Deutsch wins ISBE award 'I love seeing students succeed at something...'

ROCHELLE — Central Elementary School Special Education Teacher Melissa Deutsch was recently named a recipient of the Award of Special Recognition in the teacher category as part of the Illinois State Board of Education's Those Who Excel annual educator recognition program.

Deutsch is in her 24th year teaching in Rochelle Community School District #231. She spent her first 20 years at Rochelle Middle School, where she mainly taught self-contained and co-taught English language arts to students with the need for special education services. She was moved to Central School three years ago to support the special education program and teach academics and social emotional skills to students with individual needs.

Deutsch said that upon hearing the news of her award, she felt"very proud and excited." She was recognized by a peer that believes that what she does in the classroom is a benefit for all students.

"Typically, I see a smaller population of students than most of my peers,"

Deutsch said. "I feel like I make connections that are lasting with those small groups as well as a positive impact on their learning goals. In addition, I have co-taught with multiple teachers and I feel like I have made those same connections and impacts."

Tilton School update given at meeting

ROCHELLE — The Rochelle Elementary District Board of Education heard an update from Tilton Elementary School Principal Becky Cox on recent happenings at the school. The Tilton building is home to the district's fourth and fifth grade students.

Cox discussed a chart that analyzes Tilton students' illustrative math performance and how it compared to their Illinois Assessment of Readiness score and said progress has been made and more content has been covered.

"This also identifies the students who did above the state average in those different standards," Cox said. "You'll notice there's far more information there showing that our kids are taking more with them and using that to help them with the IAR."

Locals compete at snow sculpting events Mark, Danica Rogers and Kurt Wolter place third with 'Morsmordre'

ROCKFORD — Rochelle sculptors Mark and Danica Rogers placed third in the 37th Annual Snow Sculpting Competition at Rockford's Sinnissippi Park on Feb. 11 for their entry "Morsmordre."

The father-daughter sculpting duo have a history of competing locally in both snow and straw competitions. They also competed Feb. 4 in the 2023 U.S. National Snow Sculpting Championship in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. Their team, "Two Blondes and a Burnette" also included friend George Burnette in Wisconsin. When he was unable to compete in Rockford, Rochelle's Kurt Wolter filled in on the team.

"Morsmorde" comes from the Harry Potter world and consists of a skull with a snake coming out of its mouth and other snakes wrapped around the skull. The idea was Danica's due to her Harry Potter fandom. For the national competition

Danica has taken part

in seven snow sculpting competitions, five times in Rockford and twice at nationals. Mark has done four in Rockford and one at nationals. Danica said she enjoys the sense of camaraderie at the competitions, because it "feels like a reunion every year." Her father agreed.

"Everyone is so supportive of each other and helping and accommodating," Mark said. "It's a family-oriented event. I like to do it because I get to spend time with Danica and see her artistic talent at work. It's fun to take a big chunk of snow and see it turned into a piece of art 3.5 days later."

"I know that the person who recognized me for this award is someone whom I have worked with and sees those qualities in what I do and what I've done for our students."

Being a special education teacher comes with many responsibilities, including educating students with emotional and learning disabilities. Deutsch is responsible for writing individualized education plans (IEPs) and holding meetings with the educational team yearly or more frequently if needed. She also collaborates with staff members and parents on a regular basis.

Deutsch called special education "incredibly important," due to how it provides the opportunity for students who learn differently to access the curriculum and reach their full potential.

"The staff who work with these students are specially trained to teach in a variety of ways to help the students be successful," Deutsch said. "We spend a significant amount of time problem solving to find the best ways to help our students. I am challenged every day to be better. My job is stressful, but never boring. In elementary, I have a small group of students that I get to know really well. I love seeing students succeed at something they previously struggled with.'

Deutsch was a peer coach for students with disabilities while she was in high school and coached many different sports through the Special Olympics. She worked at a residential home for adults with disabilities during high school and college. She knew at an early age that she wanted to work with people with disabilities.

