Arbitration looms as union workers vent frustration

Public works employees feel pay not up to par

CLINTON — As their union is about to head into arbitration with the City of Clinton, a group of city employees attended the council meeting Tuesday to vent their frustrations about pay and benefits.

Water plant supervisor Kyle Morris addressed the council on behalf of his fellow union members, saying there was a serious gap between raises offered to non-union, city employees and what the city offered union public works employees during contract negotiations.

Morris told commissioners the union members weren't trying to attack non-union employees. He sent out an email earlier this week addressing some of union members' issues.

"That's not what this is about," Morris said. "We were trying to get our voices out there for what we deserve."

Morris said he felt

the city was ignoring them. He said the union employees were good, young workers and the city needed more of them.

"Our starting pay is terrible, it's not good" he said. "Everybody pays more than us. We deserve better."

Morris said the union was asking for pennies, while "other guys are asking for thousands," referring to non-union salary and wage increases the board was set to vote on later in the meeting.

"Everybody wants to stay here," Morris said. "They want to work here." Morris said he was dedicated to his job, including answering emergency calls after hours.

Commissioners later voted down a list of non-union employee salary and wage increases.

Morris told the Journal the city did not make a counter offer during negotiations and would not match holidays that non-union employees receive.

John Warner, IV dies in car accident

TUFTONBORO, N.H.

— John Warner, IV, of Clinton, died Monday in a two-vehicle accident near Tuftonboro, N.H.

The two vehicles collided near the intersection of Route 109 and Edge O Lake Drive at approximately 1 p.m. on Monday, according to police. They reported the driver of the other vehicle was treated and released.

The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

Warner was former owner and chairman of

Moore & Warner Ag Group, LLC. The Warner family name is part of Clinton history, appearing publicly on the local hospital as well as the public library.

Warner was active in the community. His most recent effort was spearheading the Prairie Flyers exhibit, which chronicled aviators of DeWitt County, hosted by the DeWitt County Museum in 2022.

CLINTON – Enel North America has begun operations of the 200-megawatt (MW) Alta Farms wind farm in DeWitt County. The project supports Meta's DeKalb Data Center through a 125 MW long-term power purchase agreement.

Like it or not, sometimes we just have to buy a new cellphone. When the old one won't hold a charge anymore or it won't take the newest security updates, we have to cave in and begin a hunt for a new one.

Sometimes it's easy. You take the old phone to the same store where you bought it and tell them you want an upgraded version of that phone. You look it over, press all the buttons, like it, and there you go ... a new phone.

however, it's not that easy. Technology moves along so quickly, and so do the capabilities of new phones. If it's been more than three years since your last phone purchase, talk to friends and family. Play with their phones and see how they feel in your hand. Look up cellphones on the internet and compare the features -- all before you even head

to a phone store.

Your choice of phones depends in part on what you want it to do. If you want to keeps things simple, check out RAZ phones and the Jitterbug lineup. The RAZ phones, for example, only do regular voice and video

For fancier options, do you want to cruise the internet, send email, watch videos, make calls, take photos, send text messages or play games? Most of the phones out there now do all of this.

Decide in advance how you want to handle the purchase of the phone. Do you want it to be part of a monthly plan or pay for it completely? Do you want to be on a monthly plan at all, which may involve signing a contract?

Additionally, ask at the store whether they'll give you anything for trading in your old phone and whether they'll transfer your information to a new

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No more masks at the VA

You can ditch the mask now if you visit a Department of Veterans Affairs medical facility. Because, they say, the public health emergency is over.

While it appears that you can walk into a VA medical facility without a mask, there are still high-risk places within the facilities where masks are required: chemo units, emergency and urgent care departments, open bay ICU units, transplant areas, dialysis and spinal injury/community living centers. And, of course, if you have Covid or any other respiratory infection, or even suspect you do, mask up.

Additionally, if you, the patient (or a caregiver or family member) request that medical personnel wear a mask, they're required to do so. Stand up for yourself. If you want a medical provider to put on a mask, say so.

Yes, Covid is fading, but it's not gone. A

couple of stats: Across the U.S., only 17 percent of people have had the newest booster, and only 69 percent got the original vax. Approximately 4,000 people are in the hospital every day because of Covid. Several states have 2,000 to 5,000 new cases each week. In my state, Covid hospital admissions rose 250 percent in one recent week in two different counties, yet the state is listed as low level

for Covid. One important fact, and something that might be our undoing long-term when it comes to the Covid battle, is that it's no longer required for insurance to cover the cost of the at-home tests. Veterans, however, can still get two free tests when at a VA medical appointment, if you ask and they're

still in stock. (Check the expiration date if you get those.) It's better to have a couple on hand at home than to pay over \$20 each at a civilian pharmacy.

