

Board hears about demolition of old junior high

AMBOY — Summer vacation is in sight for the students and teachers of the Amboy district. Lesson plans are wrapping up, final exams being administered, and students are gathering their school supplies to take home until next fall.

The school board met on May 18 and Superintendent Joshua Nichols reported that open forum Central teachers submitted their assessment data for the year.

"The kids have been making great strides and have been closing the learning gap," he shared. Jenni Schaefer, Kathy Russel, and Principal Joyce Schamberger made the

Junior High Social Studies teacher, Kelly Foster presented student projects from her design and development class.

Work continues on the demolition of the old Junior High building. Schmidt Plumbing has run the water lines to the records building and has capped off the sewer lines from the building. Helm's electrical division has pulled the electrical panel out of the building so it can be installed in the bus garage and has begun the process of switching the power there.

Under First Reading, the 2023-24 student handbooks were looked over and briefly discussed. The board approved the 2023-24 Fee Sheet. District fees have stayed the same and haven't increased in the last five years.

The Book Nook By: Tatjana Kazan

MONEY FOR NOTHING

'n Hernan Diaz's superb novel "Trust," which won the 2022 Pulitzer Prize, Ida Partenza, one of the principal characters, perfectly sums up the novel's self-regarding men. Such men, she writes, "all believed, without any sort of doubt, that they deserved to be heard, that their words ought to be heard, that the narratives of their faultless lives

The book consists of four parts: a novel, an autobiography, a memoir, and a private diary, each with its own author, audience, and motivation. The first part, the novel "Bonds," written by fictious author Harold Vanner, sets up the story on which the novel's three other parts play variations. Like the book's title, where "Trust" is both a moral quality and a financial arrangement, as though virtue and money were synonymous, so "Bonds" can be both a monetary instrument and family attachments. In the 1890's in old-money New York, Benjamin Rask who has enjoyed almost every advantage since birth, nevertheless comes from a family of tobacco traders. He hates "the primitive sucking and puffing" that a good cigar requires, and so as soon as his father dies, he sells out and begins to play the market.

For Rask "capital is an antiseptically living thing. It moves, eats, grows, breeds, falls ill and may die. But it is clean.' Rask seems almost entirely without an inner life. Devoid of dialogue, the narration of his life is like a summary rather than in scenes. He marries Helen Brevoort, an American girl from an old family who has been raised in Europe. She is intelligent and talented, but ends up deranged in a Swiss

The second part is "My Life," a partial autobiography by tycoon Andrew Bevel, who is clearly the model for Benjamin Rask. Bevel's wife Mildred has recently died at the same sanitarium in Switzerland. But unlike Helen, Mildred did not go insane, she died of cancer. Andrew is obsessed with setting the record straight, and to that end hires Ida Partenza to write the story of his beloved wife for his autobiography. Ida is the Brooklyn-born daughter of an Italian American

anarchist printer. Her working-class presence bursts the elite bubble. We get a closer look at narcissistic Andrew Bevel, but more importantly, Ida's dogged research into Mildred Bevel's life takes center stage and introduces genuine suspense. Fifty years on, Ida looks back on her ghostwriting days, and her memoir, the third and most spirited part of the novel, will make us distrust the entirety of the novel's first two parts. In the fourth and final part, we get a glimpse of Mildred's diary. She is dying. Andrew is impatient, but she tolerates him, writing in one of her last entries, "The loneliness of animals is what I aspire to."

Helicopter makes special delivery of new air handling unit at CGH

STERLING — On Thursday, May 25, CGH Medical Center and local contractors working to replace two outdated air handling units (AHUs) at the hospital brought in a helicopter to lift seven sections of the new, larger, more efficient air handling unit into place. The AHUs allow for proper ventilation within occupied wings of the hospital (second through fourth floor North and 3 West).

"In our ongoing efforts to improve patient comfort throughout the hospital, this project was long overdue," said Cindy Zander, Vice President of Support Services. "Our amazing Plant Operations and Maintenance staff have been able to keep the current units running for almost 45 years, when the normal run life of each unit is approximately 20 to 25 years! In addition, this project was postponed during the pandemic due to material delivery delays, so it was of top priority to get it completed." Other parts of the project include replacing the hydronic heating water systems and shell and tube heat exchangers that serve the south wing.

In under an hour, the military-grade helicopter, owned by Midwest Helicopter Airways, Inc. of Willowbrook, lifted each of the seven AHU sections into the new mechanical room located on the upper roof in the center of the hospital. Once in place, local mechanical MEPs - Loescher Heating & Air Conditioning and CORE Construction – began work assembling the new unit.

