## Two Meridian schools awarded Lighthouse status

'Our vision is that we have small-town values and world-class results'

STILLMAN VALLEY — In 2016, Highland Elementary and Monroe Center Grade School in the Meridian CUSD 223 school district began the adoption of Leader in Me. Leader in Me is a character education program based on the 7 Habits of Highly Effective Leaders. This program from Franklin Covey provides direct instruction to students on how they can use the habits to help develop individual skills, skills to collaborate with their peers, and skills to work through peer conflict.

There is over 5,000 Leader in Me schools across the globe, including 74 schools in Illinois. While schools implement Leader in Me they are able to follow a rubric that helps to provide a base for best practice and what exemplary school practices look like. Lighthouse Schools serve as exemplars for other Leader in Me schools around the area, the nation and the globe. As of May 2023, there were less than 700 Lighthouse Schools worldwide.

On Monday, May 22, principals at both Highland Elementary and Monroe Center Grade School were notified that they had achieved Lighthouse status. To become Lighthouse Schools, both Highland Elementary and Monroe Center Grade School went through a rigorous process that included the creation of an evidence binder, multiple visits from their regional coach, and a full-day visit from outside evaluators. Both schools were measured in their outcomes as related to teaching leadership principles, creating a leadership culture, and having aligned academic systems.

Highland Elementary and Monroe Center Grade School will join eight other Illinois Lighthouse schools. "Our vision is that we have small-town values and world-class results, and this is an example of that", stated Dr. PJ Caposey, superintendent of schools.

"Less than 14 percent of Leader in Me

schools worldwide are recognized as Lighthouse Schools and having two schools in our small rural district is a testament to the amazing work of our staff, families and most importantly our students", Dr. Joe Mullikin, assistant superintendent and principal of Highland Elementary School, said.

"Seeing the remarkable leadership taken on through the work that is done by staff and students, and the pride that is taken in this work, is one of the most rewarding and exhilarating feelings", Mrs. Deana Simpson, principal at Monroe Center Grade School, said. "I have never been more proud."

## work pays off with **Rock River float trip**

**OREGON** – A group of 20 Oregon High School students with special needs had the ride of their lives as they floated down the Rock River as part of a workbased learning opportunity with White Pelican Canoe & Kayak Rental in Oregon. For the second year, the transition program students traveled to White Pelican in Oregon to gain hands-on work experience cleaning and detailing the canoe and kayak shuttle vans in preparation for the summer. In exchange, the students enjoyed a float trip down the Rock River, leaving from the Oregon Dam at White Pelican headquarters and concluding at Castle Rock State Park, about four miles away or a 90-minute float away.

"This trip means a lot to the students who take the transition class," Dominic Cozzi, the special education teacher at Oregon Junior High School and teacher of the transition program, said. "They gain real-life experience, and it helps build social skills and rapport with one another. It's a great cap to end the school year for students who may not otherwise ever have the opportunity to float the Rock River."

The transition program maintains several community-based partnerships designed to help students gain work experience in



authentic settings. As part of the program, students job sample with local business owners about two hours per week for 12 weeks. Other community partnerships include Hector's Cocina, Lifeline Food Pantry, Oregon Park District, Oregon Public Library, W@sh, Stronghold Camp and Retreat Center, Ace Hardware, Supervalu, Angel Treasures in Mount Morris and the Oregon Chamber of Commerce.

## Man arrested for driving while license revoked

### Ogle sheriff's office announces 'Click It or Ticket' campaign numbers

**OREGON** — The Ogle County Sheriff's Office announced May 31 it issued 108 total citations during the recent Memorial Day "Click It or Ticket" enforcement period.

While Illinois' 2022 seat belt compliance rate was 93%, unbelted occupants still account for more than half of those killed in traffic crashes. The "Click It or Ticket" campaign aims to change the behavior of the millions of people who don't buckle up. Thousands of lives could be saved each year if every vehicle occupant was properly restrained when traveling. During the enforcement period, sheriff's deputies issued 108 citations for violations to increase traffic safety that included the following offenses: six arrests for driving under the influence, 15 arrests for revoked/suspended/no valid driver's licenses, one felony drug arrest, two misdemeanor drug arrests, two arrests for drivers with outstanding arrest warrants, 28 citations for speeding offenses, seven citations for uninsured motorists, nine citations for registration violations, three



citations for no seat belt violations and three citations for improper lane usage violations.

