Council OKs budgets; General Fund in black

☐ List of streets and alleys given for summer maintenance program

MENDOTA - The approval of budgets and the designation of streets to be repaired this summer were among the items handled by the Mendota City Council at its May 1 regular meeting.

A reorganization meeting was held prior to the regular meeting in which elected and appointed city officials were sworn in. Re-elected aldermen that took the oath were John Hessenberger, John Holland, Jay Miller and Mark Peasley. Rob Letterly, who was appointed the new city treasurer, also was sworn in.

During the regular meeting, Alderman Jim Fitzpatrick presented several items for the council's consideration. The council approved the FY24 Water and Sewer budgets as given by Fitzpatrick. The water fund shows expected revenue at \$1,501,500 and expenses at \$1,738,930 for a deficit of \$237,430. The sewer fund revenue is projected at \$1,959,500 and expenses at \$2,320,700 for a negative balance of \$361,200.

In other action from Fitzpatrick's

report, the council approved a motor fuel tax resolution in the amount of \$500,000 for municipal maintenance of streets and alleys. Streets to be resurfaced this year include: 16th Street from Indiana Avenue to Illinois Avenue; 12th Street from Guiles Avenue to Stroble Avenue; Michigan Avenue from Burlington Street to Chicago Street; Jefferson Street from Illinois Avenue to Main Street; Second Avenue from Third Street to Fourth Street; Ninth Avenue from First Street to south end; Fifth Avenue from Cherry Street to Division Street; Third Avenue from Cherry Street to Division Street. Alleys to be done are east of Third Avenue from Eighth Street to Ninth Street and Ninth Street to 10th Street.

Also, the council agreed to a resolution authorizing the city clerk to enter into an electric contract for streetlights and approved a request from Mendota VFW Auxiliary Post 4079 to hold Poppy Days on Friday, May 5 and Saturday, May 6 at the intersection of Main and Meriden streets.

Alderman John Holland presented

the FY24 General Fund budget, which was adopted by the council. Revenue is anticipated to be \$8,379,000 and expenses are projected at \$8,168,000 for a positive balance of \$211,000.

The council also approved the TIF 17A, TIF 17B and 2022 TIF fund budgets.

In other action from Holland's report, the council approved a recommendation from the Revolving Loan Fund Committee to loan \$45,000 to Andy Krause, Jason Hoehn and Joe Stegbauer for the purchase of Borelli Cycle LLC. The loan is for seven years at an interest rate of 5 percent.

Alderman Kyle Kim gave the Mendota Civic Center budget, which was approved. Revenue is estimated to be \$144,900 and expenses are anticipated at \$180,164 for a deficit of \$35,264.

Chief Greg Kellen reported that the second Dodge Durango has arrived for the police department. The purchase cost was \$41,009 with payment through the state drug fund. Kellen emphasized that the purchase of the two vehicles does in no way affect the city taxpayers.

Medicaid renewals resume for first time since start of COVID-19 pandemic

☐ Thousands may no longer be eligible

SPRINGFIELD - Medicaid recipients in Illinois should be on the lookout for correspondence from the state regarding their coverage as the normal renewal process resumes for the first time in three years.

Medicaid is a health insurance program for low-income and disabled people that is jointly funded by the federal government and the states. Throughout the pandemic, people who were enrolled in Medicaid did not have to go through the normal process of reapplying every 12 months to determine whether they were eligible, even if there were changes in their income or household that would normally make them ineligible.

That rule has ended due to a change approved by the federal government in its December spending plan. Redetermination letters will be sent to Illinois Medicaid recipients in waves over the next 12 months, with letters going out to the first group this week.

State officials are urging all Medicaid recipients to update their information within the Illinois Medicaid program to ensure their benefits are not wrongly ended due to the state being unable to contact them. Medicaid recipients can do so, and can check their enrollment status, by visiting abe.illinois.gov and clicking "Manage My



Case" to set up an online

Recipients can also call 1-800-843-6154 or find more at Medicaid.illinois.gov, which includes answers to frequently asked questions and other resources.