'Special education provides individualized services for students who aren't traditional learners,' Adolph said. "It is an essential service so that all kids can reach their fullest potential. She connects with students very well and helps

them see their strengths." Deutsch said a number

of teaching experiences stand out in her memory in her years with D231. She's always enjoyed seeing student reading test scores increase several grade levels closer to their age group. She had the opportunity to tutor one of her favorite students during three separate summers.

Deutsch's husband, Jason, is also a longtime educator with D231 and teaches at RMS. In 2002, then-Principal Kevin Zilm helped Jason propose to Melissa over the morning announcements.

In her years of teaching

locally, Deutsch has enjoyed seeing her students grow through education.

Ogle County man sentenced to

to 14 years in federal prison for transportation of child pornography.

Oscar Flores-Vazquez, 51, pleaded guilty earlier this year to one count of knowingly transporting child pornography. U.S. District Judge John Robert Blakey imposed the sentence. Flores-Vazquez was also ordered to pay \$8,750 in restitution to certain victims. The sentence was announced by John R. Lausch, Jr., United States attorney for the Northern District of Illinois; and

was represented by Assistant U.S. Attorney Jessica S. Maveus.

Flores-Vazquezadmitted in a plea agreement that he used a peer-to-peer application on his computer to knowingly allow others, including an undercover law enforcement agent, to access files on his computer that Flores-Vazquez knew contained child pornography. In June 2018, Flores-Vazquez knowingly transported child pornography, including a file depicting a minor engaged in sexually explicit conduct. Flores-Vazquez further admitted in the plea agreement that he possessed a laptop that contained more than 600 images of child pornography.

"In addition, whenever you implement something new, you would anticipate there to be a little bit of an implementation dip, but we haven't seen a significant dip in student progress. That's been exciting to look at."

Tilton School is finishing Star360 assessment benchmarking this week and Cox said that information from the fall and winter will be used to start picking out things that are working out well and things that need to be improved on.

The district recently sent eight staff members to a conscious discipline conference in Dallas in December, three of which were from Tilton, Cox said. Conscious discipline is the school's social emotional learning curriculum/ mindset and the conference helped staff to bring back new ideas, strategies and tools for implementation.

"I can speak to some of the things that we've done at Tilton such as increasing the visuals that are present in the building," Cox said. "One of those specifically would be in our lunch room. That's kind of an area we struggle with a little bit at Tilton. We've done some things to kind of increase our recognition of kids who are doing the right things."

Cox said the school is working to implement pieces of conscious discipline throughout the school day.

Tilton's speech team is "back in full effect" this year after being off last year, which Cox said has been exciting for students, who are putting a lot of time and effort into making upcoming speech meets

special.

Superintendent Jason Harper thanked Cox and Tilton staff following her presentation.

"Thank you for all your efforts this year with your fourth and fifth grade students," Harper said. "I know your staff goes to great lengths to meet their needs and has done a lot of creative problem solving due to the number of kids and space and those types of things. We appreciate all of your efforts."

Technology

Shared District IT Director Will Wise made a presentation to the board on recent happenings in his department. The IT departments of the elementary and high school districts were recently merged and technology has become of more importance in Rochelle schools since the COVID-19 pandemic.

All Rochelle schools now operate on a oneto-one basis, meaning each student has a Google Chromebook device for school work. That required a lot of infrastructure upgrades to be made including wireless internet improvements.

Wise said the move to shared service IT for both districts has been "a great benefit for everyone involved" and one IT employee can be in each building at the beginning of each week.

"That's a really big deal and I don't think that's ever been the case," Wise said. "We rotate around quite a bit and we have a new ticketing and inventory system for our IT department. It's gone really well and it's been a real lifesaver for everybody in my department. This year, we've

closed over 1,000 trouble tickets since switching to this system."

The shift towards more devices has resulted in the ratio of IT employees to devices now being one to 800.

"That's 800 things that somebody is responsible for on a daily basis," Wise said. "We're constantly busy and running around and doing our best to make sure everything is operating. It's been a fun challenge."

The IT department is now on a yearly cycle for Chromebook renewals and will be purchasing 400 of them each year, along with teacher laptops for one building each year. Students will receive new Chromebooks as they enter first and fifth grade, matching up with the high school schedule of receiving one as a freshman.

