Council hears more about Dollar General concerns

CLINTON — Residents living in the area of a proposed new Dollar General store returned to the city council Tuesday to continue making their case against the plan. The site for the proposed store is near the intersection of E. North Street and Rt. 54 east.

Glenna Rogers, who lives with her husband Marc about a block from the planned store site, addressed the council for the first time. Her concerns were similar to other people living in the

area, potential flooding caused by the plan and declining property values.

But, Rogers also felt residents living near the site weren't offered adequate information about plan beforehand.

"We don't know when the zoning was changed," Rogers said. "The taxes on that property for 2022 show it's RD-1 (Residential Development)."

Rogers also said residents in the area did not know when the property was annexed or if a building permit had been issued. The site is

currently farmland.

"You know, people move into town because are excellent schools or because they have a church or they have a job," Rogers said. "I've never heard anybody say they were going to move to an area because they have a dollar store."

Rogers said she felt a backward approach was being used with regard to the project and that it had been dumped on people living near it.

Commissioner Tom Edmunds emphasized the part of the plan that will eventually come to the council for approval

constitutes only the minor subdivision part of the proposal, the drawings that map out how the site will be divided from its current state.

Zoning and approval of the site construction plan are approved by the city zoning board of appeals and the planning commission. "We're more than

happy to listen to you guys, but there are preliminary decisions that have to be made before any of it comes to us," Edmunds said.

E d m u n d s recommended continue attending the planning meetings to let their concerns be known. Marc Rogers

he felt residents were blindsided by the zoning board of appeals because it wanted to vote to change the parking lot.

"We said, 'parking lot for what'," Rogers told Edmunds. "Nobody had told us anything. We talked to the planning commission until we were blue in the face."

Rogers said residents were "pleading with anyone we can to try to get something done."

Senate votes to lift nuclear build ban

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Senate approved a measure on March 30 that would lift a 1980s-era moratorium on nuclear power plant construction.

Senate Bill sponsored by Sen. Sue Rezin, R-Morris, was approved on a 39-13 vote. The bill now goes to the House of Representatives for consideration.

"The bill is going to come to the House with a lot of momentum," Rezin said in an interview after the bill passed. "The unions are out and working their members to explain the importance of the bill and to just explain the technology."

Rezin said on the Senate floor that the bill would specifically allow for the construction of small modular nuclear reactors, or SMRs. These reactors operate at a much smaller scale than traditional nuclear reactors and are built in factories and assembled on site. SMR proponents say they can be deployed in places like factories, replacing the need for things like coalfired cogeneration plants.

"This is a large change in energy policy for the state of Illinois," Rezin said.

At this stage, flooding is still a primary concern for Rogers. Flooding in his neighborhood was largely alleviated after a major, federally-funded flood plain project was conducted about years ago. He, and other residents, fear the problem could return if the Dollar General project is not handled well.

Resident Kendra Hunt told the council residents

had not received proper notification under city code nor had any idea who had purchased the property. She claimed annexation and rezoning of the site to accommodate the project violated the comprehensive plan.

Edmunds said property had not yet been rezoned. Commissioner John Wise said the owners of the property wanted it annexed into the city

and then planned to have it developed under the "small subdivision" class. He said neither he nor any council members, at this point, had information about whether the property had been sold or, if it had,

for what purpose. The city's only involvement so far was to approve annexation.

"That's the only thing we have done at any point so far," Wise said.

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

Senate proponents of the bill, including Sens. Bill Cunningham, D-Chicago, Patrick Joyce, D-Essex, said that lifting the ban would help the state attract investment in new technology.

Cunningham said the moratorium is preventing the state from "sending signals out to the market" for investment in new technology, energy including SMRsand using nuclear power for hydrogen generation.

"I'm here to make Illinois stay relevant, to make Illinois stay at the table," Joyce said. "With the moratorium in place, we're not even part of the conversation."

Rezin noted during floor debate that the federal government has signaled for nuclear reactors and made funding available for small

modular projects. The Department of Energy has several grant programs for the development and demonstration of SMRs.

"By lifting this ban, it allows Illinois, should they choose, to go after federal dollars that are provided by this administration, the Biden administration, who is embracing, supporting and investing in advanced nuclear reactors," Rezin said.

Sen. Ram Villivalam, D-Chicago, said the bill was "still not fully baked," adding that the question of what is done with nuclear waste still doesn't have a solution.

"Whether it's one pound or a thousand pounds, it's still nuclear waste," he said. "We can't wait for a national strategy, in my opinion."

The state's ban went into effect in 1987 and was intended to remain in effect until the federal government identifies a national nuclear waste disposal strategy. In 1987, Congress identified a site in Nevada as the nation's repository for nuclear waste, although later opposition from the

state and the White House quashed that plan. No national disposal site has been designated. Some of the state's largest environmental groups, including the Illinois Environmental Council, oppose the

Jack Darin,

chapter of the Sierra Club, told Capitol News Illinois earlier this month his organization doesn't believe nuclear energy is "clean energy," citing concerns over the environmental impact of

nuclear waste. David Kraft, the head of the Nuclear Energy Information Service, an anti-nuclear advocacy group based in Chicago, has said the bill will weaken the state's landmark energy policy, the 2021 Climate and Equitable Jobs Act.

