Gov. Pritzker vetoes bill that would have allowed new nuclear construction

SPRINGFIELD-Gov. JB Pritzker on Aug. 11 vetoed a bill that would have lifted a 1980s moratorium on the construction of new nuclear reactors.

The measure passed in May with three-fifths majorities in both legislative chambers, meaning that if all



of the members that voted for it also support an override of the governor's veto, it still could become law. Its Senate sponsor, state Sen. Sue Rezin, R-Morris, said she has already filed paperwork to bring the bill up in the legislature's fall veto session scheduled for late October and early

The governor said in a message to lawmakers explaining his veto that he did it "at the request of the leadership team of the Speaker of the House and advocates."

While Pritzker said he saw "real potential" in small modular reactors, or SMRs - a type of "advanced" nuclear reactor that proponents tout as a path forward for the industry – he also said he doesn't think the legislation goes far enough in regulating the nascent technology.

"This bill provides no regulatory protections for the health and safety of Illinois residents who would live

Report: More Illinois schools are fully funded than ever before

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) issued the fiscal year 2024 Evidence-Based Funding (EBF) allocations, announcing an unprecedented number of fully funded districts. There are also zero aistricts under the 60% funding adequacy benchmark for the first time in Illinois history

FY 2024 marks a historic number of fully funded districts. Only 146 districts were at or above 100% funding adequacy in the first year of EBF in FY 2018; that number has increased by 59% with 232 districts now fully funded in FY 2024. An additional 94 districts have met the 90% funding threshold.


"Equity is how we move the needle forward in Illinois, and equity has always been at the center of the Evidence-Based Funding formula. I was proud to be at the forefront of the fight to implement EBF and am thrilled to see the compounding positive impact this approach continues to make in districts in every corner of the state," said

State Superintendent Dr. Tony Sanders. "Thank you to Governor Pritzker and the General Assembly for their commitment year-over-year to steady increases in equitable education funding. We are making sure a student's ZIP code does not determine their access to a well-rounded, quality education and that every child has the supports

they deserve." EBF sends more resources to Illinois' most under-resourced students. The formula compares the funding a district currently has to the amount it needs to provide a safe, rigorous, and well-rounded learning



student population. This ratio, called a district's Percentage of Adequacy, quantifies in universal and equitable terms a district's financial need and has allowed ISBE to distribute both EBF and other state grants more equitably to the districts in the greatest need.

Seven years of investments in EBF have raised the funding floor. The lowest Percentage of Adequacy for any district in the state in FY 2018 was 46%, which meant that district had less than half of the funds it needed to serve its students. Today, the lowest Percentage


of Adequacy is 62%. The number of district's severely underfunded — at or below 60% — has dropped from 168 in FY 2018 to now zero.

The General Assembly has appropriated an additional \$350 million for EBF in FY 2024. Every district will receive at least the funding it received last year through the formula's hold harmless provision, called the Base Funding Minimum. The formula will distribute an additional \$300 million equitably based on each district's Percentage of Adequacy through the

Garcia, born and raised in Mendota, graduated from Mendota High School this May.

As a Trojan, Garcia played volleyball, basketball, and soccer for four

years, was a member of Student Council for three years, Spanish Club for three years, Interact Club as a senior, helped every year during freshman orientation, and was named last year's Cinco de Mayo Queen.

Now she is off to play National Junior College Athletic Association Division II soccer at Rock Valley College in Rockford.

She plans on studying law with a specialization in immigration at Rock Valley before transferring to Western Illinois University to study criminal justice and enter law school.

But before she takes off for her next adventure, she wanted to experience the pageant.

"The Mendota Sweet Corn Festival Pageant has always been a main highlight of this weekend," Garcia said. "Even when I was younger, we would always say, 'I can't wait for Sweet Corn Fest. I can't wait to do this, this, and this.' I would literally always plan the weekend with my friends.


"As I've grown up,



SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) is reminding the public to be aware of the potential for exposure to rabies from infected animals. Bats are the most common source of potential infection in Illinois, and exposures from bats tend to be more frequent during the summer months, especially July and August. The disease can also be found in other wild animals, including raccoons, skunks, foxes, and coyotes.

