

Amboy High School spring musical to open March 10

AMBOY — Although this winter hasn’t been a typical cold, gray, and snowy Midwest affair, have you found yourself kind of hibernating inside, going out for necessities or maybe to shovel your walk? Spring is just around the corner, we set our clocks one hour ahead this weekend, and that also means that the Amboy high school stage play is geared up and ready to be showcased this Friday, Saturday and a Sunday matinee performance in the auditorium.

Amy Schwamberger is in her fourth season as Director and also serves as the elementary music teacher. She has guided a group of nine actors and eight crew members through daily after school rehearsals for two hours since the beginning of January. This year’s adaptation picked by Schwamberger over the summer using Music Theatre International for the scripts and musical scores is the musical comedy “Dirty Rotten Scoundrels.” The show has taken on many manifestations since its original 1964 film written by Paul Henning and Stanley Shapiro, and starring Marlon Brando and David Nevin entitled Bedtime Story. You may remember the 1988 comedy film that featured Steve Martin, Michael Caine and Glenn Headly. In 2019, it was made yet again, this time called The Hustle, with Anne Hathaway and Rebel Wilson.

The plot opens inside a lively casino near the French Riviera, British con-artist Lawrence Jameson, played by Kelton Schwamberger, and is tricking wealthy women out of their money with the help of his trusted bodyguard Andre, played by Cooper Whitney. Muriel Eubanks, played by Emma Dinges, has expressed her devotion to Jameson, and warns him of a highly successful con-artist known as “The Jackal,” who is said to be visiting the area. Jameson meets an American named Freddy, played by Austin Shugars, who

he thinks is the Jackal, and makes a deal with him that the first to swindle a woman out of \$50,000 gets to stay, while the other leaves town. Singing, dancing, and hilarity follow this two hour tangled journey.

Amboy Fire receives \$26,000 state grant

SPRINGFIELD – The Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal (OSFM) announced the recipients of the 2023 Small Equipment Grant Program. A total of \$1.5 million was awarded to 64 fire departments/districts and EMS providers across the state. The program was established to provide grants of up to \$26,000 each for the purchase of small firefighting and ambulance equipment.

Area grant recipients and their awards include Amboy Fire Protection District, \$26,000; Compton Community Fire Protection District, \$26,000; Ogle-Lee Fire Protection District, \$23,016.80.

“We are going to use the grant to replace our equipment from 2007,” said Amboy Fire District Fire Chief Jeff Bryant Sr. “The grants are really important. With inflation and supply chain issues, it’s hard to keep up with updated equipment. The only way to keep up is grant and alternate funding or things get out of date really quickly. Then the problem is there is no way to catch up.

“The economy that we’re currently in, it’s not fair to the taxpayers. So, we’re doing our best to do everything on our own to make sure we facilitate the equipment and

keep everything up to date as much as possible without causing issues for the taxing district.”

This program is an innovative approach to a problem that has long caused difficulties for fire departments and not-for profit ambulance services in Illinois, particularly those that have hardships in generating the necessary revenue for small equipment. The purpose is to allow eligible applicants the opportunity to purchase small equipment that they may otherwise not be able to purchase. The OSFM received 296 applications, requesting around \$4.5 million in funding for this grant period.

A Look Back At Amboy Area Heroes Who Served During World War II

Editor’s note: The Amboy News will be publishing a series of articles on veterans who served during World War II. These heroes are part of Amboy’s history and it is our honor to publish these articles so you can learn about their service to our country. This article was researched by Jack Mead and Tom Dempsey, and written by Dempsey.

Lt. Willilam “Dutch” Vaessen

William Mangus Vaessen enlisted in the Army Air Force in the summer of 1940, a year and a half before America entered the second world war. After earning his wings, he achieved the rank of First Lieutenant, and left for duty in the Mediterranean Theater in July, 1944 with the 829th Bomb Squadron, 485th Bomb Group. The mission of this group was strategic bombing of



military, industrial, and transportation targets. The story of his courage and heroism is recounted in the following news article in the Dixon Evening Telegraph on September 2nd, 1944:

“WILLIAM M. VAESSEN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Vaessen, Route 2, Dixon, was born in Sublette township. Lee County, Illinois, on Oct. 3, 1921, and was killed in action while acting as the pilot and commanding officer of a B-24 Liberator bomber in the course of duty



over Toulon, France, on July 5, 1944. He was buried in the American Cemetery at Borga, Corsica. Lieutenant Vaessen enlisted in the army air corps on July 10, 1940, as a private and he took his basic training at Kelly Field, Texas.

