescent health for a share of \$10 million in federal funding intended to strengthen mental health services for students across Illinois. The funding from the CDC's COVID-19 Public Health Workforce Supplemental Funding program is being offered to help schools and local agencies improve student care in areas such as workforce enhancements, developing frameworks to prevent adverse childhood experiences, interventions to assist children suffering from trauma, and training for medical and school staff to expand adolescent mental health resources.

"The last few years have been challenging for all of us and this is especially true for our children," Governor Pritzker said. "With these new dedicated resources, Illinois will better identify children and young adults who are suffering through mental health challenges and ensure they receive treatment and therapies that work while also addressing disparities in access to mental health treatment."

"We applaud the Biden Administration and CDC for supporting efforts to address the critical issue of children's mental health at a time when these services are needed across the nation," said IDPH Director Dr. Sameer Vohra. "Data shows that more than a third of high school students in the country reported poor mental health during the COVID-19 public health emergency. Our goal with this funding is to implement

and enhance programs in schools and community agencies that focus on addressing the mental and physical health of school age children. Every child in Illinois deserves the support necessary for long-term development and success."

The funding is authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) and the application process is being administered by IDPH's Office of Women's Health & Family Services. Following are the two program areas in which funds will be allocated:

- \$3 million for Preventing Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) Post-COVID-19: To identify mental health issues within school populations and provide education, resources, care coordination, and/or training that helps to develop frameworks to prevent adverse childhood experiences and improve mental health outcomes for children and youth in a post-pandemic world. (Up to 15 grants expected.)
- \$6.9 million for Enhancing Post-Covid Recovery Efforts for School Based Health Needs: Up to \$500,000 per school district or qualifying school affiliated organization to expand workforces, purchase mental health training materials and deploy programs

and resources to enhance student mental health. (Up to 25 grants expected.)

IDPH will be accepting applications from school districts and agencies that support adolescent mental health through September 8. Grant applications will be handled through IDPH's Electronic Grants Administration & Management System (EGRAMS) system.

The opportunity to apply for ARPA funded grants follows the state of Illinois' announcement last fall of the Illinois Pediatric Mental Health Care Access Expansion program. The \$2.5 million federally funded program is a partnership involving the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), the Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS), the Department of Human Services (DHS) plus the University of Illinois Chicago's (UIC) DocAssist Program and the Illinois Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics (ICAAP).

The program is supporting improved mental health services through a range of pediatric primary care providers, including pediatricians, family medicine physicians, nurse practitioners, and physician assistants.

State Senator Win Stoller will not seek a third term; current term ends January 2025

PEORIA – State Senator Win Stoller (R-37th District) is announcing that he has decided not to seek a third term serving as State Senator for the 37th District. He will continue serving out the rest of his term, which expires in January 2025.

"My wife, Amy, and I have decided that I will not seek reelection to a third term in the State Senate for two main reasons," said Stoller. "First, after redistricting, the map for District 37 has shifted much further north. Secondly, I believe in our nation's founder's core principle of citizen legislators where people from various backgrounds serve in the legislature for a limited time and then return home and continue with their lives. I am walking the walk on that because I never intended

to be a career politician." Stoller was first elected in 2020 and won reelection in 2022.

"During my first few months in office, I was extremely gratified to pass a significant tax cut. In fact, last year the Pass-Through Entity (PTE) tax credit that I introduced shielded over \$2 billion of small business income from federal taxation. It feels really good to make that kind of an impact in our high-tax state."

After passing his tax cut legislation, several legislative leaders said it was an epic feat for a lawmaker in the minority party, particularly a freshman. Few legislators have been able to accomplish such a positive impact for people statewide. In 2021 alone, over 48,000 small business owners qualified for the tax credit Stoller's

bill introduced.

"Senator Stoller has been a fierce advocate for the business community, passing multiple pieces of meaningful legislation during his short time in the Illinois General Assembly," said Illinois Senate Republican Leader John Curran (R-Downers Grove). "We are grateful for his impactful service to his community and our state, and I look forward to working with him throughout this next year before we wish him well in his new endeavors."

Due to Stoller's ability to work in a bipartisan way, he was able to deliver for his district. In all, Stoller passed 15 pieces of legislation, including a bill in his second term that was crucial to protect Lee County and Ogle County's \$70 million investment in their

Enterprise Zone, which had been threatened by the Democrat super majority's push to strip downstate counties of their authority.