So far this year, 27 rabid bats have

been found in 14 Illinois counties. There have been five rabid bats each in Kankakee and Lake counties, four in Cook County, and three in McHenry County. Rabies has also been found in bats in Bureau, Clark, DeKalb, Macon, McLean, Peoria, Rock Island, Sangamon, Wayne, and Will counties. "Rabies is a fatal but preventable

disease," said IDPH Director Dr. Sameer Vohra. "It is important that Illinois residents know how to prevent rabies exposure to protect themselves and their loved ones. Rabies can be prevented in a number of ways including vaccinating pets, being cautious around wildlife, and seeking medical care immediately after a potential exposure. If exposed, please seek medical attention immediately."

Rabies is a deadly virus that affects the brain and nervous system. People can get rabies from being bitten by an infected animal. Rabies can also be contracted when saliva from a rabid animal comes into contact with a person's eyes, nose, mouth, or an open wound. If someone wakes up to find a bat in the room, that is also considered an exposure even if they cannot identify a bite.

A bat's teeth are small, so someone who has been bitten by a bat may not

know it, or may be unable to communicate it (for example, very small children). That's why it's important that if you discover a bat in your home, you should avoid killing or releasing it; instead, immediately consult with your local animal control or your local health department to determine appropriate next steps. If you have been exposed to rabies, preventive treatment, known as PEP, is necessary. But if the bat or wild animal can be safely captured and tested, and the test comes back negative, no preventive medication is required.

If you have been bitten by any wild

animal, seek immediate medical attention. Animal bites may also become infected with bacteria. Rabies preventive treatment, if needed, must begin within a few days of the exposure.

A bat that is active during the day, found on the ground, or is unable to fly is more likely than others to be rabid. Such bats are often easily approached but should never be handled.

"It's also recommended to take steps to protect your pets against exposure to rabies," said Dr. Mark Ernst, Illinois State Veterinarian. "Illinois law requires that all dogs and cats 16 weeks of age and older be vaccinated for rabies and registered with their county. If an animal bites a person or your pet is bitten by another animal, the local animal control must be contacted for quarantine information."

• Do not touch, feed, or uninten-

tionally attract wild animals with open

garbage cans or litter.

- Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your home. Do not try to nurse sick wild animals to health. Call animal control or an animal rescue agency for assistance.
 Teach children never to handle
- unfamiliar animals, wild or domestic, even if they appear friendly. "Love your own, leave other animals alone" is a good principle for children to learn to reduce the risk of exposures to rabid animals.

 Maintain homes and other buildings

so bats cannot get inside. If a bat is in your home, do not release the bat outdoors until after speaking with animal control or public health officials.

• After consulting with animal con-

trol or public health officials, the bat may need to be captured for rabies testing to determine if you need preventive treatment or if your pet may have been exposed.

Steps you can take to capture the bat

if animal control is not available:

• When the bat lands, approach it

- slowly, while wearing thick gloves, and place a box or coffee can over it.

 Slide a piece of cardboard under the container to trap the bat inside.
- Tape the cardboard to the container securely, and punch small holes in the
- cardboard, allowing the bat to breathe and call animal control

 Do not come into physical contact with a bot
- with a bat.
- If the bat is dead, put it in a plastic container and keep it cool while waiting for animal control to pick it up.

MENDOTA – The Mendota Police Department urges motorists to pay attention, be alert for bikes and share the road. MPD urges bicyclists to be predictable and observe traffic laws. Your actions affect public opinion.

Illinois Bicycle Laws

Traffic laws apply to persons riding bicycles. Bicyclists riding on a highway are granted all of the rights and are subject to all of the duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle, with few exceptions.

Lane Positioning – When riding on roadways and bicycle paths at less than normal traffic speed, ride

as close as practicable and safe to the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway, except, when overtaking and passing another bicycle or vehicle proceeding in the same direction, or, when preparing for a left turn, or, when reasonably necessary to avoid fixed or moving objects, parked or moving vehicles, bicycles, motorized pedal cycles, pedestrians, animals and surface hazards.

Lights on Bicycles – For

night riding, a front lamp with a white light visible from at least 500 feet to the front and a red reflector on the rear visible from 100 feet to 600 feet are required. A rear light visible from 500 feet may be used in addition to the red reflector.