“Following his basic training he made rapid strides and received his wings and commission and was retained as an instructor of navigation at Hondo, Texas. Lieutenant Vaessen had been very anxious to receive overseas duty and had made many requests



for such an assignment but his ability as an instructor had kept him in this country for many months. While at Hondo Field he was an assistant engineering officer of the field and held many other important positions. His request for overseas duty was finally granted and after special training with a selected crew, he left this country May 30, 1944.

“He was assigned to the Mediterranean air theater and had flown at least ten bombing missions over France and Germany before meeting his death. From information received by his parents his plane was damaged by anti-aircraft fire over Toulon

and Bill was unable to reach the flying fields of Corsica before crashing into the Mediterranean Sea.

“His parents have been informed that his body was recovered and burial was at Corsica. They were further informed that there were four survivors out of the crew of 10 in Bill’s plane. From letters received by the surviving members of his crew his parents have been informed that ‘Dutch’ as he was known to his crew members, was very highly regarded both as a pilot and friend by all of them.

"First, the cast gets the chance to watch the Broadway production so they can get a feel of the mood and progressions and make the characters their own," she said. There aren't any drama classes at the high school. Many of these student actors have been performing since the third grade and have a love for the theatre. Memorization of their lines

"She is really good at giving advice and has a clear vision on how she likes things to be done," Dinges said. "She is precise in her directing which makes it easier and fun for all of us."

This show is also bittersweet for the Schwamberger family. It's Kelton's last performance with "mom" and he shared a fun moment.

"The most special part of working with my mom has been working out the choreography dances at home," he said. "We actually dance together in the living room sometimes which is such a laugh

and will always be a fond memory."

Mom shared similar sentiments.

"Kelton has been in all four of the shows that I've directed. Come Sunday afternoon it will be hard on me and I might shed a tear. It's special," she added.

"They had named the bomber 'The Flying Dutchman' in honor of Bill and they all stated that they felt that he was one of the best pilots in the Army air corps.

"They all felt perfectly safe when Bill was at the controls and the survivors said the loss of six of the crew and the plane was in

no way attributable to lack of flying ability but rather to the mechanical failures as the result of shell fire.

"Since receiving official notice from the war department of their son's death, Mr. and Mrs. Vaessen have also been presented with posthumous decorations for Lieutenant Vaessen consisting of

the Order of the Purple Heart and the Presidential Citation. Memorial services were held in St. Flannen's Church in Hamon, of which church Bill had been a member before leaving for service, on July 21, 1944 and [the] Dixon Post of the American Legion and Company 'A' of the Illinois Reserve Militia assisted in

the observance."

BBB reveals Top 10 local scams

ROCKFORD — The annual Scam Tracker report from the Better Business Bureau of Chicago and Northern Illinois has been completed. The results show that fraudsters keep coming up with various schemes and ways to entice all age groups to snare as victims.

At the #1 position for the third year in a row is the menacing problem of Online Purchase Scams. The pandemic is a huge factor in the escalation of these scams to the top, where it has remained, as shopping on websites has become a common way to purchase.

Phishing Scams continued to be the #2 scam reported locally for the second year in a row. These scams not only flood consumers' e-mail inboxes, they also are a dangerous weapon that Cyber Criminals use to infiltrate businesses.

The #3 Scam reported is Counterfeit Products, which moved up from the #4 position last year. Many fake websites are popping up, especially on social media, and consumers report paying for items they never receive, or cheap knock-off merchandise is delivered.

Employment Scams remain high on the list in the #4 position. To no one's surprise, with remote working and more layoffs in the news, this scam could be even more significant in 2023.

A new entry to this year's Top 10 list at #5 is Advance Fee Loan Scams. The scam has been on the list in the past and is most likely returning due to inflation and a tough economy. More people are looking for loans and find solicitations in their email, text, and pop-up ads with enticing offers, which often lead to scams.

After missing last year's list, COVID-related Scams reappeared in 2022 in the #6 position. This new massive nationwide wave of scams was mostly related to complaints regarding Covid testing pop-up site clinics. BBB of Chicago led a major campaign to alert and warn people across the country.

