The clinic and Orthopedic Surgeon Dr. Gadini Delisca offer a full range of orthopedic services for patients as young as 2-3 years old up to geriatric patients including fracture care and total joint replacement, particularly hips, knees and shoulder replacements, sports medicine programs including care for ACL injuries, rotator cuff tears, sprains and strains, and hand procedures including for trigger finger/carpal tunnel problems.

Delisca currently sees patients at the Rochelle and Sycamore clinics. On June 14, RCH representatives held a ribbon cutting event for the location in conjunction with the Sycamore Chamber of Commerce.

Rochelle woman helping organize suicide prevention walk AFSP chairperson White: 'I feel like it's just a good way to process grief'

ROCHELLE — The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention will host an Out of the Darkness walk for the Rockford area on Saturday, Sept. 23 at 11 a.m. at the Rock Valley College Starlight Theater in Rockford. Check in begins at 10 a.m. and registration can be done online at afsp. org/Rockford. Donations can also be made at that site. The event will take place during National Suicide

Prevention Month. Stephanie White of Rochelle holds a chair position with the AFSP locally and is working to organize and promote the walk. Since May 2022, White has been working as an advocate for the AFSP. Her father, Steven, passed away in February 2022 due to sui-

cide. After that, she felt it's important that communities come together to educate everyone on mental health and end suicide. Her work as an advocate has included helping to urge public officials to prioritize suicide prevention and mental

health. "The work with the AFSP has felt really good over the past year," White said. "I feel like it's just a good way to process grief. I think personally, it's just helped me take something really negative in my life and spin it to a positive to try to help other people."

After her father's passing, White's family did research and chose the AFSP as the organization that friends and family could make donations to during his memorial service.





Delisca said he's most excited for the opportunity for more access and showcasing the quality of care that XCEL Orthopedics and RCH have to offer. He wants his practice to be "a pillar of orthopedic services" for Ogle County and the surrounding counties.

In looking at the idea of a clinic in Sycamore, RCH noticed a lack of competition for orthopedic care and the provider there did not accept "a lot of insurance providers," Delisca said. The XCEL Orthopedics clinic will make for independent evaluations and healthy competition and increase the quality of area orthopedic care, he said.

"We take a fair bit of insurance providers," Delisca said. "With the exception of HMOs there's a lot of insurance, including all of the major Medicaids that we take. It's relatively easy to get in with us, in terms of being able to get advanced, imaging, like

MRI, which we'd do at RCH. We can get people in quicker at RCH than the surrounding hospitals. We have a lot of opportunities to help people get taken care of in an expeditious manner."

Delisca said the clinic has already seen "a number of patients" that have been thankful for the offering of services closer to where they live. In the past, some patients from the DeKalb/Sycamore area had difficulty getting to Rochelle.

"In general, we've gotten a lot of good feedback about us having a service that is much-needed and people being excited about the prospect of having an orthopedic injury and being able to get right in with us," Delisca said.

The demand for orthopedic care has been increasing "almost exponentially," Delisca said, due to an aging baby boomer population that brings with it arthritis, fracture care and injuries. Rural communities in the

area have a harder time finding and traveling to orthopedic care.

"I think whenever you can make it convenient for patients and get them access, you can help bridge the gap between need and access," Delisca said. "You can offer people firstworld services that they otherwise would have not thought of. What we can do by giving someone an injection or replacing a joint. In terms of optimizing their lifestyle and making them feel younger in some ways is extremely rewarding and it's something that smalltown America deserves."

Delisca said that if the clinic model goes to plan, another orthopedic surgeon will be needed along with more team members. He believes it could be a model as a specialty clinic from a critical access hospital like RCH.

Being able to help people and having the trust of patients to provide a service or surgery to improve their lives are honors that

Delisca said he doesn't take lightly. He's been able to help patients with a vast variety of different ailments. He recalled one patient with osteoarthritis in both hips whose goal was to be able to walk her daughter down the aisle at

her wedding.

"Because her rate was slightly on the high side, she'd already been declined by multiple providers and I felt that she had a disease that we could treat and treat faithfully at RCH," Delisca said. "We

took on her hips and were able to replace them one at a time in a staged fashion and she was able to walk her daughter down the aisle. That kind of stuff is what matters. Being able to provide the everyday is

Funds donated to the AFSP go directly to scientific research and helping families impacted by suicide loss.

"The more I read and researched that foundation, I loved what they were doing and decided I wanted to help out any way I could," White said. "I started just volunteering as an advocate, where I was working with local, state and federal levels to get different policies in place and then I attended my first walk last year. I decided I really would like to put my focus into helping with those."