"If you have a student who goes through Rochelle schools, they'll never have a Chromebook older than four years, which I think is a great benefit for the kids," Wise said. "We keep the old ones around for parts. We've probably had 300 screen breaks out of those 1,000 tickets. We do all of the repairs in house and typically it only takes about an hour to make any repair and get it back to the student. It's our goal to have kids take personal ownership of the Chromebook and try to take care of it. They get to keep it after high school."

Wise said bringing two school IT systems together has been a challenge with "a lot of moving parts," and his department is looking at merging more in the future including email systems, fiber wiring and surveillance systems.

Copiers

The board unanimously approved a bid from Marco for a five-year lease for 18 copiers. The elementary and high school districts are joining copier contracts and desired to have both renewed at the same time. The elementary district will be refunded a check for \$26,796 for the remaining six months on the current lease.

Personnel

The board unanimously approved personnel changes including the retirement of Sheryl Casey (end of 2022-2023 school year) and the employment of substitute teachers Jessica Keisling, Noah Mershon, Evelyn Figueroa (as-needed), Jennifer Herrera (as needed) and Jennifer Schroll (as-needed).

Personnel changes for the 2023-2024 school year that were also unanimously approved by the board include the transfers of YharoslivCruz(interventionist/ substitute teacher to third grade bilingual teacher at Central School), Samantha Lower (special education at Central School to special education at Tilton School) and Melissa Bowers (reading teacher at Central School to reading teacher at Lincoln School) along with the hires of Meghan Fletcher (third grade dual language teacher, Central), Betsie Swartz (third grade teacher, Central), Alexandria Vanderkolk (fourth grade teacher, Tilton) and Jessica Kiesling (resource teacher, Tilton).

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

Ogle County Sheriff's Department Deputies respond to disturbance

OREGON — On Feb. 14 at approximately 9:34 p.m. deputies responded to a disturbance in the 100 block of South Commercial Street in Baileyville. After investigation, deputies placed John Lehmann, 58, of Freeport under arrest for driving under the influence of alcohol. A thorough investigation ensued in conjunction with the Illinois Attorney General's Internet Crimes Against Children Unit, the ISP, Belvidere Police Department, Rochelle Police Department and the Ogle County Sheriff's Office. A search warrant was executed on Feb. 15 at Cornejo-Garcia's residence. During the warrant execution, investigators seized evidence supporting an arrest for child pornography. On Feb. 15 at approximately 5 a.m. deputies responded to the 600 block of North Second Street in Holcomb regarding a reported disturbance. After an investigation, deputies placed Laura A. Dee, 35, of

Machesney Park, under arrest for disorderly conduct. Dee was transported to the Ogle County Jail, where she was held in lieu of bond.

On Feb. 15 at approximately 2:54 p.m. deputies conducted a traffic stop at the intersection of North Kilbuck Road and East Illinois Route 72. After an initial investigation, deputies placed Ali M. Saleh, 23, of Rockford, under arrest for driving unlicensed. Saleh was additionally cited for avoiding a traffic control device. Saleh was released from the scene on an I-Bond and provided with a future court date.

On Feb. 15 at 10:47 p.m. deputies responded to the area of 7000 W. Penn Corner Road for the report of a vehicle in the ditch. The Rockford competition saw 14 total teams competing, along with a high school division. Warm temperatures postponed the competition, originally scheduled for Jan. 18-21. Warmer temperatures and rain returned for the past weekend, but Mark said the team was able to stave off the weather.

"That was detrimental to the sculpting aspect because we didn't want the rain on it," Mark said. "We put up a structure and tarped it over to save it from the rain. We were able to work on our block without the rain bothering us. It went great considering the circumstances we were dealt. All the teams did a great job. Everybody had a piece that was interesting. But it was quite the task."

For the Rockford competition, the Rockford Park District and its snow making team makes snow and puts it in big box forms six feet by six feet by 10 feet tall. They fill them and pack the snow, before wrapping them and waiting for competitors, who unwrap the blocks and start sculpting.