At #7 this year, Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams are a consistent top 10 scam. The first major lottery prize in 2022 of over 1 billion dollars only encouraged scammers to prey on victims' hopes and dreams as they continue to cause heavy losses.

Rounding out the Top 10 for 2022 were Credit Card Scams at #8, a return to the top list of Home Improvement Scams at #9, and Identity Theft at #10.

Falling off the Top 10 this year, Tech Support Scams, Cryptocurrency Scams, Fake Invoices, and Debt Collection Scams.

It should be noted that there is catch-all category called "Other," which contains a garden variety of scams. Many hot topics in the "Other" category include a wide range of issues, from romance and pet/puppy scams to airline issues, concert tickets, legal services, maintenance issues, and social media marketplace issues.

Local nature and history

A Pioneer's Story

At least one young mother was not prepared for prairie life...

It is not often that we can record the story of one of the pioneer families in Lee County. Thanks to the discovery of letters that were sent by Seraphina Welty in Lee County to her friends and relatives in Buffalo, New York, we can reconstruct much of her story. Seraphina Scott married David Welty in Buffalo, New York in 1834. In 1838, on the advice of his doctor, David Welty who had been troubled with bad health, decided to move from Buffalo to Illinois.

His decision to come to Illinois proved to be a good one; all of northern Illinois had recently been opened for settlement. The Black Hawk War of 1832 had ended six years prior. Northern Illinois was one large, empty prairie, only a small part occupied by trees. The main road through this region was the "Dad-Joe Trail" from Peoria to Galena. Dixon was the only town between Peru and Galena. Dixon was a village of log cabins. Even "Father" Dixon's trading post, the hub of the town, was a log building.

David sent for his wife and son to join him in Dixon. Their journey from Buffalo to Dixon was a like a modern journey to a new planet. The state of New York was one large forest. Every farm in the state had required the clearing of 6,000 maple trees. But northern Illinois was one vast prairie with trees scattered along rivers and isolated groves. The change in scenery was very depressing for Seraphina, but she soon adapted to her new surroundings.*

David had purchased a large farm on the Peoria (Dad-Joe) Road, along the banks of Green (Inlet) River, south of present-day Walton. He built a farm house, a log building 50 ft. x 32 ft. He soon furnished it with expensive carpet and fine furniture. It was only the third house on the Peoria Road. Dad-Joe's tavern was another.

The area was considered to be the best hunting ground

in the entire state. Deer were abundant. Prairie chickens were common. Huge flocks of ducks and geese never seemed to diminish, and David loved to hunt. David and Seraphina had 13 children; two of them died in childhood. When David was appointed Probate Judge of Lee County, they moved to Dixon. Their son, Charles, took over the operation of the farm.

Seraphina died in 1886 at the age of 72. David died in 1887. They are both buried in the Oakwood Cemetery in Dixon.

* Seraphina's initial adaptation to the Illinois prairie was recounted in the book, *Recollections of the Pioneers of Lee County*, published in Dixon in 1893. Her son, John Welty, wrote: "When mother looked upon the long stretches of prairie, utterly devoid of houses, trees, or any other evidences of civilization... she sat down for a two week's cry. She gave her undivided attention to the business in hand -- that of weeping." -- Editor

Editor's Note: James Brady Long was born in Amboy on June 12, 1926. Known by many as "Mazie", he grew up in Amboy, served in the army during World War II, then studied forestry at the Michigan College of Mining and Technology. His studies in botany and forest protection continued as he ventured into farming here. A beloved story-teller, his farm became a place of learning and adventure for relatives and friends. In his later years, he contributed a series of local nature articles to The Amboy News. Upon his death in 2000, his many hand-written drafts were gathered and initially curated by Brenda Boyle. The present, renewed series draws from those drafts, both unpublished and previously published.

WORDS MATTER

Their website proclaims "600,000 words ... 3.5 million quotations ... over 1000 years of English. The Oxford English Dictionary (OED) is widely regarded as the accepted authority on the English language." Yes and no. In "The Dictionary of Lost Words" (2020), Australian author Pip Williams begs to differ.

Williams's Victorian novel is a clever blend of fictional characters and real people. Her protagonist is Esme Nichol, a precocious nine-year old whose father is a lexicographer. Along with other scholars, he toils over words and their meaning in a Scriptorium, a humble shed in the back garden of Dr. James Murray's house in Oxford. He is the real principal editor of the OED, who will hire the fictional Esme when she comes of age. It will take Murray and his people forty years, from 1887 to 1928, to complete this gargantuan project.