The Illinois "Click It or Ticket" campaign is administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation with federal highway safety funds.





## **MOMENTS IN** TIME

\* On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution, which determined that the U.S. flag would consist of 13 alternating red and white stripes and 13 white, five-pointed stars on a blue background.

\* On June 12, 1817, the earliest form of bicycle -- known as the Laufmaschine in German and in English by the derogatory term "dandy horse" -- was demonstrated by its inventor, Karl Drais.

\* On June 16, 1903, Pepsi-Cola became an official trademark. The Pepsi Cola Company had launched just the year before, to immediate success, and by 1910, boasted more than 200 franchises in 24 states.

\* On June 18, 1978, American serial killer and sex offender Jeffrey Dahmer murdered his first victim just three weeks after his high school graduation. Dahmer had lured 18-year-old hitchhiker Steven Mark Hicks to his house with the promise of a few beers.

\* On June 13, 1981, Queen Elizabeth II was shot at with six blank rounds by Marcus Sarjeant while she was riding a horse. The queen managed to keep her horse under control and was not injured. When police questioned Sarjeant about his motives, he said: "I wanted to be famous. I wanted to be a somebody."

\* On June 17, 1985, fighter pilot and Saudi prince Sultan bin Salman Al Saud became the first Arab, the first Muslim and the first member of a royal family to fly into space, on NASA's Discovery Space Shuttle, as a payload specialist. He chose not to fast for Ramadan while he was training and in space, but brought a small Koran along for the trip, with a prayer from his mother asking God to protect travelers, and tied his feet to the shuttle floor to prostrate himself in prayer as best he could. \* On June 15, 2019, Babe Ruth's baseball jersey became the most expensive sports memorabilia in history when it sold for a staggering \$5.6 million. According to Hunt Auctions, the jersey dated to between 1928 and 1930 and broke the previous record of \$4.4 million set by a 1920 Ruth jersey.

## How the left and right exploit our election system

N April 25 NBC News report signifies the kind of choice that we'll likely face in the 2024 presidential election. It revealed an approval rating of 34 percent for Donald Trump versus a similarly-pitiful 38 percent for Joe Biden. 60 percent didn't want Mr. Trump to run. 70 percent said the same of President Biden.

Yet both seem certain to be nominated by their respective parties. This forced choice comes to us from an election system that too often fails to represent the people. It's a problem that we can fix, if we have the will.

The flaws in our system of primary elections for nominating political candidates were open to view in 2020, when the Democratic Party came close to fielding socialist Bernie Sanders for president. It was also apparent in the 2022 House and Senate contests, when the Republican Party nominated extremist candidates, at the cost of its expected landslide victory.

Primary elections normally attract only a small percentage of the voting public. Fewer than eight percent of eligible voters, for example, participated when progressive Democratic Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez first won in 2018. Fringe candidates can triumph with the support of fewer than half of the voters in these winner-take-all contests, as moderate contenders divide the rest among themselves. That's how Donald Trump was able to win primaries in state after state in 2016 and go on to dominate the Republican convention.

The success of this divide-and-conquer strategy is rooted in well-intentioned reforms that largely did away with the control that party bosses used to

have over the selection of candidates. The unintended consequence was, as Steven Levitsky and Daniel Ziblatt explain, in their book, "How Democ-racies Die," to eliminate the "guardrails" that those leaders had provided against radical candidates.

Gerald Sieb, in the April 22 Wall Street Journal, describes how the following decades further weakened the political parties, with laws limiting their fundraising, court decisions opening the floodgates to election spending by outsiders, and the advent of on-line fundraising by candidates. Mr. Sieb favors laws to reverse those trends and strengthen party organizations.

Other reformers seek to advantage moderate candidates through non-partisan primaries and rankedchoice voting. Alaska introduced a promising version of that approach in time for the 2022 election.

Candidates in Alaska now participate in a single primary election that includes all contestants and voters, regardless of party. The top four winners then move on to the general election, where voters can rank them in the order of their preference. If no candidate wins a majority, the lowest one is eliminated.

