Implementing California's Prop 12 comes with challenges, expenses for Illinois hog farmers Ogle County's Duncan: 'We're just not sure what happens now' **BY TIMOTHY EGGERT**

LLINOIS pork farmers say a litany of Luncertainties remain about how California's Proposition 12 will be implemented or enforced after the U.S. Supreme Court found the law constitutional.

Led by Justice Neil Gorsuch, the court recently upheld the state's animal welfare law, ruling 5-4 that "while the Constitution addresses many weighty issues, the type of pork chops California merchants may sell is not on that list."

But according to Illinois livestock producers, preserving the law could spell major costs for farmers, leading to higher pork prices for consumers, and might cause more negative health outcomes for hogs raised under its standards.

"There's some big macro, even global, consequences to this, and then there's consequences that impact day-to-day pork production and pig farmers like myself," said Illinois Farm Bureau Vice President Brian Duncan, who raises hogs in Ogle County. "We're just not sure what happens now."

Adopted by 63% of California voters as a 2018 ballot initiative and set to take effect July 1, Prop 12 prohibits sales in the state of pork, veal and eggs from

livestock whose confinement do not meet certain minimum space rules.

Those rules mandate hog spaces be large enough for an animal to turn around, lie down, stand up and extend its limbs. They specifically set sow

confinement dimensions at 24 square feet, which is 7 square feet larger than the industry standard.

The National Pork Producers Council and American Farm Bureau Federation contend the requirements violate the Commerce Clause because California represents less than one-sixth of domestic demand and sources most of its pork from other state producers.

The organizations also argued the law would compel farmers to adopt group housing and open pen gestation, which in turn would result in worse health outcomes for sows.

"There's a higher cull rate due to injury," said Duncan, who, with certified veterinarians, manages a sow farm that uses pen gestation.

HOG: Mandates estimated to increase production costs at farm level

"There's more abrasions, there's more fighting, there's more biting," Duncan said of open pen gestation systems. "All the things you would expect when you have animals that are aggressive let loose with each other."

To meet the law's space requirements, hog farmers will likely need to cull as many as 30% of their sows, according to Chad Leman, president of the Illinois Pork Producers Association. He owns Leman Farms Inc. in Woodford County. "This alone will come at a significant

cost," Leman told FarmWeek, adding he has no immediate plans to change any of his hog barns or production systems until there's more direction within the industry. The law's mandates are estimated to

increase production costs at the farm level by 9.2%, with producers expected to spend between \$290 million and \$348 million to update sow housing to comply with the law, according to NPPC and AFBF. "Currently with building and construction costs and the dynamic of our farm, it'd

be very cost prohibitive and hard to justify making those changes for an unpromised premium," said Thomas Titus, a former IPPA president who manages Tri Pork Inc., a farrow-to-finish farm in Logan County. There are also questions around how

California regulators will enforce the rules in other states. Do packers certify the pork product came from an animal housed according to the law? Will there be third-party audits and inspections? While farmers might be tasked with

tracking Prop 12-compliant hogs on their farms, Titus said packers might also have to keep pigs segregated when they come in, separated in freezers and coolers and affixed with specific labels.

"(The law) definitely adds not just another layer of compliance challenges for the producer, but also for the processor, too," Titus said. "Labor around that is also a concern."

And there's uncertainty whether the market will even offer more for pork raised in the environment the law mandates.

Duncan, Leman and Titus said the farmers who implement changes to comply should be compensated more for their meat products, such as a per-head premium.

"We have no problem if there's some sort of voluntary program where producers who choose to raise pigs this way would be paid a premium for their products and could make a business decision to try to capture that market," Leman said. "What we've got a real problem with is this involuntary regulation being forced on all of us who raise pigs." Illinois hog farmers are further con-

cerned the ruling on the law will empower "states with high people populations and low pig populations" to craft similar regulations, Leman added.

Duncan agreed, forecasting consequences that a patchwork of U.S. laws could have on international trade.

"What good is an agreement that I may negotiate ... if I can't assure (a trade partner) the access to my markets is going to be uniform across the country?" Duncan said. "It raises all sorts of questions about what trade agreements look like going forward if a state can slap extra burdens on an importer."

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

The campaign culminated in Washington, D.C., to demand aid for America's most impoverished communities and focused not just on Blacks, but all minorities.

