City hires new administrative assistant

Clinton has a new city administrative assistant. The council voted Tuesday to appoint Taylor Baxter as city administrative assistant for a nine-month term.

The city has had a rocky road since the retirement of former administrative assistant Tim Followell at the end of 2021, going through two short-lived candidates within about a year.

"I'm very pleased with this next motion here," said commissioner and acting mayor Tom Edmunds.

Mayor Roger Cyrulik resigned suddenly in July.

Commissioner John Wise referred to the "long, drawn out process," that preceded the city's trials without an administrator before choosing Baxter.

"We didn't have a very good track record," Wise said. "We tried two, and on our own, we didn't do so well."

Wise thanked those who helped the city in its search. He said he was "very much impressed," by Baxter.

Baxter comes to Clinton from Pontiac, where he was director of parks and recreation.

In other council business, commissioner Ken Buchanan said next week was the city's regular brush pick-up. He said a lot of brush piles already were out waiting for collection.

Buchanan also reminded residents workers would not pick up brush piles that were more than would fit into the bed of a pickup truck. He said piles too large for collection would result in residents being fined.

John Wise said water quality was improving after some emergency repair work recently at the water plant.

"It is coming around," Wise said. "It may take a few days. We may have to get out and do some flushing to get it cleared out."

However, he also said a 500 gallon-per-minute motor at the plant recently went down. All of the wiring from the electric panel to the motor had to be replaced. The replacement motor is expected to arrive in the next day or two, Wise said.

County talks return to wind energy fines

Land use committee review of county ordinance hits again on turbine curtailment

CLINTON — As the county's land use committee continued Monday reviewing its wind energy ordinance for possible changes, committee members circled back to the topic of the June 29 tornado warning.

During thunderstorm warning and tornado warning that followed, wind turbines operated by Enel Green Energy continued to rotate. Under Enel's agreement with DeWitt County, operators are required to curtail turbines during such warnings, i.e. slow or stop the turbines' rotation potential prevent interference with weather service radar.

An Enel spokesman later told the Clinton Journal Alta Farms II turbines were "inadvertently not curtailed." He said the company took immediate action to prevent the oversight from reoccurring. During Monday's land use meeting, members again discussed ways of tightening language in that portion of the ordinance and making the punishment for violating it more severe.

Committee member Patrick Ryan said the \$5,000 fine the county assessed for the curtailment violation by Enel would stand. The ordinance

allows for a \$5,000 fine for each violation. But, Ryan said he considered it "laughable" fines were only \$5,000.

"We're serious about curtailment taking place during extreme weather," Ryan said. "If it doesn't the company that owns the project needs to forfeit whatever they earned during that period when they should have been curtailing."

Ryan said he felt that wasn't actually enough to "incentivize them to do it." He said he thought Enel would be satisfied to pay the fine to avoid curtailing the turbines.

"They would run and pay us the money rather than curtail," Ryan said.

He suggested the county should require a company to forfeit double the amount of revenue it makes from a wind facility during a period when curtailing is

required but fails to do so. "One, because they (wind company) don't deserve it and, two, because they're going to get fined for it," he said.

Ultimately, committee member Joe Witte suggested waiting until the county's Regional Planning Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals conclude their reviews of the wind energy ordinance language.

Witte felt between the versions those committees might propose, the county's current ordinance and the recent state wind energy regulations enacted earlier this year, it might result in additional complexity for the land use committee to also recommend changes at this point.



CLINTON The monarch butterfly is easily identifiable with its orange and black markings.





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

Getting through the drug shortages SENIOR

In the spring of this year, the U.S. saw a larger prescription drug shortage than we've seen in 10 years. And we haven't recovered yet.

Part of the problem is that 78% of our drugs (or at least a crucial ingredient in each one) are made in foreign countries. Chemotherapy drugs, antibiotics, mental health drugs ... so many are in short supply. As of this writing, cisplatin, a commonly used cancer drug, is on the shortages list, and has been since February.

It doesn't help that a drug manufacturer filed for bankruptcy and closed its doors. If this isn't bad enough, a major drug facility was recently hit by a tornado. Hospitals all over the country saw the writing on the wall and immediately tried to overbuy and get as much as they could. The manufacturer stepped in and put a stop to that.