In June, according to the governor's office, approximately 113,600 cases in Illinois are up for renewal. Of those, 51 percent have been automatically renewed as a result of screening by the Department of Healthcare and Family Services, which administers Medicaid at the state level. Still, customers with June renewal dates are urged to watch for correspondence from the state to see if they have been renewed automatically or will need to take action by June 1.

Customers who do not respond or who are no longer eligible will lose Medicaid coverage a month after their due date, the administration said in a news release. Those losing eligibility will be notified and will receive information about enrolling in alternative coverage.

DHFS said that Illinois' Medicaid enrollment grew by about 1 million enrollees during the COVID-19 pandemic, to 3.9 million.

MENDOTA - Toward the end of senior year, most students are thinking about the end of their high school career and the beginning of the summer.

Unless you're a Mendota High School student in Aaron Sester's consumer economics class where he is teaching financial education until the last day possible.

And he has some help.

"I call consumer economics adulting 101," said Sester, who has been teaching the economics class since fall 2021. "We're trying to teach the senior class what happens with our taxation unit, what you're responsible for paying, how the process works, insurance, mortgages, car payments, budgeting, and all the financial stuff.

"Anytime you can get real, outside-of-the-school professionals to come in and

talk about the banking world, the car world, or the insurance world, I like to do that. I really think the students get a lot of perspective having an actual loan officer come in and talk about the nuts and

bolts of financing a home." For the last two years, Eureka Savings Bank Loan Officer Rachel Balestri has presented Sester's students educational information on home mortgages.

This year Balestri came to Sester's classroom just before Spring Break on March 30.

As usual, Sester and his students enjoyed the education Balestri provided.

"It's been interesting over the last couple of years with interest rates and just trying to tell the kids how it matters to your overall payments," Sester said. "A couple of years ago we were at historical lows and now it's kind of creeping back up with



the Fed (Federal Reserve System) raising the interest rates. It's interesting to show them how much interest rates can raise monthly payments.

"I think they take a lot out of it. We typically always have a question-and-answer session at the end and the kids always have some really good questions. I think they're really enjoying it. Most kids nowadays are not ready to buy a home right out of high school, but at least they have an idea about the process and how long it could take. I think a lot of kids are initially surprised

that it is a process and it takes multiple months to agree on a price, loans, and go through closing.'

Balestri brings 20 years of banking experience to the classroom as she started banking at 18 years old filing insurance in a loan department. She worked through many positions in the loan department to become a loan officer in Eureka's Peru

office. The funny thing is, the 2002 Leland High School graduate didn't initially want

to go into banking and loans. "I didn't think I was going to get into the banking industry. When I graduated high school I wanted to be an attorney," Balestri said. "When I was attending IVCC, I realized that wasn't the plan that was going to work for me. My sister

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





But the state also received an additional \$3 billion in federal funding through the enhanced matching rate.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services estimated that about 9.5 percent of Medicaid enrollees nationwide, or 8.2 million people, could lose coverage because they are no longer eligible. Another 7.9 percent, or 6.8 million people, could lose coverage despite still being eligible due to issues with the application

That would translate to roughly 700,000 people in Illinois. In February, IDHFS said in a news release the department believed it could mitigate the impact to result in roughly 384,000 losing coverage, acknowledging "nobody knows for sure" how many individuals would be affected.

"Illinois has taken a proactive, multi-faceted approach to try to make sure that everyone who is eligible for Medicaid can continue coverage through the program without disruption," IDHFS Director Theresa Eagleson said. "Medicaid customers have not had to renew coverage in over three years, and we have engaged

in many levels of outreach to prepare people for when their renewal date comes up. We believe these efforts will have a significant impact in preserving coverage.'

The department has been building up staff and has conducted a multi-platform outreach campaign called "Ready to Renew" to ensure recipients are prepared for their renewals. The state is also collaborating with community health centers and local organizations to publicize the restarting of renewals.

IVCC gives P-T faculty award

OGLESBY - Criminal justice instructor Kevin Hermes was selected by students, teaching colleagues, administrators and staff this spring as the winner of Illinois Valley Community College's 2023 Outstanding Part-Time Faculty Award.

