Food Pantry looking for new home

Local food source has to be out of Main Street building by Sept. 30

MENDOTA – From the time they enter the Mendota Area Christian Food Pantry until the time they leave, director Tracy Cooper and her volunteers speak about one thing – the big move.

Cooper and the food pantry found out in the beginning of March that the lease of the pantry's current location at 918 Main St. in Mendota is not going to be renewed with building owner Salvador Hermosillo.

"We have to find a new home for the pantry. We have to find a new place in Mendota to either rent, buy, or we need to acquire land to build," Cooper said. "We have to be out of our current location by Sept. 30."

The Mendota Area Christian Food Pantry began in the basement of Holy Cross Catholic Church in 1987.

It was then moved to the current location on Main Street approximately 30 years ago.

On average, the food pantry serves 115 families and 400 people per month.

"We have looked at a couple of buildings in Mendota. We would like to stay in the downtown area because that's the most convenient location for our clients," Cooper said. "We have to have a space of 3,000 square feet or more. So far, we're not finding anything that would work, ideally. We have to have a door wide enough to bring pallets through.

"We can't be closed or shut down for any amount of time with as many people and families that need food. The number of new people and the number of people

who were clients, stopped coming, but are now back, has increased since the SNAP COVID-19 benefits ended."

With six months to locate a new home, the food pantry is open to any and all ideas.

Renting or buying an existing property would be the quickest and easiest solution, but if they have to buy property and build, the pantry will.

"At the moment, it's looking like we're going to have to buy land because we're not finding a building. If we buy land and have to build, it's going to be hard to have it done by September," Cooper said. "I asked the city about the land where the fire on Main Street happened in August. From what I understand, the city hasn't acquired the land yet.

"To get land from the town, they can't give it to us. We would have to pay the appraised value of the land."

Cooper and the Mendota Area Christian Food Pantry are asking the community for any help, suggestions, or leads for a new home.

If you can help, the food pantry's number is 815-538-2211 and it is open 8-11 a.m. Tuesday-Friday at 918 Main St.

"If anyone knows of a building, has a building that they would like to lease or sell us, they are more than welcome to get a hold of the Mendota Christian Food Pantry," Cooper said. "The biggest thing we need from people right now are donations to go toward the new location. The donations are going to be needed to help us move. We have 13 freezers that we need to come with us. "We're going to pend help

"We're going to need help from the community to find a place and get moved."

Advocates push for tax credit aimed

Electronics recycling, hazardous

at increasing affordable housing

SPRINGFIELD – Lawmakers are considering bills that would create a new tax credit for affordable housing, referred to as the "Build Illinois Homes Tax Credit."

The legislation, contained in the identical House Bill 2044



tical House Bill 2044 and Senate Bill 1737, would mirror a federal program administered by the Illinois Housing Development Authority and Chicago Department of Housing which helps finance

affordable housing across Illinois.

The Illinois Housing Council, a non-profit membership association consisting of over 260 businesses and non-profits, has been advocating for the measure's passage.

"Our state is facing an affordable hous-

ing crisis, stemming from years of housing under-production," Allison Clements, executive director of IHC, testified in a Senate committee. "Our state's housing deficit has grown 64 percent since 2012, meaning we have more people needing homes than are available."

A 2023 IHC report showed Illinois still has a deficit of low-income housing despite the federal program. According to the report, Illinois has lost 13 percent of its low-rent units since 2011. Additionally, while there are more than 450,000 extremely low-income renters in Illinois, there are only about 150,000 affordable and available rental units, creating a deficit of about 288,000.

