> STILLMAN VAL-LEY — A Stillman Valley woman was transported to a Rockford hospital with broken bones and is "doing well" following a June 23 home explosion in rural Stillman Valley, Ogle County Sheriff Brian VanVickle said.

Fire crews were called to a home in the 9,000 block of East High Road in rural Stillman Valley at 2:41 p.m. for a report of a home explosion with a woman trapped in the home. The Stillman Valley Fire Department arrived on the scene within four and a half minutes and located a woman trapped in what used to be the kitchen of the house.

"They worked on stabilizing the house and getting her out and transported to the hospital," VanVickle said. "There was a little bit of fire. It was not a significant amount of fire.

The fire spread through different areas. At this point it looks like it was a natural gas explosion. The fire marshal is here and ATF is here, which is standard protocol, just trying to determine what happened. They said the home occupant was actually in pretty good shape. She has some broken bones and she's in a Rockford hospital and doing well."

VanVickle said that besides it being natural gas-related, the specific cause of the explosion is unclear pending an investigation by Nicor, the state fire marshal and the ATF. Crews were still working on a live gas leak and trying to find the main to shut off the gas as of early Friday evening.

The sheriff said the explosion was heard and felt miles away.

"It's pretty incredible, the amount of damage. It was a family homestead house and it's completely leveled," VanVickle said. "It's just fortunate that the homeowner was in an area that was close to the outside. You can see that if she was in any other area, it certainly could've been a different outcome."

Along with SVFD and the sheriff's office, multiple agencies responded Friday including fire departments from Byron, Lynn-Scott-Rock and Cherry Valley.

Neighbors of the home sustained minor damage to their properties and ash and glass covered the road in front of the home. Two dogs were in the home and survived the explosion as well, VanVickle said.

"The only thing I've seen that's comparable to this is the tornado damage in 2015," Van-Vickle said. "She was the only occupant of the home. There were two dogs and we just got the second dog out about an hour ago. Both dogs survived. It was a good outcome. Everyone is doing well."

Office will add 3 full-time patrol deputies, unit to start by Jan. 1

**OREGON** — Following unanimous Ogle County Board approval of an Ogle County Sheriff's Office patrol deputy expansion from 20 to 23 to allow for a full-time drug interdiction unit on June 20, Sheriff Brian VanVickle said June 21 said the hiring process will begin in July and he hopes to have the drug unit up and running by Jan. 1, 2024.

Sixty-one percent funding of salary and benefits for the three additional deputy sheriff positions has been obtained for three years through the federal COPS grant, with county matching funds of 39 percent obtained through the salary budgeted line and a one-time payment of Ogle County Sheriff Brian VanVickle recently spoke to the Ogle County LIFE about his office's new drug unit.

\$80,000 from the opioid lawsuit monies received by the county. The total cost of the expansion will be \$621,602, and the county share of that will be about \$55,000 a year. At the end of the three-year grant, the additional three patrol deputy positions will be reevaluated by both the sheriff and the county board for permanent staffing of those positions. The ordinance approved June 20 said there is a "critical need" for a full-time drug interdiction unit in the county and the work has been being done on a part-time basis.

"We've had this grant for quite a long time and we've talked about this in meetings for nearly two years," VanVickle said. "To finally be able to bring that to the citizens is something that I think is a really great accomplishment for the people in our office that have been working so hard to get this taken care of."

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### **Byron Generating Station contributes** \$10,000 to area environmental nonprofits

Employees and volunteers do conservation work

BYRON — Constellation's Byron Generating Station is contributing a total of \$10,000 to four area environmental non-profit organizations, while its employee-led conservation club continues ecological improvements on the more than 1,700 acres of the nuclear plant's property in northern Illinois. The donations to groups focused on Rock River preservation and community ecological efforts, combined with station employee conservation events, is a logical pairing of business and community efforts to maintain the state's natural resources and help combat the negative effects of climate change.

