Company planning CO2 pipeline that would pass through county

CLINTON — Part of DeWitt County could be in the path of a second CO2 sequestration pipeline. Representatives of Wolf Carbon Solutions talked to the county's land use committee Monday about a plan to cross the southwest corner of the county with a pipeline that will terminate in Macon County. The difference between Wolf's plan and one proposed by Navigator CO2 is it does not involve wells in DeWitt County. Navigator filed several months ago with Illinois to terminate a CO2 pipeline at wells in DeWitt County. Another leg of the Navigator pipeline would terminate in Montgomery County.

CLINTON — Ill. Rep. Dan Caulkins met June 9 with students at The Vault teen and community center. Students in the The Vault-sponsored Envision U construction and trades camp delivered some games tables to the center they made during the camp. The Envision U Summer Career Camps is in its third season. In addition to construction trades, students can join camps in healthcare services, cosmetology, culinary arts and aviation. In 2021, The Vault hosted a table tennis group from Decatur. The group put on an exhibition and also donated table tennis balls, paddles and nets to the

center. The Vault also has hosted a STEM and Robotics Career Camp. Camps are for students from 7th grade through high school. "We should have something like this in all the towns in my district," Caulkins said about The Vault. "It's really great." Caulkins' helped fund the center from his foundation, which is funded by his legislator's salary. The Vault summer career camps are part of a trend to reach students who aren't necessarily interested in going to college. Clinton High School participates in the SkillsUSA program, which helps students get internships in various trades.

The object of CO2 sequestration is to pump CO2 emissions from various industries deep into the Mount Simon and other geological formations to prevent its release into the atmosphere. CO2 is a major culprit in climate change.

Archer Daniels Midland (ADM) announced early in 2022 a partnership with Wolf for advanced decarbonization of ADM's ethanol production. ADM has been involved with CO2 sequestration for several years in an effort to further reduce the company's carbon footprint.

ADM's two original CO2 injection wells are located under the ADM plant and in an area next to Richland Community College used in alternate years to host the Farm Progress Show. Richland is home of the National Sequestration Center, the first facility to offer degrees in carbon capture technology.

The proposed Wolf pipeline would travel across about 90 miles of Iowa and about 190

miles across Illinois. Wolf representatives are preparing to talk to landowners about granting easements for the pipeline. Law requires they wait until the project is approved at the state level before they are permitted to contact those landowners.

Tracey McDaneld, director of government relations and land for Wolf, said they do not pursue the right of eminent domain to obtain easements but prefer work with landowners to secure voluntary

easements.

McDaneld is a native of Salem, Ill. and works with projects throughout the Midwest and Great Plains states.

Todd Peterson, with Wolf, said the company submitted its applications to Iowa and Illinois.

Peterson said construction on the pipeline was expected to begin in the second quarter of 2025, "by the time our core permits for environmental and crossings and seeing how the ICC process goes, and the acquisition process."

"They're still holding be accountable to have it in service by Q2 of 2025," Peterson said. "It just depends on how we going to adapt the ag mitigation plan and have the contractors we intend to use."

Some landowners in Iowa have been fighting installation of CO2 pipelines, including projects from Navigator, Summit and Wolf. A group of landowners in Montgomery County, Ill. also have raised concerns about pipeline projects.

1963 - 26-year-old Valentina Tereshkova went into orbit aboard the Vostok 6 spacecraft for three days. She was the first female space traveler.

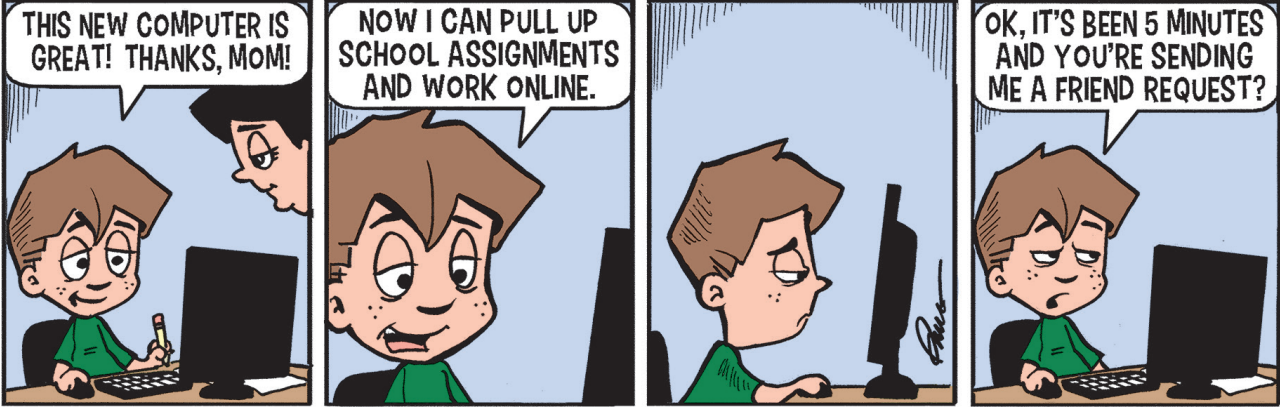

Disaster in the making

VA Fraud 101

There are only so many tax dollars to go around to provide services and benefits to veterans. When thieves cut into that money by taking what they're not entitled to, it harms the rest of us.