Two or More on a Bike

- Bicycles shall not be used to carry more persons at one time than the number for which it is designed and equipped, except that an adult rider may carry a child securely attached to his person in a backpack device or sling.

Parental Responsibility – The parent of any child and the guardian of any ward shall not authorize the child or ward to violate any of the provision of this code.

The Mendota Police Department encourages bicyclists to wear a helmet for protection against head injuries.







and work around these new reactors," Pritzker wrote. "My hope is that future legislation in Illinois regarding SMRs would address this regulation gap." The governor also cited

an "overly broad definition of advanced reactor" in the bill that he said could "open the door to proliferation" of large-scale nuclear power plants, like the reactors at the state's six existing generating stations.

Pritzker said these traditional reactors are "so costly to build that they will cause exorbitant ratepayer-funded bailouts.'

The bill would have allowed for the construction of reactors that meet the federal government's definition of "advanced reactor," which require that fission reactors have "significant improvements" to things such as safety features and waste yields.

Rezin, in a phone interview with Capitol News Illinois, said Pritzker's characterization of the bill allowing construction of traditional reactors is "just not true."

"This is a pattern of a governor that is bending to special interests," Rezin said.

Rezin also noted the limitation in the bill to only apply to advanced reactors came out of bipartisan negotiations.

"Advanced nuclear reactors would help supplement the flaws that wind and solar unfortunately have by providing reliable power 24/7, because wind and solar alone don't have the infrastructure or technology to provide our state with the reliable, affordable and efficient energy it needs," Rezin said in a news release.

Rezin's claims about advanced nuclear reactors are contentious, particularly among some environmental advocates that have been leading voices in the push for carbon-free energy in Illinois.

Last week, a pair of influential advocacy groups sent a letter to Pritzker asking him to veto the bill. The Sierra Club Illinois Chapter and the Illinois Environmental Council's joint letter outlined several concerns, including waste disposal, costs and a lack of up-to-date regulation.

"Nuclear power comes with significant safety risks and results in highly hazardous wastes that threaten our drinking water, with no safe, permanent waste solution in sight," IEC Executive Director Jen Walling said. "Rather than abandon all safeguards, Gov. Pritzker recognized that such substantial risks merit

Waste was the central concern of the original moratorium, which will end when the head of the state's Environmental Protection Agency finds the federal government has "identified and approved" a method for the disposal of high-level nuclear waste, a responsibility the federal government has failed to successfully act on.

the highest protective guard-

rails our state can offer."

Currently, nuclear waste is stored on-site at the plant that produced it. But in the 1970s and 80s, a facility outside of Morris, became home to waste from California, Minnesota, Nebraska and Connecticut, making Grundy County the nation's only de facto high-level storage site. Rezin defended her pro-

posal on the subject of waste as well, pointing out in an interview that companies building nuclear reactors must submit plans for waste management when they apply for permits. "This is a very heavily reg-

ulated industry by the federal government," Rezin said.

Beyond waste, environmental advocates also say that focusing on nuclear power diverts attention and resources away from the development of wind, solar and battery storage technology.

"SB76 would have opened the door to increased risk, negative environmental impacts, and higher costs for consumers while jeopardizing our progress toward Illinois' clean energy future," Sierra Club Illinois Director Jack Darin said.

The nuclear moratorium does not affect research reactors, like the one under development at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. In addition to this bill,

the governor also vetoed a measure that would have required the state to implement a contract to provide religious dietary options in schools, which Pritzker rejected because food service contracts are a district-level responsibility. Pritzker also used his amendatory veto powers to modify two bills that have to do with property taxes and government procurement.

Tier Funding portion of the formula. Districts with the highest property tax rates will also be eligible for nearly \$50 million in Property Tax Relief Grants.

Thanks to steady increases in EBF, education funding has increased from \$5.9 billion in FY 2017 to \$8.28 billion in FY 2024.

State law requires districts annually to complete an EBF Spending Plan, indicating how it plans to use its Tier Funding and its funds earmarked for English learners, special education students, and low-income students. These plans will be public as part of the school district budget

template for the first time in FY 2024, providing Illinois education stakeholders with a new level of transparency into how EBF benefits their local students and communities.

The YMCA comes to Mendota – 1896

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Aug. 14, 1996.)

