County considers selling marina

Costs to maintain, improve facility prompt discussion

CLINTON The county is considering selling the Clinton Lake On Mar. 23, marina. county board members voted to have the 90.55 acres plus buildings and property on the site the county owns appraised. Discussion about the merits the of plan followed.

Board chairman Dan Matthews was advised by state's attorney Dan Markwell to have the appraisal conducted, along with several other items, to prepare for a possible sale.

"People are starting to ask us what we're going to do," Matthews said. "We've already shared it in a number of other meetings."

He said he was looking for approval to "continue down this path."

"I think everyone agrees, we need to get out of the day-to-day operations of the marina," Matthews said. "Talking with these appraisers, talking to a gentleman out of New York who works with selling marinas all across the United States and even overseas, every one of them is recommending we don't do a lease."

Since the county first assumed ownership of the Clinton Lake marina from Exelon, it has contracted with various management firms to oversee the facility.

Matthews said, based on advice he received, a lease restricts the ability of the marina operators to fully invest in developing a successful facility.

While the county has over the years funded improvements to the marina, officials often have been hampered by the cost of maintaining the facility. Some projects have involved major renovation of aging systems, such as the marina waste treatment plant, and unexpected, expensive work to make the site ADA compliant.

These were in addition to the periodic work performed to the marina's docks and recent replacement of the marina breakwater.

Board member John Werts asked if it would be better to offer each

component of the marina separately as individual contracts. He suggested a "hybrid" plan.

"...Hiring someone to manage the facility, take the gas dock, offer it to the highest bidder, the restaurant to the highest bidder, the mechanical shop to the highest bidder," Werts suggested.

He felt the option would mean the county would receive more of the revenue.

Board vice chairman Terry Ferguson said the board considered such an arrangement several years ago.

CEO program introduces students to business

CLINTON - Clinton High School senior Alexa Harris and Maroa-Forsyth senior Jack Horve spoke with the Clinton board of education on March 22 about the Central Illinois CEO program which, in addition to CHS and M-F students, is open to students in Farmer City and Warrensburg-Latham.

This is the fourth year of the program, open to juniors and seniors, to learn business concepts, life skills, and more. The goal is to teach students business concepts and give them the opportunity to apply them, explained facilitator program Melanie Brown.

Reviews of the program have illustrated students' pride in their communities as well as increased intent to remain in their communities.

Brown said when students start the program, only about 30 percent plan to remain in their hometown after they finish school. However, when they complete the year-long program, that increases to 80 percent.

By visiting different businesses and business the leaders during program, students see the employment, different occupation, and economic opportunities their communities offer, Brown said. "It is a wonderful program that not only teaches them business concepts and helps them launch their own business, but it helps them gain an appreciation for the community in which they are raised.' Harris told the board she joined the program after having a friend in the program, adding she has found inspiration from local business leaders. "Joining (the program) has been a really great experience for me," said Harris. She believes her public speaking skills have greatly improved since starting the program and she enjoys the site visits to local and area businesses. Each student in the CEO program creates a business during the final semester. Harris is creating a vintage clothing business.

Pro-Ag Resolution

Grace Clark, manager of the DeWitt County Farm Bureau, visited the county board on Mar. 23. Clark urged board members to support the Pro-Agriculture Resolution listing on the board's agenda. "This seems fitting because we are celebrating National Ag Month," Clark said. The resolution acknowledges the important contribution agriculture makes to the county and the nation. DeWitt County Farm Bureau has about 2,000 members, including 443 farmers. The board approved the resolution.

OSF Peace Meal senior program restarting in Weldon in April

WELDON OSF Healthcare plans to restart its Peace Meal program serving the Weldon area. Peace Meal has not been available there since the



beginning of state COVID restrictions in 2020.

The first meal of the new Weldon Peace Meal program is scheduled for Wednesday, April 12 from 10:30 a.m.-noon.

The Peace Meal program helps provide senior citizens with meals served at central locations and also through some home delivery. OSF took over responsibility of the program in December 2020. It serves seniors in Champaign, DeWitt, Ford Iroquois, McLean, Piatt and Livingston counties. Peace Meal coordinator for the Weldon area Dee

Ryan said she hoped they would serve at least 30-40 seniors at Weldon Village Hall for the first scheduled meal of the restarted program. The Weldon program also is open to seniors living in the Cisco, DeLand, DeWitt and Lane areas.

The OSF program is an expansion of the previous Peace Meal service, which operated just once a month. OSF Peace Meal will serve meals five days a week.

Activities, including BINGO, also will be offered during the daily meals at the village hall,

Ryan said.

OSF Peace Meal served nearly 300,000 meals in 2021 with more than 1,600 seniors receiving meals every day in the counties the program serves. The meals contain a third of the daily adult nutrition requirements. People age 60 and older are encouraged to participate. OSF also works with several organizations, including transportation providers, home care agencies, food pantries, care centers and the University of Illinois Extension to receive and provide referrals to get

seniors resources and services they need.

The suggested donation is \$3.50 per meal. The meals are intended to be low-cost to help seniors affected by increasing costs. Peace Meal is partially funded through the Older Americans Act and State of Illinois general revenue funds.