You can help by keeping your eyes open, and then reporting what you see to the correct people if you spot a scam.

Education benefits fraud can occur when a school charges veterans a higher rate than what is advertised or what they charge civilian students. They might offer discounts to civilians while billing the Department of Veterans Affairs for higher amounts. Students are told they don't even have to go to class and no actual skills are being taught.

Health care fraud can include billing for services the veteran didn't receive (check your explanation of benefits and your bills), or include the name of a different doctor or even the wrong dates the services were supposedly provided.

Medical identity theft can include the above, but gets worse when you discover errors in your medical file or when collection agencies start to hound you for medical bills you didn't incur.

Genetic testing scams can be lucrative for thieves, partially because of the kickbacks involved. Beware especially if you get a request for your personal information -- including medical, personal and financial -- for tests your doctor didn't order.

Keep an eye on what goes on around you for things such as: It looks as though a deceased veteran's benefits are being used by others, a veteran has a maxed-out 100% disability rating but doesn't seem to be getting any care for it or a beneficiary is too physically active for the supposed disability level.

What I've written about here is only the tip of the iceberg. To read about even more signs and indicators of fraud and theft, check the VAOIG's webpage: www.va.gov/oig/fraud/default.asp. Scroll through each section and become familiar with the signs of fraud. You could end up saving the VA massive amounts of money.

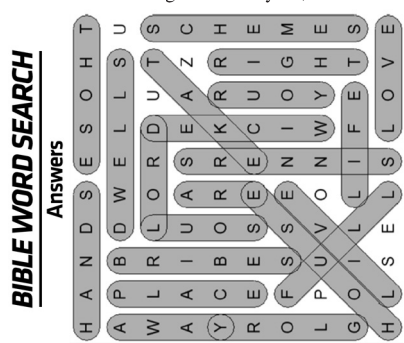

South America has a most complex cuisine due to various cultures and various different types of ingredients. Mexico had the Aztecs as its indigenous people. The central parts of South America had the Incas and others.

The Inca civilization had a very sophisticated culture as well as a well established cuisine. Their irrigation systems were superior. The Incas developed scientifically designed agricultural methods in matching the right type of crops for the best locations. This rivals

our own technology. It is no wonder this was a culinary paradise.

As was common of the conquistadors, they dramatically changed the existing cultures. Be as it may, the aborigine cuisine filtered through; an amalgamation. Due to the tropical conditions to the north and cooler climates as we travel further south, there would be a wide range of ingredients.

With that would come a wider range of dishes. In short, there would be sub-cultures with their own cuisines. Because of this vastness and the lack of strong international exchange with South America, many of the dishes are unknown outside of many of the sub-regions.

This country does not just grow chili peppers but different species of them. There are a dozen or more different kinds. Then chili peppers we buy from nurseries to grow in our gardens are probably a strain that originated in South America.

The tubers grown there

are not just the potato variety. To list a few in alphabetical order, we have: arracacha, choquepito mashwa, oca, papa amarilla, papa huayro and ullucu. Try and find those in your grocery store. Needless to say, much of the cuisine is unique to the area and strange to ours.

South America can be divided into four culinary sub-regions. This division is based upon the similarity of the cuisine within each separate region and yet dissimilar compared to the other regions. I prime factor for this is the type of ingredients commonly grown or found in these regions. An added factor would be the cultures that saturate these regions. For example, the northern and eastern parts of South America are heavily influenced by African immigrants.

Other regions have are heavy with natives have maintained the pre-invasion cuisine. In the Andes, the sweet and bitter potatoes are grown and thus enjoyed. Do not forget that Colombia is widely known for its coffee. That is not regionally enjoyed; it is enjoyed world wide.

South opens a 15-17 1NT, opposite which a 9-point hand is very much on the borderline between bidding game and inviting game. But North's 9-pointer is a particularly fine specimen, what with that 5-card suit and all those lovely Tens, so in this case North has no qualms whatsoever about bidding 3NT directly.

West's opening lead is his 4th best Spade to East's King. East returns the Spade Nine and, in this situation, it sometimes pays for West to duck the trick, thereby maintaining communications between the E-W hands (so that East still has a Spade to lead if and when he gets in again). But here that is not necessary. West has the ♥A as a fast entry and has no need to duck the second Spade. So, West wins the ♠A and leads a third round, won by Dummy's Queen.