*On June 20, 1947, gangster Benjamin "Bugsy" Siegel was murdered at the Beverly Hills, California, mansion of his girlfriend, Virginia Hill, while reading the evening newspaper. Though the case has never officially been solved, one theory holds that Siegel died by order of mob associates disgruntled about the soaring costs of his pet project, the Flamingo resort in Las Vegas.

* On June 21, 2006, two recently discovered moons orbiting Pluto were named Nix, after the Greek goddess of darkness and night, and Hydra, after a mythological, multiheaded serpent defeated by Hercules. The moons had initially been spotted by the Hubble Space Telescope a year earlier.

* On June 22, 1940, the first Dairy Queen restaurant opened on historic Route 66 in Joliet, Illinois. While frozen sweet treats are, sadly, no longer served at the site (especially at their original prices of 5 cents for a cone and 8 cents for a sundae), it remains a local landmark.

* On June 23, 1951, a hailstorm in El Dorado, Kansas

Taxation and agriculture

ITH Tax Day in the rear-view mirror, I thought it might be worthy to look at taxation and agriculture. One thing about farmers, they don't like paying taxes.

Running a farm or ranch business is challenging under the best of circumstances. Agriculture operates in a world of uncertainty — from unpredictable markets to fluctuating farm business costs, to weather disasters and disease outbreaks. Farmers and ranchers need a tax code that provides certainty and recognizes their unique financial challenges as they work to provide a secure food supply for our nation

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sage of the Tax Cut and Jobs Act, have been made in recent years, farm bureau supports a number of changes to help provide stability and security for America's farms and ranches.

Estate taxes should be permanently eliminated.

At the very least, farm bureau believes that the \$11 million per person/\$22 million per couple indexed estate tax exemption that was passed as part of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act should be made permanent and that unlimited stepped-up basis should continue.

The limitation on the amount that property values

can be reduced under Special Use Valuation Section 2032A should be removed. Timber harvesting or the sale of a conservation easement should not trigger a recapture of estate taxes.

The capital gains tax rate should be reduced and assets should be indexed for inflation.

Capital gains should not be collected at death and there should be an exclusion for agricultural land that remains in production, for transfers of farm business assets between family members, for farmland preservation easements and development rights, and for land taken by eminent domain.

Passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act in 2017 benefits most farm and ranch businesses and has allowed them to build their operations and stimulate the agricultural economy. Important provisions include reduced tax rates, the new business income deduction, provisions to allow the matching of income and expenses, immediate cost recovery and an increase in the estate tax exemption. USDA Economic Research Service documented the expected benefits of the tax reform in its June 2018 publication "Estimated Effects of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act on Farms and Farm Households."

Permanent

Provisions

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act contains many new, permanent provisions that help agriculture.

Sect. 179 Small Business Expensing Increased to

\$1 million. Indefinite Carry Forward of Deductions Indexed for Inflation. Depreciation for Farm Equipment Shortened from seven to five tears.

New Flat 21 percent Corporate Tax Rate. Repeal of the Corporate Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT)

Temporary Provisions

Many of the pass-through business provisions in the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act are temporary and should be made permanent.

More the 98 percent of farm and ranches operate as "pass-through businesses:" sole proprietorships, partnerships and Sub S corporations. Failure to extend these important provisions will result in a tax increase for farmers and ranchers and leave them without ways to deal with the cyclical and unpredictable nature of their businesses.

Peduced Pass Through Tax Pates and Expand

Reduced Pass-Through Tax Rates and Expanded Brackets: If not extended, higher tax rates will increase taxes on the majority of farm and ranch businesses.

New 20 percent Business Income Deduction

(phase-out starts when taxable income exceeds \$315,000/joint): Allowing the business income deduction to expire would expand the tax base of pass-through businesses, erasing much of the benefit of tax reform legislation.

Unlimited Bonus Depreciation (Expensing): If

not continued, farmers and ranchers will be unable to offset income with deductions for their business expenses. This is especially critical because likekind exchanges for equipment and livestock are repealed.

Doubled Estate Tax Exemption to \$11 million person/\$22 million couple: If the exemption is allowed to revert back more farms and ranches will be subject to estate taxes. And, as long as the exemption level is temporary money must be spent on estate tax planning rather than on growing farm and ranch businesses.

Increased Alternative Minimum Tax Threshold for Individuals: Rollback of the higher AMT threshold will cancel out important deductions and credits put in place by tax reform.

Farmers invest in sustainable agriculture throughout the year

ACH spring people around the world celebrate our planet, recognizing the need to find innovative solutions to protect our soil and water for generations to come.