A hundred years ago, Mendota was whipping up enthusiasm for a "permanent organization" of the Young Men's Christian Association here. The first steps were taken in August 1896. The constitution and bylaws of the state YMCA were read and adopted. A board was elected with three degrees of tenure. Board members to serve one year

were J.H. Dix, E.J. Staten, C.J. Franks and Fulton Gifford. Two-year members were G.V. Clum. Samuel Nauman, T.G. Herbert and Albert Otterbach. Elected to serve three years were Dr. E.P. Cook, C.L. Hawley, George S. Denison and

The board met at once and elected officers - C.T. Franks, president; George Denison, vice president; Harry H. Henry, recording secretary; and Fulton Gifford, treasurer. There was a membership of 160.

The first item on the YMCA agenda was to decide on suitable quarters and have them "fitted up."

The Sun immediately suggested that a few public spirited Mendotans put up a new building for the Y.

For less than \$3,000, a magnificent club house could be built.

Members were prepared to pay \$150 to \$200 per year for rent. There was also the sum of \$2,000 still drawing interest in a disbanded Universalist church account, which might be made available to a YMCA. It was thought a stock company might be formed "for stability."

However, none of these suggestions got off the ground. The YMCA's first rooms were above the Dix clothing store in a building owned by Fred Cavell, one door east of his meat market. This was on the south side of Washington Street.

There was a reading room, a game room and also gymnasium equipment. The formal opening was on Oct. 25, 1896. For the first few years the Y sponsored athletic events and was a popular gathering place, but gradually membership dwindled. Headquarters were moved to rooms above the Herbert meat market on the north side of Washington Street in 1906 and in November 1907, the Mendota YMCA disbanded.

Backtracks Sidetracks

At the fair in 1896, races were a major attraction. A new pacing record for the Mendota track was set when Sir Edwin Arnold, with a time of 2:13.5 bested Dyersburg's record at the Mendota track of 2:14.25 the previous year. Owners of these two horses were rival businessmen in Paducah, Ky.

Many of the races were "close and exciting"-in one heat, so much so that-The audience disagreed with

the judges and howled their disapproval when the decision was announced. Receipts at the 1896 fair were \$4,500

of which \$3,300 was paid out in purses for the races. After other expenses, a net of \$300 to \$400 was anticipated. Certainly a very good showing

for a hard times year.

Speaking of hard times, corn was bringing only 19 cents a bushel in Mendota, and -

But for the fact that two dealers are having their commission waived in Chicago, it would bring less.

The Advent Christian Association was holding its annual camp meeting on the Adventist college campus in Mendota in August 1896. People living near the camp grounds were urged to cut the weeds in the vicinity. There is nothing will leave so

bad an impression on visitors as to have the streets run over with weeds.

A heat wave in Mendota and elsewhere was described as the most severe in 20 years. In Chicago, figures were published showing 658 deaths in the period from Aug. 2-9, 1896.

Many dropped dead on the street, or were found dead in their beds.

In trying to escape the heat at night, "more than the usual number rolled from roof tops or fell from balconies and fire escapes."

Mendota's sewer system was under construction and contractors Mahoney & Stenger advertised that 100 men were needed on the job. No salary was quoted. The firm of Schaller & Goebel was

starting work on expansion of its build-

ing at the corner of Washington Street and Eighth Avenue. A second story was being added and provision was being made for "a commodious repertory" in front where "there fine work can be shown to advantage." Republicans met at city hall to

organize a Republican Club. George Tower was president, J.G. Reul and Dr. M. Wilson, vice presidents; Theodore Fischer, secretary; and R.N. Crawford, treasurer.

A former Mendotan, Miss Lottie Hicks, an employee of the Chicago post office, won third prize in a contest for "most popular working girl." It was conducted by the Chicago Chronicle. The prize was a trip to Denver and other Colorado resorts.

The fear factor of Donald Trump

Donald Trump has gotten indicted yet again, and, as usual, most of the other Republican candidates have been sympathetic, if not outright deferential, to him.

It's another episode that raises the question: Can someone who is afraid of Trump defeat him?