"A helicopter is more efficient from both a cost and workload perspective, as well as much quicker to lift each of the units," said Bob Lehman, CGH Director of Plant Operations and Maintenance. "But in doing so, there are strict FAA and Department of Transportation requirements, as well as many precautions that need to be taken for the safety of our patients and staff.

Worst kind of graft are often legal ones

The worst kind of graft is perfectly legal. Guest Column That's a lesson I've observed in my 35 years as a journalist.

I've been thinking about that lesson these past few weeks as revelations are brought forth about gifts U.S. Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas received from a rich buddy.

Let me preface my criticisms of the jurist by saying I often agree with his decisions. But that doesn't absolve him from the shady things

Thomas and his wife Ginni, received luxury

vacations and private jet travel from Texas real estate magnate Harlan Crow. The justice contends he did nothing wrong and that these were just gifts from a friend.

I don't doubt that Thomas and his wife consider Crow to be a "dear friend." But a more appropriate question might be whether the billionaire would be chumming around with Thomas if

he didn't happen to be a Supreme Court justice. Democrats in Congress are squawking about how wrong

this relationship is. What is happening here is wrong – but probably not illegal. When I was a young reporter in Galveston, Texas, the

managing editor had a "Wheels" column in which he wrote a weekly love note to the auto industry. The price of this journalistic prostitution? Every week, a

car company would send him a new vehicle to "test drive" along with a press release espousing the model's virtues. His teenagers drove them to school. And even when they sent him a real dog with major mechanical issues, he wrote

about how swell it was. "There is no such thing as a bad car," he told a group of young reporters who asked about the practice. We rolled

Most journalists would say what he was doing wasn't ethical. The readers were never informed of this cozy relationship. But it's also the kind of graft that is legal.

If pressed as to why he did it, I suspect he would have justified his actions by pointing to his salary and saying he deserved some sort of perk. By Scott Reeder

Thomas, who earns \$184,000 a year as a Supreme Court justice, could make a similar claim, noting that he would make many times that in private practice. That justification reminds me a bit of one

given by another supreme court justice, Ray I. Klingbiel, who served on Illinois' highest court in the 1960s. Before that he was East Moline mayor. Sometime in 1966 Ted Isaacs, a member of

then-Gov. Otto Kerner's cabinet and a wheeler-dealer, managed to put himself in a position to allocate stock in the politically connected Civic Center Bank in Chicago.

At the time, the state high court was considering the dismissal of a 35-count felony indict-

ment accusing Isaacs of bilking the Illinois Treasury. Shortly thereafter, the court unanimously affirmed the dismissal of Isaacs' felony indictments in an opinion written by Klingbiel. According to the book "Illinois Justice" by Kenneth

Manaster, Klingbiel kept his 100 shares in a dresser drawer. Klingbiel insisted that the stock was merely a campaign contribution. But it was given after he had been elected and in the form of a stock certificate and it had been given to him by an associate of Isaacs, who had a case before the court.

"There is no doubt in my mind Isaacs was trying to influence the court with his actions," Manaster told me.

So why do educated people like Thomas and Klingbiel do stupid things like this?

Manaster attributes Klingbiel's transgressions to the Illinois political culture that he had been reared in. Klingbiel served as the Republican mayor of East Moline for six years and before that worked as the city attorney. There were few regulations on campaign contributions in those days.

But that strikes me as a child's excuse: "Everybody's doing it." Someone with a better moral compass would have

known better.

Future U.S. Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens was appointed chief counsel to the five-member commission that investigated the allegations of wrongdoing. Stevens was quoted in a 1969 Associated Press article

saying, "Chief Justice Roy J. Solfisburg, Justice Ray I. Klingbiel and Theodore J. Isaacs are guilty of gross impropriety. But neither Chief Justice Roy Solisburg nor Klingbiel

was ever criminally charged. "The short answer is they never could prove they took a bribe to the degree necessary needed in court," Manaster said.

Stevens insisted during his 1975 confirmation that he never would have been nominated for the supreme court if not for the work he had done investigating Klingbiel and Solfisburg. One honest man rose as two dishonest ones fell.

The episode ended with Klingbiel retiring and Solfisburg

resigning from the state supreme court. Klingbeil's final days were sad ones, Manaster said. He

remained bitter about what he described as a "political push" to get him off the court. Shaken and sorrowful, Manaster said he told one member of the commission, he knew in his heart he was not a crook,

"but I was a damn fool.' Will Justice Thomas have such a revelation? Don't hold

"These events are good for getting the word out."







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
