\$1.00 With rural healthcare changing across the country, how are local hospitals adapting?

LEE/LASALLE COUNTY - Let's face it, health care has changed across the country in the last few years.

COVID-19 is the main culprit.

Throw in staff shortages, cost increases, and new laws or concepts such as Rural Hospital Emergency Designation, and everything is different than what we once knew the healthcare system to be.

Fortunately, for the OSF Saint Paul Medical Center in Mendota and the Katherine Shaw Bethea Hospital (KSB) in Dixon, the changes haven't left a permanent financial struggle or thoughts of closing.

We're doing really good in Mendota as a critical access hospital. We've been able to maintain and optimize what we provide," said Dawn Trompeter, president of OSF Mendota and OSF Saint Elizabeth Medical Center in Ottawa. "I'm very familiar with Rural Hospital Emergency Designation and what that entails. No, we will not be doing that at Saint Paul.

'We are very stable financially. Saint Paul is part of our integrated delivery system across OSF. It's very valuable, as we look at how we provide the continuum of care across all of our services, to have our critical access hospitals, such as Mendota, in place as is.

"We're not looking at Rural Hospital Emergency Designation at all."

Rural Emergency Hospital Designation, which went into effect on Jan. 1, was created by federal officials.

Facilities who are under the designation must provide 24/7 emergency medical services and observation care and have the option to provide additional outpatient medical services. However, inpatient services are

not available at a Rural Hospital Emergency Designation.

"Rural Hospital Emergency Designation is not even on the radar because of the fact that our inpatient volume is what we need in order to sustain our business," said Kevin Marx, who is the director of business development and the hospital spokesman at KSB. "It would really have to change dramatically before we would want to consider discontinuation of the emergency business or the inpatient business.

"To some degree, rural hospitals are not unlike hospitals across the country, particularly community hospitals that were impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, which essentially reduced our volume of patients early on. One of the key factors, in terms of now, is how quickly has the patient base recovered.

"I think that most hospitals share the experience that we're having. We're probably back around 95 percent of our patient base. We're not fully back to the same patient numbers as before the pandemic. In rural settings, it's more of a significant issue perhaps than urban hospitals because you have similar costs in terms of facilities, equipment, staff, and you need to have a critical mass of patients in order to spread that cost over."

During a recent Telemedicine Program webinar, chief executive officer of the National Rural Health Association, Alan Morgan, gave numbers and comments about the state of rural health.

Morgan stated, since 2005, 180 rural hospitals have closed across the U.S. The Center for Healthcare Quality and Payment Reform estimated more than 600 rural hospitals (30 percent of all rural hospitals in the country) are at risk of permanently closing its doors.

A Look Back At Amboy Area Heroes Who Served During World War II

Editor's note: The Amboy News will be publishing a series of articles on veterans who served during World War II. These heroes are part of Amboy's history and it is our honor to publish these articles so you can learn about their service to our country. This article was researched by Jack Mead and Tom Dempsey, and written by Dempsey.

P.F.C. Charles Warren Engle

harles Engle was the fourth child born to William and Lilly Engle on Sept. 21, 1921. President Wilson's term was coming to an end, "Prohibition" was the law of the land, and women could vote for the first time in history. The Engle family operated a dairy farm on Route # 3, outside Dixon, Illinois, raising five children in all. As the roaring 20s gave way to



the hard times of the 1930's, the family faced additional hardship when William died, leaving Lilly as head of the household, and sole parent of five children.

In late 1941, at age 20, Charles registered for the draft as he continued to find any type of work that would help support his family. After entering the U.S. Army, he attained the rank of Private First Class, assigned to Company C, 6th Armored Infantry

Regiment, 1stArmored Division, which would play a key role in the liberation of North Africa and Italy.

On Sept. 9, 1943, the 1st Division landed in Italy with some elements landing at Salerno and Paestum while others, including P.F.C. Engle, took part in the fighting along the Rapido River between Naples and Rome. Nazi forces had established a defensive position north of Naples known as the "Winter Line" set among mountains which would give them observation points and the strategic advantage of high ground. The most prominent

of these was Mount Porchia, located near Mignano.

From Jan. 4-9 of 1944, the 6th Armored Infantry Regiment attacked and seized Mount Porchia, suffering heavy casualties in fierce mountain fighting. The 6th Armored Regiment went into battle as the infantry component, but they were accompanied by division artillery, an engineer battalion, and much needed medical personnel. Infantry soldiers were carried in at night on M3 halftracks, which were vulnerable to anti-tank weapons but had the advantage of avoiding the perilous on-foot slog

up the mountainous terrain. On Jan. 6, P.F.C. Charles W. Engle was killed in action during this effort. Over four days of fierce fighting and heavy losses, the allies were able to seize Mount Porchia and penetrate the German defenses. From there, the 1st Division would move on to the Anzio beachhead and beyond in a slow bitter struggle until German forces in Italy finally capitulated in May, 1944.

St. Margaret's Health in Peru (formerly Illinois Valley Community Hospital) terminated its emergency room physician coverage and all health services.