Stoller noted that after redistricting eliminated much of the territory he represented in his first term, the bulk of the new district is much further north including all of Whiteside and Lee Counties, most of Bureau County, along with portions of DeKalb, Ogle, Rock Island and LaSalle Counties. The district was drawn by the legislative Democrats to be based further north.

"My home in Germantown Hills is at the southern tip of the new Senate District. I have been putting in a demanding schedule to serve the constituents and will continue to do so until my term ends, but the time has come to examine

whether this pace is sustainable for another four-year term and to consider what is best for the people in this district. I only know one way to do this job and that is all out, striving to serve with excellence. This district is conservative, so I have no doubt I will be able to pass it to another Republican.

"The greatest privilege I've had is the opportunity to fight for and articulate the conservative principles of limited government, personal accountability, and the importance of faith and family. If Illinois returns to and embraces these principles, I believe our best days lie ahead.

"It may sound like a cliché, but I truly am honored and humbled to have had the opportunity to serve this district. Thank you to the voters for this opportunity."

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

Are you age 70 or older and not yet receiving SS benefits?

Burn Ordinance

MENDOTA – It is unlawful to burn any materials other than small and dried quantities of branches, leaves, weeds or grass at any time. The burning of any material such as rubber, tires, leather, tar paper, old batteries or any material that emits an offensive odor when burned is unlawful within the city limits of Mendota.

Limited amounts of yard waste material may be burned provided the material is dry and does not create an offensive odor, nuisance or fire hazard due to excessive high winds. Combustible yard waste material may be kindled from 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays only. All fires must be constantly tended by a competent person, until such fire is properly extinguished. The continued smoldering of slow-burning combustible yard waste after 4 p.m. is a nuisance and anyone kindling such a fire that will emit obnoxious odors after 4 p.m. will be considered performing an unlawful act. Burning on Sunday by commercial establishments shall be considered an unlawful act.

He'll drive 90 percent of the time and we'll look for milkweed. We have a bucket of water in the back and I know how many pieces of milkweed I need each day.

"Sometimes I need up to 15 pieces. I have to make sure that it's fresh. It can't be old because my caterpillars are spoiled."

The last of the season's Gibson-grown monarchs will take flight in October.

Then she sits back and remembers why she has continued to perfect the art of monarch raising over the last six years.

"I think what makes me keep doing it is the end result when the butterfly flies away," Gibson said. "I have a cypress tree right outside of the habitat. Once the butterfly is born, it's very, very fragile. I take the butterflies and hang them in the cypress tree after they've been alive for 30 minutes to an hour. Their wings are crumpled, and they need to hang upside down as

blood from their abdomen flows through their wings.

"When you see 12-15 butterflies hanging in the tree, and you know that eventually in an hour or two they're going to fly away, it's a great moment."

For those who want to help monarchs, Gibson recommends growing flowers; not

just summer flowers but also ones that last into late summer and the fall because monarchs and other butterflies still need to eat while they're flying south.

At the same time, don't spray them with chemicals, flowers or milkweed, because there is a great possibility deformed butterflies, like the one she first saw, will be born.

self, but with help from my family I've made it through."

Since she is right-handed, everything seemed difficult.

Her parents, Nohemi and Celerino Medellin, and sisters Marion Quintana, the owner of Expressions, and Angelica helped her as much as possible.

Medellin's children, Camilo (11) and Daniel (9), played a pivotal role in their mother's recovery as they would brush her hair.

The intern, the student, and the mother went through a cast, an arm splint, removal of stitches, and months of therapy at OSF Saint Paul in Mendota before she could do things on her own.

In July she found herself doing more around the house and feeling more movement in her hand. When the accident first happened, she couldn't move her fingers as they were curled and wouldn't stretch.

She began school in August, 10 months after she thought nails were a thing of the past for her.

"I grew up practicing doing nails for my friends and my family. I knew this is what I wanted to do and the career path I wanted to follow," Medellin said. "Everything I had learned was self-taught. I just practiced a lot. I decided to go to school at the Nail Inn Academy and I'll graduate on Jan. 15. I just switched from a part-time student to a full-time student in hopes of graduating early."

Through the Nail Inn Academy and two other nail institutes in the Joliet area, the Nail Inn Academy Art Competition was announced with a deadline of Sept. 22, 2023.

The competition called for 10 nails designed to tell a story.

