
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Sublette Farm Toy & Antique Tractor Show

MENDOTA - The Mendota City Council made a donation and approved several requests at its March 20 regular

Alderman John Holland presented a request from the Mendota YMCA for a donation to its annual SCAMP program. In the past, the city has donated \$3,000 toward this cause, but Holland made a motion to increase the donation to \$4,000, which was approved by the

New law guarantees Illinois workers five days of paid leave

☐ Legislation goes into effect Jan. 1, 2024

SPRINGFIELD – Gov. JB Pritzker signed Senate Bill 208 into law last week, ensuring at least 40 hours of paid leave for Illinois workers.

Effective Jan. 1, 2024, workers will begin to earn paid leave on their first day at a rate of one hour of leave for every 40 hours worked, up to 40 hours of paid leave for the year. Employees can begin using their paid leave either 90 days after their employment begins or 90 days after the act's effective date.

"Today we will become the third state in the nation to require paid time off and the first among the largest states," Pritzker said. "I'm exceptionally proud that labor and business came together to recognize the value of this requirement to employees and employers alike."

The measure passed in both chambers earlier this year during the 102nd General Assembly's lame duck

Prior to the act's effective date, Illinois workers have not been guaranteed paid time off for sick leave, child care, medical appointments or any other reason.

The measure has been under negotiation since 2019 and has "changed hands" a number of times since its inception, Lightford said.

Lightford, who is the Senate's majority leader, acknowledged former state Sen. Toi Hutchinson, who served from 2009 until 2019 and was an original carrier of the bill.

"This is an issue that has been lingering around the General Assembly for far too long," Lightford said.

Pritzker: Tax cuts on the table if state revenues continue to exceed expectations

SPRINGFIELD - With two months to go before the legislature adjourns and current-year revenues continuing to smash expectations, Gov. JB Pritzker said he and legislative leaders are

Accountability, or COGFA, increased its revenue estimates by about \$1 billion for the current and upcoming budget years combined.

"I would like to see – as we feel comfortable with these new revenues coming in and their stability; and I think we're seeing a few years in a row now of the whether there are tax cuts that we can implement," he said at an unrelated news conference at a Springfield community college.

The governor did not say whether tax cuts would be permanent or which taxes he and lawmakers are considering cutting.

And tax cuts were one of several potential uses of excess revenues the governor said he would like to consider. Others include contributions to the state's "rainy day" fund and added payments beyond required amounts to the state's pension system.

The conversation about what to do with excess revenues that show year-overyear stability is one Pritzker said has involved both Democrats and Republicans.

"We will continue to call for implementing the business incentives that the governor agreed to in the Blue Collar Jobs Act, along with additional tax relief for Illinois families and small

businesses." He said the Senate GOP is hopeful Pritzker will "include Republicans at the table of substantive budget meetings," and they are "willing to negotiate in good faith.'

In their budget approved last summer for the current

fiscal year, lawmakers included an array of mostly temporary tax relief. That included direct checks of \$50 or more to most Illinoisans depending on income and number of children, a permanent expansion of the state's earned income tax credit to 20 percent of the federal credit, a six-month pause on a 2-cent gas tax increase that ended Jan. 1, a one-year suspension of the state's 1 percent grocery tax that ends June 30, and a property tax rebate up to \$300 for some

Illinoisans. The governor's office estimated those measures amounted to about \$1.8 billion in tax relief overall. The state approved legislation bringing its rainy day fund

balance to an estimated \$1.9 billion by the end of the fiscal year and contributing \$500 million beyond statutory requirements to its pension fund over the past two years.

The revenue update announced by COGFA last week represents just the latest in a remarkable stretch for state government revenues that have boomed nationwide over the course of the past two years. In Illinois, the growth has been driven by wage growth, corporate profits, inflation, changes to the corporate and online sales tax structures, revenues from marijuana sales and other factors.

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





Burn Ordinance

MENDOTA – It is unlawful to burn any materials other than small and dried quantities of branches, leaves, weeds or grass at any time. The burning of any material such as rubber, tires, leather, tar paper, old batteries or any material that emits an offensive odor when burned is unlawful within the city limits of Mendota.