"The dollars have actually filled a critical need but they are only a short-term solution to build affordable housing

Electronics Recycling

Accepted items for the electronics recycling include: cable and satellite receivers, cameras, cash registers, credit card readers, cell phones and accessories, chargers, circuit boards, computer servers, computers and computer parts, copiers/ printers/scanners/fax machines/typewriters, DVD/



VHS players, external drives, ferrous and non-ferrous metals, ink and toner cartridges, laptops/tablets/eReaders, mice and keyboards, microwaves, monitors (all types), MP3/iPods/etc., networking equipment (modems, switches, routers, hubs), phones and telecom equipment, projectors, rechargeable batteries (lithium, ion, Ni-Cd, lead acid, Ni-Mh), stereos/ radios/speakers, televisions (all types), uninterrupted power supplies, video game consoles, wire/cables/Christmas lights.

Non-accepted items for electronics recycling include: loose alkaline batteries (accepted while contained in electronic devices), liquid containing items, freon containing items (AC units, dehumidifiers), white goods (refrigerators, freezers), thermostats, light bulbs.

There is a limit of two televisions per vehicle. Registration is not open to businesses. Oversized loads may be refused.

SPRINGFIELD - Illinois averages 53 tornadoes per year, which means you should grab your dog Toto and be prepared for tornadoes and severe weather. March is Severe Weather Preparedness Month and a good time to plan ahead, especially with the severe weather here in Illinois.

"From heavy snowfall to dangerous winds, everyone in Illinois should be prepared for adverse conditions," said Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) Director Alicia Tate-Nadeau. "Illinois recently saw multiple tornadoes throughout the state, followed by unseasonably-warm temperatures, and now we're getting ready for snow and potential flooding."

Illinois ranks fourth in the United States for the most tornadoes per square mile.

Communities across the state are also susceptible to flooding as it is the most common natural hazard in the U.S. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), just one inch of water can cause \$25,000 of damage in your home.

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St. Margaret's selects investment bankers in search of potential partner

SPRING VALLEY – In recent months, St. Margaret's has been meeting with a larger health system, regarding the potential acquisition of St. Margaret's Health. Due to the existence of a Confidentiality and Non-Disclosure Agreement (NDA), St. Margaret's is unable to disclose the identity of the larger system at this time.

To further facilitate those discussions, and to ensure that St. Margaret's achieves the highest value from any potential transaction, a Chicago firm, Juniper Advisory has been retained to serve as its investment bankers. Juniper's role is to assist St. Margaret's in identifying other parties that may be interested in acquiring St. Margaret's Health. Juniper has initiated a nationwide marketing campaign to engage prospective partners.

IDPH launches \$30 million program to distribute air purifiers in Illinois schools

CHICAGO – Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) announced that the state is launching a \$29.6 million program to distribute more than 60,000 HEPA (High Efficiency Particulate Air) purifiers to Illinois schools to help reduce the transmission of respiratory viruses, including COVID-19.

IDPH is coordinating the program with the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE). The program is funded by the CDC through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 and is targeted for school districts that serve lower income communities and counties that have elevated air pollution counts. IDPH estimates almost 3,000 schools will be eligible for the program, covering 68 percent of school districts in the state. It will cover schools throughout the state, including Cook County, with the exception of Chicago, which has received a separate federal grant.

"There is nothing more important to me than keeping Illinoisans safe and healthy especially when it comes to our youth," said Governor JB Pritzker. "We know that our children need to stay healthy and study in classrooms that are well-ventilated in order to thrive and succeed. Thanks to this \$30 million investment, schoolchildren will experience cleaner air—preventing illness and absenteeism, while improving our children's ability to think and learn."

"I have devoted much of my career to protecting and promoting the health of children," said IDPH Director Dr. Sameer Vohra, who is a pediatrician. "Data over these last three years have shown us the critical importance of good ventilation to keep children and adults safe from respiratory illnesses. These HEPA air purifiers are a significant investment in our children, and I am very excited that the State of Illinois can make this impact. They will keep kids healthy and in school, ensuring more opportunities for learning and success for years to come."

"Every Illinois student deserves a safe, healthy learning environment regardless of zip code or income level," said State Superintendent of Education Dr. Tony Sanders. "Improving classroom ventilation with air purifiers is a proven method we can use to reduce the transmission of respiratory viruses, including COVID-19, the flu, and RSV, and, at the same time, reduce absences related to illness. A child's health and attendance is inextricably tied to their ability to learn, and I'm pleased the State is making this vital investment."