"When they posted that there was going to be a nail art competition, my mind was made up and I told myself, 'I'm going to do it. I'm going to go for it and see what happens,'" Medellin said. "Then they told us that the competition included three nail academies in the Joliet area. I see the work of the girls I go to school with, but I didn't know what else was going to be brought to the table, so I was nervous, excited, and hoping for the best.

"When I found out I won, it was a feeling that I hadn't felt in a long time."

Medellin defeated 17 other nail designers through three academies to prove to herself that she is still meant to be in the profession.

Not only did she enjoy working on nails again, but the story she told was of her Mexican heritage that provided pride for her and her family.

The story of her culture told by Medellin on nails included Loteria (Mexican Bingo), flowers in 3D acrylics with limestones, Frida Khalo, splash t-lavera, zarape with the famous Mexican drink cantarito, tres tacos asada

with guacamole, a sunset with a cowboy on a horse looking over a mountain top, maracas, piñata with a donkey, Mexican sweet bread, chocolate abuelita, and a night scenery with mountains and cactus.

"When the winners for first, second, and third were announced, I had a walk-in client so I couldn't see immediately when the teacher said the results were posted," Medellin said. "The girls came and hugged me, and I asked, 'Did I win?' I was really happy.

"My kids see me working on nails all the time and they tell me they look really cool. I told them if I won the contest that it was for them. They were happy, too.

"I was so emotional. It sinks in and it's just, God is good. All the praying and asking him to help me, and he did. It's been a rough year. I went through a divorce and I'm a single mother. It's been tough, but at the end of the day there has been a little light letting me know I'm going to be OK."

The paper check dinosaur

“Paper checks are dead and cash is dying.” When I read that headline in the Washington Post last week, I cringed.

According to the Post article, back in 2000, 6 out of 10 non-cash payments were made with a paper check. Today it is 1 in 20.

Or consider this: 57% of Americans haven’t written a check in the past month. None. Nada. Zero. Zip.

If check writing is going the way of the dinosaur, I must be a regular Tyrannosaurus rex. I still pay my bills by check.

I line up my bills on my desk and pay each of them with the swoop of a ballpoint pen. To me, it screams financial responsibility.

But soon those giant, oversized, foam board novelty checks will be the last remnant of what was a 20th Century fiscal icon.

I was thinking about that at a recent downtown Springfield Kiwanis meeting when a local merchant presented a grant via one of those gigantic emblems of generosity.

I found their use of this symbol curious because when I tried to make a purchase from the same store last month, they wouldn’t take my check. A clerk informed me they quit accepting customer checks two years ago.

Hmmm, they’ll give a symbolic check but not accept a real one?

I remember when merchants preferred checks. Credit card companies charge them between 1.5% and 3.5% of each transaction. More than a few times, I’ve negotiated a discount on merchandise by offering to pay with a check rather than a charge card.

Destiny Nance-Evans, a senior vice president at Security Bank in Springfield, tells me that checking accounts remain popular. But increasingly customers don’t use them to write checks.

They are using debit cards and electronic transfers to draw money from the accounts.

She said she personally prefers these types of transactions to ones involving paper checks because they are more secure. She noted every paper check has a routing number and account number printed on its bottom and if an unscrupulous individual were to get ahold of the information it could be misused.

Still, I can’t help but think something is lost as the written check goes by the wayside.

I opened my first checking account when I was 11. My dad thought it was important that his sons have experience operating their own businesses. My brother raised hogs. I raised cattle.

I purchased bull calves from dairy farmers across Knox County, took them home and raised them on a bottle. (Dairy calves are raised on formula because humans drink their mother’s milk.)

I felt like a regular Rockefeller writing a \$25 check for a Holstein calf.

My mother taught me to carefully record each transaction in my checkbook: milk replacement, feed, a pitchfork. Checks were about responsibility and accountability.

When I received a check in the mail from Bill Robinson, the farmer I eventually sold the calves off to, I felt a sense of accomplishment. Holding something tangible in my hands was a reward for hard work.

In college, my peers griped about their parents monitoring their activity by reading the cancelled checks the bank mailed home with a statement each month.

“You’re writing a lot of checks to Domino’s Pizza. Why aren’t you eating in the dorm cafeteria?” annoyed parents would exclaim.

Decades later when I wed, the checking account became a point of contention.

Spouses have to communicate with one another. And nothing requires communication more than a joint checking account.

My wife, God bless her, has a phenomenal memory and can remember all of her transactions. But somehow, she’d forget to tell me about them.