If you can't get your drugs due to shortages:

Talk to your pharmacist. Ask whether they can ask your doctor about changing the dose. For

example, can you have two half doses that would add up to the same amount? Ask your doctor if they have samples or can get them from the sales rep.

Call the manufacturer ask when they expect pharmacies in your area to be resupplied. Give them the name and address of your pharmacy and ask specifically that the drugs you need be sent there.

What you should NOT do: Divide your drugs to make them last longer. Call your health care team and ask for help. Is there a different drug you can take?

One important thing you can do: Call your congressmen and let them know what it's like to be unable to get the drugs you need. Ask what they're doing about the shortages. Foreign countries should not be able to hold our drugs hostage.

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New presumptives coming

fingers Cross your that we'll see three new presumptives added to the list of medical conditions that the Department of Veterans Affairs uses to consider automatic service connection after exposure.

Getting these new conditions added to the list is part of the PACT Act. The act itself added 20 presumptives to the list when it was signed and covers a wide variety of toxic exposures. There is the water at Camp Lejeune and Marine Corps Air Station New River, agent orange, radiation and much more.

Now they are considering adding acute leukemias,

chronic leukemias and multiple myeloma outside of the head and neck to the list. The locations include deployment to Jordan, Iraq, Syria, Yemen, Djibouti, Egypt, Afghanistan, Somalia, Lebanon, Uzbekistan and southeast Asia.

Inclusion on the list of presumptives won't be immediate -- they never are. But scientific reviews have begun, and if they're approved, we won't need to prove that the cause of our medical condition was our service in those locations. The assumption will be automatic, as will the benefits.

The current presumptives list includes cancers of

the brain, head, kidney, neck, pancreas and many more. Less serious are allergic rhinitis, bronchial asthma, chronic bronchitis and others. Of the five conditions most frequently claimed via the PACT Act, hypertensive vascular disease tops the list, with 80% of claims granted.

If you have any of the three new conditions and served in any of those locations, apply for VA health care and benefits right now. Don't wait until you hear that they've been approved. It's possible you could be approved for care and benefits even before the three new conditions are declared presumptives





Trump 4X

Last night's cable news lead story was a live broadcast of Trump being indicted for the fourth time. This time by a Georgia Fulton county prosecutor regarding Trump's objections to the 2020 election in Georgia.

What was most interesting to me was that the prosecutor used Georgia's version or RICO to indict Trump. RICO is a racketeering statute that is primarily used against mob affiliated crimes.

RICO requires a conspiracy between individuals to violate the law as an element of the offense. Towards the conspiracy aspect the prosecutor also indicted 18 other people affiliated with Trump's challenge to the Georgia election results.

Last night's news left me conflicted. I was bemused, saddened and at times simply angry as events were displayed on various channels. The charges are serious and need to be given serious review. There are several questions that need to be answered somewhere in this process.

First, the charges relate to the 2020 election. The prosecutors in all four of these cases had two and half years to file the charges. Why are they being filed at the start of the 2024 election cycle?

Never in this nation's history has a former President or a leading opponent been charged with a criminal offense regarding the election. This prosecution simply does not smell right.

Second, both the New York and Georgia cases are state charges concerning a federal election. If there is a crime, then the jurisdiction or venue seems best to be in a federal court, not a state

Both of these prosecutors are elected officials and it is fair to question what there political motivation is to bring these charges. The grand jury process is not a public process. It is a formal process that is secret until the indictment is made public. Monday night the grand jury process was live prime time news. Such actions seem to reflect a political prosecution and not blind justice that Americans expect of their elected officials. Again, there is a smell that isn't right.

Third, Democrat Al Gore strongly contested his loss to George Bush over the Florida election results. Democrat Tracy Abrams strongly contested the Georgia governorship race, which she lost. Their objections were very similar to Trump's objections in the 2020 presidential race.

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Abrams has never conceded the race. It seems to me that if the Fulton County prosecutor is so adamant in her efforts to charge Trump, then what is her stance regarding Abrams? The appearance is that there are two standards of justice in Georgia, which brings that smell back into the discussion.

Fourth. Have you noticed that when the Biden family gets some serious negative press regarding Hunter or Joe Biden, Trump gets a new indictment? Perhaps this all is coincidence, but what if it is a grand design to shift attention? While I do not like conspiracy theories, I am reminded of the Russia gate accusations made against Trump and questions do orice.

