

Something for everyone at the 2023 Amboy Depot Days

AMBOY — The 2023 Annual Amboy Depot Days offers something for everyone. This year's festival runs Aug. 24-27.

The annual festival kicks off on Thursday night in downtown Amboy with the opening of the food stand and carnival. Thursday night is family night and arm bands are \$30 for unlimited rides for this special night. The Depot Days Little Dancers will take the Main Stage at 6:30 p.m. The Miss Amboy and Little Miss Amboy pageant will begin at 7 p.m. with the crowing of the new Miss Amboy at 8:30 p.m.

On Friday at 8 a.m., the community wide garage sales and the vendor booths downtown open for business. The food stands open at 10 a.m. and the carnival will open at 6 p.m. The carnival

special for Friday night is \$30 bands for unlimited rides. The free concert on the Main Stage is Snapshot. sponsored by Shell Oil, from 7 - 9 p.m. The Knights of Columbus is again hosting a beer garden, where Class Trip will be performing from 9 p.m. - 1 a.m.

Saturday morning kicks off bright and early at 8 a.m., when the annual Ambov Education Foundation Sylvan Shuffle Adult 5K Run/Walk begins. The Amboy Farm Tractor Show and Semi Big Rig Show will be held in downtown Amboy from 8 a.m. - 1 p.m. Also open in downtown Amboy at 8 a.m. will be the vendor booths. The community wide garage sales will open at 8 a.m. The food stands open at 11 a.m. and the KC Beer Garden opens at 11 a.m.

Kids will have a chance to meet and greet LOL Doll and Mario Luigi at the Pankhurst Memorial Library from 11 a.m. – 1 p.m. Wrestling mats will be rolled out at approximately 11 a.m. for the first ever Meet in the Streets Old-Timers Tournament as Amboy High School wrestling coach Brent Montavan is hosting a tournament for wrestlers 21-over who are not currently wrestling in college.

The carnival opens at noon on Saturday and from noon to 3 p.m., they will offer an arm band special of \$30 for unlimited rides. A dinosaur show will be held on the Main Stage in the Depot Museum parking lot from at 1 p.m. Whimsey Face Painting will be on hand in the Depot Parking lot decorating faces for free from 2-4 p.m.

The annual Amboy Lions Depot Days parade will step off at 3 p.m. on Saturday.

The annual Teen Turf Donkey Drop will be held at 5 p.m., near Amboy Sporting Goods.

Journey Tribute Band will take the Main Stage for a free concert from 7-9 p.m., sponsored by KSB Hospital. The final act of the evening is live music of Kirkland in

the KC Beer Garden from 9 p.m. - 1 a.m.

Sunday morning begins at 6 a.m. with the opening of registration for the 32nd annual Depot Days Car, Truck and Motorcycle Show.

The Knights of Columbus will be hosting a pancake breakfast from 6:30 -10 a.m., at the beer garden.

At 8 a.m., the downtown vendors and community wide garage sales open for

business. The food stands open at 11 a.m.

Judging for the annual car show begins at 11:30

At noon, the KC Beer Garden opens and the carnival will offer an arm band special of \$30 for unlimited rides from noon to 4 p.m.

The Depot Days car show awards will be presented at 3 p.m., followed by the 50/50 raffle winner drawn.

Wittenauer, King take over 50/50 drawing; Jeff and Stacie Gerdes step down

AMBOY – Since the first Depot Days Car Show and the 50/50 drawing in 1991, it has been synonymous with the name Gerdes.

Jeff and Stacie Gerdes were involved since Day 1 and have earned names such as 50/50 director, 50/50 Committee Chairperson, and the 50/50 messiahs.

For the last few years, the Gerdeses have tried to hand the reins to someone new and take a step back. However, they haven't been able to find

Until now as Sandy Wittenauer raised her hand to be the next 50/50 caretaker.

"I thought, 'How hard could this be?' Most of the people who go to the car show meetings are involved in the cars, the parade, and all the other facets of Depot Days," said Wittenauer, who goes by the nickname "City Girl" as she was born in Chicago, raised in Brookfield and has lived in Amboy with her husband, Roger Wittenauer, for the last 10 years. "So, I threw my hand up. But, I'm a one-woman show, it won't be a husband and wife collective because my husband isn't available to help because he is a high

school football referee.