Limited amounts of yard waste material may be burned provided the material is dry and does not create an offensive odor, nuisance or fire hazard due to excessive high winds. Combustible yard waste material may be kindled from 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays only. All fires must be constantly tended by a competent person, until such fire is properly extinguished. The continued smoldering of slow-burning combustible yard waste after 4 p.m. is a nuisance and anyone kindling such a fire that will emit obnoxious odors after 4 p.m. will be considered performing an unlawful act. 

When SB 208 was debated on the floor in January, one key point of opposition was that it would burden small businesses by raising

"My major concern are the little guys. It's the mom-and-pops that have 5, 10, maybe 13 employees, that this has a significant impact on their budgets," Rep. C.D. Davidsmeyer, R-Jacksonville, said on the House floor.

Pritzker pushed back against this sentiment at the bill signing ceremony.

"Just like bigger businesses, small businesses want their workers to be more productive, to be able to deal with their stresses, emergencies at home, so they can be better and more productive at work," Pritzker said. "I want to encourage anybody who's concerned about that to look at, and remind the workers who work for them, how important it is that we have a law like that that protects workers in the state of Il-

The measure does not apply to employees subject to collectively bargained contracts, because time off would be subject to negotiations between the union and the employer. Ultimately, the measure

received a few Republican votes in the House but passed the Senate with only Democratic support. (Capitol News Illinois

"You can see in every single month so far this fiscal year we've actually had a gain where we've generated more revenue in this fiscal year compared to the same time a year ago," Eric Noggle, senior revenue analyst for COGFA, said at the commission's March meeting last week.

COGFA's new estimate of \$51.9 billion in revenues for the current fiscal year that ends June 30 is \$545 million beyond the amount assumed by the Governor's Office of Management and Budget in Pritzker's budget proposal. And its \$50.4 billion estimate for the fiscal year that begins July 1 is \$465 million beyond GOMB's initial estimate.

All told, COGFA now expects the state to end the fiscal year with revenues surpassing their initial estimates by more than \$5 billion. While that's partially because base sales and income tax receipts continue to produce at record levels, it's also because the state's estimates approved last summer were conservative, Pritzker said.

The current fiscal year still has three and a half months left, so COGFA noted in its recent report that the revenue estimate could be bumped even higher if final income tax receipts are stronger than expected as taxpayers file their returns

for the year. But it could also move downward, the commission noted, if those revenues come in lower than expected due to weakening market conditions. They noted other factors could change the state's revenue outlook, including the possibility of another COVID-19 resurgence, a worsening of the war in Ukraine, or a potential recession.

it from the current location to the new one. Also, there is a strip of lights on the sign that are out and need replaced.


Reasons to leave the village message board where it is and why to move it were both addressed before the item was tabled.

Sacrificing for Lent

Having married a Catholic and now being the only Protestant in a household of six, I've learned a few things in the past 20 years.

One of those things I've learned is how to bake really good macaroni and cheese during Lent. Like many families we don't eat meat on Ash Wednesday and the following Fridays leading up to Easter.

A couple of decades ago, I thought these fasts were silly and overly legalistic.

In fact, early in our marriage, I had no problem eating a steak while my wife and kids munched on pasta. To her credit, my wife never said anything to me about it.

My kids, on the other hand, eyed me with envy bordering on irritation.

But as I've aged and learned more, I've changed my view. It's a beautiful tradition that can be honoring to God if done not out of obligation but a desire to The problem is so many people don't fully understand

the spiritual practice of fasting. Growing up Protestant, I never once heard a pastor extol the virtues of even a According to abstinence rules within the Catholic Church, meat includes flesh from warm-blooded ani-

mals and birds. Fish and other seafood are OK to eat on Lenten Fridays. There are exceptions. In the New Orleans Diocese, it's permissible to eat alligator and in Detroit muskrat can be a Lenten Friday entrée. I'm not particularly keen

on trying either exception. Before Vatican II, Catholics abstained from meat

on almost all Fridays throughout the year. Even though I grew up post-Vatican II, my best

friend's family continued the year-round practice. When I ate at the Reeds on Fridays, on good days it

was cheese pizza and on bad ones, pea soup. Being a rather inquisitive child, I asked my friend's dad, just why they didn't eat most types of meat on Fridays. He gave me a rather long explanation about

a pope centuries ago wanting to help fishermen out. Since my dad was a hog farmer, my 10-year-old-self worried that the pope had it in for folks like us. But, no, that isn't the case.