It was a recipe for checks bouncing higher than a super ball.

We experimented with separate checking accounts. But that created a mindset of: “his money” and “her money” – never a good idea. In marriage everything should be “ours.”

Eventually, we tried a joint account again and learned to communicate better. It wasn’t just good for the finances but for the marriage.

A young man I do business with needed to pay me and asked about sending me a Venmo payment. I told him I didn’t have an account. This exasperated, college-educated, 20-something then asked how he was supposed to get the money to me. I told him to mail me a check.

He had to watch a YouTube video to learn how to fill one out.


As the written check fades away, the American lexicon will be altered. Terms like: “Grip and grin,” “Rubber check,” “The check is in the mail” and “Paycheck Fridays” will slowly disappear from our language.

Future students may ponder these words of ‘60s radical Jerry Rubin:

“The individual who signs the check has the ultimate power.”

Will those future scholars ponder this statement or simply ask: “What’s a check?”

Approval for retaining walls – 1923

(The following is from Jessica Nashold’s *Backtracks & Sidetracks* column reprinted from Oct. 14, 1998.)

Seventy-five years ago the Masonic Temple was already located in the present quarters on Washington Street. Attorney C.P. Gardner and Fred Hennig appeared at a city council meeting on Oct. 1, 1923, with a major request.

Since the Mendota creek ran under the building, they wanted retaining walls built, not only under the building but also along both sides of the creek between Washington and Jefferson streets.

Before making their presentation at the council meeting, they prepared a blueprint for construction of the retaining walls. They assured council members that the width of the creek would still be sufficient to carry water downstream. They also volunteered to secure cooperation from other property owners along the creek.

This would be at no expense to the city.

Attorney Gardner had prepared an ordinance authorizing the walls. All the council had to do was pass it. Which they did.

At the same council meeting, Alderman Mahar mentioned complaints received because trees had not been trimmed on a certain block on Sixth Street. Mayor Ralph Madden explained that the city could trim trees at the lot line, but not within private property.

The job might not be as nice if owners would trim their own trees or allow the city to do so.

Alderman Wicks believed he could obtain consent from property owners to allow proper trimming. He agreed to accompany Superintendent of Streets Hoffman when the work was to be done.

It was also Alderman Mahar who thought the city was buying too many pairs of rubber boots for street employees. Street Supt. Hoffman said the city had never bought any boots for him, as he owned a pair. Also, he said he could account for every pair of boots purchased by the city since his appointment. In some situations, rubber boots were needed.

A motion was carried to purchase one pair of rubber boots for the street department and

one for the water department.

A meeting in Princeton attended by 6,000 “hard road boosters” was addressed by Gov. Len Small. He assured the crowd that he was not going to wait for another governor to complete the Cannon Ball Trail, but would do it now. With surveying and grading done at once, laying concrete could begin in the spring.

Great applause rent the air and it was several minutes before Gov. Small could continue.

He said the million-dollar bond issue to be voted on would be paid by auto license fees. The number of autos licensed in Illinois in 1911 was 38,000 and in 1917 there were 340,000 autos. Some license money was held in a special account.

If you do not vote for the bond issue, the legislature will divert the license money.

The Yellowstone Inn on the fairgrounds road was the scene of a disturbance when Miss Lulu Gordon disputed with Bethel “Home Boy” Robinson over ownership of the establishment. Miss Gordon was taken to Ottawa by Sheriff Welter and was released on a \$50 bond. The Reporter was non-committal, only commenting that the Yellowstone was noted for its chicken dinners (Other things for which the Yellowstone was notorious were not itemized.)

Since Home Boy Robinson had opened this place he seems to have done a very prosperous business.

A.W. Dunkle bought the billiard hall located north of Hotel Faber. In addition to offering billiard and card tables, he opened a barber shop where three barbers claimed “bobbing hair a specialty.”

Any lady can come in this shop, as it will be conducted in the most gentlemanly manner.

Several shoe shining chairs and a small soda fountain were installed as well.

Dr. J. Turner Hood, pastor of the Presbyterian church, accepted a call from a congregation in Cairo, Ill. Although he had been in Mendota only three years, he had managed to reorganize the Mendota Ministerial Association and introduce religious education in the schools. His final service in Mendota was a union meeting at Presbyterian in behalf of the Salvation Army. A total of \$180 was collected, including a \$60 contribution from the Ku Klux Klan.

