'We didn't make all of that investment to support windmills and solar panels'

**ROCHELLE**—City of Rochelle officials are concerned with a piece of recent state legislation's potential future impact on a portion of the Lee-Ogle Enterprise Zone that is in and nearby Rochelle.

House Bill 4412 is a recently-signed state law that sets statewide standards for wind and solar farm siting and takes away previous local controls such as at the county level. The state would effectively

be able to greenlight large solar or wind developments without the say of local governing bodies.

**OREGON** — The City of Oregon is working to bring a new outdoor space to its community.

The Sarah Phelps Community Plaza will be located at the Old Harvard Bank Drive Up location at 5th and Washington Streets. Phase one of the project was the public restroom. The plaza is phase two.

"We will be using a combination of donated funds, grants funds, and ARPA funds to complete this project," a city

## LOCAL NEWS COUNCIL: Director concerned about bill passage

City Economic Development Director Jason Anderson told the News-Leader March 1 that the legislation has him concerned for the Lee-Ogle Enterprise Zone area on the south east side of Rochelle reaching into Lee County. Over \$75 million has been invested in the area by the city, county, state and federal governments on infrastructure upgrades aimed at attracting future industrial development. Anderson's fear is that a solar or wind developer could make a deal to put a large development into the area and have it greenlighted without the city's, counties' or enterprise zone's say, making all of that development investment for naught.

"The big issue from an economic development perspective is that HB 4412 should be amended or a trailer bill should follow to carve out enterprise zones," Anderson said. "We're not against solar or wind. But we should have the authority so say where it goes, not the state. It should be a local decision. We should have the right to say yes or no."

An enterprise zone is a specifically-defined area where incentives are available to businesses that locate there, most notably a tax abatement on real estate taxes. That same area on the south east side of Rochelle recently attracted Wheatland Tube (Zekelman Industries),



which made a capital investment of over \$100 million in the former Nippon Sharyo facility and brought at least 125 jobs paying an average pay rate of \$50,000 or more per year before benefits.

Anderson said creating the enterprise zone and winning the designation for it required "a lot of effort." It was founded by the city, Ogle County, Lee County and the City of Dixon. Investments made in the south east Rochelle portion include a new well and radium plant, water tower, electrical substation, Steward Road overpass, sewer line, water line and road improvements.

"The primary objective of an enterprise zone is to create jobs and bring new investment," Anderson said. "New buildings and new factories bring taxes and fund schools and city services. Lee

County previously said no solar or wind projects were allowed in this area and made a resolution protecting it. HB 4412 comes in and says the state ultimately will decide and told counties that they must make permitting as permissible as the state would make it. There were counties all across the state that were forbidding any kind of wind or solar. This has taken away the counties' authority to do the permitting.'

Anderson said the city is waiting for clarification on what the legislation means to its ability to approve or deny any zoning within a mile and a half of Rochelle, which would apply to the enterprise zone. If that doesn't protect the area, he said he wants enterprise zones carved out of the bill and protection for the state-certified enterprise zones.

City Manager Jeff Fiegenschuh stressed that the city did not make previous investments in the area to support solar panels or windmills.

"They don't create a lot of jobs or add equalized assessed value long term," Fiegenschuh said. "Solar panels and windmills depreciate in value over time. A business like Wheatland Tube does not depreciate over time. One of the things that drew that business to Rochelle was that property being in the enterprise zone. That's why it's such a valuable tool to our community."

#### Invested

#### infrastructure

The city and Rochelle Municipal Utilities have invested in infrastructure in the area with additional future industrial growth in mind. Rochelle is also one of the few cities in the state with its own short-line railroad, which also is utilized in the enterprise zone area and would be negatively impacted by the allowance of a large solar or wind power developerty taxes down.

"I'm not against solar, but they don't fund city services," Fiegenschuh said. "Places like Wheatland Tube that use city power and provide high-paying jobs and work with the community are what we want in our community. Solar is great, but it's one-dimensional. Businesses that invest and come here are 10-dimensional because of all the value they bring to our community."

The enterprise zone area could be attractive to solar and wind power developers due to its proximity to RMU and ComEd's new Ritchie Road substation, where they could potentially tie into a transmission line to send power onto the grid.

Anderson said he knows of solar developers that are talking to landowners in the enterprise zone to get them to sign onto a project.