"We've planted milkweed along with warm season grasses and summer flowers on hundreds of acres of Constellation property to restore the natural habitat for wildlife and create a sanctuary for the diminishing monarch butterfly population," Byron Station Employee Matt Hinkle, president of the plant's employee conservation club, said. "Our club members, employees and their families have helped with numerous projects like tree plant and invasive brush clearing to make our extended property a wonderful oasis for area wildlife."

Forest Preserves of WinnebagoCounty-Dedicated to protecting, conserving, enhancing and promoting Winnebago County's natural heritage for the environmental, educational and recreational benefit of present and future generations.

Rock River Coalition – Dedicated to preserving and improving water resources throughout the Rock River Basin and to educate and provide opportunities for people of diverse interests to work together to improve the environmental, recreational, cultural and economic resources in the Rock River Basin.

"Hoo Haven remains committed to help area wildlife, and contributions like these from Constellation are vital to helping us treat injured animals,' Steven Herdklotz of Hoo Haven said. Byron Generating Station is a certified "Silver" business by the Wildlife Habitat Council. The plant is located in Ogle County, about 100 miles northwest of Chicago. With both units at full power, the site produces more than 2,300 megawatts, enough electricity to power the equivalent of more than 1.7 million average American homes.

The sheriff's office is currently taking applications as part of its normal hiring process, which will close on July 1. Physical tests will follow shortly thereafter and meetings will be held with the merit commission to establish a hiring list by mid-July and then the sheriff's office will move forward to fill the positions "as quickly as possible." Veteran officers will join the drug interdiction unit and new officers will fill the patrol positions.

With a nationwide shortage of law enforcement applicants for open positions, Van-Vickle said his office has been fortunate to be fully-staffed for the past year with hiring processes going "very smoothly.

"We've gotten really good candidates when hiring," VanVickle said. "We've had a number of recent retirements over the last 4-5 years. We haven't lowered our standards at all. In fact, if anything, we've raised our requirements. We take a different approach. We support our deputies. We try to provide them with the best equipment and the best training. The men and women in this profession talk, and that's been our go-to, taking care of our people. And when you do that, their work ethic speaks for itself."

the full-time drug interdiction unit is to send a message to offenders and produce results to make the county safer.

"Even though we're a small, rural agency, this is something that we take very seriously and we have a dedicated group of people that are going to go out and enforce that and put cases together on those people and arrest them and hopefully send them to jail," VanVickle said. "That's what I want people to understand. Our goal is to make sure that everybody understands what we're doing down here and that we're going to hold those people accountable."

On the topic of the need for regular patrol deputy coverage in the county, VanVickle said he's had those discussions with the county board members on his department's subcommittee over the past several months. He called the expansion for the drug interdiction unit "a good compromise" because of the federal funding, and said a conversation about more regular patrol deputies will "definitely" need to be had again in the future.

The sheriff's office has 758 square miles to cover and the population it specifically serves is about 32,000 people. VanVickle said measures have been taken to help with coverage such as bringing in cover shifts to add additional deputies during busy times. Schedules have been adjusted accordingly after looking at analytics about when the potential for the highest call volume is.

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"When you compare

our numbers to the surrounding counties per capita and per square mile, our patrol deputy numbers haven't changed since the 1990s and those numbers reflect that," VanVickle said. "At some point this is a discussion that we're going to have to have about increasing the number of patrol deputies just because of the sheer volume of calls that we have and the distance it takes to get there. Waiting 25-30 minutes for a deputy to get there when a serious crime has been committed is not the right answer."

## HAPPY BIRTHDAY, AMERICA! 9 facts about the Declaration of Independence

**HE** Declaration of Independence is a document that indicates the founding principles of the United States of America. The declaration was issued by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776, and announced the separation of the 13 British colonies in North America from the United Kingdom.

That significance means the public may want to learn more about the Declaration of Independence. Here are some key facts.

1. While Thomas Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence, it was carefully reviewed and modified by other members of the Continental Congress, notably John Adams and Benjamin Franklin.

2. The Continental Congress actually voted for independence on July 2, 1776. The written Declaration was dated July 4, 1776, but it wasn't actually signed until August 2nd of that year. John Adams thought July 2nd would be marked as the national holiday.