Dr. Hood was followed by Dr. and Mrs. A.M. Eels, who had arrived from Arkansas. They were getting settled in the Presbyterian parsonage when The Reporter came out on Oct. 11, 1923.

Mendota Businessmen’s Association, headed by Frank Fritz, introduced weekly drawings for \$100 in gold. Sponsored by 35 stores, the drawings for \$50, \$25, \$15 and \$10 in gold were held Tuesday afternoons in downtown Mendota. Drawings were “by some little girl.” This business-builder had to be discontinued when merchants in surrounding towns complained.

Black Bros. Co. reported shipment of a revolving clamp machine to Paris. In an indirect reference to post-war Europe, The Reporter predicted –

Their export trade will be greatly increased as soon as foreign countries are on a better financial basis.

On Oct. 10, 1923, George E. Whitmore was appointed Acting Postmaster of the Mendota Post Office. Acting Postmaster Robert Hallenberg had resigned to become head of a newly created publicity department for Illinois Northern Utilities. Whitmore had been with the post office since graduation from Blackstone High School in 1902.

The Reporter carried a syndicated column by Arthur Brisbane in 1923. When he was asked by a reader if he could explain why prize fighting was allowed, he replied –

Easily. A big prize fight is worth two-million dollars to the promoters. That makes it respectable.

IVCC offers online software to aid students facing challenges

OGLESBY – It can be tough to focus on college classwork when you're hungry or worried about where to live or how to pay the bills. Recognizing that more students are facing those challenges, IVCC has enlisted a new technology to streamline access to resources.

With a few keystrokes and some information, students can see what benefits they're eligible for, where to find them and how to apply. The online screening software called Single Stop will assess eligibility based on the student's information and deliver a list of potential federal, state and local resources, from housing, utilities and food benefits to tax credits.

The program doesn't award benefits. Individuals still must apply to individual agencies, but IVCC can assist them through that process, too.

"Sometimes students don't even realize what benefits they might be eligible for," said Crystal Credi, Special Populations Specialist. And even when they're aware resources exist, applying can be intimidating and confusing, she added.

So, Credi is on hand to help navigate the software and as a guide to resources and a pilot through the application process. Similar benefits navigators are appearing at colleges and universities across the state thanks to a state law that took effect in January.

Single Stop's technology was another tool to make connecting to resources even easier, said President Dr. Tracy Morris. "When I heard the concept, I knew it would be life-changing for our students. As more of them face challenges and obstacles that could derail their

education, we want to be there as a support and partner to connect them with these key services so they can reach their educational goals."

The service is free to current IVCC students, GED seekers and English-language learners, who can access the Single Stop web site from home or on campus. One computer in the Eagles Peak campus food pantry is dedicated to that purpose, Credi said. Students submit income information, household occupants, marital status, and expense estimates – all of which remains confidential.

IVCC is the first college in Illinois to use the software, though it's used widely in California and some other states, Credi said.

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
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

Life insurance can be an important part of financial planning. Before you buy a policy, do your research and understand which type of life insurance is right for you.

Think life insurance is not for you? Consider these insights

(StatePoint) Life insurance can provide protection to loved ones. But experts say that common misconceptions lead many to assume this important aspect of financial planning is not right for them.

Myth: Retired people don’t need life insurance.

Reality: Life insurance is often viewed as a source of income replacement, but depending on your situation, you may still benefit from coverage even after you retire. For example, if you have debt, like a mortgage or medical bills, life insurance could help your family settle it in the event of your passing. It can also help fund final arrangements, relieving financial stress during a dif-

icult time. The average cost of a funeral with a viewing and burial was \$7,848 in 2021, making final expense insurance worth considering.

Myth: Buying life insurance is too complicated.

Reality: Approximately 106 million adults in the United States are underinsured or have no life insurance coverage. In a recent survey by an insurance distribution company, 15% of those who are uninsured cited lack of knowledge about what kind of policy to get and 12% cited lack of knowledge around how much coverage to get as the reason they’ve elected to forgo coverage.

“Unfortunately, a large portion of today’s population remains uninsured because life insurance sales models weren’t designed to serve everyone,” says Long.

Speaking to a licensed insurance agent who sells life insurance from multiple carriers can help simplify the process. An agent can ask questions to understand your needs and deliver personalized recommendations for relevant insurance products.

Myth: Life insurance is too expensive.

Reality: Life insurance may be more affordable than you think. Term life insurance could be a great option for budget-conscious consumers who need to protect their income or pay off a debt.