While it is an interesting, oft-repeated fable within the church, it also happens to be nonsense.

Another explanation I've been told by some folks of a more progressive bent is that chickens, hogs and cattle eat grain, so if Catholics abstain from eating their flesh more food will be available for hungry people.

It's a nice thought. But it also doesn't hold up to scrutiny. Modern aquaculture feeds soy, corn and rice to farm-raised fish. And some cattle, goats and sheep eat only grass.

Since I'm no theologian, I asked Springfield Bishop Thomas Paprocki to explain the practice.

"We don't have this visible presence right in front of us where we can actually see and talk to Jesus the way his disciples did," he said. "So, there is that longing in our hearts to be with Christ, to be present with him. And fasting in a way is analogous to that. When we're fasting, we get hungry. Hunger is a longing for food. ... We long to be with Christ. We look forward to the day when we'll be with Christ in his kingdom. But for the time being, we have to grow in the sense of patiently

That makes sense. And it's something I'll be thinking about as I participate in the partial fast with my family

I occasionally hear folks pooh-pooh the practice. They'll say a partial fast doesn't amount to much.

This sort of disparagement of another's religious practice is perplexing. After all, why should someone care what someone else is giving up? And let's be honest, most of the folks critical of the practice are not giving up anything themselves.

In a self-centered age, it's refreshing to see others sacrificing to remember something greater than themselves. Isn't that the meaning of Lent?

Present Reporter office changes – 1920

Backtracks

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from March 22, 1995.)

Seventy-five years ago, the present Mendota Reporter building was occupied by the City Meat Market & Grocery. In March 1920, plans were announced to combine this building with the adjacent store to the north, recently purchased by William Erbes. George Erbes was proprietor of the market.

Contract for the work, scheduled for April, was awarded to Charles D. Larabee. When consolidation of the two buildings was complete, the store would have frontage of 48 ½ feet.

A centered vestibule entrance would be flanked on either side by large plate glass show windows. Above these, "prison glass fitted with ventilators" would be put in place.

The refrigerator in the original market was being retained and another installed in the new section with capacity of five carloads of hogs and cattle. A new ice machine capable of producing 15 tons of ice daily would furnish refrigeration for both plants. It would be run by a 30-horsepower motor.

The double building was later occupied by National Foods, Ben Franklin, Coast to Coast and an office furniture division of Mevers Furniture Co., after which it was divided into two stores again. The Reporter moved into the south store in 1993 and Dunfrund's appliances and shoe repair into the north store.

On March 20, 1920, Mendota's recently acquired fire truck was put to a rugged test. Some doubt was expressed that the truck would be able to answer alarms on muddy streets as well as horses. The fire on March 20 was down in the third ward near St. Mary's Catholic Church.

Drive Black, in his first experience in the soft roads with the truck, handled it in excellent style and brought it through in

Two days later the truck was called to a house near the high school. On this occasion, the truck had to "cross the sewer ditch six times" in order to reach its objective. Again, Mr. Black

made "a record trip."

The public was reminded that the fire truck had the right-of-way with no restriction on its speed.

It is not only dangerous for autos to go ahead of the truck but may result in loss of time to the department.

It was crisis time for the Mendota fairgrounds in March 1920. A dozen businessmen and farmers had bought the grounds, but the meeting on March 17 determined nothing could be done to save the property. The grounds were offered at auction on March 27. The Sun-Bulletin lamented this action. There is no one to take the lead.

This will be the cause if the fairgrounds property is lost and reverts back to farmland.

Apparently, the auctioneers agreed that it would be a shame to sell the fairgrounds. Auctioneers Plumley and McCall offered to contribute \$300 apiece toward a rescue effort. A new organization was subsequently formed and new buildings put up later in the year, allowing the fair to function again.