All donations to the AFSP and funds raised by the walks are used for a variety of initiatives, including educating the public on suicide prevention, critical research to improve suicide prevention and treatment for those at risk.

Back in 2021, the AFSP donated \$6.44 million for suicide prevention research. Funds are also used to organize programs for survivors of suicide loss, and some of that donation money is used to empower volunteers to advocate for those policies at the state, federal and local levels.

talks and presentations at no fee and no cost for resources with donations and fundraised money.

White called attending her first walk last year "a mix of emotions.'

"Obviously it brings that grief forward, but just the community and the amount of people that come to these walks and everybody is going through similar feelings and has had a similar experience, and everyone else is sharing their stories, so it just has this positive community feel," White said. "It's a big range of emotions. Everyone there is sad, but feeling loved and supported. It's very therapeutic."

White's advocacy work in the past involved the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. The now-simplified 988 service is an alternative to 911 and connects callers to Lifeline centers. The service is up and running and those in crisis can easily call or text the number and get somebody live on the line to help them.

"It's such a wonderful tool for people to have," White said. "Just having an easy number to remember and getting it out there so people know

how accessible it is and that there's somebody to talk to. It's very important that we get that number out there."

White said she is content with her volunteer work at a local level, but would like to do more in the future.

"The educational part of it has helped me as someone who hasn't personally struggled with depression or suicidal thoughts," White said. "Learning what my dad was going through has been helpful. And it's also been having this community that you didn't know about. You feel so isolated when you have a loved one that you lost to suicide. Just knowing that there are so many other people out there in your local community that have gone through a very similar struggle is helpful. And just doing work to help other people and having that positive spin on a hard thing that happened is very beneficial. It's hard to be sad when you're helping somebody else."

Kern: Successful legislation in Springfield THE Illinois Gen exemptions so equipment was somehow going to dents benefit from participrogress in this space. Require a wind/sol

HE Illinois General Assembly wrapped up a couple of weeks ago and as usual, farm bureau was in Springfield working the Capitol halls. Let's look at some of the legislation we were successful in passing.

Energy generation

equipment sales tax exemption
The omnibus tax bill

included language that allows energy generation equipment used directly for the raising of crops and livestock to be treated like 'farm equipment and machinery' for production which are not subject to state sales tax. Power equipment will include items like generators, solar panels, wind turbines or other forms of generation equipment. The equipment must be necessary for the actual growing of a crop or livestock. This is modeled after the current farm equipment exemptions so equipment that is primarily used for powering a machine shed, your house, electric fence, etc. will not be exempt.

Ethanol sales tax exemptions
This provision estab-

lishes a sales tax incentive on E-15 equal to 10 percent; creates a 20 percent sales tax break on mid-range ethanol (20 percent to 51 percent ethanol-blended fuel), and the current E-85 sales tax exemption of 100 percent will be extended. All three exemptions sunset on Dec. 31, 2028. The original bill introduced would have let the exemptions run until 2030, but there were concerns of the legislators that the exemptions could have a larger fiscal impact in future years, so the shorter sunset will require a review sooner. The only group that opposed this provision was ABATE. Their feeling was this was somehow going to mandate the elimination of E-10. **Diseased animals pro-**

hibition hibition

Allows the director of the department of agriculture to declare a temporary (30-day or longer) prohibition on the sale, movement, or exhibition of certain animals in order to prevent or reduce the spread of any contamination or disease in the state.

School code FFA & 4H absences

This bill allows schools

to support FFA and 4-H students attending competitions or exhibitions. This also benefits the school by counting these students as in attendance while participating in the events. High school agricultural

as in attendance while participating in the events. High school agricultural education and the FFA and 4-H are vital programs for development of the talent and leadership needed in farming and agricultural service industries. Stu-

dents benefit from participating in competitions and exhibitions held by these organizations.

Soil & water conser-

Soil & water conservation districts

IFB worked diligently with the Illinois Association of Soil and Water Districts (IASWCD) and American Farmland Trust (AFT) to focus this legislation on providing practical soil health authority for soil and water conservation districts (SWCD) and continue farmers involvement in state and federal conservation. SB 1701 allows SWCDs the ability to better leverage federal funds; continues the Partners for Conservation program; and provides more direction to SWCDs on soil health duties. In this long-haul conservation effort, this legislation will help farmers continue to find the best sustainable soil practices for their fields and make steady Modular nuclear reactors

Repeals language prohibiting approval and construction of new nuclear facilities and requires the ICC to provide a certificate of public convenience and necessity to modular nuclear reactors.

Food labeling standardization

The department of ag

The department of agriculture in consultation with the department of health shall publish information to encourage food manufacturers, processors and retailers responsible for the labeling of food products to voluntarily use specified uniform terms on food product labels to communicate quality dates and safety dates.