For example, if you have a mortgage, you might purchase a term life insurance policy for the life of the mortgage so that your spouse could stay in your home in the event of your untimely death.

Fewer home buyers highlight the need for renters insurance

(BPT) - The rental housing market in the United States has reached a 50-year peak, with more than 114 million Americans living in landlord-owned properties. Renting a house, apartment or condo means that the ownership of that property belongs to someone else - the landlord.

“A common misconception is that a landlord’s insurance policy for the property eliminates the need for renters to purchase their own insurance,” said Bonnie Lee, vice president of property claims at a leading insurance company. “In reality, your landlord’s insurance does not cover your personal belongings or any liability claims against you. While you may not be liable for repairing the rental property after a covered loss, your personal possessions may still need replacement if they are damaged or stolen.”

Renters insurance is relatively affordable. The actual cost will depend on several factors, such as the type of coverage you choose, how much coverage you buy, and the amount of your deductible, otherwise known as the amount you agree to pay before a claim is paid.

Renters insurance offers three key areas of protection:

- **Theft and vandalism:** Renters insurance protects your personal belongings, electronics, jewelry and unique collectibles against damage or theft. In these instances, your rental policy can step in, compensating for losses so that items can be repaired or replaced.

“Renters should keep an up-to-date inventory of their possessions, including



new purchases and gifts,” said Lee. “Smartphones can be a tremendous aid in this process, by simply walking around your place with the video camera on. Take photos, provide descriptions of these items including serial numbers and copies of receipts when possible. Building an inventory of what you own will prove invaluable in the unfortunate event of an unexpected loss.”

- **Natural perils:** Renters insurance covers damage to property and personal belongings due to natural events like fire, lightning, hail and sudden water overflow. If your rental becomes uninhabitable due to these occurrences, you may be eligible to receive compensation for living expenses. Note, however, that renters insurance does not cover personal property damage from floods or earthquakes. You must purchase a separate policy if you live in an area

prone to any of these types of perils.

- **Liability protection:** You may be protected financially if you cause bodily injury or property damage to others due to a covered incident - either on the rental property or elsewhere - by your renters insurance. You may be covered for legal defense costs if you are sued for injuring someone on your property, such as if a guest trips and falls while in your rental.

Renters insurance can provide peace of mind and protection against other financial losses in times of crisis.

- **Coverage while traveling:** Renters insurance not only safeguards your possessions at home but may also offer protection while you are away. If a valuable item such as your laptop was stolen from your hotel room while on vacation, your policy may cover the loss.

- **Financial protection:** An

unexpected event, like your dog biting a neighbor, may lead to a lawsuit. Renters insurance may cover damages up to your coverage limit in addition to legal bills.

- **Neighbor-related incidents:** Despite your best efforts to keep your rental property safe, the actions of your neighbors are beyond your control. For example, if your upstairs neighbor leaves the stove on, resulting in a fire that destroys your belongings, you would bear the loss without renters insurance. A rental policy can provide protection against such an unexpected incident.

“When considering rental insurance, it’s important to understand what it covers and to ask your agent about available discounts, deductibles and coverage limits,” said Lee. “It’s a small investment that gives renters an invaluable peace of mind, knowing that their treasured belongings are protected.”

Are you a Medicare rookie? Pros can help you find the right plan

(StatePoint) Roughly 4.4 million Americans will reach the age of 65 in 2024, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. While age is just a number in some respects, this particular birthday marks the time when Americans become eligible for the federal Medicare health insurance program. 1. Don’t delay. Medicare has a seven-month window around your 65th birthday called the Initial Enrollment Period. Enrolling outside this window could result in higher premiums on Medicare Part B for the rest of your life. However, if you’re still working, you may be able to keep your current plan, depending on the size of your company, and switch to Medicare without penalty when you retire. If you’re not working and you’ve already filed for Social Security, you’ll be automatically enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B when you turn 65.

2. Know what’s covered. Medicare Parts A and B are sometimes called Original Medicare and cover hospital and physician expenses. To cover things like dental, vision, hearing and pharmacy, you may opt for a Medicare Advantage plan (also known as Part C), which covers everything that Medicare does and provides additional benefits, including, in many cases, prescription drugs (also known as Part D). Assessing your budget, health needs, doctor preferences and lifestyle will be important in making the best choice for you.