"We know this is going to become a difficult thing going forward because people can sell their land to whoever they want," Anderson said. "The interesting part about it is the asking price for all this land has increased from \$20,000 per acre in 1999 to \$50,000 an acre now. We think it's a win-win for the landowners to allow us to continue to keep this as an enterprise zone and keep the wind

and solar folks in other areas where \$70 million has not been spent on infrastructure."

The city is working with State Sen. Win Stoller on the issue, who has submitted a shell bill to amend HB 4412 to say that enterprise zones and municipally-owned railroads should be exempt from the requirement that allows the state to decide on wind and solar power.

Former State Rep. Tom Demmer is now the Lee County Industrial Development Association's executive director, which gives him a vested interest in the issue. Anderson said Demmer will be using his legislative experience to work on protecting the Lee-Ogle Enterprise Zone from HB 4412's effects.

"We know that there's a lot of people out there that, once educated on this, will support changes to this legislation," Anderson said. "I think we have a pretty good chance. Sen. Stoller has really taken the lead on this and submitted a shell bill that we'll put the guts into. He and Tom are going to work together to get this thing passed."

Fiegenschuh said he believes local control for cities and counties is "of absolute importance."

"If you look at the way our community has grown and all of the money the city, state and federal government have invested in this area, it makes sense for it to be industrial growth because it's going to grow over time. It's a good use of the land. Having solar there is maybe a good use, but it's not as high of a use as industrial commercial growth that adds value to the community. Our people want jobs and to see the town grow. The only way that's going to happen is by supporting the current businesses we have and seeing more growth happen. And it happens in this enterprise zone."



ment, Fiegenschuh said.

Anderson and Fiegenschuh said industrial growth in the area has increased the city's equalized assessed value, which has resulted in keeping the city's tax levy and residents' prop-

### MOMENTS IN TIME

\* On March 17, 1756, St. Patrick's Day was celebrated for the first time in New York City at John Thompson's Crown and Thistle public house. Interestingly, Thompson was nicknamed "Scotch Johnny," and his tavern was only part-time Irish.

\* On March 16, 1834, Charles Darwin, on the HMS Beagle, anchored in the British-owned Falkland Islands for the first time, to carry out a zoological survey. At first unimpressed by the desolate landscape, he soon discovered fossils of about 400 million years old, most of which are now housed in London's Natural History Museum.

\* On March 19, 1916, eight Curtiss "Jenny" planes of the First Aero Squadron were used in support of the 7,000 American troops who had invaded Mexico with the intent of capturing Mexican revolutionary Pancho Villa, marking the U.S.' first use of air combat.

\* On March 18, 1922, British lawyer Mohandas K. Gandhi was sentenced to prison in India on the charge of civil disobedience after urging for mass civil disobedience, including boycotts of British educational institutions and law courts and foreign-made goods. His speeches always emphasized the wrongness of physical violence. He served just two years of his six-year sentence.

\* On March 15, 1956, the musical "My Fair Lady" made its Broadway debut. Based on George Bernard Shaw's play "Pygmalion," it starred Rex Harrison and Julie Andrews in the lead roles of domineering Professor Henry Higgins and his protegee, the equally strong-willed but good-hearted Cockney flower seller named Eliza Doolittle. It was an immediate smash hit.

\* On March 13, 1997, a heated debate was launched among believers in UFOs when a series of unidentified lights appeared above Phoenix, Arizona. It was later revealed that the lights were not from alien aircraft, but illumination flares dropped from a U.S. Air Force plane.

\* On March 14, 2014, it was announced that public transportation systems in Paris, France, would run for free for three days in an effort to combat the heavy smog and air pollution the country was experiencing due to unseasonably warm temperatures.

\* On March 30, 1855, in territorial Kansas' first election, some 5,000 "Border Ruffians" invade the territory from western Missouri and force the election of a pro-slavery legislature. Although the votes cast exceeded the number of eligible voters, Kansas Gov. Andrew Reeder reluctantly approved the election to prevent further bloodshed.

## Farm bill critical to keeping America's food supply affordable

ITH winter weather on the horizon, farmers across the

state are gearing up for another productive spring planting season. Once the frost melts and the soil temperatures rise, it will be time to hit the fields, but for many farmers high prices for fertilizer, fuel and other critical tools remain a challenge.

Like consumers, farmers are feeling the pain of ongoing inflation. The ripple effects of the war in Ukraine and supply chain issues pose significant hurdles for farmers. Heading into the spring season and farm bill negotiations, these difficulties remain top of mind at Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB).