His/her supporters' votes are then distributed among the other contenders, based on who they identified as their second choices. If there's still no candidate above 50 percent, the next lowest is eliminated in the same way. At this point, one of the two remaining

contestants will have a majority and will be declared the winner. The idea behind this and similar

> reforms in some other states is, first of all, to ensure that no candidate wins a primary or general election without earning the support of a majority of the voters, as too often happens today. It also discourages extremism and negative campaigning. Candidates need to appeal

to a broad range of the public, and avoid offending other contestants' followers, in order to prevail in the elimination rounds.

Alaska's system seems to have had the intended effect in 2022, when Lisa Murkowski, a moderate Republican Senator, was reelected. Under the previous system, she wouldn't have made it past the hard-liners in the Republican primary.

Reforms like Alaska's appear to be growing in popularity. They nevertheless won't by themselves bring about a golden age of harmony to our polarized society. Nor will they address other structural flaws that threaten our democracy, including the Electoral College, the undemocratic Senate, and gerrymandered election districts.

What they can do is impair the ability of the Left and Right to exploit our election system, and help return the advantage to the broad center, the core of the American people, who have for too long been neglected in politics.

The questions he asked had little to do with her experience and much to do with the candidate's child-bearing plans. This incident happened more than a decade ago when I was in management for a different employer.

I would like to say that I stood up and interrupted the interrogation and said, "You can't ask those questions." But to my shame, I remained silent. I didn't want to lose my job.

Only a few months earlier, the same boss became infuriated when another woman announced her pregnancy shortly after she'd been hired.

He said he'd been "tricked" and "deceived" and that he wanted me to fire her. I wouldn't. (Interestingly enough, he could have fired her himself, but for some reason didn't.)

Instead, I spent nearly nine months being harangued daily by my supervisor about the woman's continued employment. It was a miserable experience. He was gestating a grudge.

Call me a Pollyanna, but until this experience it never occurred to me that some employers would retaliate against a worker for getting pregnant.

I grew up in a family business. When my parents learned someone was expecting, it was considered a matter to celebrate. Yes, there was the inconvenience of finding someone to fill in during a maternity leave. But it never would have crossed their minds to penalize someone.

A few days ago, I read about Becky Hammon, the coach for the WNBA team the Las Vegas Aces, being suspended for making inappropriate remarks about the pregnancy of one of her players, Dearica Hamby.

Hamby alleged the Aces "bullied, manipulated and discriminated against" her after she told the team she was pregnant.

"I was asked if I planned my pregnancy," she wrote of the Aces in her statement. "When I responded, 'no,' I was then told that I 'was not taking precautions to not get pregnant."

Here's a thought, it's nobody else's business whether a pregnancy is planned or not.

In fact, according to the Guttmacher Institute, 45 percent of all pregnancies in the United States are unintended.

In other words, walk into any preschool and about half of the kids you will see were an oops. Or just look in the mirror and remember your own parents were probably batting .500.

But unplanned doesn't necessarily mean unwanted or unloved.

Her coach, Hammon, was a trailblazer in her own right. She was an Olympian, a professional basketball player,

> only the second female to be an assistant NBA coach, and she is one of the most highly-regarded coaches in the WNBA.

And yet, she apparently hassled another woman for getting pregnant.

Perhaps I should find this surprising. But when I was enduring abuse from my own boss for not firing a pregnant worker, a female editor kept chiming in, "I've seen pregnancy just ruin otherwise good reporters."

Her tone made one think she was describing a prize canine bred by the neighbors' mutt right before competing in the Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show. Every time she'd say it, I'd roll my eyes and wonder how someone could be that stupid.

Next month, a new federal law goes into effect that requires employers with more than 15 employees to make reasonable accommodations for pregnant workers. Such workers could not be denied employment opportunities or retaliated against for requesting a reasonable accommodation.

My friend and Springfield native former U.S. Rep. Cheri Bustos helped spearhead that measure into law.

"Like many women, I have seen the impact that it can have on a career when an employer refuses to consider accommodations for a pregnancy," she said. "Years ago, when I was still early in my career, I was up for a promotion. At the time, I had two children at home.