"Small modulars are not climate solutions, they're not job generators until the 2030s and they'll generate more nuclear waste," Kraft said in a Thursday interview.

Kraft added he's worried that lawmakers are not fully considering the safety implications of SMR technology.

The federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission has approved one SMR design, although no power plants using an SMR design are online in the United States. China and Russia both have SMRs of other designs online.

A similar bill was introduced in the House by Rep. Mark Walker, **D**-Arlington Heights. That measure, House Bill 1079, was approved in committee with a bipartisan majority, 18-3, although it hasn't been heard by the full House.

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

How we protect you from misleading advertising and communications

Social Security works with the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) to protect you from scams that use Social Security as bait. Section 1140 of the Social Security Act allows OIG to impose severe penalties against anyone who engages in misleading Security-related Social advertising or imposter communications. You can review Section 1140 at www.ssa.gov/OP_Home/ ssact/title11/1140.htm.

For example, the OIG may impose a penalty against anyone who:

- Mails misleading solicitations that appear to be from or authorized by Social Security.
- Operates imposter internet website or social media account designed to look like it belongs to or is authorized by Social Security.
- Sends emails or text messages or makes telephone calls claiming to be from Social Security.
- Sells Social Security's free forms, applications, publications without our written approval.
- Charges a fee for a service that Social Security provides free of charge without providing a clearly visible notice that Social Security provides the service for free.

If you receive misleading or suspicious Security-related advertisement or imposter communication, please let us know immediately. Try to capture as much information about the communication as you can.

1953 - IBM unveiled the IBM 701 Electronic Data Processing Machine. It was IBM's first commercially available scientific computer.

Indicted

Please note: Due to newspaper deadlines this article is written after it was announced that Trump was indicted, but before the actual indictment is made public on Tuesday afternoon.

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Employees banned from working at VA

After all the instances of fraud unearthed by the Department of Veterans Affairs Office of Inspector General over the years, I was not surprised to see this special report of something else they uncovered: "Stronger Controls Help Ensure People Barred from Paid Federal Healthcare Jobs Do Not Work for VHA."

Those who are excluded from getting VA health-care jobs are those who previously committed "healthcare fraud, patient abuse, controlled substance violations, or acts subject to license revocation," among other things such as Medicare fraud. The Health and

Human Services OIG keeps a list of those excluded people, but the VA OIG recently ran a test sample of a single pay period, and yes, they found people on that list employed by the VA.

What apparently happened was that the human resources (hiring) staff didn't correctly do as they were required by federal law, which is run the names of potential new hires through the list to make sure they hadn't excluded from employment. In instances surname changes, of the previous last names weren't checked even though they were noted on the hiring documents.

But that wasn't the only error. The VA's Office of Integrity and Compliance was also required to do a monthly computer check of all Social Security numbers of people being paid to make sure excluded people hadn't slipped through the employment cracks. They pointed to a computer coding error as the reason they weren't.

Enter the OIG, who made recommendations so it doesn't happen in the future. One of those recommendations is to

do a comprehensive audit of the Social Security numbers of all VA employees to see if any additional names show up.

There will be new training, of course, of the people who didn't follow policy, plus written guidelines, plus redundancies with multiple eyes looking at data and processes.

You have to love the VA OIG and the people who work there. Surely they have the highest satisfaction level of any who work in government.



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Gumbo delight

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights. Chicken and shrimp gumbo is clearly a very old classic that undeniably represents the Deep South. It is notably a New Orleans cuisine delight. It is with pleasure I now present it.

The following recipe will produce a gallon's worth of gumbo. Be forewarned that it is rather involved.

In a heavy bottomed soup


kettle, heat a small amount of vegetable oil. In that, add 4 ounces smallish diced andouille sausage. Cook it until the sausage firms-up. Add and cook for a few minutes 8 ounces of filet and medium diced chicken breast. The purpose here is to sear the chicken. Now stir in one ounce of minced garlic along with 8 ounces of diced yellow onion.

Add 3½ ounces of sliced green onions along with ½ ounce of jalapeños. Add remaining vegetables which are 5 ounces each of medium diced green peppers, celery and thinly sliced okra. To this add peeled, seeded and medium diced tomatoes. These vegetables are to be cooked until tender and the onions translucent. This completes the first segment.

Enough oil has been rendered from the sausage to add 5 ounces of flower to make the dark brown roux. Work the roux and allow it to cook for one minute or two before adding 96 fluid ounces of preheated chicken stock. You might need a whisk at this point to insure there are no lumps due to the roux.