Hermes was IVCC's criminal justice program coordinator from 2018 to 2021 following 31 years as a police officer/sergeant. He brings that experience to courses in Criminal Investigation, Evidence and Criminal Procedure, and Ethics in Criminal Justice, among many others.

The book ban debate

I like to read things that I disagree with.

Doing so not only gives me greater empathy for those with whom I differ, but every once in a while it changes my own viewpoint.

A movement is afoot to censor what books libraries and schools can offer.

Such efforts are pernicious malignancies that metastasize from community to community, from state to state.

Dr. Sarah Bonner, who until last month taught in Heyworth school district, learned about this evil firsthand.

The English teacher in the rural McLean County, Illinois, school district became the subject of a school board meeting because of one of the books offered in her class.

The tome in question is titled "This Book Is Gay." It explores topics teenagers encounter as they navigate through adolescence: dating, sex and safe sex practices.

And, no, it wasn't required reading. It was one of more than 100 books that students in her class could choose from.

According to the reporting of my friend Edith Brady-Lunny, the debate went viral after a pupil published images of certain pages on social media.

More than 80 people attended the next school board meeting. They didn't come bearing pitchforks and torches, but they certainly wanted Bonner's head. And before the meeting was over, she was forced to quit.

"Our kids deserve learning experiences that prepare them for our world and not just our town," she told the

Ironically, Bonner quit the same week Illinois legislators voted to withhold funding from public schools and libraries that ban books. The bill has passed the House and is pending in the Senate.

Unfortunately, pressure to censor comes from both the left and the right.

Last year, my own daughter's class was reading 'To Kill a Mockingbird" in a Springfield school when a parent complained about a racial epitaph used in the book. A school administrator ordered the class to discontinue studying the classic. Some of the youngsters never learned how the anti-racist tome ended.

Increasingly, our society is losing any sense of nuance. In the book, the lawyer Atticus Finch tells his young daughter, "Don't say n----er, Scout. That's common." She responds that everyone at school says it. He retorts, "From now on it'll be everybody less one."

In the context of the book, a life lesson is being taught – that even though a particular slur is common, it shouldn't be said.

Isn't that the lesson we want our youngsters to learn, in this age where that racial vulgarity increasingly finds its way into music and popular culture?

According to the American Library Association these are some of the most banned books:

"To Kill a Mockingbird," by Harper Lee "The Catcher in the Rye," by JD Salinger

"The Grapes of Wrath," by John Steinbeck

"The Color Purple," by Alice Walker "1984," by George Orwell

"Brave New World," by Aldous Huxley "Native Son," by Richard Wright

"Slaughterhouse-Five," by Kurt Vonnegut

"A Separate Peace," by John Knowles "The Lord of the Flies," by William Golding

The Illinois legislation would prohibit libraries from

banning books or other material because of partisan or doctrinal pressure. House Bill 2789 is being pushed by Secretary of

State Alexi Giannoulias, whose office oversees the Illinois State Library and administers grants for public and school libraries.

It's a measure whose time has come.

Most of the opposition to the bill came from Republican lawmakers who said it takes control away from local library and school boards.

But my prediction is that in coming years if this bill becomes law, folks on the left as well as the right will be frustrated because they won't be able to remove books they don't agree with from library shelves.

It is commendable that parents are monitoring what their children are reading. But it's deplorable that some adults believe they can use government to keep other people's children from reading something they

Referendum fails; cost-cutting at MHS – 1987

Backtracks

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from May 7, 1997.) By Jessica Nashold

Failure of a referendum to authorize additional funds for Mendota High School resulted in a board meeting devoted principally to cost-cutting suggestions. Although the board was determined to continue its efforts to get a referendum passed, something had to be done to decrease expenses in the 1988-89 school year. A suggestion to eliminate the spring

athletic programs was protested by athletic director Paul Kimrey and track coach Don Gooden. They said it would not be fair to college-bound athletes as they worked to expand their athletic resumes. Superintendent Morris Morgan said spring sports at MHS cost \$25,000.

In a partial concession to financial realities, the athletic department reduced its request for supplies from an estimated \$10,253 to \$5,855.