The high school announced that "poor work cards" were being given out in mid-March. It was hoped that if parents knew their children were in danger of failing "a week or two before report cards came out," they might be able to "save the pupil from failure" by encouraging better study habits.

Boys who had played football for MTHS in the 1919 season received sweaters. They marched into the assembly hall, wearing the sweaters "and also broad grins."

We have a good looking team and you should see them now in their purple sweaters with a large white "M" on the front

This was the year that Kenneth M. Snapp resigned as superintendent of Mendota schools to accept a superintendency at Downers Grove. He had been in Mendota for four years and was followed by R.E. Beebe.

William Phalen sold his blacksmith business on Sixth Street to William Angel. Phalen had conducted the business for 45 years. Angel had been with him for eight years.

A spokesman for the state highway department said it was difficult to determine when contracts for additional miles of hard roads could be signed. The "unknown quantities" they were

compelled to deal with were the cost of labor (about 65-70 percent of the total), the uncertainty of getting railroad cars to deliver materials and the "price to be realized" from the sale of state bonds. Edward and Theodore Yohn moved

their barber shop from the basement to the first floor of Hotel Faber. Edward Ossman, a former employee, joined them as a partner in the new location. The basement room rented by the

barbers was rented by John Virgil for a shoe repair shop.

Both Blackstone and Lincoln schools organized Home & School Associations, which functioned much as the Parent & Teacher Associations of later years. At Blackstone, one objective for the Home & School group was purchase of a phonograph.

Among automobile dealers seeking Mendota customers in 1920 were Cannon-Ball Garage (Overland), D.A. Fitch (Hupmobile), Mendota Auto Co. (Ford), Carroll Auto Co. (Chevrolet), Fred Hueter Garage (Dodge) and Fahler's Garage (Dort). Fahler offered a Dort touring car at \$1,115. The other dealers did not quote prices.

It was reported that 30 carloads of Buicks had passed through Mendota bound for the west. Most Mendota dealers hired locals to drive cars out from the factories or went themselves to pick them up.

In defense of Ronald Reagan

Presumably, Donald Trump will never produce the dark secrets promised about Ron DeSantis' past. But his team thinks it already has one -- the Florida governor once was a Reagan Republican.

"There's a pre-Trump Ron and there's a post-Trump Ron," someone in the Trump camp told Axios. "He used to be a Reagan Republican. That's where he comes from. He's now awkwardly trying to square his views up with the populist nationalist feeling of that party."

In his CPAC speech doubling down on "MAGA," Trump said, "We are never going back to the party of Paul Ryan, Karl Rove and Jeb Bush." He didn't mention Reagan, but the inclusion of the Gipper in the hall of shame was heavily This way of thinking in a Republican primary is something

new. Once, pretty much every Republican wanted to be a Reagan Republican. If the Trump camp gets its way, Reaganism will have gone from pass $\sqrt{(c)}$ in 2016 to an affirmative vulnerability in 2024. There are layers to this intra-Republican debate. It is certainly

true that conservatives became overly obsessed with identifying themselves with Ronald Reagan and when something becomes an -ism, it is likely to be simplified and ossified. Then, there's the sheer passage of time. Reagan left office

34 years ago. As of 2020, more than half of Americans were under age 40, meaning they have no real memory of Reagan. Neither the pro- nor anti-Reagan side tends to do justice to the real, historical political figure.

Reagan was a free marketeer but wasn't doctrinaire. He accepted the fact of the New Deal.

He was a free trader, yet acted to protect American automakers and Harley-Davidson from Japanese imports. If he was hawkish on foreign policy, he was always pru-

dent. He was cautious about deploying U.S. troops overseas and contemplated eliminating nuclear weapons at a summit with Mikhail Gorbachev in Reykjavik.

Although Reagan eventually came to define conventional

Republicanism, he took on his party's liberal establishment and brought a populist voice to issues like the Panama Canal

At the end of the day, Reagan's achievements are momentous and should be acknowledged as such by all Republican factions. He set the predicate for winning the Cold War. He slayed inflation. He ended the energy crisis. He forced a turn to the center by the Democratic Party under Bill Clinton. He

changed the mood of the country. The thoughtless version of Reaganism doesn't take sufficient account of how circumstances in the country have changed in the last 30 years. Take taxes. The burden of federal income taxes isn't nearly as heavy on middle-class families as it was in the 1970s and 1980s, when inflation pushed them into ever-higher tax brackets. And Republicans have cut taxes so many times, any positive economic effect of further reductions is limited.