"I said, 'If you think one person can do it, I'll find myself a right-hand man and let's see if it will work'."

Wittenauer's right-hand man is Robert King.

Both Wittenauer and King, the two-person Car Show 50/50 Committee, are both retired and thought this was a great way to help the community.

Knowing she wanted to do the best job she could, Wittenauer shadowed the Gerdes couple last spring and watched their every move during the planning, pre-Depot Days, during Depot Days, and post-Depot Days.

"I paid attention to everything they were doing because someday they're not going to be doing it anymore," said Wittenauer, who retired 11-years ago after being an accountant for a retirement home in Brookfield and then working for the Lisle Library District for 33 years. "I am so grateful that Jeff and Stacie are around for all of my questions, starting this past spring, to make sure I'm doing things in the right order, so they're done by August. There is a schedule most people don't know about. You don't just

pop in a trailer the day before Depot Days. A lot happens before then. I could call Jeff and Stacie.

"There haven't been any nerves because I'm not involved. I can't buy a ticket. That would be ethically wrong for me to buy a ticket. You're not actually looking at a pile of money sitting on a table. You make regular deposits at the bank.

"The pot does build up and an excitement level is

going to come when you give the big check to the winner. That is the cherry on top. Giving the big check to the winner is what you work so hard for. Also, the four prizes of \$2,500 each. Those are nothing to sneeze at and are very generous."

For Jeff Gerdes, the transition is, well, different.

Jeff and Stacie were the go-to 50/50 figures, although they had help from many other volunteers, from 1991

to 2022 with only one August off, 2020 because of COVID-19.

"It's bittersweet to a certain point. My wife Stacie and I have been running the Depot Days Car Show 50/50 since Day 1," said Gerdes, who will stay involved with the car show. "It's bittersweet, but it's time to pass it along to someone with new enthusiasm, new energy, and is willing to take it over and wants to do a good job.

"After years of searching, someone finally said, 'Yeah, I can do it'. It was kind of a shock. I initially thought, 'I have someone who says they can do it, but can they actually do it'. Sandy is a great lady. She is very organized, jumped in with both feet, and she's doing great.

"There were nerves at the start on our side, but the nerves are gone now."

Gerdes remembers the beginning very vividly.

The first winner of the 50/50 took home a whopping \$750. At that point Jeff and Stacie did not think it would reach the levels it has.

Winnings have been in the \$100,00 range for most of the 21^{st} century as the 50/50has brought in \$2.4 million from 2001-2022 and has paid out \$1.2 million.

Last year's winner taking home \$99,430 and the 2015 chosen ticket holder claimed the 50/50's largest pot, \$149, 333.

"A couple of friends of mine and I were walking around begging people to buy tickets. Boy, it grew and grew," Jeff Gerdes said "Once we got past 2012. the 50/50 has had a mind of its own. People wanted tickets. We didn't have to ask anymore; people were asking us. It's good money People think they have a better chance of winning our money than the lottery. so why not?"

"The original idea was to help the Depot Museum with their expenses We did that and the 50/50 kept growing and growing Eventually, it got to the point where we could help out the Depot financially and help other people That was the premise of the whole thing. Now, we help many organizations every year."

Wittenauer said cutting a check for nonprofit organizations is her favorite part of her new role.

With the help of Jeff and Stacie Gerdes she is learning and becoming comfortable with all of her duties.







Everything new Miss Amboy has new director, new strategy, new numbers

AMBOY – When Ashley Grim was named first runner-up Miss Congeniality in the 2010 Miss Amboy pageant, she didn't think she would ever be the director.

Fast forward 13 years and here we are, Grim is the new director and she has immediately made executive decisions and taken action to boost Miss Amboy.

"Back in 2010, I ran for Miss Amboy. I've always had a passion for the contest that is important for every girl," said Grim, who is married to Alex Grim with three children. "When Emily Leffelman was stepping down, I decided it was time to see if I could take over the pageant.

"I asked her if I could do it. She said there were a few other women who were interested in being the director. She chose me and now I'm doing everything I can to turn the pageant around."

Grim, born and raised in Amboy and a 2013 Amboy High School graduate, started recruiting high school-aged contestants at the end of the 2022-23 school year as she wanted to get a jump on the 2023 pageant.

The new strategy worked well as there are 31 participants combined through the ranks, Little Miss, Little Mister, Junior Miss, and Miss Amboy.