Of all the advantages that Trump has in the competition for the 2024 Republican nomination -- immediate past president, ability to generate enormous media attention, etc. -- perhaps foremost among them is the fact that the other Republican candidates are afraid. It's hard to think of anyone who has ever won a major-party

nomination while showing fear, especially of someone else A successful candidate might be careful around certain

issues or constituencies, or back off of an unpopular position. But being clearly scared by an opponent is something else, entirely. George W. Bush and John McCain might have hated or disdained each other in 2000, same with McCain and Mitt Romney in 2008, or Romney and Newt Gingrich in 2012. But no one was ever clearly, demonstrably afraid.

When asked about Trump, most of the candidates might

not actually lick their lips, or swallow hard or begin to blink faster, but you wouldn't be surprised if they did. Generally, they'll evade questions, reject the premise or revert to an answer that has been as carefully crafted as an official statement by one of the parties negotiating the Paris Peace Accords. You can almost see them thinking:

Maybe he'll leave me alone. Maybe he'll make me his veep.

Maybe there will be a better time to attack him later.

If they can help it, his opponents will never say Trump's name -- he's the most unnamed major politician in American history. Mike Pence has tended to call him "my former running mate."

This means that Donald Trump's political dominance of the rest of the field extends to a kind of personal and psychological dominance.

A key aspect of the Trump phenomenon from the beginning has been how he's brought the subrational element of politics that's always been there, but usually relatively submerged, to the fore -- more Frans de Waal, author of "Chimpanzee Politics," than Richard Hofstadter; more Dana White than Lee Atwater.

This raises the possibility that not taking Trump head-on means more than simply missing the opportunity to make the case against him. It also means implicitly acknowledging his status as the Big Man of Republican politics, and the rival's status as a subordinate player in the world Trump created and rules.

The only one who's really not playing this game is Chris Christie, who gives as good as he gets and also needles Trump and initiates fights against him. If Christie can achieve a breakout in New Hampshire, it will be based, in part, on winning points on strength and courage while doing and saying what no one else dares. (Also-rans Will Hurd and Asa Hutchinson criticize Trump, too, but more politely and conventionally.) All that said, the other candidates are reacting to a genuine

conundrum -- Republican voters might be open to an alternative to Trump in theory, but they don't want anyone to criticize him. How to square that circle is the biggest challenge for the rest of the field, at least those members of it genuinely running to win. To be fair, Governor Ron DeSantis, as Trump's main target,

has been willing to push back as necessary, and he makes a constant, implicit critique of Trump's electoral prospects and governing abilities. But the Florida governor is always careful to stay on the right side of the line, biding his time for later or hoping that his message catches on without having to grasp the nettle. This isn't unreasonable, but, again, it exposes a disparity -- he has a strategy, while Trump has a sledgehammer.

So long as everyone believes that Trump has one and they don't -- and acts accordingly -- the fear factor will continue to work in Trump's favor.



City Ordinance

Animals-Pet Waste Ordinance

• The purpose of this section is to establish requirements for the proper disposal of pet solid waste in the City of Mendota so as to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to prescribe penalties for failure to comply.

• Requirement for disposal.

All pet owners and keepers are required to immediately and properly dispose of their pet's solid waste deposited on any property, public or private, not owned or possessed by that person.

• Exemptions. Any owner or keeper who requires the use of a disability assistance animal shall be exempt from the provisions of this section while such animal is being used for that purpose.

• Violations and penalties. Any person(s) who is found to have violated the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of no less than \$25 and no more than \$75.



MENDOTA – A trial date has been set for a Mendota man who entered not guilty pleas to his charges during an appearance in LaSalle County Circuit Court on Aug. 11.

Brett W. Merritt, 54, of 803 14th Ave., will go to trial on Monday, Oct. 16 after being charged with two counts of aggravated criminal sexual abuse, a Class 2 felony, and two counts of child pornography, a Class 3 felony.

The aggravated criminal sexual abuse charges brought

The aggravated criminal sexual abuse charges, brought about on Aug. 1, are for alleged contact with a teenager between 13 and 17 years of age at the time of the offenses. The two offenses were alleged to have occurred in 2017 and 2018, but the criminal information filed in LaSalle County Circuit Court states that Merritt is subject to an extended statute of limitations because of the alleged victim's age and the alleged nature of the contact.

