No plans by county to terminate animal control agreements

County will honor agreements as it looks for new animal control administrator and solicits help

CLINTON — The county will continue animal control services to Clinton, Farmer City and Wapella as it works to find a new animal control administrator.

A motion listed on the county board's Jan. 19 meeting agenda, if approved, would have terminated the county's intergovernmental agreements with the three municipalities. But, it was made clear at the meeting the county

did not intend to take such action.

"We're not going to bring that forward," said board chairman Dan Matthews.

Matthews said he talked to Megan Myers, chairman of the board's public safety committee, and other board members as well as Sheriff Mike Walker and Clinton Police Chief Ben Lowers.

"How this came about was our inability to hold up our end of the agreements," Matthews said.

Since the county is currently without an animal control officer, there was concern those duties

could not be performed.

"We don't have anyone to go out on calls," Matthews said. "So, we thought, can we suspend the agreement? How do we handle it so we hold up our part of the agreement?"

Matthews said the county was searching to find a new animal control administrator.

"Hopefully we find somebody who is capable, willing to do the job," he said. "We want to get them trained as quickly as

possible."

Matthews said he did not know

how long it would take to fill the position, "but, there will probably be some situations we can't handle right away." He said they were seeking help and looking for some flexibility with the agreements until they hire someone.

"It certainly is not our intention to terminate those agreements," Matthews said.

In fact, he said the county plans to work toward improving the agreements when they come up for renewal.

Governor signs bill that includes new regulations for wind farms

SPRINGFIELD — Gov. J.B. Pritzker last week signed Illinois House bill HB 4412, which, among other items, includes new state regulations for establishing and regulating sites for wind energy facilities.

For some counties, the bill will relax some wind regulations implemented by those counties. In some cases, counties have more restrictive regulations governing wind and solar energy projects, and fear loss of local control over project site approval.

The bill sets statewide site standards for renewable energy

projects, such as wind and solar, as well as a protocol for downstate relief of energy rates. The bill also limits counties in their authority to regulate commercial wind and solar energy generating facilities

Seventy-eight Illinois counties, in addition to DeWitt County, passed resolutions objecting to losing local control over wind

and solar site approval.

The Illinois Farm Bureau also opposed the bill, giving testimony the bill would not provide sufficient protections for property owners who were not leaseholding participants of wind energy facilities.

State sets DeWitt County multiplier

SPRINGFIELD

DeWitt County has been issued a tentative property assessment equalization factor of 1.0000, according to David Harris, Director of the Illinois Department of Revenue.

The property assessment

equalization factor, often referred to as the "multiplier," is the method used to achieve uniform assessments property counties, among required by law. This equalization is particularly important because some of the state's 6,600 local taxing districts overlap into two or more counties (e.g. school junior college districts, fire protection districts).

If there were no equalization among counties, substantial inequities among taxpayers with comparable would result.

State law requires property in Illinois to be assessed at one-third (1/3) of its market value. Farm property is assessed differently, with farm home sites and dwellings subject to regular assessment and equalization procedures, but farmland and farm buildings are assessed according to standards that are based on productivity.

The equalization factor is determined annually for each county by comparing the sales price of individual properties sold over the past three years to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county supervisor of assessments/county assessor.


If this three-year average level of assessment is one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be one (1). If the average level of assessment is greater than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be less than one (1). And, if the average level of assessment is less than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be greater than one (1).

Assessments in DeWitt County are at 33.68 percent of market value, based on sales of properties in 2019, 2020, and 2021.

The equalization factor currently being assigned is for 2022 taxes, payable

Last year's equalization factor for the county was 0.9846.

The tentative factor is subject to change (1) if the County Board of Review takes actions which significantly affect the county assessments or (2) if local officials

or others can present data showing that the Department of Revenue's estimates of the average level of assessments in the county should be adjusted. A public hearing on the tentative multiplier will be held between 20 and 30 days after the tentative factor is published in a newspaper of general circulation within the

change in the equalization factor does not mean total property tax bills will increase or decrease. Tax bills are determined by local taxing bodies when they request money each year to provide services to local citizens. If the amount requested by local taxing districts is not greater than the amount received in the previous year,

then total property taxes will not increase even if assessments may have increased.

The assessed value of an individual property determines what portion of the tax burden a specific taxpayer will assume. That individual's portion of tax responsibility is not changed by the multiplier.

LeRoy Rifle and Pistol Club accepting new members

American Heritage Range open in DeWitt County

LEROY - Founded in 1974, the LeRoy Rifle and Pistol Club operated on a site near LeRoy. Over the next 40 years, the club built a club house, a covered firing line with

berms at 25, 50, and 100 yards and a trap house and concrete trap field. They had to leave all this

behind after losing their lease in 2018. The club kept the LRPC name but began a search

for a new site and a new

range. They were able to purchase a 40-acre parcel in DeWitt County. There was however an

issue with access, since the parcel was about 20 feet short of the road. Though there was an easement to the property, the owner refused to grant access to the club. This started an extended

process to gain access and to begin construction of the club's new range, the American Heritage Range. Eventually permission was granted by all federal, state, and county authorities to begin building. But, it took until the fall of 2020 for this to be completed and groundbreaking to occur.

During this time, the club was improving the grounds. They planted trees, installed fencing, put up a gate, installed a flagpole, cut down brush and cleaned up trash.