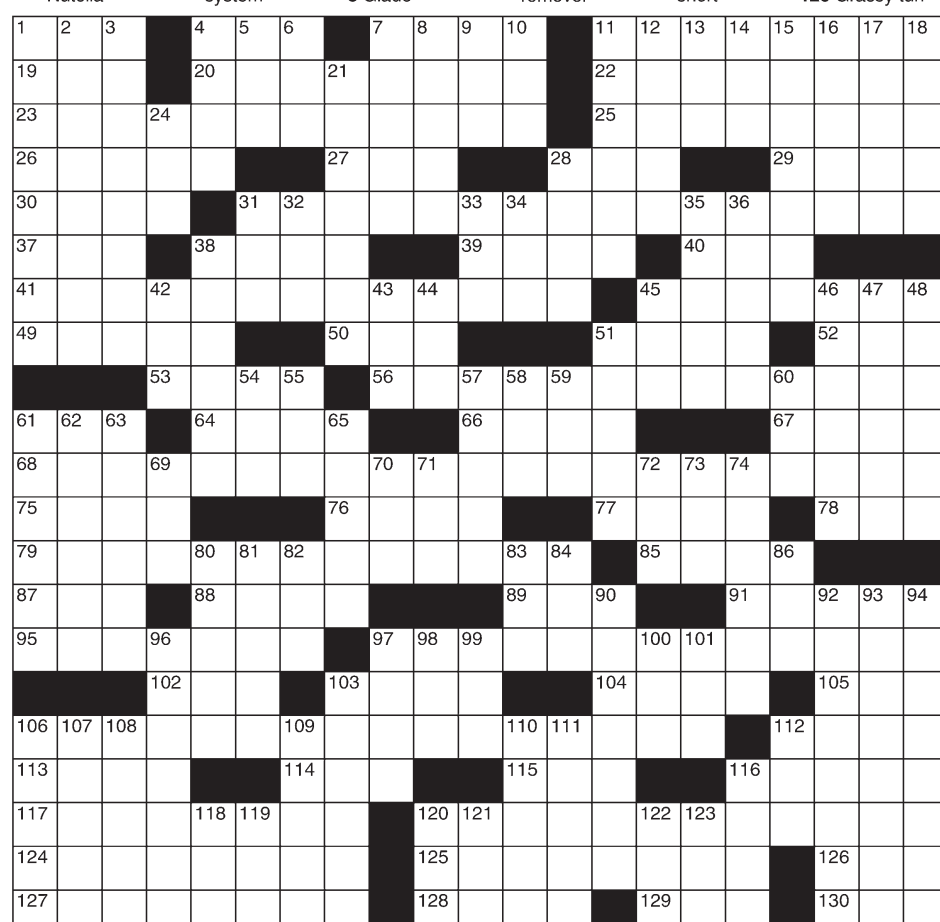
At this point, Declarer has 8 top tricks and must guess the Heart suit correctly if she is to make her contract. When she leads a Heart from Dummy should she play the King or the Jack? It may seem like a pure guess, but in fact Declarer has a clue. West didn't duck that second Spade! Presumably he didn't think it was necessary, and the strong inference is that West has a fast entry, namely the ♥A. So Declarer finesses the Jack and brings home her contract!

If West is a truly devious fellow (and many bridge players are) then he might duck the second Spade anyway, even though it is unnecessary. That could prompt an alert Declarer to conclude that West has no fast entry, and therefore that the ♠A must be with East. In that case, Declarer hops up with the King and goes down one! Then again, if Declarer knows that West is of the devious persuasion, she might smell a rat and guess right anyway. And if West guesses that Declarer will smell a rat then he might