Trailer bill clean-up for county siting of wind & solar facilities per PA 102-1123

Changes to public act passed in January include:

Require a wind/solar facility to file a farmland drainage plan with the county and any impacted drainage districts.

Clarify that a vegetative ground cover and management plan shall follow provisions outlined in the Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA) unless the landowner negotiates a more stringent standard by agreement.

Clarify that a wind/solar

facility shall compensate landowners of repair the damage for crop losses and other agricultural damage caused by drainage issues during construction.

Restore a provision that keeps the financial protection.

keeps the financial protections for decommissioning a facility consistent with requirements of the AIMA and at a more stable protective level.

Guebert Jr.: Mental health and farmers

ARMERS go to great lengths to take care of their land and livestock, but sometimes we're not great at taking care of ourselves. Our first instincts are to

protect our operations at any cost, often by working alone for long hours. Unpredictable stressors such as weather, crop yields, high labor and energy costs, skyrocketing land prices and low income build over time, weighing you down day after day.

When things get tough, it's hard to ask for help.

May was Mental Health Awareness Month, which presents an opportunity to share our story and the tools available for helping farmers cope with stress, anxiety, depression, suicidal thoughts or substance abuse.

In January, the American Farm Bureau Federation unveiled results of a survey of 1,600 Georgian farmers about farm stressors in the state. The survey, conducted in partnership with the Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center, housed in Mercer Univer-

sity School Development, found that: Twenty nine percent

of farmers report suicidal thoughts at least once every month.

Forty two percent of

all farmers have thought about dying by suicide at least once in the past 12 months.

Forty seven percent of

farmers report experienc-

ing loneliness at least once

per month.

Forty nine percent of farmers report being sad or depressed at least once per month.

Thirty nine percent of farmers report feeling hopeless at least once per month.

Of those surveyed, the top stressors reported were balancing home and work life, weather and finances, and common coping strategies included drinking alcohol, exercising and engaging in a hobby.

The results of this survey are staggering, but there are several mental health resources and wellness tools farmers can use to reduce stress and manage their mental health.

In Illinois, the Farm Family Resource Initiative (FFRI) is a free helpline connecting farmers across the state with mental health specialists. The service is managed by Southern Illinois University School of Medicine's Center for Rural Health and Social Service Development and averages a handful of calls per month on a range of issues, including financial stresses, conflict and relationship troubles on the farm. Follow-up telehealth

counseling sessions with SIU Medicine counselors are also offered to those using the resource. Up to six individual, couple or group sessions are available for free to the farmer or farm family member.

FFRI also offers free monthly virtual suicide bereavement group sessions, which is overseen by a licensed clinical social worker and behavior health program supervisor with SIU Medicine's Department of Family and Community Medicine. For more information or to register, call 217-757-

Other tools farmers can use to manage stressors and mental health include developing strong social networks and relationships. Taking 15 minutes each day for an uninterrupted conversation with a spouse or family member and getting involved or staying connected with a friend or group of friends can provide a lifeline when things are tough.

Farmers should also take note of how their body reacts to stress, which is often out of their control. Instead of focusing on things you cannot change, try working toward a solution. This goes hand in hand with nurturing yourself and finding ways to keep your mind and body connected. Exercising 20 minutes or taking a daily walk, swim or bike ride, getting regular medical checkups with a local health care provider, eating a nutritious diet, spending time outside, getting plenty of rest, and

activities that you enjoy can all help to reduce stress. Establishing goals can

finding hobbies or other

also help navigate stressful situations and plan for increased periods of work. Spending 10 minutes of your day prioritizing tasks can help you stay on top of your work. However, don't let discussions of farm operation needs occupy all aspects of your life. When you find yourself overwhelmed, try stepping away to assess the problem and brainstorm possible solutions that help break it down into manageable steps.

A productive mind is a healthy mind. Finding 5-10 minutes in your day to relax and recharge, sharing your concerns with a counselor or another professional and using helpful self-talk (telling yourself that you can adapt and overcome any challenge) can help reframe your way of thinking.

These strategies are just a few coping mechanisms farmers can incorporate into their daily life to help

manage stress. However, they are not a substitute for professional medical advice, diagnosis or treatment. If you or a loved one is experiencing a crisis, visit your local emergency department or call 911.

Colbert: Labor in the food industry

N my annual visit to the National Restaurant Association Show in May, the number one topic on everyone's mind was not food or beverage. It was labor with two jobs available for every one

According to data from the association, the labor situation shows no signs of abating either.