The initial charge against Merritt that occurred on July 11 was for the offense of possession of child pornography, following the execution of two LaSalle County search warrants in Mendota, one being the home of Merritt and the other being his place of business at 800 Monroe St. His arrest by Mendota Police followed a six-month investigation into multiple and various crimes.

Before the trial begins, Chief Judge H. Chris Ryan Jr. ordered Merritt to appear in court for a motions hearing on Thursday, Oct. 5.

The aggravated criminal sexual abuse charge carries a possible prison sentence of three to seven years and the child pornography charge carries a two- to five-year sentence.

box office. "Barbie" recouped more than twice of its cost in the first three days of its release



"Barbie" definitely has legs! Created in 1959 by Ruth Handler, Barbie thrived for 50 years as many little girls? favorite doll. In 2009, her parent company, Mattel, signed a deal with Universal Pictures to produce a film, but they failed to come up with a screenplay. In 2014, Sony Pictures tried and also failed to come up with a script. In 2016, comedienne Amy Schumer was cast as Barbie, but dropped out a year later because what she described as "scheduling conflicts." (Or was it no workable script?)

Two years later, Margot Robbie persuaded Warner Brothers to bring Barbie to big screens. Finally, in 2021, Oscar-nominated screenwriter Greta Gerwig, who








Create great relationships in your everyday life

Do you get along well with people? It's an important question because, let's face it, people are everywhere. People are in your family...on your job...in your neighborhood. You can't get away from them!

And the people in your life are not always the way you would like them to be.

Your ability to get along with people greatly impacts the quality of your life. That's why it's important to know how to relate to all kinds of people—not just the ones who are like you.

Personally, I have had to learn how to work with all kinds of people because I literally have hundreds of people working for me. When you are in that situation, you learn that you have to talk to some differently than others. You have to understand them in different ways. You can't expect the exact same thing out of every single person.

I've also learned that people respond to correction or constructive criticism in different ways. Some need a little more attention than others. Some

need you to pat them on the back at least twice a month or else they feel rejected...while others are fine if you don't pay any attention to them.

Here's a common reason why our relationships get messed up: We all have a tendency to try to give other people what we need, instead of giving them what they need.

What "Makes Them Tick"?

One of the biggest mistakes we make in relationships is not studying people to discover their individual needs. If you will closely observe people, they'll let you know what "makes them tick."

Many people are stuck in self-centered mindsets. For example, some opinionated people don't understand that everybody doesn't want their opinion.

Maybe someone who thinks they're always right doesn't "get it" that somebody else would like to be right once in a while. Maybe somebody who is a big talker doesn't understand that other people would like to talk occasionally.

To have better relationships, start thinking more about others and noticing their needs. For instance, if I want to be a good wife and a blessing to my husband, Dave, then it requires me to pay attention to what he likes. I need to stop and listen when he talks about his dreams, preferences, and



things he likes to do.

And then—and this is the important part—I need to follow through with what I find out!

Taking Practical Steps

This is where your love walk comes into play. Are you including others in your daily thoughts and actions? As I mentioned, walking in love includes drawing out information about others...not just getting people in a corner and talking their head off. Because real relationships work both ways—there's give and take for each person involved.

I am so hungry to see people who are enthusiastic about walking in love—people who want to do what Jesus did. Acts 10:38 (AMP) says that "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with great power; and He went around doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, because God was with Him."

It's really simple when you think about it. Here's a personal example: "Doing good" for my husband can be something as simple as talking to him about golf—a game he loves!—and truly

listening while he's sharing his thoughts with me.
There are so many ways

we can do good. A common one is our attitude and behavior when we are out in public. How do you treat the server when you eat at a restaurant or the clerk who is checking you out at the grocery store? Are you rude? Or do you take the time to consider how demanding their job is?

Instead of complaining, give them a kind word. Take interest in them, and when you're being waited on, give the person a generous tip.

That's what people who walk in love do, because they know that's God's way.

We have to be intentional about focusing on others and doing what we can to meet their needs or make their lives better. When we do, the blessings of God will chase us down and overtake us.

God wants to help you be enthusiastic about loving other people every single day of your life as you do kind and caring things for them. The truth is if you will simply take the time to start studying other people, notice what their needs are, and then put

that knowledge into action through your love walk, it will dramatically improve your relationships in every area of your life!
