

Drought spreads across the state as dry weather continues

CHAMPAIGN—Dry conditions continue to worsen in Illinois as drought spreads across the state, according to Illinois State Climatologist Trent Ford at the Illinois State Water Survey.

The U.S. Drought Monitor now shows the Chicagoland area, much of central Illinois, and areas along the Missouri border from Quincy to St. Louis are in moderate drought, and the

northern two-thirds of the state are characterized as abnormally dry.

Among the many impacts of drought conditions, lawns, gardens, and trees have begun to show moderate to significant moisture stress in northeast and central Illinois. Reports have indicated some visible stress in soybeans in central Illinois and emergence issues in corn in western Illinois. Streamflow

across much of the state is well below normal for the start of summer in several spots along the Illinois, Vermilion, and Kaskaskia rivers and in other areas.

Outside of a few areas of heavy rain, most places have had only 25 to 60 percent of normal precipitation in the past 30 days, and parts of northeast and western Illinois have had less than 25 percent of normal precipitation since

the start of May. Chicago had its fourth driest May on record, and April and May total precipitation in Quincy was the third lowest on record.

The NOAA Climate Prediction Center shows the highest chances of near to above normal precipitation between June 8 and 14, though outlooks for more

Mendota plans to crack down on nuisance violations

☐ Food truck permit fee discussed

MENDOTA – Mayor David Boelk said the City of Mendota is going to be strictly enforcing its Public Nuisance Ordinance after a recent tour of the city opened his eyes to numerous violations.

Boelk, speaking at the June 5 regular meeting of the Mendota City Council, said beginning in July, the city will be "enforcing to a 'T' our public nuisances in Mendota." He cited condemned and vacant properties, abandoned cars, boats, and other vehicles, weeds, grass clippings, rubbish and everything else covered under the ordinance.

"It is not fair to the people who keep their properties up for others to not do the same," said Boelk

The city's Public Nuisance Ordinance reads as follows:

'It is against city ordinance to have accumulations of trash, building materials, abandoned automobiles, machinery, scrap metal, discarded tires, vehicle batteries or any other material that creates a public health hazard on your property. It is also a violation to permit weeds, grass or plants other than trees, bushes or flowers or other ornamental plants to grow to a height exceeding six inches anywhere in the city. Also, all multi-family structures, including structures that consist of both residential and commercial units, and structures which

share a wall or walls with another structure, shall be kept free from infestations of insects (including but not limited to bedbugs, cockroaches and disease-carrying insects), rats or other vermin. The city of Mendota requests anyone who is in violation of the above mentioned nuisance regulations to remove the item(s) from your property. Anyone found in violation will be subject to receiving a citation, which involves a court date and fine.

ALDERMANIC REPORTS

Alderman Jim Fitzpatrick presented a request from officials at St. John's Lutheran Church to use Veteran's Park from 8-11 a.m. Sunday, July 30 for a worship service. The request was approved.

Alderman Leo Hochstatter shared a request with fellow council members from Salvador Orozco to have a mobile food truck at a graduation party on Saturday, June 10 at Strouss Park, and the council agreed to the request.

During Alderman John Holland's report, the council approved an ordinance authorizing an intergovernmental agreement with LaSalle County in regard to Mendota TIF District 2022.

Alderman Kyle Kim presented an ordinance amending ambulance billing, which was approved. The amendment will allow

Mendota Union Depot mural project is nearing completion



Northern Illinois Food Bank launches Food Finder map

GENEVA - Northern Illinois Food Bank (NIFB) announced the launch of Vivery, an innovative platform and digital Food Finder map helping neighbors experiencing food insecurity connect with vital food resources in their community and surrounding areas. The new mobile-friendly map increases access to the fresh and nutritious food neighbors need to thrive.

Northern Illinois Food Bank works with a network of 900 food pantries and feeding programs to provide 78 million meals a year to neighbors across 13 counties in suburban and rural Northern Illinois. With the help of volunteers, donors, and member agencies, the Food Bank distributes perishable and non-perishable foods to 450,000 neighbors every

The Vivery platform, developed by the Thierer Family Foundation, helps food banks and food pantries remove obstacles preventing neighbors from finding food.

Digital features include an interactive Food Finder map with a searchable directory of food distributions sites with up to date schedules, times, directions, and programs. The Northern Illinois Food Bank website allows for users to easily change the language so neighbors can access the food they need in the language they speak. Users can also search by zip code, an address, or even filter for specific dietary needs to ensure they find the right food at the right time and place.

"These digital tools are a game changer in the future of food accessibility and equity in Northern Illinois,' said Julie Yurko, President and CEO, Northern Illinois Food Bank. "Our hope is that we can reach more neighbors experiencing food insecurity and help them and their families get to thriving faster."