Bring it up to a boil and

Bring it up to a boil and allow it to boil briefly. This helps to set the starches so it will properly



thicken. Now reduce to a simmer. Second segment is completed.


It is now time to add the herbs and seasons for heightening and balancing the flavors desired. For this add 2 bay leaves along with 1 teaspoon each of oregano and onion powder. Also add ½ teaspoon each of dried thyme and dried basil leaves.

Next add salt and black ground pepper as desired. Simmer for about 45 minutes to blend flavors. From this point forward, do not allow it to boil. Do not forget to dredge out the bay leaves before serving. The final segment is next.

Peel, devein and chop into medium pieces 1 pound and 4 ounces worth of shrimp. Add this and 13 ounces of cooked long grain rice to the mixture. Vigorously whisk in a tablespoon's worth of filé powder.

Some people think that to filet meat is to cut it into layers or slabs. It is simply a word to save one the trouble of saying, "boning and skinning". For example, a chicken breast removed from the bone and its skin removed is a filet. Many may not be familiar with filé powder. Filé powder is dried leaves from the sassafras tree ground to a powder. It is primarily used in Cajun and Creole cuisines as a seasoning and also for thickening.

April 7

Further south, 2 strong tornadoes occurred across the northern parts of Champaign and Vermilion Counties.





N-S are a little shy of the 25 or so HCP generally required to make 3NT. On the other hand, they do have a source of tricks in Clubs which gets Declarer up to eight winners. And where there are eight there's often a 9th, as East is about to find out to his detriment.

West dutifully leads his partner's Heart suit and the Jack is taken by Declarer's Ace (holding up won't achieve anything). The ♣K comes next and East wins his Ace. At this point East can count (at least) eight tricks for Declarer, namely two Spades (because surely Declarer has the Ace), one Heart, one Diamond and four Clubs. East can also deduce that Declarer started with ♥AT9x, because West's opening lead from ♥Tx would be the Ten and from ♥Txx would be a low one. That being the case, it's clear that persisting with Hearts will merely serve to set up Declarer's game-going trick. A Diamond is no better, of course, so East does the best he can by exiting safely with a Club. A nice try, but it just delays the inevitable.

On the run of the Clubs Declarer pitches two Spades and a Diamond, and then cashes the ♠K followed by the ♠A. With East known to have the missing Heart honors and nothing left but red cards, he is a sitting duck for an end-play. Declarer simply exits with the ♥T and sits back smugly while East chooses whether to surrender the 9th trick in Hearts or in Diamonds.

Illinois Groundwork provides community resources and guidance for creating community green infrastructure

URBANA, Ill. - During large rainstorms, many Illinois residents brace themselves for flooding in their basements, streets, and neighborhoods. Illinois Groundwork, illinoisgroundwork.org, is a new free, online tool for communities and stormwater professionals with resources on green stormwater infrastructure, which provides a way for rain to be absorbed into the soil where it lands.

Green stormwater infrastructure is an approach to enhancing traditional or "grey" infrastructure using a rain garden or even permeable pavement. But this method doesn't always work as well as it might. By improving access to data, research, and other resources, this tool can help increase the effective use of green infrastructure to address stormwater management challenges.

"University of Illinois not only has relevant research and data across many departments but also real-world examples of successful green infrastructure, along with other University of Illinois Extension and education Rain Garden," says C. Eliana Brown, Illinois Extension stormwater specialist. "This new tool brings these resources together, providing a robust platform to access green infrastructure knowledge."

The project is a collaboration between Illinois-Indiana Sea Grant and Illinois Extension. A critical component of Illinois Groundwork is an IISG-funded research project that focused on including soil data in green infrastructure design. Soils are the foundation of effective green stormwater infrastructure performance.

"Soil characteristics establish how much and how fast water can move through and absorb into the soil," says Margaret Schneemann, IISG water resource economist. "Failing to take soil performance into account means we are not designing green infrastructure as cost effectively as we could be and may be leaving its benefits on the table."

The goal of Illinois Groundwork is to complement and deepen existing community knowledge with better design capacity and soil knowledge to support local decision-making,

tools, such as the Red Oak soil research. "Ultimately, about the website, contact design is a social process, the IISG team at iisg@purpeople coming together to make a change," McGuire

The web tool outlines a process that users can follow to incorporate soil data into green infrastructure design. Illinois Groundwork provides insights into helpful or necessary expertise, specific tasks, and additional resources. It also includes an interactive resource to help optimize green infrastructure sizing and Plant Finder, which covers 119 plants, with information on soil type, light, and moisture needs for each, as well as photos and descriptions.

"Plant Finder helps designers select plants that are best suited for site conditions and promotes designing with maintenance in mind," says Layne Knoche, University of Illinois stormwater associate. Other resources include relevant Illinois regulations, scientific literature addressing a range of green infrastructure benefits, and real-world green infrastructure examples.