IDPH is launching an enrollment process in coordination with ISBE through which schools can submit orders for portable HEPA air purifiers. The administrators of eligible school districts will be contacted directly with information about how many purifiers that their districts are eligible to receive. The portable air purifiers will be delivered to school districts in the coming months. Schools will generally be eligible for one small air filter unit for each 20 students in a school, with a limited number of larger units for districts with more than 1,000 students.

Studies show that cleaner air can reduce absentee rates, and improve students' abilities to think, learn, read and solve math problems.

Last year IDPH issued ventilation guidance to educate the community on the impact of ventilation systems and to provide information about low cost and DIY interventions for ventilation upgrades.

Jerrene was born Feb. 27, 1932, in Compton to Walter and Mabel (Caruth) Heiman.



in Illinois," Rep. Dagmara Avelar, a Democrat from Bolingbrook and lead sponsor on HB 2044, said in a House committee hearing. "The long-term, permanent solution is a state tax credit, the Build Illinois Homes Tax Credit that can sustain affordable housing construction over the next 10 years."

If passed, the Build Illinois credit would cost the state \$35 million annually for 10 years, which advocates say would help increase the number of housing units by 3,500 each year. Once investors construct the housing developments, they would be eligible for an income tax credit based on the development area.

Clements emphasized that the state tax credit would only be issued after the construction of a unit is complete and qualified tenants are moved in.

"Private sector investors, not taxpayers, are going to bear the financial risk of a project not being completed or successful and they closely monitor and oversee each development where these credits are involved," Clements said in the House committee. 'Because the state tax credit is not claimed by an investor until the affordable housing is successfully built and completed, passing this state tax credit this year would not result in any budget impacts to the state until 2026.

According to the IHC report, over 20 states currently use tax credits to attract private equity for building more affordable housing. Lawmakers in Kentucky and Ohio are also considering measures to enact such programs.

Gov. JB Pritzker proposed additional funds for housing in his budget address. The program, referred to as "Home Illinois," would provide for a \$50 million increase in homelessness services, including for emergency shelter, short-term rental assistance and the development of new permanent supportive housing units. If implemented, "Home Illinois" would bring the total funding in that area to \$350 million.

In his budget address on Feb. 15, the governor estimated over 120,000 people experience homelessness annually and over 76,000 children live in overcrowded shared housing.

"The faces of Illinoisans with no home to go to are not homogenous," Pritzker said in his budget address. "They include single parents with infants and toddlers, 6th graders trying to complete their homework using toilets as a desk in temporary shared housing, and LGBTQ+ high schoolers who were kicked out of their homes by their parents."

Moody's gives Illinois credit upgrade

S P R IN G F I E L D – Moody's Investors Service announced that it has upgraded Illinois' bond rating to A3, up from Baa1, marking the eighth credit upgrade the state has received in less than two years.

Moody's is now the second major rating agency to put Illinois in the 'A' category following S&P's decision on Feb. 23 to upgrade the state to A- on its scale.

"This credit upgrade, our second one this year, is the result of the steps we've taken in Illinois to put ourselves on firm fiscal footing," Gov. JB Pritzker said in a statement. "We have balanced our budget, paid our bills on time, cleared out decades of debt, made extra pension payments, and saved billions for a rainy day."

In its announcement, Moody's cited the state's "improving governance" as a key factor in its decision. Moody's is one of many firms that now assesses companies and governments on an "environmental, social and governance," or ESG, framework.

The rating agency said it had updated the state's "issuer profile score" in the governance category to 2 from 3.

"Like other states, Illinois enjoyed solid tax revenue growth over the past couple years, expanding its capacity to build financial reserves and increase payments towards outstanding liabilities," Moody's said in its announcement. "The state is on track to close fiscal 2023, which ends June 30, with further growth in reserves that are already at their strongest level in over a decade."