Do yourself (and those around you) a big favor and keep washing your hands a full minute with antibacterial hand soap, not the 20 seconds that is generally recommended. Don't become a statistic at this late date. There have been 870,000 veterans treated for Covid. Don't let your guard down just

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

John was an aviation

enthusiast, operating the federally registered grass strip airport Hooterville Airport outside Hallsville, and flying a restored 1944 Boeing-Stearman biplane for much of his adult life. He was a history buff, a lover of literature, and had a passion and talent for antique cars. For nearly 20 years he operated Melvin Garage, in Melvin Village, N.H., which was part business, part hobby, and a gathering point for community and friends.





The U.S. Census Bureau this month released new information on people moving from one stateto another. Deniers of Illinois' problem with population loss won't like it. It's drawn from its the

American Community Survey and is their most recent report on interstate moving.

It sheds new light on not just Illinois' shrinkage but on the national reshuffling of where people

are choosing to live, which may be among today's most important political trends. Illinois was a net loser

of residents to 40 different states between 2020 and 2021, resulting in a net out-migration of 150,000 residents to those 40 states.

On the flip side, Illinois was a net winner of residents from just nine states. The net in-migration from those nine states totaled just 4,000 residents.

In all, Illinois netted a loss of 146,000 residents in 2021. Only California and

New York lost more people

to other states on net. It's not because of the weather. Illinois residents to all of its neighboring states, of which gained from interstate migration except Michigan, though not nearly to the extent of Illinois' losses. Florida, predictably, gained a net 23,414 residents from Illinois.

However, destinations number 2, 3 and 4 were Wisconsin, Indiana and Missouri. Illinois lost a net 51,000 residents to those

More on South American cuisine

corner of culinary delights. To give you a classic South American recipe would be difficult. It would require a considerable understanding culinary methods technique by the reader. It would also be difficult to find the necessary ingredients. Substitutes can be made for some ingredients, but then again, that requires very special knowledge. I will walk you through a few comparatively simple recipes just so you can get an idea.

The recipe I think is wonderful and needs to be tried. It is called Anticuchos con Salsa Criolla. Most people would think of it as a shish kebob because it is skewered meat. This recipe comes in three parts; marinade, salsa and preparing the skewers. This recipe provides 20 servings. Whenever I use the term "prepared," that means rinsed, seeded and any connecting ribs

Chiles well minced. You can substitute Serranol Chiles. ½ ounces dried chili de Arbol crushed. You can substitute any hot, dried, red chili. Add ½ ounce of Achiote, 2 teaspoons of cumin seeds, 3 ounces of olive oil, 1 ounce of minced garlic, 6 fluid ounces of red wine vinegar, 1½ teaspoons of salt, and finally 1 teaspoon of black ground pepper. Mix this thoroughly in a non- reactive container and add your beef chunks to it. Cover and let this marinate in the refrigerator for no less than three hours. I like using a plastic freezer bag. Make

sure it is sealed tightly. The beef needs to be prepared by removing all gristle and connective tissues. Cut 3 pounds worth of beef into inch size cubes and marinade as stated above. Remove from the marinade and pat dry with a paper towel. You may wish to lightly

baste the meat with oil.

Put about $2\frac{1}{2}$ ounces worth of beef on each skewer. You could include pieces of green or red bell peppers if you wish. This would be grilled over an open flame when ready. If wooden skewers are being used, be sure to soak them in water first. It goes without saying that dry wood is easily consumed by fire. If the oil catches fire, do not get excited. It will burn out quickly.

For making the salsa; shave a pound's worth of yellow onion very thinly on a mandoline. 2 ounces of prepared chopped Aji or Serranol chiles. Add in 1/4 cup's worth of minced cilantro. To all of this add 2 fluid ounces of lemon juice and season with ½ teaspoon of salt. Thoroughly mix. Do not forget that Salsas must rest in the refrigerator for at least an hour before use. It needs this time for the flavors to marinade. The salsa is to be used as a dipping sauce.



June 23

1962: A tornado in Cook County severely damaged 14 homes in Oak Forest, with 40 others had minor damage. Damage was estimated at \$1.1 million along the 2 mile path.

1994: Severe thunderstorms moved across central Illinois, from Quincy to south of Decatur. In the town of Moweaqua, in Shelby County, strong winds downed or destroyed over 1,000 trees, with numerous power and phone lines down. Property damage around

the area was estimated near \$750,000, with crop damage estimated to be near \$6 million.

June 24

1924: A strong tornado moved across McDonough and Fulton Counties, touching down east of Bardolph. About 50 buildings were damaged or destroyed, and barn splinters were driven into trees a half mile away. Five people were injured.

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



A combined 27 HCP is usually plenty for a 3NT contract, but here the N-S hands did not fit well together. Even so, East needed to keep his wits about him if he was to beat the contract. But, sadly for E-W, East's wits deserted him at the crucial moment. See if you can do better.

Against 3NT West led the &Q which held the trick. Dummy's King won the second Spade, the Diamond finesse lost to West's Queen, then back came another Spade, won by Declarer's Ace. Now, when Declarer conceded a trick to the ♦A, East was out of Spades, so West's Spade winners were useless and Declarer romped home with 9 tricks.