During my interview, I was asked if I had child care and if I planned to have more children. I replied that I had everything in my personal life in the right place.

"Despite having more experience, an excellent track record and having been with my employer longer, weeks later it was announced that I did not get the promotion. The person who did was single, with no children at home.'

Bustos asked that I not identify the employer. That's understandable. No one wants to talk badly about a former employer. And that's why I, too, have held off on identifying the outfit where I had my bad experience.

But an interesting aspect of Bustos' situation was that it was a female supervisor who questioned her about whether she planned another pregnancy. In my case, the pressure to fire a pregnant worker came from a man.

Discrimination can come from all quarters.

And that is why I'm glad we will soon have a law protecting all pregnant workers.

**KINGS** — Students in fourth grade at Kings Elementary School recently discovered the importance of GPS to farmers through an Ag in the Classroom program.


Some uses of GPS in agriculture include: field mapping, soil sampling, crop scouting, tractor guidance and variable rate applications. GPS allows farmers to have tractors with auto-steer. This helps so there is not overlapping of seeds, chemicals, fertilizers, etc. GPS allows farmers to plant more seeds in richer soil and fewer seeds in poorer soils. It is also used when applying fertilizer. Instead of the whole field receiving the same amount of fertilizer, the amount of application is based on the needs of the soil.

After hearing information about GPS, students participated in a GPS scavenger hunt. They were trying to be the first to collect 11 letters to spell a word. Once the letters were unscrambled they found the word was agriculture.

Agriculture in the Classroom is a program to help students gain a greater awareness of the role of agriculture in the economy and society. Students learn that thousands of farm products are in the world around them — on their plate, in the clothes they wear, in the medicine that makes them well, and in earth-friendly fuels and plastics.

Ag in the Classroom is offered through the University of Illinois Extension in partnership with Ogle County Farm Bureau, Carroll County Farm Bureau, Ogle County Soil & Water, and Carroll County Soil & Water. 

## **Forreston-Polo boys track team claims** state title in 400-meter relay

'This shows that anything can happen'

CHARLESTON — The odds were stacked against Forreston-Polo's 400-meter relay team at the IHSA 1A track & field championships.

Coming into Saturday's finals, they had finished second in their preliminary heat. For that matter, they had lost to Lena-Winslow the week before at the sectional and before that at the NUIC meet.

With 10 state medals since 2010, the highly-regarded program had sprint relays just as talented, but the best finish was a third place (400 relay) in 2021. Also, in the past, there were individuals faster than anyone in this year's group.

However, in front of thousands of fans at O'Brien Stadium at Eastern Illinois University, the 400-relay of De'Angelo Fernandez (Polo), McKeon Crase (Forreston), Noah Dewey (Polo) and Michael Taylor (Forreston) stunned the rest of field with a school-record time of 42.91 to claim a state championship.

"Not one person would have had us winning," F-P coach Tony Hardin said. "All those teams they beat - Catlin Salt Fork, Decatur St, Teresa, Madison, Le-Win - had history and heritage. And, then to do it coming out of the eighth lane."

Typically, in a 400, the middle lanes (3-7) are strategically more favorable to run in. Additionally, F-P was nowhere to be found in last year's 400-relay finals, while Decatur and Catlin brought back the majority of their state-placing teams.

"I feel it was deserved, but it's still surprising," Crase, who torched the

backstretch on the second leg and pushed F-P to an early lead, said. "The key was the handoffs. They were perfect."

Of any relay, the 400 is most dependent on handoffs and F-P performed at a higher level than the other eight finalists.

"Honestly, we just nail handoffs in practice," Taylor, the anchor, said. "If it broke, we fix it."

Taylor took the baton from Dewey with a lead of 6-8 meters and held off the Decatur anchor at the finish (42.91-42.98)Le-Win was third at 43.16.

"I was jumping up and down in joy when I saw Michael taking the baton with the lead." Fernandez. the lead-off runner, said.

Delo, as he is better known, jump-started the road to victory by breaking the stagger a bit and putting F-P in contention with the more experienced groupings.



"To have a chance, we needed to get it to our anchor first," Hardin said.
