LaMoille School District, Arukah secure grant to help mental health of local schools

LaMOILLE - LaMoille School District 303 and Arukah Institute of Healing developed and submitted a grant in October to bring much-needed mental health support and services to seven local schools in Bureau and LaSalle counties. These participating schools include Bureau Valley High School, DePue School



District 103, Hall High School, LaMoille School District 303, Mendota High School, Princeton High School and Ottawa High School. The grant, totaling \$6.86 million for five years, was awarded on Dec. 27, 2022.

LaMoille Interim Superintendent Jay K. Mc-

Cracken stated, "We are deeply grateful to our school counselor, Katie Shevokas, and Dr. Scruggs and Dawn Conerton at Arukah for securing this amazing grant. Most importantly, hundreds of students in Bureau and La Salle counties will receive the social work/mental health services they desperately need. The funding will assist our seven participating school districts as they provide proactive help to our area youth. Our LaMoille Board of Education, administration, and staff are proud to serve a key role in this incredible grant program, and we express deep appreciation to Arukah and participating schools who made this dream a reality."

Dr. Sarah Scruggs, Chief Executive Officer of Arukah remarked, "We are thrilled to partner with LaMoille and participating schools to secure this much-needed funding. Along with developing important collaborations and vital resources for students, my hope is that this increases community awareness of the struggles our kids face every day. Our Bureau and LaSalle County youth have markedly higher rates of poverty and chronic absenteeism relative to State of Illinois and National averages. Teens in our area also have higher alcohol and marijuana usage, suicide ideation, and prolonged feelings of extreme sadness. We saw these data as a cry for help, and we knew we needed to be involved."

The Project Director will be Dawn Conerton from the Arukah Institute of Healing, and the School SEL Liaison will be Katie Shevokas from LaMoille School District. The purpose of this grant is to increase capacity of school-based mental health providers and increase access for youth (12-18 years) to timely and appropriate mental health intervention in participating schools. The grant begins in January 2023.

Hard work pays off for MHS student

☐ Carlos Olivas earns full-ride scholarship to the University of Chicago

MENDOTA - When Carlos Olivas was thinking about his future after high school, the Mendota High School senior already knew what he wanted to pursue.

Instead of waiting for an education or career path to open itself to him, with the encouragement and support of his mother, he made sure he put in the hard work to clear the path himself.

"Ever since I was young, even as far back as 3- or 4-years old, my mother, Natasha Lemus, has always pushed me," Olivas said. "She has told me, 'College is the way of having a better life.' We've always been low income, poor, and I've pushed myself. I try to view it as a mark of pride saying despite the disadvantages of being a low-income or poor student, I'm still able to excel.

"It's something that I'm proud of. Everything that I've worked for through all of these years paid off. I've sacrificed a lot of my free time to work on my grades and now it's all worth it. I had already planned to pursue computer science at the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign, but it's a really selective program.

"I was going to go for one of the sister schools - University of Illinois Chicago or University of Illinois Springfield. It feels very rewarding to get a scholarship like this to go to college."

Through many years of skipping hangouts with friends or walking past a video game controller to pick up a book, study, or work on a project, Olivas had developed an excellence

in academics.

The QuestBridge program and the University of Chicago recognized Olivas' intelligence and desire to push through disadvantages for an education and rewarded him with the QuestBridge Match Scholarship, valued at over \$342,000, to study computer science.

"For the QuestBridge Match Scholarship, you have to apply to become a Quest-Bridge scholar, which you have to fill out paperwork basically another FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) – specifically for the QuestBridge program,"Olivas said. "If you're selected, they push you out to become a QuestBridge finalist.

"The match scholarship, the one I was awarded, is for low income students that excel academically and are matched with schools that vou rank on a form. You rank 15 schools and fill out applications individually for each school. You have 2 ½-3 weeks to fill out all of them. If you're selected by one of those schools, that's the school that will give you a scholarship.

"I was rejected by my

top five schools including Stanford University, Yale University, Brown University, Rice University, but I was accepted by my sixth choice, University of Chicago."

Not only did Olivas put studying and schoolwork at the top of his priority list, he made sure staying involved in school activities was next on the list.

Over his four years, Ol-

ivas has been part of the Mendota High School band program, cross country, ILMEA (Illinois Music Education Association), track, scholastic bowl, and the tech

support team. Scott Siri, the MHS technology director, has worked with Olivas during the last

Illinois named top soybean producing state for the 2022 growing season

BLOOMINGTON-The Illinois Soybean Association (ISA) is proud to announce that Illinois produced the most soybeans in the nation again in 2022.