Illinois' "rainy day" fund is slated to reach its highest-ever balance of more than \$1.9 billion by the end of the fiscal year.

The new rating applies to the state's general obligation, or GO, bonds and its Build Illinois sales tax bonds. Illinois currently has approximately \$26 billion in

outstanding GO bonds and \$2 billion in outstanding sales tax bonds.

Moody's also rated the state's financial outlook as "stable," saying that such an outlook "balances the financial progress being made by the state with the uncertainty of the present

economic climate." "The state's lean financial reserves and heavy long-term liability and fixed cost burdens make it more vulnerable than other states to a negative shift in the national or global economy," it said.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

Accepted items for the household hazardous waste event include: oil-based paints, household batteries, used motor oil, paint thinners, herbicides, lawn chemicals, insecticides, solvents, pesticides, antifreeze, old gasoline, hobby chemicals, pool chemicals, aerosol paints and pesticides, cleaning products, fluorescent lamp bulbs, mercury, drain cleaners, acids, corrosives.

Non-accepted items for the household hazardous waste event include: latex paint, agricultural wastes, propane tanks, business/commercial sector wastes, smoke detectors, explosives/ammunition, farm machinery oil, fireworks, fire extinguishers, controlled substances, biohazard waste/ medical wastes, institutional wastes, tires, electronics, lead acid batteries.

For safe transport of HHW, residents are asked to:

• Pack HHW items in a disposable box to avoid spilling during transport.

• Keep like chemicals together and separate unlike chemicals.

• Secure lids and make sure containers are not leaking.

• Place box(es) of HHW in the empty trunk or storage compartment of your vehicle, away from passengers during transport.

• Remain in vehicle at collection site. On-site personnel will remove the HHW from your vehicle.

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

To declaw or not declaw?

As lawmakers debated a bill this month to outlaw cat declawing, I couldn't help thinking sometimes the best intended legislation can have disappointing consequences.

The legislation pits two well-intentioned groups against one another: animal rights activists and veterinarians. Members of both groups love animals and want what they believe is best for them.

But their worldviews differ.

Animal rights folks are the idealists who see the world as they believe it should be. The veterinarians, on the other hand, are pragmatists who deal with the woes of four legged critters and their two-legged owners every day.

I'm the son and husband of veterinarians. I've spent my entire life surrounded by their concerns.

Cat declawing has fallen out of favor in the veterinary community. Most veterinarians I know – and I know many – do the procedure rarely. Our family cat has her claws and is a happy well-adjusted member of our family.

During the last 20 years, my wife and I have rescued special needs cats and given them a home in our house. One was a victim of abuse where we believe a past owner deliberately broke its leg.

Another was a kitten born without eyes that was found abandoned at the bottom of a drained swimming pool. Someone wanted the kitten destroyed, but my wife refused and we gave it a home for 13 years – much to the delight of our three then-young daughters.

We love cats. And, no, we have never declawed any of our own animals because we view it as an unnecessary surgery.

But veterinarians also see difficult situations. They see the elderly client who brings in a cat she dearly loves but it keeps clawing her thin skin and leaving wounds that won't heal. They see the child who is immunosuppressed, and his parents fear a playful scratch from a kitten could give way to an uncontrolled infection.

It's heartbreaking to think of these felines being taken from their loving homes. And sometimes there is no place for the cat to go. Shelters are often overcrowded and not taking new animals. And even if they do, the cat may spend many months in a cage waiting for a placement.

Worse yet, unwanted animals are often dumped in rural areas to fend for themselves. We feed plenty of abandoned cats on our front porch every night.