3. Read the fine print. Before signing up for a particular plan, make sure that your favorite health care providers are in its network. While you may be able to go out of network for care, be prepared to pay more if you do. You’ll also want to factor in all the associated costs of a given plan, including monthly premiums, co-pays and deductibles, as well as the prices and rules around the prescription drugs you take.

4. Get help. Turn to resources and platforms that can help ensure you understand the plan you’re enrolling in. Call Medicare at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227) 24/7. TTY users can call 1-877-486-2048. Or, visit the Medicare Plan Finder website at Medicare.

gov/plan-compare. For local assistance, refer to the State Health Insurance Assistance Program at www.shiptacenter.org. You can also contact individual Medicare plans.

5. Use your benefits. For optimal health, make full use of your plan’s benefits. In particular, be sure to get the wellness checks and preventive screenings needed for your age and health status. If your plan offers extra perks, such as fitness or nutrition programs, take advantage of them.

“If you find out that the plan you signed up for last year is not the right fit, lean into the experts about what works best for you and make changes during AEP to set yourself up for a winning year,” says Johnson.

In joint effort, election authorities try to tamp down misinformation

Officials from 25 counties seek public's cooperation ahead of 2024 races

SPRINGFIELD — Six months before the next presidential primary elections in Illinois, county clerks and other local election authorities are asking for the public's help in stopping misinformation campaigns before they get started.

Officials from 25 counties scheduled a series of news conferences on Sept. 26 in Tazewell, McLean and LaSalle counties. At the Tazewell event, the election officials said accusations of vote tampering and other misinformation campaigns have proliferated in each of the last two presidential election cycles, and they fear it could get worse in 2024.

"You know us. Our kids attend the same schools," Tazewell County Clerk John Ackerman said at a news conference in Pekin. "We shop at the same supermarkets. We are actively involved in the communi-

ties we represent. You also know as election authorities we are all working together regularly for best practices and procedures."

Some of the election officials described misinformation they have encountered in recent elections, including accusations that voting machines had been rigged or that tabulation machines had been hacked, and social media rumors that certain polling places were closing early or had run out of ballots.

"So we actually have social media monitors that we hire on Election Day, and even before, and they try to watch as many as possible — you can't watch them all — and see if something comes up so we can get ahead of them, whether it's Reddit or Facebook or whatever," McLean County Clerk Kathy Michael said.

Elizabeth Gannon, executive director of the Peoria County Election Commission, noted that all voting

equipment used in Illinois is certified by both the U.S. Election Assistance Commission and the Illinois State Board of Elections.

"And all of that information is available at the State Board of Elections because you can see the tests that they run and all of the ins and outs that that equipment has been put through to show that it is counting accurately and that it can be trusted," she said.

State Board of Elections spokesperson Matt Dietrich said misinformation campaigns not only hinder election officials in performing their jobs, but they also erode public confidence in the integrity of the election system.

"Whether it's false rumors on social media about Sharpie markers, or more serious but equally untrue allegations about manipulation of voting equipment, we in the election community are working hard to debunk these attacks," he

said. "We're starting here now, well before the 2024 primary."

Ackerman said anyone who has questions or concerns about voting equipment or election procedures should simply contact their local election authority.

"We welcome your inquiries," he said. "Better yet, get involved in our processes. We all need more election judges. You're never going to hear one of us say we don't want more election judges. Get involved in the process."

Representative payees help you manage your Social Security

PERU — Some people who receive monthly Social Security benefits or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments may need help managing their money. When we receive information that indicates you need help, we'll work with you to find the most suitable representative payee to manage your benefits.

A representative payee is someone who receives your monthly benefit payment on your behalf and must use the money to pay for your current needs, including:

- Food.
- Clothing.
- Personal care items.
- Housing and utilities.
- Medical and dental expenses.
- Rehabilitation expenses (if you have a disability).

If you need help managing your benefits, tell a Social Security representative that there is someone you want to be your representative payee. Your representative payee should be someone you trust and see often, and who clearly understands your needs. Social service agencies, nursing homes, or other organizations are also qualified to be a representative payee. Ask them to contact us.

You can write to us within 60 days of being assigned a representative payee if you don't agree that you need one or if you want a different representative payee.

We also offer Advance Designation, which allows you to designate someone to be your representative payee in the future. There may come a time when you can no longer make your own financial decisions. You and your family will have peace of mind knowing that someone you trust may be appointed to manage your benefits for you.