Farmers, often called the "original conservationists," continue the fight for cleaner, more sustainable agricultural practices throughout the year. We care deeply for our land and collaborate with our agricultural research partners to implement the best solutions to preserve our natural resources.

We invest time, money, and energy in protecting our land. We are investing in our future.

Our farmers utilize a variety of sustainable practices. One strategy that has gained momentum in recent years is the use of cover crops, or plants such as wheat, rye, and radishes which are planted after primary cash crops like corn and soybeans are harvested. These special crops work hard to enrich the soil, maintain moisture, and prevent erosion among other benefits.

In February, University of Illinois researchers released a new study showing that Midwestern farmers are seeding more cover crops than ever. The study showed that cover crop adoption reached 7.2% in 2021, up from 1.8% a decade earlier. Researchers stated that the rapid increase in cover crop adoption between 2017 and 2021 coincided with increased state and federal incentive programs.

The U of I study, "Recent rapid increase of cover crop adoption across the U.S. Midwest detected by fusing multi-source satellite data," was published in Geophysical Research Letters.

Farmers also work hard to

voluntarily implement the Illinois

Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy (NLRS) to reduce nutrient loss to the Mississippi River and the Gulf of Mexico. Last year, Illinois Farm Bureau's (IFB) environmental team

joined forces with farmers and agricultural researchers to film a new documentary highlighting sustainability efforts in Illinois.

The hour-long film "Sustaining Our Future: A Farm Family Story," celebrates farmers' dedication to the environment while sharing with a broader consumer audience the trials, and in some cases, the financial risks farmers take

to conserve our natural resources.

Viewers are invited to join the
Ganschow family of Bureau County to learn how three generations of
farmers have approached sustainability to create a brighter future for
generations to come. People can
now watch the documentary for
free on IFB's YouTube channel.

This April, Illinois farmers and the agricultural research community collaborated to showcase current and past conservation practices, including ongoing cover crop projects. These Spring Nutrient Stewardship Field days are an opportunity for those inside and outside of agriculture to learn more about farmers' role in protecting the environment.

Now in its eighth year, IFB's Nutrient Stewardship Grant Program supports research conservation projects across the state. Our organization has committed more than \$2.8 million to nutrient stewardship initiatives since 2015. For the fiscal year 2023, IFB distributed \$175,000 in grants for local projects, including \$25,000 to support pollinator conservation across the state.

It is fitting that this year Illinois farmers will host two field day opportunities ahead of Earth Day. In Washington County, farmers will evaluate nutrient loss reduction

practices in addition to evaluating cover crop projects. Young farmers in Knox County will also invite researchers and farmers to learn more about their goal to implement one cover crop plot in each township within the county.

Farmers are at the forefront of climate-smart farming, putting scientific solutions, technology, and innovation to work to protect our land, air, and water. Every year is a learning curve,

We are constantly building upon previous research to develop better, more sustainable practices and strategies to protect our land. It is important to also keep in mind this is a long-haul effort. Each year, our farmers find new ways to approach conservation and sustainability, moving the needle ever closer to a brighter, greener future.

I am proud of the work Illinois farmers are doing and will continue to do to preserve our natural resources. While the world celebrated our planet on April 22, I challenge everyone to learn more about how their local farmers are committing themselves to finding innovative solutions to protect our land.

FHS completes first year of senior engineering capstone course

FORRESTON — The first year of Forreston High School's Senior Engineering Capstone course was completed on Thursday, May 4. A team of three seniors presented a year-long project they worked on through the Project Lead the Way curriculum. Team members included Johnathen Kobler, Alexander Milnes and Brock Smith. The project started last fall with the students generating a list of situations that frustrated them. Once the list was determined, the students worked from that list towards defining a problem with the guidance of their instructor, Mr. Jonathan Stauffer. The student team then conducted research on several of these problems to see which would become a feasible project. Their final project choice led to an improved football cleat cleaner for better performance and reducing the risk of injury.

The team received help on the project from five expert members of the community. Community members listened to the initial presentation and provided recommendations that focused their project design towards a working prototype. The experts were Dean Fox (E.D. Etnyre & Co.), Shaun Gallagher (Gallagher Engineering), Guy Gronewold (independent business owner), Scott Schoonhoven (Mid-America Plastic) and Seth Gronewold (Fehr-Graham). At the May 4 event, Dr. Naeva Batina filled in for her father, Guy, as a judge along with the four other experts mentioned above. The Forrestville Valley School District appreciates the time each community expert gave to support the students over the year.