Mendota hosted an invitational track meet on May 8, 1987, which drew contestants from Sterling, Hall, St. Bede, Mt. Morris and Amboy. Mendota earned 82 ½ points, taking first place in the meet. Especially noteworthy were the relay teams, with firsts in four events.

In the 400- and 800-meter relays, the team was comprised of Tony Bond, Dennis Klatt, George Needs and Brian McPheeters. In the 1600-meter relay, Needs and Klatt were joined by Scott Aughenbaugh and Mike Robison. The 3200-meter relay was captured by Tim Sondgeroth, Scott Ansteth, Keir Sexton and Robison.

At the opening meeting of the city council in May 1987, Paul Blumhorst was confirmed as fire chief although the volunteers had voted for Dale Cunefare. Mayor James Troupis said Blumhorst had been active in fire groups at the county and state levels for 23 years.

Bill calls for review of teacher licensing standards

SPRINGFIELD – Some Illinois lawmakers are calling for a review of one of the tests prospective teachers must pass in order to be licensed in Illinois.

The test is known as the Teacher Performance Assessment, or "edTPA," and it is intended to determine whether a prospective teacher has the knowledge and skills necessary to be effective in the classroom. It has been a requirement for teacher licensing in Illinois since 2015.

State Sen. Tom Bennett, R-Gibson City, said he started hearing concerns about the test from people in his district, and he later learned that those concerns were shared by other lawmakers.

"And it was over and over again," he said in an interview. "I was only hearing from a few folks that thought it was the best thing since sliced bread, which, okay, but then I hear from the other side. It's like, I'm not hearing the same thing from people in my district.'

Every state has its own

criteria for licensing teachers and every school of education uses its own curriculum for training teachers. Developed at Stanford University, the edTPA was intended to be a standardized way of measuring an aspiring teacher's knowledge and abilities, regardless of what state they came from or which college or university they attended. The assessment is given

at the end of a prospective teacher's student teaching experience. It's a performance-based assessment that, among other things, requires applicants to submit a portfolio that includes actual lesson plans and tests that they've administered, examples of their students work, and other material that demonstrates their knowledge and competence.

The portfolios are then scored by teachers and teacher educators with expertise in the subjects and grade level in which the applicant is seeking a license.

Bennett said that having outside evaluators who have never met or worked with the applicant scoring their portfolios is one of the issues that concerns him about edTPA.

"They're weighing in, and their weight is pretty heavy,'

Mendota City **Ordinance**

MENDOTA - It is unlawful to burn any materials other than small and dried quantities of branches, leaves, weeds or grass at any time. The burning of any material such as rubber, tires, leather, tar paper, old batteries or any material that emits an offensive odor when burned is unlawful within the city limits of Mendota.

Limited amounts of yard waste material may be burned provided the material is dry and does not create an offensive odor, nuisance or fire hazard due to excessive high winds. Combustible yard waste material may be kindled from 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays only. All fires must be constantly tended by a competent person, until such fire is properly extinguished. The continued smoldering of slow-burning combustible yard waste after 4 p.m. is a nuisance and anyone kindling such a fire that will emit obnoxious odors after 4 p.m. will be considered performing an unlawful act. Burning on Sunday by commercial establishments shall be

considered an unlawful act.

he said. "If they pass, great. If they don't, it's based on this evaluation from these folks that don't understand the whole situation. So that just got my attention."

Sen. Meg Loughran Cappel, D-Shorewood, a co-sponsor of the bill, said she has concerns that edTPA is so rigorous and intensive that it could deter some people from ever trying to become a teacher.

"You will have someone that wants to be a math teacher, and then they get to the point where they have to do all this work for their student teaching and all this additional rigorous testing and projects," she said. "And what you end up having is, they're like, 'Why would I go through all of this and maybe not even make it, only to make \$40,000 coming out (of college) when I could stop what I'm doing right now as a junior, take a couple extra classes and become an accountant and come out making \$60,000 or \$65,000?"

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Gov. JB Pritzker issued an executive order suspending use of the edTPA but that executive order will expire when the disaster declaration is lifted on May 11.

