Sublette Village Board approves six motions

ADDRESSES CONCERNS BY SUBLETTE RESIDENTS

Amboy News Reporter **SUBLETTE** – The Aug. 14 Sublette Village Board Meeting saw a little bit of everything including six motions being

Amotion was made by Sublette Village Trustee Bob Bulfer to approve a temporary liquor license for Sublette 365 during the village event, Hops & Harmony, on Sept. 2 at the Sublette Centennial Park. Sublette Village Trustee Rick Klaser seconded the motion, and trustees Julie Kessel, Larry Ellis, and Scott Hanson approved.

Bulfer made a motion to approve waiving the bidding and soliciting of prices for companies to complete water tower inspection and cleaning. Ellis seconded; all approved.

Hanson made a motion to approve a contractor to clean and inspect the water tower, interior and exterior. The cost will be \$7,300 for the interior and \$7,300 for the exterior, equaling a total price of \$14,600. The village's budget for the project is \$12,000. Ellis and Klaser seconded; all approved.

Kessel approved to solicit prices for repair or replace work to curb stops and/ or water services. Bulfer seconded; all approved.

Kessel also made a motion to approve water and garbage billing costs for gWorks, which bought out UB Max, to run through TEST Inc. The contract for the program will run for four years and includes costs per month and for installation. The one-time installation price is \$1,080, the first-year costs \$1,380, the second year will be \$1,421.40, third year \$1,464, and the fourth year will be \$1,507.92.

School board convenes with students back in classroom


Amboy News Reporter **AMBOY** — Amboy School Board President Katie Pratt officially welcomed back all board members at the first meeting now that school is in session on Thursday, Aug. 17.

Once the business side of things including last month's minutes, financial reports, expenditures, and payroll were voted on and passed, sixth grade teacher and tier three reading coordinator Yvonne Vicks gave her annual Star reading and math scores and RTI (Response to Intervention) percentages using the Pyramid of Learning from last May. Her slide presentation included an informative bell curve to see where most students ranked. Vicks commented that she is encouraged by the up tick in some of the numbers which are calculated for students in fifth

to eighth grade. When it came time for the Principal's Report, Pratt acknowledged new Central Elementary Principal Jessica Meusel. The first remarks by Meusel were to thank the custodians and summer crew for their hard work cleaning and refreshing the school. Pre-school is scheduled to begin Aug. 21. There are 40 preschoolers enrolled and there is a waiting list. "The Book It" committee met over the summer to prepare and plan for the "Sweet Success" theme. Students who meet their reading goal will get to participate in fun monthly activities beginning in September. A bus evacuation drill was held on Aug. 16. School Improvements





LEE COUNTY — Extreme heat is expected throughout much of the state this week and it is important to take action and be prepared to protect yourself and your loved ones. The Red Cross offers the following reminders that help us stay safe when the temperatures soar.

1. Hot cars can be deadly. Never leave children or pets in your vehicle. The inside temperature of the car can quickly reach 120 degrees.

2. Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids. Avoid drinks with caffeine or

3. Check on family, friends and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat.

4. If you don't have air conditioning, seek relief from the heat during the warmest part of the day in places like schools, libraries, theaters, malls, etc.

5. Avoid extreme temperature changes.

6. Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing. Avoid dark colors because they absorb the sun's rays.

7. Slow down, stay indoors and avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day.

8. Postpone outdoor games and activities.

9. Take frequent breaks and use a buddy system when working outdoors.

10. Check on animals frequently to ensure that they are not suffering from the heat. Make sure they have plenty of cool water and shade.

Excessive heat can lead to sunburn, heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke. If someone is experiencing heat cramps in the legs or abdomen, get them to a cooler place, have them rest, lightly stretch the affected muscle, and replenish their fluids with a half a glass (about 4 ounces) of cool water every 15 minutes.



THE CONQUERED

The English novelist Pat Barker has written some of the finest books on war. Her "Regeneration Trilogy" about the First World War has become a classic since its publication in the nineteen-nineties. With "The Silence of the Girls" in 2018, Barker, perhaps inevitably, turned to the most famous of all wars, the mythic clash between the Achaeans (Ancient Greeks) and Trojans in Homer's "The Iliad." Barker's version is told from the victim's point of view, Briseis, the captured princess at the center of the dispute between Agamemnon, the commander of the Greek army, and Achilles, the Greek's greatest warrior.

"The Women of Troy" (2021) is the sequel to "The Silence of the Girls." It too is narrated by Briseis and also by Pyrrhus, the long dead Achilles's sixteen-yearold son who takes his place. Pyrrhus is a bully whose cruelty barely masks his pervasive anxiety. In the novel's masterful opening chapter, Pyrrhus is sitting inside the Greeks' famous gift: the Trojan horse. He is sweating, terrified, ready to scream. After ten years of warfare, trickery may give the Greeks victory. The city is breached, the slaughter is unimaginable, Pyrrhus hacks his way to elderly King Priam. In his moment of glory, he fumbles. After three clumsy tries, Pyrrhus manages to kill Priam, but not before being shamed and teased by the old king.