At the project's beginning, Esme spends her afternoons under the long sorting table in the Scriptorium. Words and examples of their usage are sent in from all over the world on slips of paper the size of a postcard. One afternoon, a

lexicographer drops a slip with the word "bondmaid" and Esme decides to squirrel it away. She learns that it means "slave girl." From then on she collects words the dictionary men discard or neglect, most of them belittling women. Lizzie, the Murray's maid, provides a secret trunk for Esme's treasures. Her passion for collecting these wayward words persists for many years.

In time Esme begins work in the Scriptorium as a lowly gofer. When she realizes that only written words are included in the dictionary, she begins to accompany Lizzie to market to document the language of the poor. She meets toothless, skin-and-bones Mabel O'Shaughnessy, whose wares are useless chipped cups and saucers, but she also creates exquisite wood carvings. Mabel is a treasure trove of foul language. Lizzie too gets an entry in Esme's collection when she colorfully describes how "knackered" she was after twelve hours of interminable physical labor – the Murray's have eleven children.

The Victorian elements of the novel furnish the drama of Esme's life. There is brilliant Aunt Dita, Esme's guardian angel who is the real historian Edith Thompson, who worked on the OED from beginning to end. There is the omnipresent tragedy of Esme's mother's death in childbirth; and the trauma of becoming pregnant without the benefit of wedlock that nearly destroys Esme.

The vivacious actress Tilda Taylor draws Esme into England's militant suffragette movement, though curiously, Williams refrains from mentioning the bombings. The Great War destroys not only men on the battlefields in the tens of thousands, including many of the dictionary men, but also ushers in the most brutal century in history. Words can barely describe it.

Lee County Sheriff reminds residents to plan before you party

LEE COUNTY - All too often, St. Patrick's Day celebrations turn deadly because of impaired driving. However, you celebrate, make sure you and your friends stay safe this St. Patrick's Day by remembering one important piece of advice: If you'll be drinking alcohol, using cannabis or any other impairing substance, remember "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" and "Drive High. Get a DUI."

"This year, St. Patrick's Day falls on a Friday, and that means more parties throughout the weekend," said Chief Deputy Derek Ranken. "If you've been drinking, using cannabis or any other impairing drug, make the smart choice and plan for a sober driver to get you

and your friend's home safely. Before you put your keys in the ignition, remind yourself: "Buzzed Driving Is Drunk Driving."

In addition to looking for alcohol and cannabis-impaired drivers, the Lee County Sheriff's Office will be stepping up seat belt enforcement, particularly at night when seat belt usage rates are lowest. Speeding, distracted driving and all traffic laws will be strictly enforced.

"Before celebrating St. Patrick's Day this year, decide whether you'll drink or you'll drive, or whether you'll use or you'll drive," Ranken said. "If you choose to drink or use cannabis, designate a sober, reliable driver to

get you home safely."

Always designating a sober driver and not letting friends drive drunk are just two simple steps to help avoid a tragic crash or an arrest for driving under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.

Other important tips:

- Remember, you can be held liable and prosecuted if someone you serve is involved in an impaired driving crash.
- Make sure all guests designate a sober driver in advance or help arrange ride-sharing with other sober drivers.
- Serve lots of food and include lots of non-alcoholic beverages at the party.

• Keep the phone numbers for local cab companies handy and take the keys away from anyone who is thinking of driving drunk.

• Designate a sober driver before the party begins and give that person your keys.

• If you do not have a designated driver, ask a sober friend for a ride home, call a cab, sober friend or family member to pick you up or just stay where you are and sleep it off until you are sober.

• Never let a friend leave your sight if you think they are about to drive drunk.

• Always buckle up.

Pedestrians are at risk, too. If you are walking, keep an eye out for cars.