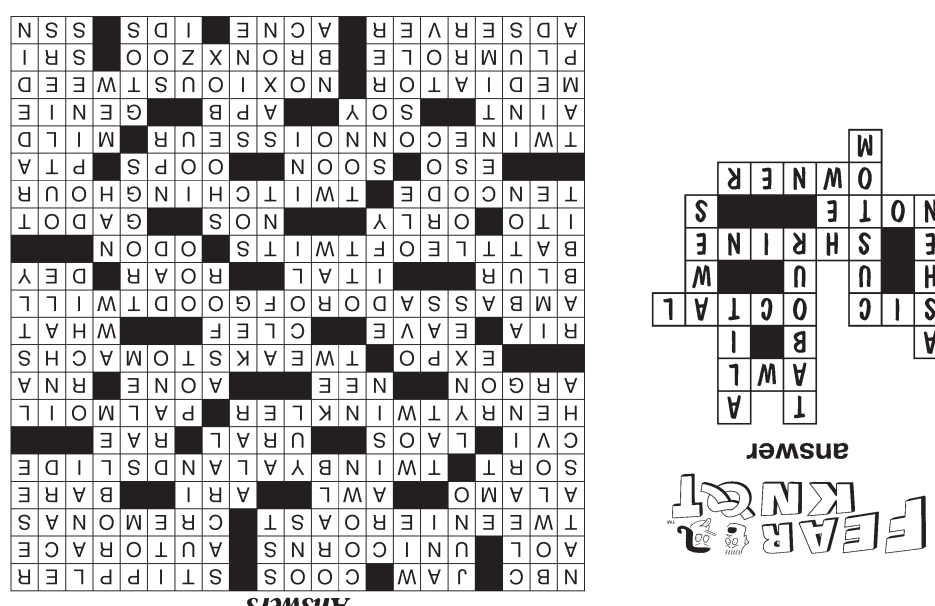
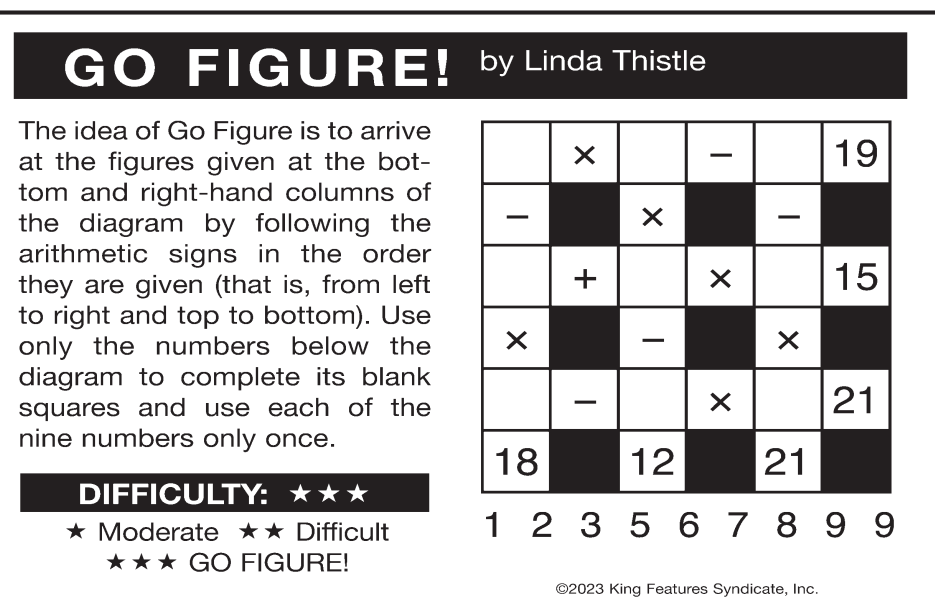
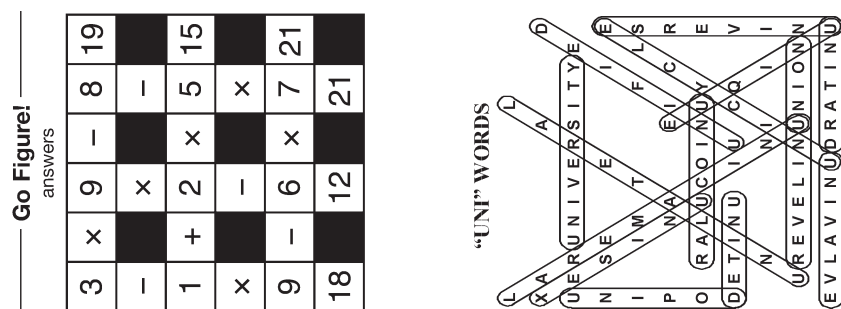

The course ensures that the adult leaders fully understand what Servant Leadership is all about, so they teach the youth they work with correct method.

The course is run as if were an ideal Troop as founder Baden Powell laid out in the early 1900s. The adults form patrols, five to seven Scouts in each, from more than 50 adult leader from the Central Illinois area. These small groups bond as they learn via the use of games, examples, more games and other activities meant to demonstrate and teach, breaking from today's norm of lectures and power point presentations.

What they learn then is designed to help Scouting youth to understand what leadership, character development, critical evaluation, planning, citizenship are really all about. These are vital parts of why youth become involved in Scouting, often not realized until years later.

Richards took on the job expanding both the Clinton Troop 1142 website (www.

clintontroop142.com) and their Facebook page to make information more accessible for people with disabilities by incorporating text-to-speech options and videos. He has been working on redoing the outside of the Troop's trailer with new signage, including a list of all the Eagle Scouts in the last 30 years.