3. Fifty-six delegates signed the Declaration of Independence, but not all were present on that day in August.

4. While many know that John Hancock signed first, with his prominent signature readily visible, it is believed that Thomas McKean of Delaware was the last person to sign

5. Others signed according to state delegation and in columns, starting with the northernmost state (New Hampshire) to the southernmost (Georgia).

6. About 200 copies of the Dunlap Broadside were printed. Today, 26 copies remain.

7. The original rough draft of the Decla-



ration of Independence has been lost.

8. The Declaration of Independence was not universally accepted, and many people in the colonies remained loyal to the British monarchy and opposed American independence.

9. The Declaration of Independence has a message written on the back of it. It reads, "Original Declaration of Independence dated 4th July 1776."

#### Drive sober or get pulled over, drive high get a DUI

**OREGON** — Ogle County Sheriff Brian VanVickle announced plans for stepped-up July 4 traffic enforcement with a focus on impaired and unbuckled drivers. The safety campaign runs from June 16 through the early-morning hours of July 5 to encompass three summer weekends leading up to and after Independence Day.

"It's simple: If you're driving, don't drink, use marijuana or other drugs," Sheriff VanVickle said. "Our officers will be working around the clock to keep impaired drivers off the roads and enforce all other traffic laws. We're doing it to save lives."

The Ogle County Sheriff's Office will join the Illinois State Police and more than 200 local police and sheriff's departments for the increased statewide enforcement effort.

Use these tips to help ensure a happy and safe holiday:

Designate a sober driver and

give them your keys before you go out.

Don't let friends or family members drive under the influence.

If you are drunk or impaired by marijuana or other drugs, call a taxi, take mass transit, use your favorite ride-sharing app, or call a sober friend or family member to get home safely.

Promptly report drunk drivers to law enforcement by pulling over and dialing 911.

Make sure everyone in your vehicle wears their seat belt. It's not only the law, but also your best defense against an impaired driver.

The "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over," "Drive High Get a DUI" and "Click It or Ticket" programs are made possible by federal highway safety funds administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation. The enforcement period runs concurrently with a media campaign reminding motorists that "It's Not a Game" to drive impaired.

LEASE fill in the blank: "Our - Father who art in be they name. heaven This month, that question came up on the television gameshow Jeopardy and none of the otherwise smart contestants could an-

swer that question.

The social media universe exploded with indignation. (In case you are wondering, the correct word is "hallowed.")

Scott Reeder The Rev. Franklin Graham said,

'We have lost so much Biblical literacy & basic awareness of the things of God's Word. This moving away from Biblical values will equal double jeopardy for our nation."

To be honest, I admired Graham's father, Billy, but after several years of listening to Franklin Graham bow before the altar of Donald Trump, I've come to the conclusion that the Graham gene pool might need a new lifeguard. His dad he ain't.

Butevenastoppedclock is right twice a day. And Graham is on to something here. In many ways are society is becoming increasingly ignorant of scripture.

For centuries the Bible has been a common cultural reference point that bound our nation. When Abraham Lincoln gave his House Divided speech, he was quoting from the book of Matthew.

When I was in high school, the rock group Iron Maiden came out with the tune, "Hallowed be thy name" proving that scriptural knowledge can give insight into heavy metal music. When Ben Franklin sent his "olive branch petition" to King George III it was a was a plea from colonists to avoid war with Great Britain. But its name came from a Biblical reference. > In Illinois, towns such as Athens, Mt. Zion, Zion, Hebron, Salem, Rome, Mount Olive and Bethany all derive their names from biblical references. Basic knowledge of scripture helps

us understand our own heritage.

What Jordan is experiencing in the classroom is what my college civil liberties professor, Donald Boles, warned of more than 35 years ago. Boles was one of the foremost experts on the intersection of religion and public schools.

He agreed with the 1963 Supreme Court decision, Abington Township v. Schempp, which prohibited mandatory recitation of Bible verses in public schools. But he feared school administrators (modern day scribes and Pharisees) would use the ruling as a legal pretext to eliminate classes dealing with religion.