Days before he was killed, Achilles gave the pregnant Briseis to his trusted friend Alcimus in marriage. She is a free woman. In the aftermath of the sacking of Troy in which every boy and every pregnant woman are slaughtered, Briseis visits the cramped huts of the enslaved Trojan girls waiting to be parceled out to the Greek warriors. She also visits Helen, who is the source of another outrage: Her husband Menelaus does not kill her for her treachery. Queen Hecuba, despite her frailty, is by far the liveliest character; imperious, coarse, and fearless, she always commands the room. Her daughterin-law Andromache is inconsolable: Pyrrhus had hurled her little boy to his death from the battlements of Troy.

The plot of "The Women of Troy" is quite simple. The army has been waiting a long time for the powerful winds to abate so it can go home. In this atmosphere, Pyrrhus announces that anyone who tries to bury King Priam will be executed. Briseis's companion Amina disobeys the decree and draws Briseis into her scheme to give Priam a proper burial.

"The Women of Troy" does not measure up to "The Silence of the Girls," much less to the great Euripides's magnificent play "The Trojan Women" of 415 BCE. So the question is, how can a novelist bring something fresh and innovative to a classic that has stood the test of time for the past 2,500 years?

efore his conversion (and subsequent name change) the Apostle Paul was what we would probably consider a real "Bad Dude." His life story is still a true inspiration to us even today, some 2000 years

And this is why I take the time (and column space) to share his story. Perhaps you are reading this and thinking that you have done some terrible, awful things and that because of this, God doesn't want a relationship with you. Nothing could be farther from the truth. God still loves you and wants you to be in His family. Look at how bad Paul was. If God can forgive a person like Saul of Tarsus, and transform his life, He can do the same things for you. Or someone you may know who needs to read this.

It's only a matter of admitting your sins and failures to Him and receiving the forgiveness and Lordship of Jesus Christ into your lives. This is even a good thing for longtime Christians to do again as we have a tendency to become complacent and compromising in our walk with God. I invite you to open your heart and mind and let the loving power of God come in and transform you... as He did the Apostle Paul.

cil Harrison's team 10-8 to win the championship. Both teams had been undefeated.



Better Business Bureau urges families to create a Codeword to combat alarming new AI Scams

ROCKFORD – To combat imposter "emergency" scams, the Better Business Bureau recommends families create a codeword to be used in such situations to ensure the person contacting you really is your relative. "With major advancements in

technology, scammers now can replicate a person's voice so realistically that fake phone calls sound exactly like your relative," says Dennis Horton, director of the Rockford Regional Office of the Better Business Bureau. "Or you might receive a fake email or text."

Artificial intelligence (AI) and deepfake technology pose serious threats to the public. Your "grandmother" might call to say she lost her wallet, or your "grandson" could text he was arrested or had a serious accident. The con artist sounds so much like your relative that you wire money.

Horton notes, "The danger is you react immediately, without thinking, because you want to do everything possible for your loved one. That's what scammers want you to do."

If you respond, the result can be identity theft and financial disaster. Fraudulent emails and texts will have links that contain malware. Family members must create a codeword if there are emergencies, so the scammers won't be able to get to them.

Con artists only need 3 seconds of the sound of your voice to create counterfeit recordings that sound like you but are not you. In fact, AI enables fraudsters to create words that you never said.

"Without a doubt, this is the scariest type of scam that I have seen in my 36-year career at the Better Business Bureau," says Horton. "It has the potential to reach millions more people and be the most effective scam of all time. Because of the problems that we are encountering now with these scams,

we want consumers to make certain that they protect their families."

BBB Codeword Tips: · Create a codeword or "safe word" that each family member knows and keeps private to themselves. Use the codeword to confirm in strange situations that it's really who they say they are.

· Lock down your social media sites; don't make them so open-ended. Scammers can pull sound clips off your social media posts.

• If you have experienced this type of scam, even if you didn't lose money, report it to BBB Scam Tracker.

Lee County Sheriff's Office to conduct Labor Day campaign

LEE COUNTY – The Lee County Sheriff's Office today announced it is partnering with the Illinois State Police and law enforcement across the state to step up efforts to stop impaired driving and help save lives as we near the end of summer and the busy Labor Day weekend. No matter how you plan to celebrate summer's end, make sure you do it safely. "Our first priority is to keep people

safe, so we're asking everyone to plan ahead for a sober ride home if they'll be drinking or using another impairing substance," said Chief Deputy Derek Ranken. "Let's make this a partnership between law enforcement and motorists: Help us protect the community and put an end to the dangers of impaired driving."

The high-visibility "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" enforcement campaign runs

from Aug. 18 through the early-morning hours of Sept. 5. During this period, motorists can expect to see roadside safety checks, more officers on the road and increased messaging about the dangers of impaired driving.

In addition to looking for drunk drivers, the Lee County Sheriff's Office will be stepping up seat belt enforcement, particularly at night when seat belt usage

rates are at their lowest. Speeders and distracted drivers should also be aware.

The Labor Day "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" and "Drive High. Get a DUI." enforcement efforts are made possible by federal highway safety funds administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation.