There are eight girls vying for Miss Amboy, which is six more than last August.

"Last year there was only two girls in Miss Amboy. One was an incoming freshman and the other was an eighth grader," Grim said. "I closed the age to only allow high school students to do it because I feel there is a maturity level from junior high to high school. That one year makes a difference. I want the girls to be mature, be good representatives of Amboy, and I want them to take this role seriously because you are the face of Amboy for the next year.

"I also went to the schools and sat at the lunch

tables to talk to girls and try to get them to join the pageant. I brought popcorn, chocolate, and tried to get to know them. I wanted to know why they were or were not interested, and what would make them interested. I got to know the kids 1-on-1 and it definitely helped."

The eight Miss Amboy contestants are Brianna Henkel, Hayden Hunsberger, Magdalena Keene, Alexa Morris, Madison O'Malley, Emilie Reed-Dempsey, Emily Sachs, and Brooklyn Strub.

Not only are they competing for Miss Amboy, but for the first time in pageant history, they're also in con-





But when the Amboy Depot Days Car, Truck, and Motorcycle Show was inserted 33 years ago, it instantly became a fan favorite and the centerpiece to Depot

where you come in hasn't changed in 30 years. The only year we haven't had a show was in 2020 because of COVID-19."

There was one change in the strategic planning of the car show.

Dallam and the Car Show Committee went to unusual locations to try to recruit a different batch of cars and car owners.

"This year, we went to different car shows than we usually go to whether they were large ones or small ones," said Dallam, who added 6,500 flyers were given to car show goers last summer. "We're hoping to get some different cars in our show. There are a group of guys who haven't missed a show yet. They keep coming back because they like the show.

"It's a judged show and we try to have guys who have been doing it for a while or guys who are in the automotive industry judge cars."

The blueprint of the Depot Days Car Show is etched in stone and chisels out success.

However, outside interference has hindered the show the last few years.

"Last year, at around 3 p.m. on Sunday, we had water coming up to the curb on Main Street because of all of the rain," Dallam said. "The weather put a damper on everything. There are more and more car shows on the day of our car show now. There are at least two in northern Illinois on the same date that I know of.

"When I talk to people who are involved in other car shows, they say their numbers are up. But because of weather being unfavorable and the date being booked by other car shows, we've been down a little bit."

Fingers are crossed for great Depot Days Car Show weather and for car showers and car viewers to come to Amboy.

Pre-registration is recommended as the entry fee remains \$10, but early birds receive perks such as having all of the paperwork and dash card filled out and ready to be placed on the dashboard and \$5 worth of 50/50 tickets.

tention for a \$1,000 scholastic scholarship donated by the Amboy Depot Days Car Show Committee.

"I figured an incentive such as a college scholarship would help get a few more girls in Miss Amboy," Grim said. "We had our first meeting with the girls a couple of weeks ago and I asked them, 'Why haven't you been in Miss Amboy? You're seniors and this has been going on for years.' They mostly didn't know about it or it was too late to enter when they found out. Maybe an opportunity to earn money for college can help make girls aware of Miss Amboy."



Scavenging the museum and other events at the museum are in thanks to the Depot Days Car Show's 50/50 tickets sales and other donations.



Donna Wellman chosen to be the Depot Days Parade Grand Marshall

AMBOY-When Donna Wellman was first asked to be the Depot Days Parade Grand Marshall for the 2023 Depot Days, her first reaction was shock.

"I said, 'Oh no, I don't think I'm worthy of being the grand marshal of the parade,' said Wellman.

Actually, it's shocking she hasn't been asked to be the grand marshal before.

Wellman, 88, hasn't always lived in Amboy but she was only a hop away as she lived on Shaw Road with a West Brooklyn address as a kid, went to little country

schools until she started eighth grade at Lee Center, and graduated from Lee Center High School in the Class of 1952.

Amboy residency became official in 1955 after she married Richard Wagner (1932-2008; co-owned the Amboy News from 1971-80).

The couple lived in a three-room apartment on W. Division Street before moving to a home on S. Jefferson Street in 1958 and raising their children Jeffrey Wagner (now 65) and John Wagner (62).

Donna Wellman still bakes in the kitchen of the house on S. Jefferson.