Faced with these undesirable alternatives, some owners choose to euthanize their pet. Sometimes declawing is the only alternative to hold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from March 29, 2000.) By Jessica Nashold It was 25 years ago today, March

A fire on the night of April 1, 1975, badly damaged the Alexander Lumber Company's main officer on Sixth Street. Frank Schmitt could see flames through the window as he passed and an alarm was sounded at 10:45 p.m. Because cans of paint were on display in the showroom, Fire Chief James Johnson said the fire was difficult to control and spread between the ceiling and the roof. Although none of Alexander's stored lumber was involved, damage of \$70,000-\$100,000 was estimated.

Firefighters responded from Paw Paw and Mendota-Troy Grove Rural District. Pumpers were brought in from Peru and Arlington.

In reporting the Alexander Lumber fire, mention was made of three other large-scale fires in recent years. On June 25, 1973, Oddfellows Hall and Carroll's Building Supply, on the present site of Mendota's municipal building, were a total loss. On July 16, 1973, the Masonic building on Washington Street, housing the lodge rooms and a drug store, was badly damaged, but restored. On Feb. 25, 1974, the Mendota Farmer's Co-op

keeping an animal from meeting one of these fates. I wish that weren't the case. But that's the state of the world we live in.

A declaw surgery done well can be safe and the pain well managed. The long-term consequences can be minimal.

House Bill 1533, sponsored by Rep. Barbara Hernandez, D-Aurora, aims to outlaw the surgical removal of any cat's claws, with few exceptions.

The measure recently passed the House and now goes to the Senate.

Veterinarians say declawing has largely fallen out of favor but at times it is necessary.

At the prompting of veterinarians, exceptions are carved out of the legislation allowing declawing to protect the feline's health. For example, a cat that keeps digging a rash raw could be declawed.

But no exceptions were made for cat owners who may have medical conditions that could be complicated by scratches.

"Removing a cat's body part because it's convenient for a human, doesn't make any sense -- especially because it's cruel," said Marc Ayers, Illinois director of the U.S. Humane Society.

Hmm, I can think of plenty of tomcats who would just as soon not have one particular appendage removed but the Humane Society does support castration.

"The big idea that we denied was the human exemption because we see that as a big loophole," Rep. Hernandez told me. "Pretty much what they're trying to do is give people who are immune compromised or have blood disorders or dementia a medical exemption to be able to declaw their cats. But by doing that, how are we going to prove that this person has a medical exception?"

She later added, "I think a lot of people could say, 'Hey, I'm immune compromised.' And leave the doors wide open for others."

Yes, it is possible an owner may lie about their own health to get a cat declawed. But if such a person were so unscrupulous, might they not choose to abandon or kill their pet if they can't get it declawed?

"Legislation to make it illegal can be problematic because we need to be able to use it as a last resort to prevent euthanasia," said Dr. Amy Wolf, a Springfield veterinarian. "In situations like that we are helping cats. It's the lesser of two evils."

And there's the rub. Many veterinarians, such as Wolf, who do not perform declaws oppose the legislation because they know at times it is the best of several bad outcomes.

Elective declawing is fading away on its own. But occasionally, in tough cases, it's the best outcome for the cat.

Trying to legislate medical procedures by legislative fiat doesn't make sense, it should remain in the capable hands of veterinarians.

Alvin Bragg prepares to cross the Rubicon

How much does a mug shot mean to you?

To Alvin Bragg, it apparently means quite a lot.

All signs point to Bragg, the progressive prosecutor in Manhattan, indicting Donald Trump for his 2016 hush-money payment to Stormy Daniels.

The old Karl Marx line is that history repeats itself first as tragedy, then as farce. This historic first-ever indictment of a former president of the United States would skip straight to farce.

First, there's the tawdry and relatively trivial subject matter. Trump stands accused by his critics on the left of fomenting an insurrection to overthrow the Constitution and the criminal offense they are going to get him on stems from a dalliance with a porn star in 2006.

Then, more importantly, there's the question of the merits. Unless Bragg has something unexpected on Trump, this appears to be a prosecution in search of a legal theory.