BBB Investigation: failing consumers, leaving them deeper in debt

ROCKFORD – The Better Business Bureau has over 11,000 complaints and negative reviews about debt and credit assistance that reveal a pattern of misleading and sometimes fraudulent claims. Those were the findings of the 2023 study, Credit Repair and Debt Relief. The BBB® study shows some companies fail to deliver on big promises. It examines the debt relief, debt consolidation, and credit repair industries, finding a pattern of high fees and overstated promises from predatory

"Although these companies claim to help consumers reduce/eliminate their debt or fix their credit score, the BBB study indicates some companies make big promises but rarely deliver, leaving people further in debt," says Dennis Horton, director of the Rockford Regional Office of the Better Business Bureau.

Horton notes, "This year, debt is expected to rise amid climbing interest rates and with the national pause on student loan payments expiration. Consumers facing tough financial situations may turn to debt relief, consolidation, and credit repair companies, unaware that predatory companies could cost them thousands of dollars for little or no benefit."

BBB's Scam Tracker has 1,607 reports with losses of \$2.4 million. Consumers reported to BBB that their dedication to plans proposed by these companies to boost their credit scores or reduce crushing debt left them worse off. While some consumers did report

positive experiences with the credit and debt assistance industry, this study shows consumers report negative patterns to BBB about companies in the industry and outright scams designed to deceive and take money from consumers. Debt is not inherently bad, but millions

of North Americans can find themselves underwater as monthly payments and interest stack up. When emergencies strike, or monthly paychecks don't add up, missed payments result in late fees. plummeting credit scores, and further economic distress.

Key findings

Predatory debt relief, consolidation, and credit repair companies advertise quick and extensive fixes for low credit scores and defaulted debt, but the ability to enact change is often much more limited than implied.

Consumers report to BBB they have lost thousands of dollars and they are worse off because of mounting fees for debt relief programs and lackluster results from credit repair businesses.

Many of the services offered by credit and debt assistance companies can be done by consumers themselves. However, difficulty in understanding their options, lack of know-how or a time crunch, and other issues can lead some consumers to seek assistance.

BBB tips for consumers considering debt relief or credit repair:

· Use Annual Credit Report.com to get a free credit report.

· Don't pay or provide payment information until service is rendered.

Critically examine any guarantee made. Few, if any, companies can ensure a credit or debit company will agree to negotiate with them or adjust reports.

If you are in default, call debt holders and attempt to negotiate a lower debt payment. · Check monthly bank statements to avoid recurring charges from companies.

· Search online for free information.

 Don't be rushed. Unscrupulous businesses and scammers both use high-pres-

· Avoid giving away personal banking information until you are 100% certain a company is legitimate.

 Refuse to work with companies that won't tell you your rights regarding credit repair or debt relief.

Be wary of anyone claiming to be associated with a government agency.

For the 2022-23 school year, the Illinois High School Association distributed approximately 18,000 licenses to over 11,000 individuals, representing a significant increase from the previous year. However, retaining officials is just as important as recruiting them, and helping all officials experience success in the space leads to the retention needed. In a survey to all IHSA licensed officials in early 2023, 45% precent of the respondents indicated the primary reason they most enjoy officiating is the opportunity to "give back." In the same survey, though, 62% percent said "sportsmanship of participants/fan behavior" is the greatest challenge officials face.

"Officials are humans too, and I think people lose sight of that sometimes," said

IHSA Associate Executive Director Kurt Gibson, who oversees the IHSA Officials Department. "Officials have careers, live in the same communities, attend the same churches, shop at the same stores, and eat at the same restaurants as others. Treating officials with the same respect, whether out in the community or on the court, field, pitch, pool, track, diamond, etc., as any other community member is something we should all be able to do. This elevation of respect towards officials can, and needs to, start at the individual level."

As the IHSA officiating survey results show, officials, by nature, are giving individuals, but they feel the increasing negative behavior exhibited at high school sporting events is not worth remaining in the officiating community. 'Elevating

Respect' by both players, coaches, fans - and officials - is necessary, and Officially Human has a number of available resources all those groups would benefit from viewing at www.officiallyhuman.

"Officially Human is committed to restoring respect to game officials, and we are proud to partner with them," said Gibson. "Together, I believe we can 'elevate respect' in the athletic space and bring about greater synergy in the high school athletic community.'

The IHSA plans a number of action items surrounding its partnership with Officially Human. IHSA Officials and member schools will be granted access to the "Elevate Respect" program at no cost, and member schools will be encouraged to share the program with students and fans alike each season. IHSA and Officially Human will also work together to recognize and support officials during the regular and post season on social media and at IHSA state finals events and look to recognize teams and fan bases that exhibit the highest levels of behavior and sportsmanship throughout the year.

"Everyone has a part to play in making interscholastic athletics the successful laboratory it is," said Anderson. "High school sports teach untold skills that participants use throughout life, and it's the lessons learned while participating with peers that shape lives. Victory and defeat are two of those lessons, but learning how to handle both of those outcomes is the greater goal."