TITLE: Nonetheless, for the longest time, the standard Republican approach to domestic policy, with some differences in emphasis, was to cut taxes and reduce the debt, with everything else fading to the background. As it happens, Trump also ran on these two priorities in 2016, but also plowed new ground -- as other Republicans should -- on a host of issues.

The example of Reagan, like that of all accomplished statesmen, offers broad lessons that can be continually drawn on -- about how to balance prudence and principle, how to affect a large-scale political vision, how to deplore what ails the country without giving in to despair, and how to build coalitions.

The last may be most useful to DeSantis once he enters the nomination battle. To win, he is going to need to get a segment of Trump populists at the same time he locks down Republican voters who like Reagan more than Trump.

The Trump forces are going to try to make DeSantis' roots in the party of Reagan disqualifying. Instead, played correctly, it can be a strength.

IVCC Board adjusts fees; tuition remains the same

OGLESBY-While not increasing the tuition rate for a sixth consecutive year, Illinois Valley Community College trustees on March 9 adjusted the technology fee by \$1.40 and student activities by 60 cents starting this summer.

A full-time student taking 12 hours next fall will see an increase of about \$24, said IVCC Vice President for Business Services and Finance Matt Seaton.

With the combined tuition and universal fee at \$135, a student enrolled in 24 hours will pay about \$3,240 over the fall and spring semesters.

IVCC remains a high-quality, affordable option, Seaton said.

"Our peer colleges had an average tuition rate

of nearly \$141 in FY22. Our rates are lower than eight of our ten peers," Seaton said.

In other action, trustees approved:

- The retirement of nursing instructor Dr. Marjorie Francisco effective May 31, 2024. "I have found this to be the most difficult decision in my 44 years in the nursing profession," Francisco said. "I will miss the students who kept my passion for teaching and learning burning for the last 18 years."
- Purchase of a Handheld/Portable X-ray Fluorescence (XRF) Analyzer from Evident Scientific of Waltham, Mass., for \$30,770 to provide ag students in-field analysis of soils,

crops, food, fuels and oils.

- A bookstore remodel project by Franklin Fixtures of Cookeville, Tenn., for \$48,455. The renovation, expected to be completed by fall, will provide a more open shopping experience and will be financed via federal HEERF funds.
 - · Closed session minutes from Feb. 9. Trustees learned:
- The annual Employee Recognition Event April 28 at Grand Bear Resort will honor about 90 faculty, staff and administrators for achieving tenure, teaching excellence, years of service, distinguished service and retirees.
- Gov. JB Pritzker's Feb. 15 budget address was "very encouraging," IVCC President Jerry Corcoran said. Proposed increases include \$100 million to MAP grants, \$20 million to the community college operating budget; \$10 million for noncredit programs in advanced manufacturing and electric vehicle technologies, \$3.2 million for dual credit programs and \$5.2 million for noncredit workforce training. "The increase in MAP is especially significant because it makes community college free to nearly all who are at or below the median-income level," Corcoran said.

Tracy Morris.





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

Castle For Christmas' (with "The Princess Bride" star Cary Elwes), is the subject of the two-part



documentary "Pretty Baby," following the exploitation and sexualization Shields endured as a child actress since the age of 12. The doc was produced by George Stephanopoulos and his wife, Ali Wentworth. Shields is currently doing

another rom-com for Netflix, titled "Mother of the Bride," with former "iCarly" star Miranda Cosgrove and former "Law & Order" star Benjamin Bratt. Shields was wed to tennis great Andre Agassi from 1997-99, then wed producer/director Chris Henchy in 2001. Henchy and Shields have two daughters.

Chris Pine doesn't know what's become of "Star Trek 4," confessing that he's been kept out of the loop regarding the film. "I don't know

anything," Pine said. "It feels like it's cursed." Paramount took "Star Trek 4" out of production last September, despite claiming that they've got a fantastic script ready to shoot.