In early February, the United States Department of Agriculture's latest Farm Sector Income Forecast report indicated that U.S. net farm income will fall nearly 16 percent from the previous year while production costs are expected to increase more than four percent. That's on top of an already record increase in production costs in 2022.

While fuel and fertilizer prices are expected to soften, other costs related to marketing, storage and transportation are expected to increase 11 percent, and labor by seven percent. Rising interest rates and farm sector costs are another concern as

the USDA projects farm sector debt will increase \$31.9 billion to a record \$535 billion.

General inflation is a long-term issue squeezing the pocketbooks of families across America, but the farm income forecast is a reminder that farmers are not benefiting from higher prices at the

grocery store. While some commodity prices

are rising, farmers are grappling with additional circumstances, such as drought, avian influenza and supply and labor costs. After accounting for business expenses, farmers' share of the food dollar is only 7.4 cents.

That is why the farm bill is so important for everyone, not just farmers. Farm bill programs provide farmers with critical support to mitigate natural disasters and other crises. Other programs secure America's domestic food supply, which keeps our agricultural economy strong while providing consumers with affordable, high-quality products at the grocery store.

The farm bill also addresses hunger through nutrition programs, which serve our most vulnerable populations and ensure that everyone has access to affordable, fresh and healthy food. Conservation is another key focus of the farm bill, which invests in agriculture research and conservation programs to increase sustainability.

IFB is dedicated to working with our members and elected officials on both sides of the aisle to pass a farm bill that meets the needs of all agriculture segments.

Our members and leaders believe the farm bill must maintain the link between nutrition and commodity programs. IFB also supports maintaining the current crop insurance program, providing price and revenue protection for farmers, and retaining both SNAP and TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program) in the farm bill in their current form.

As we head into another eventful spring, I look forward to working with our members and elected officials to get this critical piece of legislation to the president's desk.

For \$12 apiece, they buy balloons from a California manufacturer, rig them with radio transmitters and send them skyward, Aviation Week reported. One of their projects has circled the globe seven times. have bought more than 338,000 school lunches, 75,882 library books or provided a year's tuition for 258 community college students.

Talk about money going up in smoke.

A White House spokesperson felt the need to say that none of the unidentified flying

objects, UFOs, are believed to be extraterrestrial in origin.

Of course, what launched this stratospheric level of stupidity is the previous week a Chinese balloon carrying a payload

\* On March 27, 1990, the U.S. government begins broadcasting TV programs into communist Cuba. TV Marti was conceived in the 1940s to beam news and propaganda throughout the world, particularly to communist nations.

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But the U.S. Air Force may have this group of Land of Lincoln nerds in its crosshairs.

It seems one of the club's projects disappeared off the coast of Alaska, the same day the U.S. Government announced shooting down an unknown object in the same area.

Pentagon spokesman Brig. Gen. Pat Ryder told reporters that the object had been travelling at an altitude of 40,000 feet and was about the size of a car.

For the price of those three missiles, we could

the size of two school buses was allowed to drift across the continental United States.

The Pentagon said it was a spy balloon. China says it was an off-course weather balloon.

Republicans in Congress were quick to condemn Biden for allowing China to violate our "national sovereignty." The president responded to the ballooning controversy by ordering it shot down — after it had already crossed the entire country.

Pieces are still being pulled from the ocean.

Back on the farm, we'd call that shutting the gate after the hog ran out.

But in all seriousness, our nation sends spy satellites over China and they send them over our country. Is a balloon in the upper reaches of the atmosphere all that different?

And even if it were, does it justify shooting down three other objects that don't appear to pose any military threat? In fact, one may well be from Illinois.

But what of the Illinois youngsters who launched their balloon aloft?

Instead of learning about wind currents and radio waves, these junior scientists got a lesson in international politics.

If they want their \$12 back, they should send a bill to 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue.

Once the County Clerk's Office receives verification of your request, we will then mail the Vote by Mail ballot to the voter. After voting the Vote by Mail ballot it must be mailed, hand delivered back to the County Clerk's Office or utilize the Ballot Drop Box located on the West side of the Courthouse. The ballot, if mailed, must be postmarked before or on Election Day.

The Ogle County Courthouse is accessible to disabled or elderly (over 65) citizens by entering on the west side of the courthouse. If you are unable to come to the courthouse and need to be registered or