"In looking at demographics, there will be forever high turnover," said one seasoned observer. "Additionally, a challenge is less skilled and less knowledgeable workers"

A strategy employed by the food service industry is not necessarily replacing workers, but taking steps out of the labor process.

For example, using a robot that cooks french fries or does dishes. Or using more items partially or fully cooked. Madefrom-scratch meals will be harder to find and more expensive.

Consumers, who have become accustomed to sticker shock at the grocery store, are slowly adapting to higher costs in restaurants. Reluctantly, they have also begun to accept reduced serving hours and parts of dining rooms closed because of the 'no help' syndrome.

Ambience, service and signature menu items remain drawing cards for restaurants. Since the first restaurant was allegedly opened in France in 1765,

there has always been an attraction to escape the household kitchen and be treated to a meal out.

Studies from the National Restaurant Association indicated that people continue to cook at home less and want more convenience. Consumers still want the experience of 'affordable indulgence', be it coffee in the morning or a leisurely dinner.

or a leisurely dinner.

By the way, 75 percent of the beverages served by Starbucks are cold/iced, not the traditional steaming hot cup of coffee. One reason places like that do so well is that coffee is the largest category in the food service industry.

From the days of percolated coffee with either cream or sugar at the diner, there has been an explosion of innovations in how coffee is made and served. And, the profit margin in both non-alcoholic and alcoholic has always surpassed that of food.

With all the changes in the way people eat and drink, the majority still enjoy flavors that remind them of past comfort foods. However, some of those same people want "daring" spices, those that challenge their taste buds, such as gochujang, unami

or wild hibiscus.

Plant-based foods continue to make inroads.
First, it was burgers such as the Impossible Burger.
Now, plant-based seafood has entered the market, with konjac (an Asian root vegetable) a protein

replacement filler for crab, tuna, calamari and prawns.

prawns.

After sampling the product, I don't get it. Seafood is seafood and plant-based does not taste anywhere close to it. But, oceans have been over-fished for years and plant-based is also a way to satisfy vegetarians.

Sustainability and environmental issues are important to the younger clientele and chain establishments readily promote those values.

With so many challenges these days, the restaurant business is at a crossroads. The potential for gross revenues has never been higher, but optimal profits aren't being realized.

To quote the bible, "The harvest is plenty, but the workers are few." Drive past any fast food restaurant and you will simultaneously see a help wanted sign accompanied by long line of cars wait-

ing to spend money.

To survive and prosper, the main objective of today's food and beverage operators has become attracting and retaining workers. From an erawhen the focus was on food and drink, a dramatic change has occurred with everything else secondary to the labor dilemma.

OREGON — The Oregon Park District Board of Commissioners held their monthly meeting on Tuesday, July 11 at Nash Recreation Center. The district meets the second Tuesday of each month.

The Board of Commissioners approved the District Values Statements, an engineering services contract with 20/10 engineering for air handler design services, National Recreation and Park Association conference

expenses, a 36-month contract with Dynegy Energy for electric supply rates, and a resolution authorizing support for an OSLAD grant for improvements at Park East. Each item was approved with a 4-0 vote.

The park district began

their pursuit of a new strategic plan in February and the first step in this process was redefining their values.

"The values create a clear focus on what drives day-to-day decision-making, inspires leadership, and holds the organization accountable," Erin Folk, executive director, said.

The approved values include: Caring, Creative and Community-Focused. The values were determined following interviews with community stakeholders and a staff summit involving all full and part-time employees.

An engineering services contract was awarded to 20/10 engineering in the amount of \$31,500 to

mechanical design work for a new air handler at Nash Recreation Center.

Folk added, "a facility assessment was completed in 2018 and replacement of the air handler has been a priority on the five-year rolling capital plan. The existing air handler is 23 years old and will be replaced with a stand-alone pool dehumidification unit. Design services are expected to be completed this fall

follow."

Illinois Department of Natural Resources will be accepting applications for their OSLAD grant program through Aug. 31. Oregon Park District intends to submit a \$600,000 grant application for improvements scheduled at Oregon Park East. The board has pledged their support by resolution and will look to improve recreation access and existing infrastructure at the

park site. Improvements will not impede the area occupied by Chana School or the playing field for Oregon Ganymedes.

The auction will start at 3 p.m. in the Beef Arena. It will feature 4-H market hogs, lambs, beef animals, goats, poultry and rabbits as well as the champion and reserve champion beef, swine, lamb and goat carcasses.

purchased and sent to a locker or may be bought and resold at a slaughterhouse. Transportation to processing plants will be provided. A floor price will be set according to the current market trends the day of the auction. A list of current market prices will be available.

Champion and Reserve Champion market animals will be sold first. Pork and lamb carcasses will be sold whole. Beef carcasses will be sold in halves.