The Rogers are also known for their work in the U.S. National Straw Sculpting Competition in Mt. Morris. Danica said she enjoys that competition because of the nicer weather, but the shorter window for snow sculpting makes for a better workflow. However, the snow time limit can also make it harder, as she estimates

sleep on one of the nights in Rockford.

Mark said sculpting with snow leaves less margin for error than with straw.

"With straw, if you make a mistake or don't like something, you can take straw off and reapply it," Mark said. "With snow, if you take part of it off, you have to have the right kind of snow to replace it with and the right weather conditions to make changes. And sculpting snow in the winter takes a toll on your body. I'm 62, and we used a new tool this year which is sort of a chain used by two people to saw snow off. There's a lot of shoulder work there. After doing nationals and Rockford over two weeks, been in my life."

When comparing the two recent snow competitions, Mark and Danica said the weather was better in Lake Geneva, but the sense of community and support from competitors was the same. The national competition saw sculptors from different states including Alaska, New Hampshire, New York, North Dakota and Vermont.

"Both nationals and Rockford were great," Mark said. "They treat it like a community event to bring people into town to enjoy in the rougher months of the year. Both places should be commended for the amount of work it takes to put a competition on."

GWhy aren't you drinking?"

My former boss slurred those words as he looked across a table while he and my co-workers downed a pitcher of beer at a mandatory staff pizza party.

Drinkers ask that question. Not only is it off-putting and rude it's ubiquitous.

I've never quite understood why that's anyone's business but my own; but it's asked continually in the circles where I have worked: politics and journalism.

I don't care if someone drinks around me. Why should they care if someone doesn't drink around them?

Please note, I'm not talking about beer and burgers fellas or those who enjoy an occasional sip of wine. I'm talking about those who lack an on/off switch, who don't know when is when.

My first exposure to alcoholism was my maternal grandfather. He started the day with a shot of whiskey before breakfast and couldn't function without some amount of alcohol flowing through his veins.

My recollections of him are primarily as a sad drunk, always in a stupor in his red recliner, smoking Marlboros and playing solitaire. Did I ever see him fully sober? I don't know.

Neither his wife nor three children drank alcohol. Growing up, my mother remembered hellacious arguments as Grandpa disappeared with his drinking buddies to spend money on booze rather than food or rent.

Addiction is a pernicious disease.

My mother, a registered nurse, was convinced a genetic predisposition for alcoholism lurked in our DNA. Recent scientific studies have since found

there is a genetic component to substance abuse. So, maybe she was onto something 40 years ago.

Regardless, I chose not to start drinking. I'm 58 years old and have never tasted alcohol. That's not a badge of honor or disgrace. It's just a choice. Interesting enough, both

presidents Biden and Trump make the same claim about lifelong abstinence from alcohol. Both men also have a history of family substance abuse.

In school, I was hassled a bit for not engaging in the hard-drinking lifestyle. I chose friends who didn't care

But it's in the workforce that I've found the mentioned as a detriment during a formal job-performance evaluation.

The boss said a good reporter has to be a drinker to really understand the world. It would be easy to mark this off as one bad boss among many good ones. But it's a situation I keep encountering.

Years later, I found myself in another state sitting next to another boss, as I sipped my Diet Coke, and he slurred, "Is this some sort of religious thing, you know, that you don't drink?"

No, it isn't. But if were, would it be any of your business?

By that time in my career, I was supervising people, some of whom shake and he'd shift uncomfortably in his chair. He'd then announce that he forgot something in his hotel room and disappear for a fix.

When I expressed concern, I was told, "He's not an alcoholic – they go to meetings." Not a compassionate way to deal with someone who is suffering – or a smart way to deal with a team member who is impaired.

The organization claimed it couldn't afford an employee assistance program but hosted plenty of events with open bars. Usually before opening the bar the boss would point to one fellow who would often get sloshed at lunch before returning to work and announce, "Don't get in front of him on the way to the bar, he'll ease and should be treated as such.