"Updated search features and a clean, intuitive user experience help neighbors locate a food program convenient to their schedules and circumstances. The layout of the map is much more usable now," said Chris Borresen, Network Resource Platform Specialist, Northern Illinois Food Bank. "The majority of neighbors use their mobile devices to search for food pantries and resources. The new Food Finder map scales down to a mobile screen nicely making it more user

Vivery is working with other food banks in Illinois to include their programs, with the intent of removing borders from the Food Finder map. As a result, neighbors near the border of Cook County, served by Greater Chicago Food Depository, will see the Northern Illinois Food Bank agencies, and also agencies outside of our network, in the same map.

This project was made possible by the Thierer Family Foundation in partnership with the Northern Illinois Food Bank to ensure people across Northern Illinois could have equal access to







Swimming rules at Lake Mendota –

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from June 7, 1995.)

By Jessica Nashold When The Reporter came out on June

6, 1945, it carried rules and regulations for swimming at Lake Mendota. The season was to open Sunday, June 10, at 1 p.m. Harold Owens, coach at MHS, was in charge. Lifeguards were Audrey Greenwood and Naida Bruck.

The swimming area was designated by white markers and no swimming was allowed outside those boundaries. Among 17 rules to be enforced – no fishing or boating in the swimming area, no inner tubes in deep water, no dogs, no swimming without a partner. Also –

Do not use soap! Bathe at home.

Swimming instructions for girls was offered Monday, Wednesday and Friday; for boys, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Swimming hours for adults were 5-7 p.m., but high school students with summer jobs could swim during adult hours if they had a Swimming Permit Certificate signed by a parent.

Illinois Northern Utilities received an amended franchise extending to 1965 in order to replace artificial gas with natural gas. District Superintendent John J. Keefe told the council that savings for customers would result. As to when the project could go forward -

As soon as wartime restrictions have been lifted and governmental regulations complied with an material and manpower assembled to install pipelines and equipment.

The electric franchise was also extended so that gas and electric franchises would expire at the same time. The company added 7500 kilowatts to the city's allotment of free electricity.

Elgin Watch Co., which had opened in Mendota in November 1944, announced its departure to Aurora within 60 days. There had been a 65% drop in Navy orders. Elgin had employed 40 in Mendota.

Elgin Watch intends to manufacture phonographic needles but finds duraluminum (an essential material) almost unobtainable.

Backtracks Sidetracks

Sugar for canning was in short supply. The allotment could not exceed 10 pounds per person and families of more than eight members would receive no additional sugar. Persons who grow fruit for

home canning will receive their fair share if those who do no canning refrain from applying for canning sugar.

Word was received that 6,000 workers had been released from the Seneca yards of Chicago Bridge & Iron. The yard was scheduled to be completely closed on June 30.

D.M. Lotts, manager of Mendota's Alexander Lumber Co., purchased the Armstrong Lumber & Coal Co. in Mendota is certainly sorry to

lose the Lotts family and congratulates Ottawa on their good fortune in acquiring them to augment their business, church and social circles.

Florence Andrews resigned as principal at Lincoln School. The board appointed Ernest C. Keigley of Oakland, Ill., to succeed her.

Discipline and classroom organization are part of his well-outlined plan.

On June 6, 1945, Marge Cannon Sp(S)2/C, was one of the first four to receive a Navy Athletics Award for WAVES under the NATB physical training program. The presentation was made at Cabannis Field in Corpus Christi, Texas. Awards were earned by participation in sports. Recipients were entitled to wear a blue cloth N with white border, about four inches high, on blazers, sweaters or other sports clothing.

In his Washington Letter, published in The Reporter, Congressman Noah M. Mason described President Truman as the center of opposing forces, but said he had no definite indication as to his intentions. Mason's advice -We should reserve judgment and

offer only kindly constructive criticism during this testing time for the President.

Watson Bartlett, secretary-treasurer of the Graves Public Library board, rendered his annual report to the city. The tax levy in 1944 had been \$3,015.43 and library expenses had totaled \$2,874.45. This included \$1,500 for the librarian's salary, \$422 for the custodian. Books were \$416.77 and repairs and improvements to the building for the year were \$27.64. Bartlett did not present bills for repairs and improvements made by him.

The Chicago Bears announced an exhibition game with the Washington Redskins to be held at Soldier Field on Sept. 11, 1945. The game was of particular interest in Mendota because its own Frank Seno was halfback with the Redskins.

Mendota was well below its \$330,000 quota in bond sales. As an inducement, the State Theatre offered "Billy Rose's Diamond Horseshoe" in technicolor to which purchasers of bonds would be admitted free of charge. Betty Grable and Dick Haynes starred.