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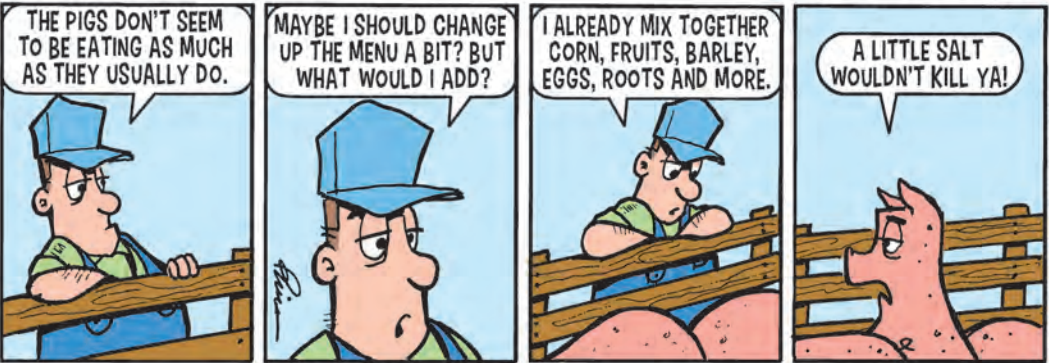

Wild weather creates perfect storm for scammers

ROCKFORD — Severe Spring Storm awareness and preparedness season has begun. March is a month famous for major weather occurrences in Illinois. We never know if it will come in or go out like a lion — or a lamb, but we typically can see snow, ice, heavy rains, flooding, or high winds move in quickly and damage homes and businesses.

Dennis Horton, director of the Rockford Regional Office of the Better Business Bureau states, “While safety and shelter are the most important aspects of storm preparedness, when the skies clear, revealing post-storm damage, it creates a perfect opportunity for scammers of substandard contractors to catch people off-guard. We urge consumers to do their homework on companies to avoid getting soaked by these opportunists.”

Horton adds, “These storm chasers swoop into affected areas and play on distraught victims’ shock and emotion. People are much more vulnerable dealing with this devastation than they would be under normal circumstances.”

Often scam storm chasers can knock on your door or call using high-pressure tactics by offering fast repairs and lower prices but insist that you pay or sign an agreement immediately. BBB receives complaints from consumers paying fly-by-night door knockers who never return or perform fake or substandard

repairs that produce future damage to your home.

Although scammers often prey on residents after damaging weather with offers of fast, low-cost repairs, these scams can happen any time. Home Improvement Scams ranked #9 in BBB’s Top Local Scams of 2022.

“Always be wary of high-pressure sales tactics, upfront fees, and fly-by-night businesses,” says Horton. “Additionally, these con artists might want to get into your home to burglarize it.

BBB offers tips to help reduce the risk of scams: Do your research. Find businesses you can trust on BBB.org. Get at least two quotes before signing a contract. Always check for proof of insurance and licensing. Get references from friends and relatives.

Beware of “storm chasers” and out-of-town contractors soliciting business. Although not all storm chasers are scammers, they may lack the proper licensing for your area, offer quick fixes, or make big promises they can’t deliver. Contact your insurance company. Ask about your policy coverage and filing requirements. Resist high-pressure sales. Some storm chasers use tactics such as the “good deal” you’ll get only if you hire them on the spot. Be proactive in selecting a contractor and not reactive to sales calls on the phone or door-to-door pitches.

Ask for identification. Check their vehicle for a business name, phone number, and Illinois license plate. Check ratings and reviews. Don’t sign over insurance checks to contractors. Get an invoice from the contractor and pay them directly (preferably with a credit card, which offers additional fraud protection over other forms of payment). Do not sign any documents that give the contractor any rights to your insurance claims. If you have questions, contact your insurance company or agent. BBB is also warning contractors to beware of storm chasers who masquerade as a local business, collect the insurance money and then move on, leaving the real business to deal with unsatisfied customers due to bad or unfinished work or unfulfilled warranties. Turkey harvest results in for state of Illinois

SPRINGFIELD — Hunters in Illinois harvested a statewide total of 801 wild turkeys during the 2022-2023 fall archery turkey season between Oct. 1 and Jan. 15.

The total compares with the statewide fall archery turkey harvest of 683 in 2021-2022 and is the third-highest harvest total on record for the season in Illinois. The top five counties for fall archery wild turkey harvest this season were Vermilion with 27 turkeys harvested; Ogle, 24; Clay, 22; Marion, 21; and Randolph, 21.

This season, 25,373 permits were sold (excluding landowner permits), compared to 24,768 for the 2021-2022 season. All 102 counties were open for hunting. The harvest consisted of 48% males and 52% hens.

Harvest total for area counties is as follows:

Bureau — 5; DeKalb — 3; LaSalle — 11; Lee — 8; Ogle — 24; Putnam — 4; Whiteside — 10.