No one is ever refused meals or services because of an inability to donate. Illinois Link is accepted at all Peace Meal sites.

Horve has created Sun Soaps, a business that sells hand and bar soaps.

"This program has given me a head start," said Horve. "I want to keep studying business and I feel like I'm a step ahead of other students (entering college)."

"We get to have a taste of learning in a nontraditional setting," added Harris.

Students get the opportunity to meet with local bankers with their business financials and request a grant for seed money to start their businesses, Brown explained.

Two hours of credit is earned for the participating students who can also earn college credit through Western Illinois University.

"It's a wonderful life

experience," said Brown. The students will host a trade show for all of their businesses on May 2 at Hickory Point Mall in Forsyth.



CLINTON — The C.H. Moore Homestead and DeWitt County Museum will open its doors for the 2023 season on Saturday, April 1.


That date will also mark the premiere of the museum's new exhibit, "Historical Houses of DeWitt County," which is included in the daily museum tours.

"The biggest negative on running it ourselves is dealing with personnel," Ferguson said. "We've got to have a lot of staff in the summer. It can get pretty awkward with how to make all that work."

"There are a lot of options, but I don't think breaking any of those off into their own pieces is going to be ... I don't think anyone is going to want any part of that," Matthews said. "They might try it for a couple of years, milk it for what it's worth and then hand it back into our laps."

Matthews also suggested the costs to improve and maintain the marina would only get larger for the county as time went on.

"If we went down that path, I'd be coming back in a couple of years saying 'okay tell me how you're going to get me \$5 million', if that's what I'll need over the next 10 years to keep that place running even like it is today."

Matthews went down the list of ongoing expenses, replacement of three docks, breakwater, erosion control.

"We have way too many more important issues to worry about somebody calling because there are geese in the bathroom," Matthews said.

He said he had a meeting scheduled with a representative of Constellation, owner of Clinton Power Station, to see if the company would want to reassume ownership of the marina.

"I think we're in a position where what we're doing doesn't work," Matthews said. "It's a lot of headaches for us. Compared to the management we had four or five years ago, the marina is in such better condition. Right now, it's on a high."

He said he expected someone would see the value in developing the marina, and it was a good time for the county turn it over to someone else.

With approval of the motion to pursue the sale of the marina, a sale is not a certainty. Matthews said it merely would allow the board's marina committee to explore aspects of a sale.

"We'll continue to go down the road with the appraiser and talk to Constellation to see how they feel about it," Matthews said.

County talks also would involve a determination of the site's value and the appropriate way to sell the property.







Question: How do I earn Social Security credits and how many do I need to qualify for benefits?

Answer:

General

We use your total yearly earnings to figure your Social Security credits. The amount needed for a credit in 2023 is \$1,640. You must earn \$6,560 to get the maximum four credits for the year. The amount needed to earn one credit usually increases each year when average wages increase.

To qualify for Social Security benefits, you must earn a certain number of credits. The number of credits you need depends on your age when you apply and the type of benefit. No one needs more than 40 credits for any Social Security benefit. You can read more about credits in How You Earn Credits at. www.ssa. gov/pubs/EN-05-10072. pdf.

Question:

I'm gathering everything I'll need to file my taxes this month. Do I have to pay taxes on Social Security benefits? Also, where can I get a replacement 1099?

Answer:

Some people who get Social Security must pay federal income taxes on their benefits. Still, no one pays taxes on more than 85 percent of their Social Security benefits.

You must pay taxes on some portion of your benefits if you file an individual federal tax return and your income exceeds \$25,000. If you file a joint return, you must pay taxes if you and your spouse have combined income of more than \$32,000. If you are married and file a separate return, you probably will have to pay taxes on your benefits. Social Security benefits include monthly retirement, survivors, and disability They benefits. don't include Supplemental

Question:

What is the average Social Security payment that a person receives each month?

Answer:

The average monthly Social Security benefit for a retired worker in 2023 is \$1,827.00. The average monthly Social Security benefit for a worker with a disability in 2023 is \$1,483.00.

Question:

Will my son be eligible to receive benefits on his retired father's record while going to college?

Answer:

No. At one time, Social Security did pay benefits to eligible college students. But the law changed in 1981. We now pay benefits only to students taking courses at grade 12 or below. Normally, benefits stop when children reach age 18 unless they are disabled. However, if children are still full-time students at a secondary (or elementary) school at age 18, benefits generally can continue until they graduate or until two months after they reach age 19, whichever is first.

I suspect that someone I know is collecting Social Security disability benefits when they shouldn't be. What is the best way for me to report fraud?

Question:

How does Social Security decide if I am disabled?

Answer:

For an adult to be considered disabled, Social Security must determine that you are unable to do the work you did before and that, based on your age, education, and work experience, you are unable to adjust to any other work that exists in significant numbers in the national economy. Also, your disability must last or be expected to last for at least one year or to result in death. Social Security pays for total disability only. No benefits are payable for partial disability or short-term disability (less than a year). For more information, read our publication, Disability Benefits, at www.ssa.gov/ pubs

Supplemental Security Income

Question:

I'm on Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and live with my two brothers in an apartment. My SSI payment is cut by one-third because the Social Security office says I don't pay enough of the household expenses. How much of the expenses must I pay in order to get the full SSI rate?