Everything indicates that Bragg is more interested in subjecting Trump to the humiliations attendant to getting charged (turning himself in, getting fingerprinted and photographed) and the grinding distraction of defending himself against a criminal charge than the cogency of the case itself.

As The New York Times put it last week, the Bragg case "hinges on an untested and therefore risky legal theory involving a complex interplay of laws, all amounting to a low-level felony."

In other words, exactly what you want to indict a former president on.

The difficulty in making a case against Trump owes to the fact that hush payments are sleazy but legal. So, the Bragg case involves the bookkeeping around the payment.

There's a reason why Bragg's predecessor, Cyrus Vance, passed on the Stormy Daniels matter. It looked like Bragg was going to pick up a broader business case against Trump instead. When the district attorney dropped that, his progressive supporters were outraged. Now, lo and behold, he has brought things full circle back to Daniels.

As president, Trump inveighed against his political enemies

and demanded that they be arrested. This was shameful and disturbing stuff, although, obviously, there were no arrests.

Alvin Bragg is apparently about to do what Trump fantasized about, and what the entire left-of-center universe characterized as an abuse of power when the Republican merely mused about it.

The prospective Bragg prosecution is no different from what would happen if Sheriff Joe were still in office and somehow found a way to get an attenuated legal hook into Joe Biden. How would Democrats feel about that?

An argument in favor of Bragg's prospective move against Trump is that Trump is unique, and uniquely vulnerable to legal charges. There is something to that, but both Bill and Hillary Clinton could have been prosecuted and they weren't. Same with Richard Nixon after a Gerald Ford pardon that is now considered statesmanlike and correct by nearly everyone.

No Democrat should be sure that Biden isn't implicated in the flow of sketchy money into his family, and we already know he violated the law in his handling of classified documents.

It's not that presidents and former presidents are above the law, but the old norm of forbearance is appropriate.

We shouldn't want to conduct an experiment in what happens when a presidential candidate with an intense following, keenly attuned to potentially unfair treatment, is subjected to a nakedly political prosecution.

That said, it should be Trump's responsibility not to inflame an already incendiary situation, but he is. That, though, is another foreseeable downside of going down this route with this particular case.

Trump's enemies never gave up on the idea that the "walls are closing in," and they've decided, where they have the power, to make it a reality. Once again, they feel justified in violating norms in response to Trump's threat to norms.

As most everyone agrees, a Bragg prosecution will help Trump in the GOP nomination fight, at least initially. If he's fortunate in his enemies, the country is not.

Public Nuisance Ordinance


MENDOTA-The Mendota Police Department would like to remind home and business owners of city ordinances regarding public nuisances



Lake Mendota, other area locations open for spring trout fishing season on April 1

SPRINGFIELD - The 2023 Illinois spring trout fishing season will open Saturday, April 1, at 58 ponds, lakes, and streams throughout the state.

An early opportunity at selected trout sites – the spring catch-and-release fishing season – will open March 18. No trout may be kept during the catch-andrelease fishing period, but anglers can keep trout after the opening of the regular season beginning April 1.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) stocks more than 80,000 rainbow trout each year in bodies of water where trout fishing is permitted during the spring season. An additional 80,000 trout will be stocked for the fall trout fishing season, which begins in October.

The Illinois Catchable Trout Program receives funding support from those who use the program through the sale of Inland Trout Stamps.

For the 2023 spring trout season, no trout may be taken from any of the stocked sites from March 13 until the season opens at 5 a.m. April 1. Anyone attempting



to harvest trout before the legal harvest season opening will be issued citations.

All anglers, including those who intend to release fish caught before April 1, must have a fishing license and an Inland Trout Stamp unless they are under the age of 16, blind or disabled, or are an Illinois resident on leave from active duty in the Armed Forces. The daily

harvest limit for each angler is five trout.

For more information on trout seasons and other Illinois fishing opportunities, check the website at www. ifishillinois.org.