Lastly, I am not a fan of either Biden or Trump for 2024 and believe both parties can put forth better candidates. The Democrats appear to want Trump to be the Republican nominee as they believe he will be easier to defeat in the general election. That reasoning may well be faulty. Trump's

contributions continue to increase each time he is indicted demonstrating Trump has a very solid and strong political base. What Democrats should really fear is independent voters who are starting to question weaponizing of the criminal justice system against Trump. People are losing faith in the Department of Justice and far left leaning prosecutors. The public is starting to question the validity of all of these indictments after debacle of the Russian accusations against Trump in previous elections. If independents conclude that the Democrats have weaponized the justice system, there may well be a backlash against the Democrats. At the same time, Trump running a campaign while indicted has many problems in itself. Both parties can do better.

Battle Cross Crusaders proud to honor veterans

As founder of the Battle Cross Crusaders program, I wanted to offer insight into what our independent program is about, what we do, and the values we represent in honoring our local veterans.

The program comprised of 90 percent local veterans from the Korea and Vietnam wars, veterans between and after, and proud patriotic supporters. In two and a half years, our independent group has honored dozens of local veterans along their funeral routes by decorating the funeral routes with hundreds of flags, coordinated with Steph Cluver and Dewitt Savings Bank to be on the route with flags we donated, contacted the Clinton Fire Department to have its ladder truck set up along the funeral routes with a large flag we donated. Two of our members also wait on the Grant Street overpass, displaying a large flag, along with our group at the cemetery entrance holding flags and saluting as the procession passes.

After the honor guard detail has completed military honors, our members present the family three items, a small flag to place on the grave so each veteran is represented with a flag as quickly as possible, and a certificate to have



the veteran's name on the Wapella veterans wall for free. We also present a specially-designed flag case to the family at the gravesite. Upon presenting each item, our veterans turn and render a final salute.

Our group has come together in many ways, including providing an all Battle Cross Crusaders Honor Guard detail, which trained in one week, for Clinton's own John Ellis, a U.S. Navy WW2 veteran who was

buried on Memorial Day at Woodlawn Cemetery, along with group members decorating all entrances to the cemetery for Memorial Day 2021 in his honor.

Prior to beginning the Crusaders, for eight years I organized the fire and police escorts for veterans returning home from the Honor Flight, and the past two years we began to host the Clinton "Welcome Home" celebrations and have done this for 96 of 97 veterans returning to their hometown from two area Honor Flight hubs.

North's jump to 4♥ was supposedly preemptive and hardly ideal given those defensive Spade tricks. The consequence was that South pushed on to 5♥, expecting that 4♠ would make and that 5♥ doubled would be a profitable sacrifice. As it happened she was wrong on both counts.

4♠ would have been down, and 5♥ also looked pretty hopeless. West led the Spade Nine, won by Dummy's Ace, Declarer dropping the devious Jack. It might seem obvious to draw trumps next, but instead Declarer did something rather clever. At Trick 2, she led a Club to her Jack, won by West's Queen. The Diamond shift was won by Declarer who crossed to the ♥J, ruffed a Diamond (high), crossed back to the ♥T, and led a Club, won by West's Ace. "Rats!" muttered West, who should have smelled one earlier. Left with nothing but Diamonds, West had to concede a ruff and sluff, a Club being pitched from Dummy and the Diamond ruffed in hand. Now a Club ruff set up the suit and Declarer had 11 astonishing tricks. Some sacrifice!

Either of the defenders could have saved the day. East could have hopped up with his ♣K at Trick 2 and cashed a Spade, though that was far from obvious. But West was the real culprit for walking straight into the end-play. In the post mortem West claimed that his defense was correct if Declarer held \$\(\delta \), \(\Phi AKQxx, \) ◆Ax, ◆KJTxx, but in that case West should have wondered why Declarer was risking a defensive Club ruff before drawing trumps. Even though West erred, let's give credit to Declarer for playing Clubs early. If, after winning the ♠A, she had cashed the ♦A, crossed to the ♥J, ruffed a Diamond (high), crossed to the ♥T and then led a Club, West would have a road map to the right defense ... he'd squander the ♣A, lead his ♣Q to East's ♣K, and the ♠K would be the setting trick.