Declarer played her part well by holding up on the first Spade, in an attempt to disrupt the E-W communications, but East overlooked an effective countermeasure. With South opening a 15-17 1NT, East knew that his partner had a maximum of five HCP, and three of those had already shown up in the Spade suit. West's only possible entry to the long Spades was the ♦Q, and it was East's job to protect that entry for use later in the hand, when the Spades had been established. The way to do that was to disregard the old adage of "second hand low" and to grab the ♦A on the first round of the suit. Now, after the ♠A is knocked out, it is West who wins the second round of Diamonds and can cash his Spades for down one. Alert play by those Easts who hopped up with the ♦A!







Illinois expands use of police surveillance drones

CHICAGO - Next time you attend a parade, there might be an eye in the sky.

A new law signed by Gov. JB Pritzker on Friday expands local police departments' authority to use drones to surveil certain events, respond to certain 911 calls, inspect buildings and participate in public relations events.

House Bill 3902 passed 56-1 in the Senate and 84-7 in the House with three members voting "present," The law drew some concerns from civil liberties groups which ultimately led to added privacy protections and disclosure requirements.

The push to expand when police drone authority originated after a 2019 mass shooting at the Henry Pratt Company in Aurora, according to the bill's House sponsor, Rep. Barbara Hernandez, D-Aurora. She and others received renewed calls after a 2022 shooting at a July 4th parade in Highland Park last year.

"I hope people are safe and that this can prevent anything else from happening," Hernandez said.

Kenny Winslow, executive director of the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police, supported the mea-

sure and is already planning to offer training on the new law to police departments. He said drone technology could save lives and expects more departments to use them moving forward.

But he added that the protections contained in the bill including requirements that police post notices if they are surveilling an event and keep a record of flight paths – were an important part of the final product.

"We're trying to be as transparent with the public as we can," Winslow said. The ACLU of Illinois – a

civil rights organization that has long been a voice of opposition to unrestricted drone use by police departments – took a neutral stance on the bill. ACLU staff were key architects of a 2013 state law referred to as the Freedom from Drone Surveillance Act that placed significant restrictions on police drone use.

"Our concern is that this kind of technology can be used in fairly invasive ways that intrude on our constitutional and privacy rights," ACLU attorney Liza Roberson-Young told Capitol News Illinois.

These concerns led to some key protections in the bill, including limitations on what circumstances warrant the use of drones and how long the information collected by drones can be

"We wouldn't want this to be a first step to a slippery slope to chipping away at the Freedom from Drone Surveillance Act," Roberson-Young said.

Under the new law, drones may only be used at outdoor, government-hosted events. These include events such as parades, walks, races, concerts or food festivals. These events must meet minimum size requirements depending on the size of the municipality in which they are hosted in order for police to use drones. The law explicitly bars

drones from being used to monitor "any political protest, march, demonstration, or other assembly protected by the First Amendment." The law also allows police to use drones when re-

sponding to 911 calls to find victims, to assist with health or safety needs or to coordinate emergency personnel.

The information collected using drones, which could include video, images, sounds or other data, may only be stored temporarily and must be deleted within 24 hours after a parade or other special event and within 30 days for most other uses. There are some exceptions where police may retain that information, such as if there is reasonable suspicion that the information contains evidence of criminal activity, if the information is relevant to an ongoing investigation or if it will be used for future training.

The Illinois Attorney General's office can investigate police departments' patterns and practices of drone use and compel their compliance by seeking a court order. Departments can lose drone authority for at least six months the first time they are found to violate the law and up to one year for subsequent violations.

In an interview, Hernandez encouraged people to reach out to the attorney general if they find police violating the new regulations. "I hope people get to see

that there are clear instructions in the law to prevent people from violating privacy," Hernandez said. The law also explicitly

bans police from equipping drones with weapons, such as firearms, chemical irritants or lasers.

The law also places significant restrictions on the use of facial recognition technology in conjunction with drones, barring police from using it during a flight and only allowing it to counter a high risk of a terrorist incident based on U.S. Department of Homeland Security intelligence or to prevent "imminent harm to life or to forestall the imminent escape of a suspect of the destruction of evidence."

But some in the digital rights world say that the law still leaves the door open for police to use other surveillance technologies that encroach on people's civil

Beryl Lipton is a law enforcement technology and surveillance researcher at the Electronic Frontier Foundation, a digital rights advocacy group. EFF was not engaged in the process of drafting HB 3902.

"It's good that they have protections on facial recognition technology, but there are other biometric technologies that could be used," Lipton said, pointing to gait analysis as one example.

Although Lipton said that her organization has concerns any time police use drones, she added that there are good reasons for drones to be used in some circum-

Ultimately, however, Lipton said that local governments should be involved in determining appropriate use of police technologies for their communities.

"There should be a municipal, local conversation about surveillance," Lipton

The law went into effect immediately after Pritzker's signature Friday.

























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