Bennett is the lead sponsor of Senate Bill 1488, which passed unanimously out of the Senate March 30 and now awaits action in the House. It would continue the suspension of the edTPA through Aug. 31, 2025. It would also establish a task force to evaluate teacher performance assessment systems and make recommendations to the State Board of Education and the General Assembly by Aug.

"I think this is a good time to sit back, let's review it, see what we got, and I'm very grateful for bipartisan support from a number of Republican and Democrat senators really feeling the same way," Bennett said.



Be alert for bicyclists on roadway

MENDOTA - The Mendota Police Department urges motorists to pay attention, be alert for bikes and share the road. MPD urges bicyclists to be predictable and observe traffic laws. Your actions affect public opinion.

Illinois Bicycle Laws Traffic laws apply to per-

sons riding bicycles. Bicyclists riding on a highway are granted all of the rights and are subject to all of the duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle, with few exceptions. Lane Positioning – When

riding on roadways and bicycle paths at less than normal traffic speed, ride as close as practicable and safe to the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway, except, when overtaking and passing another bicycle or vehicle proceeding in the same direction, or, when preparing for a left turn, or, when reasonably necessary to avoid fixed or moving objects, parked or moving vehicles, bicycles, motorized pedal cycles, pedestrians, animals and surface hazards. Lights on Bicycles – For

night riding, a front lamp with a white light visible from at least 500 feet to the front and a red reflector on the rear visible from 100 feet to 600 feet are required. A rear light visible from 500 feet may be used in addition to the red reflector.

Two or More on a Bike Bicycles shall not be used to carry more persons at one time than the number for which it is designed and equipped, except that an adult rider may carry a child securely attached to his person in a backpack device or sling.

Parental Responsibility – The parent of any child and the guardian of any ward shall not authorize the child or ward to violate any of the provision of this code.

The Mendota Police Department encourages bicyclists to wear a helmet for protection against head injuries.

What do pets see in color?

The popular notion that pets see in black and white, notably dogs, is false. People once thought that their furry companions couldn't see the color spectrum. However, the American Kennel Club reports that new research and conclusions about canine anatomy point to dogs having color vision, after all — it's just a bit more muted than their human friends. According to Dr. Jerry Klein, AKC's



dogs have more rods than cones in their eyes, which improves low-light vision. Cones are responsible for

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controlling color perception. Due to these anatomical differences, it is believed dog's vision mimics that of a person with red/green color blindness. Color is perceptible for dogs, but not in the spectrum enjoyed by humans with healthy vision. Cats also can see in color but similarly not with the same level of detail as people. Furthermore, their vision is much more attuned to upclose sight than to focusing on objects that are far away. According to Birdfact, an online resource about birds, birds have arguably the best eyesight and ability to detect color of any member of the animal kingdom. Birds can see more color than humans because they have a fourth type of light-receiving cone in their retinas (humans have three). Therefore, a pet bird will be in tune with vibrantly colored items in and around his environment. Arizona State University's Ask a

Klaser, Belan, Hanson sworn in; Sublette Board approves NCICG

SUBLETTE — Election Day has come and gone, but it didn't change an awful lot in terms of trustees on the Sublette Village Board.

At the end-of-the-year board meeting on Thursday, April 27, Richard Klaser and incumbents MacKenzie Belan and Scott Hanson were sworn in for their four-year terms as Sublette Village Trustees.

"They already know the ropes. Richard was previously on the board for at least four years and maybe even eight years," said Sublette Village Board President John Stenzel. "They're all seasoned trustees. I don't know if it happens very often when board members are on, leave, and then come back, but I also did it. It does happen on occasion.

"There wasn't a lot of shake up after this

Sublette Village Trustee Jeff Myer did not receive enough votes to be re-elected to the board and was given respect for being on the board during his tenure at the meeting, although he wasn't in attendance.

"Myer was real familiar with construction because he worked in the industry for many years," Strenzel said. "He mainly did road construction. He had knowledge and experience that helped the board. He also had his own business, so he knew about everything owning a business includes.