Both H.D. Hume Co. and J.B. Inderrieden Co. sponsored six-column "Official U.S. Treasury advertising" to promote the sale of additional bonds.

The month of May 1945 went into records at the government weather station at Westclox as the wettest and coldest May since records had been kept. Rainfall had been 7.27 inches and the average high temperature was 56.4 degrees. June seemed to be offering more of the same at an unscientific level. On Saturday, June 9, 1945 –

Farmers had pails standing out in the open and Sunday morning found two and a half inches of water in the pails.

"Before traveling to Florida, please understand that the state of Florida devalues and marginalizes the contributions of, and the challenges faced by African Americans and other communities of color."

This is a shameful lie even by the standards of the NAACP. The political play is obvious -- use "travel advisory" to get attention and credibility that a mere harsh statement about Gov. Ron DeSantis wouldn't garner, and hope the resulting media

We are used to taking travel advisories seriously, since the State Department often issues them and for non-frivolous reasons. When it says we shouldn't travel to Burma "due to civil unrest and armed conflict" and urges "increased caution due to wrongful detentions and areas with land mines and unexploded ordnance," most of us pay attention.

coverage helps drive negative associations with the state.

The NAACP wants people to think of Florida as a hellhole where the peril isn't physical but ideological --DeSantis is pursuing an agenda that, ipso facto, is hostile to certain minority groups. The group makes it clear that it is thinking of the governor's

fight against diversity, equity, and inclusion programs, critical race theory, and gender ideology in the schools, as well as his rejection of an Advanced Placement African American

This is a classic instance of progressive goalpost shifting. DEI is a relatively recent fad, but now if someone wants to keep it out of education, it's the equivalent of George Wallace standing at the schoolhouse door. It's the same thing with gender ideology -- no one thought that LGBTQ rights depended on teaching young children about gender fluidity until the day before yesterday.

As for the fight over the African American studies course, it's false to suggest the state's stance against overly politicized material in the course makes it opposed to the teaching of African American history as such.

In fact, the state's curriculum requires the teaching of key aspects of African American history, and these provisions have been made more robust under DeSantis.

Again, none of this has anything to do with travel -- if someone wants to read Ibram X. Kendi while standing in line at Universal Studios or brush up on their DEI training on an airboat in the Everglades, there's nothing stopping them.

Even if you come down in a different place than DeSantis on these various controversies, to suggest that his positions constitute some kind of malice toward African Americans or other groups is a stupid libel. Florida is a vibrant, diverse state, where people from all

backgrounds stand to benefit from good government. The state has an unemployment rate under 3%, and the earnings of African Americans have been increasing smartly. The schools are excellent and minority test scores are strong. Crime is at a half-century low.

Of course, if Florida were really a hotbed of antagonism toward minorities, Americans would have noticed and wouldn't be moving there en masse. The state has gained some 700,000 people since the 2020 census. The U-Hauls are coming because Florida has a well-earned reputation as an open place full of opportunity. If the NAACP were truly concerned about the welfare of

African Americans instead of trying to score points against a Republican potentially on the rise in national politics, it would issue travel advisories about going to Chicago or Baltimore, poorly governed cities where it is affirmatively dangerous for young Black men to live. Such places could learn from Florida. If the NAACP were

thinking clearly and didn't have an agenda, it wouldn't be denouncing the state but considering moving its headquar-

Mendotans among IVCC students studying abroad

OGLESBY - Illinois Valley Community College has five students who are studying abroad in Spain and Austria this summer. IVCC Professor and Coordinator of Study Abroad Amanda Cook Fesperman has worked diligently to increase both interest and numbers.

Nursing student Paola Martinez is traveling to Seville, Spain residing with four other roommates. Fluent in Spanish, Martinez said, "I'm excited to learn more about the language and the culture of Spain. When I graduate from IVCC I would like to become a traveling nurse. This opportunity will help to strengthen my Spanish and allow me to communicate and translate better for native speakers."

With a \$500 scholarship from the Illinois Consortium of International Studies and Programs for the trip, Martinez will also travel to Cordoba and Morocco.

Keina Arteaga and Rosie Rocha, both elementary education majors from Mendota, plan on traveling together to Seville, Spain staying with a host family for four weeks. They will also travel to Cordoba and spend a night in Morocco to experience the culture in northern Africa. Both students expressed the importance of understanding the background of their future students hoping this trip will broaden their understanding.

Arteaga and Rocha are the recipients of the highly competitive U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Education and Cultural Affairs Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program for a limited number of students receiving the Federal Pell Grant. This scholarship was named after the late congressman Benjamin A. Gilman from New York. With his support, the program was established by the International Academic Opportunity Act of 2000 to foster mutual understanding between students in the United States and students in other countries to promote positive relations. The Institute of International Education has administered the program since its inception in 2001.