Illinois 2023 fishing licenses and Inland Trout Stamps are available now at IDNR license and permit locations, including many bait shops, sporting goods stores, and other retail outlets. For a list of locations, visit https:// www.exploremoreil.com/ agentlocator.

Fishing licenses and trout stamps also can be purchased online at https://www.exploremoreil.com.

For information about all site regulations, anglers should contact individual sites that will be stocked with catchable-size trout. Not all sites open at 5 a.m. on opening day. Anglers are reminded to check the opening time of their favorite sites prior to the open date.

HOLLYWOOD -- Brad Pitt has a new love. His first public appearance with his new lady, Ines de Ramon, was in Paris at the Cesar Awards (the French Oscars) in late February. De Ramon is a fitness and health coach employed by celebs to help build nutrition plans, establish a fitness routine and maintain a healthier lifestyle.

Insiders say they've been dating for some time and that Pitt hid their love affair behind the guise of being one of her clients. De Ramon is currently in the middle of divorcing "Vampire Diaries" star Paul Wesley.

The only superstars present were Dwayne Johnson, John Travolta and Harrison Ford.

Among big names missing from the in memoriam segment were two-time Best Supporting Actress nominee Melinda Dillon (for "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" and "Absence of Malice"); Stella Stevens ("The Nutty Professor"); Henry Silva ("Ocean's 11"); Cindy Williams ("American Graffiti"); Anne Heche, star of Gus Van Sant's 1998 "Psycho" remake; Leslie Jordan ("The Help"); Tom Sizemore ("Saving Private Ryan"); Paul Sorvino ("Goodfellas"); David Warner ("Mary Poppins Returns"); Philip Baker Hall ("Boogie Nights"); Robert Blake ("In Cold Blood") and Chaim Topol ("Fiddler on the Roof").

Allegedly, Tom Cruise didn't appear to avoid his exwife Nicole Kidman, but I'm sure he would have miraculously appeared as producer of "Top Gun: Maverick" had it won Best Picture.

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
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

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

Start trusting and stop fretting

Psalm 37:1-3 is a great promise for us in God's Word. It says, "Do not fret because of those who are evil or be envious of those who do wrong; for like the grass they will soon wither, like green plants they will soon die away. Trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture" (NIV).

These verses reassure us that we don't need to be worried about everything wrong that's happening in the world, because God is still in control. And He's going to take care of us as long as we trust Him and do good.

But we all have times when we wonder, "Is God really going to come through for me? Can I really trust Him...or do I need to have a backup plan? If God doesn't come through quickly enough, how long am I willing or prepared to wait for Him to act?"

The truth is, whether or not you can trust God depends on whether you're trying to get Him to give you what YOU want, or what HE wants. In other words, are you trusting Him to do His perfect will for you, in His perfect timing and in His way?

The Best Way to Ask for What You Want

It's good for us to tell God what we want and to ask Him for help when we need it. But sometimes we think we know what is right for us, or we want something so badly we feel we just have to have it; so instead of trusting God to do what is best, we tell Him what He needs to do.

We need to realize that we really are not smart enough to deal with the problems we face on our own. And when we don't trust God, we end up trying to make something happen that only He can do, which just makes us frustrated.


I've discovered that no matter how badly I want something, I need to pray, "God, if what I want is not what You want for me, then please don't give it to me. I want to do Your will in this situation, and I'm trusting You to give me what You want

for me."

This is especially important in situations where we don't understand why things are happening the way they are. I remember when God told me to quit my job so I could stay home and study the Word more. This was the season when He was preparing me for full-time ministry.

It was so hard because without me working, we were \$40 short of what we needed each month just to pay our bills. I would go to garage sales to buy clothes for my kids, and we kept giving and tithing as God spoke to our hearts to do it. For six years we had to have a miracle every month in our finances, and it didn't make any sense to me at all why it was taking so long for us to get a breakthrough in our situation.

But I understand now that God was teaching me how to trust Him for every little thing I needed every day. Everything I went through with God during those six years prepared me to do what



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