"He understood for a contractor mobilization is a big thing. For them to come look at things or start working on a project, it costs. You try to get as much work out of a contractor as you can when they mobilize."

Stenzel added Myer knew about permits and insurance needed for Sublette projects and how to go about acquiring representation.

NCICG approved for paperwork

The Sublette Board approved North Central Illinois Council of Governments (NCICG) to complete the paperwork for a \$25,000 grant.

The village will initially give NCICG \$500 (which is returnable if the grant doesn't go through) and \$2,000 to complete the paperwork.

"We are paying \$2,500 to receive \$25,000," Stenzel said. "The grant is going to be used on infrastructure improvement for the project we've been working on around the fire station. We're going to replace storm sewer and some of the water main.

"The grant will help, but we don't know what the full cost is going to be. Fixing this issue is huge and we need to get it done because you have to get it done before you can redo the road."



The antedote to help you quit complaining

Complaining is dangerous business. It can damage or even destroy your relationship with God, your relationships with other people, and even your relationship with yourself.

It's easy to complain. We likely don't realize how much we do it, and I believe it's one of the most challenging things to overcome.

Philippians 2:14 (NKJV) says, "Do all things without complaining and disputing" (em-

phasis mine). That's a clear command, and not something anyone can do in their own strength.

Think about what you're talking about

It's important to understand that every word you speak has some kind of effect. Proverbs 18:21 says that our words have the power of life or death in them. In other words, the way we speak really does matter. So it makes sense that we should avoid complaining at all cost.

as the enemy's language. When we do it, we open the door for him to come into a situation and cause trouble. On the other hand, praise and thanksgiving is God's language.

Like I said before, it's easy to complain. There are many things that happen every day that we could murmur about if we let ourselves go there. But they really aren't worth the effort it takes to get upset and gripe about it.

For example, we travel a lot and stay in a lot of hotels. I like to take a hot bath to relax before speaking at our conferences. Once when I went to fix my bath, I discovered there was no hot water. So I called the front desk to see about getting hot water, but they weren't able to fix the problem when I needed them to. And later, I learned that my room was the only room in the hotel that didn't have hot water!

Now, I could have gotten all upset about this at the time. But God helped me to relax and resist the temptation to get upset. And the truth is, complaining wouldn't have changed anything—it would have just made the situation harder.

Check the attitude of your heart

Complaining comes from an ungrateful, prideful attitude of the heart. It causes us to feel that we shouldn't be inconve-

happen to us. It's easy for us to think, Why are you making such a big deal out of it? when someone else is inconvenienced or struggling. But when we have to deal with the pain ourselves, it's a different story. That's when we say, "Why is this

Many people in the western world are spoiled by the conveniences of our culture. We're used to instant gratification, getting what we want when we want it. We don't like discomfort or sacrifice. We don't want anything to be hard. This causes us to have an immature, selfish perspective of difficult situations and say things we shouldn't say.

I've learned that there's a better approach: Look for the treasure in every

The truth is, I've done most of my spiritual growing during the hardest and most painful times of my life. The trials of life have caused me to press in to God. And as I've done that, He's changed me. He's helped me to develop an attitude of gratitude and humility, which has brought real freedom into my life.

What's real freedom? Real freedom is being able to not have my way and still be just as happy as if I did.

Trust God throughout the process

It's a difficult process getting to the point of having real freedom. But whatever it takes to get there, it's worth it! We just need to accept that gaining spiritual maturity is going to hurt. Growing up in God is not comfortable, and there are times that sacrifice is required. There will be times when God will ask you to do things and you'll feel that you just don't have the strength to do them – but whatever God tells us to do, He always gives us the grace to do it!

Something else that helps me is meditating on scriptures about watching the words of my mouth. I like to pray Psalm 19:14 (NKJV): "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in Your sight, O Lord...." There are many more, and I encourage you to find them and pray them over yourself often. Daily

is a good idea!

Make it your goal to have a constant attitude of gratitude. Resist the temptation to complain and instead praise and thank God for who He is and all He's done for you. By God's grace and through His strength, you can overcome complaining and live each day with a thankful heart!

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
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