But when I'd raise concerns to those above me about employees in my charge, it was dismissed with a wave of the hand as if to say, "You're a teetotaler, what do you know about alcohol?"

Yeah, the problem is the folks who don't drink-not the ones who can barely function. Privately, I guided one of my co-workers into a 12-step program.

At future work gatherings, he'd be sipping coffee while others were downing cocktails.

Inevitably, someone would ask, "Why aren't you drinking?" He'd shift uncomfortably from foot to foot and try to come up with a response.



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

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

Semifinal showdown Kaneland rallies for 51-45 win over Rochelle in IHSA 3A Sycamore Regional

SYCAMORE—Tuesday's IHSA 3A Regional Semifinal between No. 4 seed Kaneland and No. 5 seed Rochelle lived up to the expectations established during the regular season, when the two Interstate 8 Conference rivals each scored a close victory on the other team's home court.

Neither team held a lead larger than eight points on Tuesday, when the two schools battled for the right to challenge No. 1 seed and host Sycamore for the IHSA 3A Regional Championship. Rochelle took control during the first half, using its size advantage to score multiple baskets out of the low post. The Lady Hubs were also effective in their 1-2-2 zone defense, which cut off any dribble penetration from the Knights, who were struggling to convert shots from the perimeter.

Trailing 24-18 at halftime, Kaneland cranked up the pressure on defense, flustering Rochelle with its full-court press and creating a myriad of turnovers to one point before the Knights surged ahead early in the fourth quarter. Rochelle's second-half mistakes proved costly in the end, as Kaneland took a six-point lead and ultimately held the Lady Hubs off for a 51-45 win. Rochelle finished 8-24 overall and 6-8 in the conference.

"We talked before the game and during halftime about how this was going to be a game of runs," head coach Ryan McQuade said. "Unfortunately, they made the last run of the game and it cost us. Our goal for next season will be to limit our turnovers. We're averaging about 25plus turnovers per game and we can't do that if we want to compete at a higher level. Our turnovers cost us during the second half because they were able to get easy looks at the basket."

Rochelle seized control early in the first quarter, opening the game with a 6-0 run behind a pair of low-post baskets from sophomore Kendyl Darby, who effectively used her size to seal defenders under the rim and finish in the painted area.

LASALLE — The Rochelle Hub varsity basketball team earned a hard-fought win against LaSalle-Peru on Tuesday, outlasting the Cavaliers 69-68 in the final Interstate 8 Conference contest of the season. Rochelle (10-19, 4-10 Interstate 8) will tip off the IHSA 3A Dixon Regional Quarterfinals at Morris on Saturday at 1 p.m.

Sophomore Carson Lewis led the Hubs with 19 points, converting six 3-pointers including three in the first quarter to spark the offense. Junior Eli Luxton recorded a double-double with 17 points and 10 rebounds, while sophomore Cayden Moore finished strong with 12 fourth-quarter points. Senior Raul Aguirre added 14 points, four rebounds and four assists in the victory.

Both teams posted nearly identical shooting numbers, with the Hubs shooting 46.2 percent from the field and the Cavaliers shooting 45.8 percent. Rochelle's defense generated 13 deflections and 10 steals, but the two teams had nearly the same amount of turnovers, with

NORMER Rochelle student-athlete Greg Ricketts didn't fold when faced with consecutive season-ending injuries over his final two years with the Central College football program.

Having already lost most of his sophomore season to the COVID-19 pandemic, Ricketts had been primed for a big role with the Dutch defense entering his junior season, which was cut short after only two games due to a shoulder injury. The RTHS alum worked his way back to full health and was ready to conclude his career with a strong senior season, but a serious foot injury during the first game of the season sidelined him for the remainder of the 2022 campaign.

Despite all of the injuries and setbacks, Ricketts never wavered in his dedication to the sport and his commitment to the Central College football program. His efforts were rewarded during the team's awards banquet, where he recently received the annual Mel VerMeer Loyalty Award, which is presented each season to one football player who displays outstanding loyalty. Ricketts also took home Academic All-Conference honors for the third consecutive football season.