"I'm a cookie baker and they call me, 'Grandma Baker.' I bake cookies for Teen Turf," said Wellman, who married Don Wellman (1934-2015) in 2010. "I made acouple of pies for Teen Turf's fundraiser at the Lee County Fair and 4-H Show in July. I try to donate as much as I can. When we have a blood drive for the Amboy Civic Organization (ACO), Idonate cookies for that.

"I'm a cookie and a pie baker. I'm not much into cakes."

With the quote alone, you can tell Wellman is involved with many organizations.

"Grandma Baker" makes cookies for Teen Turf as she has volunteered for 15 vears and was honored as the 2010 Volunteer of Year and a February 2023 Volunteer of the Week through the state of Illinois.

Wellman belongs to the ACO, the Amboy Depot Museum, and the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Lee Center.



50/50 more than just big winner

AMBOY – If you thought the Depot Days Car Show 50/50 planning started the first day of the summer spectacular, you are incorrect.

Actually, planning starts in the spring and many of the setup process are taking care of in May and June.

Just ask new 50/50 Chairperson Sandy Wittenauer.

"I don't like to do nothing, so I threw my hand up to take the reins of the 50/50 and people appreciate the help," Wittenauer said. "I don't know how the Jeff and Stacie Gerdes worked jobs and did the Car Show and the 50/50 (since 1991). The phone calls, the ordering, and all the other responsibilities makes it a semi-full-time job in July and August. They made it work somehow.

"I hope to do the same since I'm not a procrastinator. I'm always looking weeks to a month ahead. Printing T-shirts, you have to plan ahead to give the printer time to print the 50/50 T-shirts. The tickets have to be proofread, approved, and printed in May. We received the 400,000 tickets in June. There were lawn signs ordered and printed.

"There are still things to be done, but I think I'm pretty ready."

Wittenauer and her right-hand man, 50/50 Chairperson Robert King, have 21 places selling 50/50 tickets.

They routinely call and check to see if the locations need more tickets or if there is anything else the two-person committee can help with.

Although the journey of making the tickets, seeing the tickets sold, and people smiling after their name is pulled from the thousands is enjoyable, those aspects are not at the top of Wittenauer's list.

"I get a lot of joy at the meeting we have after Depot Days is over when we get to disperse the other half of the money to people and organizations that wrote us a letter asking for a contribution," Wittenauer said. "I'm happy there is a winner who walks away with a lot of money. I hope they do well with it. But, I'm happier to spread the money to the ones asking for a contribution. It personally feels good to say, 'I'm part of the car show and we supported all of these organizations with their needs'."

The irony of our railroads

A local farmer once asked me to make a list of all the plants that grew on his preserved railroad prairie. It took many hours over a period of two years to find



period of two Jim "Maxie" Long

them all. The prairie was a three or four-acre plot along the old CB&Q railroad. The right-of-way on both sides of the preserved prairie had been converted into cultivated land.

The final tally of species of plants that grew there was 230. Several of them were common railroad weeds from foreign lands, and several were not prairie plants. It is remarkable that so many prairie plants could persist after more than 100 years of abuse and neglect. There were 16 species of native sedges and 24 different grasses. The true prairie grasses such as Big and Little Bluestem were common. The Indiangrass and Cord grass and Switch grass were there. The Sandhill grasses represented by Porcupine grass, Purple Top, Purple Lovegrass, several Panicum, and Three-awn grasses were also there.

Also present were nine different kinds of Aster, including the Amethyst Aster that is rarely seen today. Along with four different goldenrods. It was



nice to see the Sweet William Phlox and the Prairie Phlox growing near the rare Prairie Milkweed and Marsh Pea and Rattlesnake Root. There too, near the Compass Plants, I found several Prairie Lilies.

It good to know that several railroad prairies have been set aside for preservation. Local nature guardians are dedicated to the upkeep of these prairies. I hope they remain preserved for the future study of Illinois' natural prairies.

In 1820, prairie covered roughly 22 million acres in Illinois. Now, 200 years later, less than 2500 acres of high-quality prairie remain. Almost all of it was lost to plowing and paving. Our prairies now survive mainly in scattered fragments: Often found in pioneer cemeteries, on bluffs high above rivers, and ironically, along railroad

rights-of-way and on abandoned railroad beds. -- Editor

In his later years, he contributed a series of local nature articles to The Amboy News. Upon his death in 2000, his many hand-written drafts were gathered and initially curated by Brenda Boyle.