IVCC adult student Lynn Keyt is spending two weeks in Salzburg, Austria studying German culture and music appreciation. Keyt plans on getting out to explore and absorb the culture. "I am very excited for the experience. I think the opportunity for exposure to other parts of the world is an important part of learning. As a business major being able to see how other cultures manage their marketing and customer relations operations will give me greater insight into international marketing," said Keyt.

Social science major Riker Fesperman, the fifth IVCC student participant, is heading overseas to Salzburg, Austria for over two weeks to study German, Austrian culture, and history. Fesperman is excited to immerse himself in the German language. "I love traveling and being abroad; they are wonderful experiences," said Fesperman.'

"Our study abroad programs are very affordable. Students can spend up to five weeks in the summer earning college credit in Austria, Costa Rica, England, France, Ireland, or Spain for about the same cost as a one-week vacation," stated Cook Fesperman. Students may also travel to other destinations including Italy, South Korea and Africa.







IDNR, Illinois Conservation Police urge life jacket use, sober boating

SPRINGFIELD - With the start of the summer boating season now underway, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) and the Illinois Conservation Police are reminding people to wear life jackets anytime they're on the water and to only operate boats while sober.

"Life jackets save lives, period," said Illinois Conservation Police Lt. Curt Lewis, the state's boating law administrator. "Everyone who heads out on the water should wear a life jacket, regardless of whether they're on a motorboat, a kayak, a canoe, or a stand-up paddleboard. We want you to have fun, but most importantly, we want you to be safe."

In 2022, there were 52 re-

portable boating accidents on Illinois waters, resulting in six fatalities and 40 injuries, according to statistics compiled by the Illinois Conservation Police. Prior years' statistics:

- 2021: 93 boating accidents with 16 fatalities and 28 injuries
- 2020: 81 boating accidents with 21 fatalities and 36 injuries • 2019: 72 boating acci-
- dents with 14 fatalities and 42 injuries Annual boating accident statistics are compiled

based on the federal fiscal

year Oct. 1 through Sept. 30. Statistics show most boating accidents occur between noon and 6 p.m.

on Saturdays and Sundays between June and August. Conditions are usually

clear with good visibility, light winds, and calm water. Most accidents involve operators between the ages of 20 and 40 who have more than 100 hours of boating experience but little or no classroom boating safety instruction. They also usually involve open motorboats cruising in a careless or reckless manner, culminating in a collision with another boat.

IDNR offers free boating safety courses that provide a review of boating laws and regulations, as well as instruction on the safe and attentive operation of watercraft. The department encourages boaters of all ages to take a safety course. Anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1998, must pass a course and have a valid Boating Safety Certificate to operate a motorboat (with over 10 horsepower). State law also requires boating safety education for people ages 12 to 17 to operate a motorboat.

"With boating season getting underway, everyone who heads out to enjoy the beautiful lakes and waterways Illinois has to offer should make safety their first priority," said Cody Gray, safety education program administrator for IDNR. "IDNR's mandatory boating safety classes are free, and what you learn may just save someone's life." Free safety courses are

taught by volunteer instructors and are available throughout Illinois. Find a schedule of courses at

https://dnr.illinois.gov/ safety/boatingsafety.html. For a fee, online boating safety courses are also available.

As part of the Illinois Conservation Police boating safety enforcement effort, officers also strictly enforce laws regarding operating under the influence (OUI) for boat operators. Operating a boat under

the influence is in some ways riskier than operating a motor vehicle under the influence, Lewis said. On waterways, there are no lane markers, boats have no seatbelts, and there is little protection for occupants should a collision occur.

In 2022, Illinois Conservation Police officers arrested 72 boaters for OUI, a 10% increase from the

previous year. In 2021 they arrested 65 boaters for OUI.

None of the six boating-related fatalities in Illinois in 2022 involved alcohol or drug impairment. Of the six fatalities, four who died were not wearing life jackets or vests.

Lewis stressed that wearing a life jacket is the most important action boaters and paddlers can take to ensure their safety and that of others on board.

Illinois law requires that personal floatation devices, or PFDs - which are life jackets or life vests - be available for each person aboard a boat or other watercraft. The law also requires Illinois law requires everyone to wear a PFD while operating a personal watercraft or jet ski.

The ultimate key to peaceful relationships

Where there is unity, God gives His blessing (Psalm 133). And Matthew 18:19 tells us there is power in agreement. However, we can't truly agree and walk in unity if there is bitterness, offense, or unforgiveness in our hearts.

I can put a big smile on my face and say all the right things, but if I'm still choosing to focus on negative thoughts and feelings about someone, I'm not really walking in love or unity. It's not just