Who is eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI)? Answer:

People who receive SSI are age 65 or older, blind, or disabled with limited income and resources. Go to www.ssa.gov/ssi for income and resource limits. The general fund of the U. S. Treasury makes SSI payments. They do not come out of the Social Security Trust Fund.

Medicare

Question:

I recently retired and am approaching the age when I can start receiving Medicare. What is the monthly premium for Medicare Part B?

Answer:

In 2023, the standard Medicare Part B premium for medical insurance is \$164.90 per month. Some people with higher incomes must pay a higher monthly premium for their Medicare coverage. You can get details at www. medicare.gov or by calling 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227) (TTY 1-877-486-2048).

Question:

I didn't enroll in Medicare Part B back when my Part A started a few years ago. Can I enroll now?

Answer:

It depends. The general enrollment period for Medicare Part B, medical insurance, begins January and runs through 1 March 31. Keep in mind that although there is no monthly premium for Medicare Part A, there will be a premium for your Medicare Part B. In most cases, that premium goes up each 12-month period you were eligible for it and elected not to enroll. If you are covered by a group healthcare plan based on your employment or the employment of a spouse, you may qualify for a special enrollment. Special enrollments may be processed at any point during the year, but require proof of coverage. To find out more about Medicare, visit www.medicare.gov or www.ssa.gov/benefits/ medicare/.







An elderly lady contacted this paper several weeks ago and asked if I would write an article on gun violence, especially as it relates to the youth of this country. Such articles are difficult to write.

encompass Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana and Alabama. There is a lot of diversity because of the coastline and interior regions. Mississippi has a short coastline but the state runs to the north a good ways. It would then have cuisine more prominent to the inland.

Florida has the longest coastline of any other state. It has the Atlantic Ocean along its east coast and Gulf of Mexico along its west coast. Its soil is very sandy and large southern regions are swampland. In the Southern parts of Mississippi and Louisiana would be marshland.

The Great Mississippi River divides these states bringing with it its own contribution to their life style and cuisine. There are huge diversities in these states. Primary

the cuisine would of come from the Spanish and French who tried to colonize these regions and Africans being brought in later. Naturally there were the aborigine Indians here. Florida's greatest food listing is the wide variety of seafood. Southern Florida is the most unique culinary region. The cuisine is so unique that it has its own name for it. It is called "Floribean." Notice it has the first five letters of the name of the state and the word "bean" attached. Don't ask me how the word "bean" got in there. Rather than beans, this cuisine utilizes seafood and tropical flavors such as lime, grapefruit and oranges. Hominy made from corn is noted as a southern

dish. This food was invented by the Choctaw states, Louisiana is a great melting pot. One particular interest would be the French that were driven out of Canada by the British. They traveled down the Mississippi River to settle in New Orleans. This would be long before the time David Crocket took his boat ride down the river.

Since the resources would be different than in Canada, the French had to apply their cooking techniques to the food available and the cuisine became known as "Cajun cooking". This cooking requires iron skillets. They would use a meat/ fish stock and dark brown roux. Using certain vegetables and herbs, you have what is called gumbo; a very hearty stew. March 30

1938: A family of three of 5 tornadoes moved across central and west central Illinois during the afternoon. The tornado damage stretched from near Quincy east-northeast to areas south of Peoria. The worst damage from the outbreak occurred in South Pekin, where 3 city blocks were leveled and 250 homes were damaged or destroyed. 9 people were killed in South Pekin, two in Morton, one in Timewell (Brown County),

and one in Astoria. Eight other strong tornadoes were reported in the state that day. A home destroyed near Edwardsville had also been destroyed by another tornado in 1883.

1898: Springfield reported a total of 9.65 inches of rain during the month, establishing its wettest March on record.



South opens a 15-17 No Trump, North raises to game, and West leads a Club. Declarer wins that trick and knocks out the A. Back comes a Club, at which point there are nine tricks for the taking in the shape of two Spades, four Diamonds and three Clubs. Is it time for Declarer to fold his tent, claim nine tricks and move on to the next hand? Not necessarily!

The matchpoint player is always looking for that extra trick. Is there one? The only possibility is in Hearts, but leading towards the ♥K (before cashing nine tricks) is not without risk, and it's possible that East will take Dummy's King with his Ace and that the defense will then cash three or four more Heart tricks, defeating the contract.

Is it just a 50-50 shot? No, the odds favor going for the overtrick. Half the time the ♥A will be onside and Declarer gets his overtrick and a good score. And even when the VA is offside it's unlikely that the defense will then run the suit, because (a) the Hearts may be blocked (picture West with QTx or Jx or similar holdings, or East with AQT or AJ or the like); (b) even if the Hearts are not blocked, the defense may do the job themselves (for example, East may hold AQJx and not realize that, after winning the ♥A, he must return a low Heart). It's a case of "Heads Declarer wins, tails she loses only occasionally".