"It means a lot and I'm extremely thankful," Ricketts said. "It all comes back to my teammates and the relationships I've built here are different than anything I've experienced during my life. I'm thankful that the team saw me in this role and even though

Even though he was injured, Ricketts remained heavily involved with the Dutch. The former Hub outside linebacker served as a team captain and aided the coaching staff with coaching and recruiting responsibilities. While Ricketts admitted there were challenges that came with missing time due to injuries, he's made the most of his collegiate experience on and off the gridiron. "I was named the starter during the second week of my junior season and I wasn't able to finish the season, which was disappointing because we had one of the most successful seasons in Central College history," Ricketts said. "I had a poor attitude and didn't apply myself in the way I wish I would've. But I had a robust network of people around me who built me up and continued putting effort into me. I'm really appreciative of those people and my junior season was ultimately a learning experience that helped shape me into the person that I am today.' In addition to his work with the team, Ricketts became involved with the Student AthleteAdvisoryCommittee(SAAC)during his sophomore year, eventually becoming the co-president during his junior year before being named president of the American Rivers Conference SAAC and an NCAA Division III SAAC representative as a senior. With

SAAC, Ricketts volunteered his time to provide insight on the student-athlete experience, attending events such as the 2022 Division III SAAC Convention in Indianapolis and the 2023 NCAAConvention in San Antonio.

"It's given me opportunities to help not only my teammates, but other students on campus as well," Ricketts said. "It's been a great way to keep my mind on the things I feel are important... I continued to be around the team because of the relationships I've built here and the things my team has done for me. I felt like if I were to get away from that, I'd be backing out on the team. Having the opportunity to stay around and help the team shows what kind of culture our program has. I don't know if there's a program that exemplifies that as much as Central does.' Ricketts concluded his four-year football career with 15 solo tackles as well as 1.5 tackles for loss and two passes defensed at the outside linebacker position. Ricketts, who's majoring in economics with minors in Spanish and business management, said he intends to graduate this spring with the goal of applying for graduate school and earning a master's degree in sports management or sports administration. Ricketts, who once aspired to be a head football coach, said his career goals now include working on the administrative side of collegiate athletics. "SAAC has been a huge influence on relationships," Ricketts said. "I've been extremely fortunate to be on successful football teams and to have people around me that push me on the football field and in the classroom. I've grown so much during greatest thing I'll take from my experience.'





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

Hubs take second at Interstate 8 tournament Rochelle freshman team concludes 2022-23 season with 24-3 overall record

MAPLE PARK — The Rochelle Hub freshman basketball team concluded its season at the Interstate 8 Conference Championship tournament on Saturday, finishing second with a 2-1 record to end the season with a 24-3 overall record.

Rochelle faced the No. 2 seed Kaneland for the tournament crown, falling just short in a 74-64 defeat.

"I thought the kids played hard all season," head coach Ryne Vrana said. "They played the style of basketball that we wanted, which was fast paced. Their ability

Entering as the No. 1 seed, to play for one another was appreciated and I thought the kids shared the ball with each other really well this season."

The Hubs opened the tournament in dominant fashion, cruising 65-27 over the No. 8 seed Sycamore. Gabe Montes led Rochelle with 14 points including eight in the fourth quarter, while

Mark Green added nine points with seven coming in the third quarter. Martiese Pogue, Caden Goodwin and Marco Belmonte each finished with seven points to aid the Rochelle offense.

The Hubs clinched their spot in the championship round with a 60-52 win over the No. 5 seed LaSalle-Peru in the semifinals. Van Gerber shined for Rochelle against the Cavaliers, scoring a teamhigh 19 points and hitting three 3-pointers. Brode Metzger anchored the Hubs down low, finishing with 11 points while Gabe Montes and Marco Belmonte each chipped in six points.

Rochelle fell 74-64 against No. 2 seed Kaneland in the finals to conclude the tournament. Metzger and Gerber carried the load for the Hubs, with Metzger scoring 26 points and making 11 field goals while Gerber totaled 18 points and nailed three fourth-quarter triples. Belmonte recorded six points and two players including Green and Pogue each scored four points.



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