You can submit your Advance Designation request when you apply for benefits or after you are already receiving benefits. You may do so through your personal my Social Security account at www.ssa.gov/myaccount or by calling and speaking to a Social Security representative.

Turnovers costly to Trojans in 63-6 loss

Geneseo cashes in on MHS miscues

GENESEO - When the 2023 Mendota football schedule came out and Geneseo appeared as one of the opponents, the Trojans knew it would be a monumental task to beat the Maple Leafs. Everything had to go right for Mendota to keep up with the perennial powerhouse, but nearly everything that could go wrong did go wrong for the Trojans.

Mendota committed a whopping six turnovers, all in the first half, and Geneseo turned five of them into touchdowns on its way to a 63-6 triumph over the Trojans in a non-conference contest on Oct. 6 at Geneseo.

Mendota's record fell to 1-6 overall, while the Maple Leafs won for the sixth time in seven outings, qualifying them for the post-season playoffs.

The Trojans committed three miscues in the first quarter (two fumbles, one interception) that aided Geneseo in piling up 28 points, and they gave the ball to the home team three more times (two interceptions, one fum-

ble) in the second period, as the Maple Leafs put 28 more points on the board.

Geneseo didn't need a Mendota turnover to score the first touchdown of the night just 14 seconds into the game. The Trojans kicked off to start the contest and Geneseo's Jeron Neal returned the kick 79 yards for a score. Brayden Combs booted the extra point for a quick 7-0 Maple Leaf lead.

The Trojans struck back on their opening possession for what turned out to be their lone scoring drive of the game. Starting at its own 20, Mendota quarterback Justin Randolph completed six of eight passes as the Trojans went 80 yards in eight plays, the final one being an 8-yard TD strike to Rhett Watson. Angil Serrano's PAT kick was blocked.

Geneseo actually committed the first turnover of the game when Neal fumbled on its ensuing possession and Wyatt Ossman recovered at

the Trojan 48. But the Maple Leafs got the ball right back when Zachary Montez swiped a Randolph aerial and returned it 30 yards to the Mendota 25.

Just over two minutes later, Geneseo quarterback A.J. Weller broke the goal line from 1 yard out, followed by a Combs kick for a 14-6 lead.

The Trojans' next drive stalled inside their own 30 and they were set to punt the ball away on fourth-and-six, but an offside penalty on the Maple Leafs made it fourth-and-one and the Trojans decided to send their offense back on the field. But disaster struck when Mendota fumbled on the play and Geneseo's Kaden Salisbury recovered the ball at the Mendota 31.

Two plays later, the Maple Leafs were back in the end zone on a 5-yard run by Neal. Combs drilled the extra point.

Mendota's third miscue of the opening stanza came on its next series when, after catching a pass, Braiden Freeman was hit hard and fumbled. Montez scooped it up for Geneseo and raced 45 yards to the end zone. Combs' kick was good and the Maple Leafs led 28-6 with 25 seconds left in the first quarter.

Three more Trojan turnovers allowed Geneseo to double its score in the second period. Maple Leaf defensive lineman Will Baum made a terrific play to start the frame when he batted a Randolph pass into the air and came down with an interception.

He returned it 12 yards to the Mendota 12, then on the first play, Weller hit big tight end Luke Johnsen in the back of the end zone, followed by a Combs PAT kick to put Geneseo up 35-6.

The Maple Leafs tacked on three more touchdowns before the half. After Mendota turned the ball over on downs at its own 34, Weller connected with Caine Craterfield on a 21-yard TD strike at the 8:42 mark. Combs split the uprights on the extra point.

Mendota punted the ball back to Geneseo on its next series, and the Maple Leafs scored in one play - a 62-yard run by Neal. Carter Holke added the extra point.

Geneseo made it 56-6, when after Salisbury pounced on a Mendota fumble at the Trojan 28, the Maple Leafs got a 17-yard TD run by Weller and another Holke kick to complete the first-half scoring.

Freeman intercepted a Geneseo pass and Montez did likewise for the Maple Leafs as the half ended.

With a running clock in the second half, only one touchdown was scored, that being a 23-yard run by Geneseo back-up quarterback Jackson McAvoy midway through the third quarter. Holke added the extra-point kick.

The Trojans ended the night with 176 total yards compared to 379 for Geneseo. Randolph completed 16 passes for 172 yards, with Freeman making five catches, and Watson, Ossman and Keegan Beetz snatching three apiece.