But the high court said just the opposite in their landmark ruling:

"In addition, it might well be said that one's education is not complete without a study of comparative religion or the history of religion and its relationship to the advancement of civilization. It certainly may be said that the Bible is worthy of study for its literary and historic qualities. Nothing we have said here indicates that such study of the Bible or of religion, when presented objectively as part of a secular program of education, may not be effected consistently with the First Amendment."

#### Recycling

The Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) encourages farmers and agrichemical facilities to take part in a free agrichemical container recycling program. Beginning in the middle of July and continuing into August, sites throughout the state will collect containers that are recycled to make shipping pallets.

This program offers farmers and agrichemical facilities a convenient opportunity to dispose of empty pesticide containers and demonstrate their environmental stewardship. Metal and household pesticide containers are not eligible for the recycling pro-



gram. Collection sites will accept only high-density polyethylene, number two plastic agrichemical containers that are clean and dry. Participants are responsible

for rinsing containers and removing all caps, valves, metal, labels, booklets and foil seals. Participants are also responsible for cutting off the top and bottom of plastic drums and cutting the side of

bottom. Mini-bulk and intermediate bulk containers can be recycled via the IDOA's container recycling program by making the following container preparations: Mini bulk (cage) containers are required to be cut into separate top, bottom and sides, fittings discarded (no metal, no wood) (six slabs of plastic).

Intermediate bulk containers are to be cut in to one-foot square pieces, fittings discarded (no metal, no wood). G. Phillips and Sons, L.L.C. is offering services to pick up mini-bulk and intermediate bulk containers throughout the year. Feel free to contact G. intermediate bulk container collection service.

The program is a cooperative venture between the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Container Recycling Council, GROWMARK, Inc., Illinois Fertilizer and Chemical Association, G. Phillips and Sons, L.L.C., Illinois Farm Bureau, and University of Illinois Extension.

In other words, public schools should not be in the business of proselytizing. But it should be educating about religion.

Sadly, Professor Boles was prophetic. Schools have cut back on the religion courses during the past half century. And it has resulted in a growing ignorance of even the most basic biblical references.

This has had a corrosive effect on our society.

Common touchstones are disappearing that once bridged the language gap between those active in a church or synagogue and those who are not.

Abraham Lincoln was keenly aware of the shared cultural reference the Bible represented when he quoted the Gospel of Matthew in the period leading up to the Civil War by saying "A house divided against itself cannot stand."

Could an American leader use such a biblical reference today and be understood by all?

Probably not. We are losing the common reference point the Bible has brought our culture.

It seems we, too, are becoming a house divided.

#### \* On July 17, 1941, New York Yankees center fielder Joe Di Maggio's hitting streak of 56 consecutive games ended as 67,468 people watched him at bat against the Cleveland Indians. His record still stands, though Pete Rose came the closest to matching it when he hit in 44 consecutive games in 1978.

\* On July 18, 1984, 21 people were shot to death and 19 more were injured in a San Ysidro, California, McDonald's by James Oliver Huberty, who told his wife as he was leaving his house with three guns that he was "hunting humans." The fatal spree ended only when Huberty was fatally shot by a SWAT team sniper.

\* On July 19, 1879, Doc Holliday committed his first murder, killing Mike Gordon, who'd tried to persuade a girl working at Holliday's New Mexico saloon to run away with him. When she declined, the frustrated Gordon began shooting into the saloon from the street, and Holliday returned fire, dropping him with one bullet.

\* On July 20, 1963, Jan and Dean's "Surf City," which trumpeted "Two girls for every boy!" in its opening line, reached No. 1 on the U.S. pop charts. Penned by the Beach Boys Brian Wilson, the tune helped create an image of California as an endless summer paradise.

\* On July 21, 1925, John T. Scopes, a science and math teacher in Dayton, Tennessee, was convicted of violating the state's law against teaching evolution in public schools in what became known as the "Trial of the Century." He was ordered to pay a \$100 fine, but the sentence was overturned on a technicality.