According to a press release, the service was terminated because the current provider of physicians terminated their contract effective at 7 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 28 and St. Margaret's could not find, nor financially support, a new ER provider. It was also mentioned there wasn't

enough staff to operate St. Margaret's in Spring Valley and Peru.

"Closings are extremely unfortunate, and they vary by location. Illinois Valley and Spring Valley are a different scenario when you have two hospitals five miles apart," Marx said. "It doesn't scare us at KSB, but it catches your attention, in terms of, making sure that you're making those adjustments that are necessary in order to meet the new way that patients are looking for care. We're a good 25 miles, or more than that, to the next hospital from us with the exception of Sterling, but they have their own population base.

"We're looking at it to see what we need to do to adjust or to try and compensate for the post-pandemic changes, but still fullfil our mission of providing health services to Lee County and southern Ogle County. To that end, the best solution is to make sure that we're being responsive to our local community's needs and encouraging the folks who've relied on us in the past to continue to choose us going forward."

Saint Paul hasn't had any alarms of closing or significant changes.

Trompeter added Mendota has partnered with St. Margaret's before and is helping where it can.

"We have seen some increase in clients with the closing, but even prior to the closing, we've always worked together with St. Margaret's Health, and previously when it was IVCH," Trompeter said. "During Covid, if there was a shortage of beds or if they didn't have staffing, we worked with them and were able to help them. The other things that we may see, that we've already prepared for, is an increase of emergency department or prompt care visits with St. Margaret's closing. We're already ready to accommodate that.

"We are very transparent. We have metrics that we share with our leaders and mission partners on a monthly basis, if not more in weekly huddles. We always update the Community Council with where we are at and what we're doing.







verone thous a n d different kinds of vascular plants have been found in Lee County. There are 97 different grasses growing naturally and uncultivated. Some, such as

bottle-brush grass

and wood reed, grow only in the woods. The greatest variety of grasses can be found growing on sandy soil. It would not be unusual to find 30 different grasses growing on a sandy prairie.

None of our wild grasses an compare with our cultivated corn (Zea mays). The South American Indians first discovered corn growing naturally in the wild. They recognized its potential and began to plant it in their gardens. After many centuries of cultivation, they developed many varieties: field corn, popcorn, sweet corn, and others. The North American natives obtained corn and planted it in their gardens. They knew they could depend on corn to produce a crop no matter what the weather. Besides man, most of our domestic animals love to eat corn. Corn feeds most of the livestock that we depend on for food. Without corn, we would have to depend on wheat to feed our livestock. An acre of wheat can't come close to the bushels of food that an acre of corn can produce. When Columbus came to America, his greatest find was cultivated corn. When the Spaniards landed in Central and South America, their only search was for gold and silver. They should have paid more attention to the gardens they found there. Who knows what garden plants were un-

ouise Erdrich based her 2020 Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, "The Night Watchman," on her grandfather, who was a night watchman and a tribal leader of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa in North Dakota. He strenuously fought a process called termination. In the book's preface, Erdrich explains that on Aug. 1, 1953, Congress announced House Concurrent Resolution 108 which, under the guise of emancipation, would abrogate all nation-to-nation treaties which were valid "for as long as the grasses shall grow, and the rivers run." Termination meant the destruction of the Turtle Mountain Chippewa.

Thomas Wazhashk, named for the lowly, hardworking muskrat, is the night watchman at the Turtle Mountain Jewel Bearing Plant, where women of the Turtle Mountain clan work by day, using gemstones as drill bits for Defense Department ordnance and for Bulova watches. Thomas is also a Chippewa Council member trying to understand the consequences of the termination bill on its way to the floor of Congress.

He stares at the bill's "innocuous dry language," which conceals its malicious objective "to unmake, to unrecognize. To erase as Indians him, Biboon, Rose, his children, his people, all of us invisible and as if we never were here, from the beginning, here." He decides to fight back with all his might. It will take him and a small delegation all the way to Washington.

Patrice Paranteau hates her nickname Pixie. "She's the kind of woman who did things perfectly when enraged." She follows her Chippewa mother's teachings, but became a Catholic and class valedictorian.

At nineteen, she has big dreams, but for now works at the Plant for a pittance. As the sole provider for her family, she must not risk her job. Still, she has a mission to find her older sister Vera who moved to Minneapolis and then disappeared.

Vera is part of a government relocation program designed to remove native people from the reservations by giving them incentives to move to the city. Erdrich's imagination is in full flight when she paints Patrice's encounters in Minneapolis. In equal measure hair-raising, funny, and gruesome, Patrice luckily escapes not with Vera, but Vera's baby.

The Turtle Mountain Chippewa are mostly dirt-poor subsistence farmers, but there is also lots of magic. Thomas's contemplation of a quilt shows Erdrich at her finest: "It had been made from a trade wool blanket and to a blanket it had returned. Here were the boys' padded plaid wool jackets, ripped and worn. These jackets had surged through fields, down icy hills, wrestled with dogs....Here was Rose's coat from the early days of their marriage, blue-gray and thin now, but still bearing the fateful shape of her as she walked away from him, then stopped, turned and smiled...daring him to love her.'







Blanton advances to Oregon Sectional