On Memorial Day weekend 2021, the first shots were fired at the new facility. The initial construction included a three-sided berm at 25 yards, a shoot house with concrete floor and insulation on walls and ceiling to mitigate sound, and an ADA compliant Construction of a 100-

yard berm and shoot house will begin in 2024. Future plans call for 300-yard and even 500-yard ranges.





Ways to train your brain

There are several "brain support" online programs out there, but many cost more than we'd like to pay.

Lumosity (lumosity. com) comes in seven languages and has games that promote memory, attention, flexibility, problem-solving more. After you sign up, you'll get three free games per day, and the Brain Performance Index monitors your progress. There is a subscription plan, of course, if you want access to more areas of the site, and you can pay by the month or the year. Test the free version first to see if you like it.

BrainHQ (brainhq. com) is another cognitive training program that you can access online. Their exercises explore brain speed, memory, attention and more. And you can design your own program. Their goals are to help you think faster, focus better and remember more. You can try it out by subscribing to their email newsletters, which have free daily exercises



to sample.

As for me, I've found books that don't cost much and are good at putting my brain through its paces on a daily basis. The New York Times series of puzzle books begins with the Monday editions, which are the easiest of the week. (The crossword puzzles get increasingly difficult as the week progresses.) I found the whole series of spiral-bound puzzle books (50 to a book) on Amazon.

Then there are the online jigsaw puzzles at The Jigsaw Puzzles .com. The puzzles (a new one every day) can be set in any number of ways, including the number of pieces in a puzzle. I've found that the 100-pieces level is plenty challenging when viewed on a computer monitor.

And then there is online chess, for those of us who used to play back in the day but would be embarrassed to lose to a small child now without serious brushing up of our skills. Try this for free at www.chess.com and play against their computer.







More on market psychology

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights. In the previous article, learned shrinkflation. From this, we learned how the manufacturers inflate food prices without us even


realizing it. There are no visual indicators. In one example, the box and price did not change, but the amount hidden inside was less. In another case the cans were all the same right down to the weight, but hidden inside was various amounts of water. Even the psychological effect that dried produces would be cheaper proved false. Now we venture from the manufacturer to

the club. Most of us know what a co-op is. Co-op catered to specific needs of a certain group of people. The earlier ones were for farmers. Co-ops were the precursor to the purchaser's club. know the type. Some require a membership before they allow the person the privilege of giving them money to buy

things. Purchasing membership presumes the "privilege" of buying from them. This concerns me. I have had a few such memberships. My first one was in 1971. What is the psychology behind it?

First, to pay for a membership presumes one will get better prices. And, if so, one needs to purchase enough to offset the annual membership fees. Does it? How can one know?

I have had a membership with a nationwide buying club. I found that they charged retail prices or above on many of their Items generally items. stocked are high volume items. This limits your choices generally to one brand. Any bargain prices



given are mainly large bulk items that cater to high volume restaurants and businesses.

Another psychological effect deals with the "overhead conception." This deals with the way products are presented. One might feel they are entering a warehouse. "Warehouse" sales in the past were clearance sells. Thus, the warehouse appearance gives that perception of "bargain prices."

To buy products directly out of the shipping crates and boxes on pallets adds to this impression. reduces labor for stocking shelves. It is assumed the savings would be passed on to the member. products are sold at or near retail prices, do not expect any savings for yourself. You might do as well, if not better, at a retail store.

Purveyors have quality levels on produce. Most of your grocery stores will pay a little extra for your fresh and higher quality produce. Other stores that presume to give the better deal, might have the policy of purchasing the cheaper quality produce. It will have a short shelf life and some of it is at the point of being composted.

Recently at such a place, I noticed indentation on some watermelons. This indicates the melons are rotting. If you press your thumb on the spot, it most likely will puncture the rind. Regarding peaches, they could smell ripe and yet be rotting at the center. This is only two

examples of incompetent management.



This deal was played in a team game and at one table West routinely led the ♥K. Declarer ruffed the second Heart and played a trump to East's Ace. A Diamond was returned for West to ruff, briefly raising the hopes of E-W. But that was all they got, and Declarer had 10 tricks. In the post mortem West stated the obvious by pointing out that East needed to overtake the King with his ♥A at Trick 1 and

shoot back a Diamond, getting the defense two ruffs and setting the contract. At the other table, West was made of smarter stuff. At Trick 1 she led the Heart

Two! Unless leading "top of a sequence" it is customary to lead 4th best from a long suit (some prefer "3rd or 5th"), so that Heart Two was distinctly fishy-looking,

considering that West's bidding had announced 6 or 7 Hearts. What was West trying to say by her strange lead? She clearly wanted a shift, probably for a ruff.

East concluded that Diamonds were more promising than Clubs, all the more so as, if West was out of Clubs, then East had natural Club tricks coming his way.

Weather History

February 3

1883: An extensive area of sleet and freezing rain occurred on the 2nd and 3rd. Two-day precipitation totals (which included rain) ranged from 2 to 4 inches, but most of the sleet and freezing rain occurred late on the 2nd into the morning of the 3rd. Severe damage occurred to trees, telegraph wires, and telephone wires. Ice accumulation of as much as 1.25 inches thick was observed in Atlanta (Logan County). As temperatures fell below freezing following this system, the

ice remained on the trees and exposed objects for as long as 11 days.

2012: An unusually mild winter was in progress, with temperatures averaging 4 to 6 degrees above normal. Several areas saw temperatures remain at or above zero the entire winter. Springfield had its first winter in 30 years where temperatures failed to fall below zero, and Peoria saw its first winter since 1997-98 without a below zero reading.