After a slow start to the planting season due to cool and wet weather, followed by a hot and dry summer for many of the state's farmers, the National Agricultural Statistics Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates Illinois soybean farmers raised 677.25 million bushels on 10.75 million harvested acres with an average yield of 63 bushels per acre.

"I'm proud to be able to congratulate my 43,000 colleagues across the state on this announcement,'



said Steve Pitstick, a Maple Park farmer and Chairman of ISA. "Illinois soybean farmers have gotten really good at making the best of whatever growing challenges confront them, making smart management decisions, and maximizing

production opportunities, and 2022 was no different. We have proven once again that we know how to roll up our sleeves and put the sweat equity into producing




Popular the world over, Taizé prayer is characterized by simple repetitive melodies, uncluttered by too many words, to open participants to the still voice of God within. This way of prayer is associated with an ecumenical monastery in Taizé, France, where generations of young people have been drawn to the monks'

mission of prayer and reconciliation since its founding by 25-year-old Roger Schütz in 1940. Brother Roger's first mission was to welcome Jewish refugees from the war to his home near the demarcation line in France.

The sisters' event is one way they are celebrating the 150th anniversary of the founding of their congregation in Jacksonville, when six Dominican sisters from a convent in Kentucky arrived there to teach the mostly-immigrant children of Irish railroad workers.

Feb. 2 is recognized globally as a day of prayer for consecrated life, when the Catholic Church acknowledges and celebrates the gift of vowed life to the church. The Dominican Sisters, like members of other religious communities, are consecrated to lives of celibacy, poverty, and obedience in the service of God's people and the Church.





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Stage 212 brings "Steel Magnolias" to the Illinois Valley

Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum offers new way to enjoy historic artifacts

SPRINGFIELD – Crawl around under Abraham Lincoln's desk. Spin the chair where Adlai Stevenson III sat in the U.S. Senate. Look down the barrel of Tad Lincoln's model cannon. Thanks to new 3-D images from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum, anyone anywhere in the world can explore treasures from Illinois history like never before.

The virtual gallery features about 100 artifacts that can be enlarged, turned upside down or spun around. Each comes with details about the item's history and significance.

"Every museum visitor has seen some fascinating artifact they would like to pick up and examine more closely. These 3D images offer the nextbest thing," said Christina Shutt, executive director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum. "They let all of us satisfy our curiosity by peering into the nooks and crannies of history.'

The 3-D scanning was made possible by grant funds the ALPLM received as part of the Governor's Emergency Education Relief. The U.S. Department of Education awarded grants to governors for the purpose of providing local educational agencies, institutions of higher education and other education-related entities with emergency

assistance during the coronavirus pandemic.

"Nothing connects us to the past quite like artifacts. They add concrete details as we imagine Abraham Lincoln writing a speech, a soldier risking everything in war, or a lonely boy playing in the White House," said Lisa Horsley, the ALPLM's director of library services. "We're excited to give people around the world a chance to explore these historic treasures.'

The 3-D gallery includes many objects that were part of the Taper Collection, a huge collection of Lincoln material that was housed at the ALPLM for many years. The collection's owners have removed the items, but digital versions remain available through the ALPLM for anyone who wants to study them.

Highlights of the virtual gallery include:

- The desk where Lincoln wrote much of the speech he would deliver after being sworn in as president
- A bust of Lincoln that was a gift to the Lincolns from the sculptor
- Tools that thieves used in a failed attempt to steal Lincoln's body from his tomb in Springfield
- A bust of Frank "Free Frank" McWorter, first Black man to plat and register a town in America
- A medal of honor awarded posthumously to Andrew Jackson Smith, a Black man serving in the

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

Sheriffs should enforce laws

We don't make the laws we just enforce them." Such statements have become nearly a cliché in

police departments across the nation. But the statement Some laws are enforced more readily than others.

And over the years more than a few sheriffs have issued press releases saying they won't enforce one

particular law or another. For example, Bexar County, Texas, Sheriff Javier Salazar announced June 25, after the U.S. Supreme Court

overturned the Roe v. Wade decision, which established a woman's right to abortion, that he would not enforce a Texas law restricting abortion. 'Shame on the Supreme Court and the bureaucrats

in Washington, D.C., and Austin who are attempting to impose their own supposed morals on others," Salazar, whose jurisdiction includes San Antonio, wrote in the post. "They will not use my badge or the color of my office to do so."

Not surprisingly, his statement was criticized by Texas conservatives and praised by progressives. Should a cop just ignore a law because he just doesn't like it? That question is being asked in Sangamon County

where Sheriff Jack Campbell has announced he will not enforce an assault weapon ban recently passed by the Illinois General Assembly and signed by Gov. J.B. Campbell, who said he believes the bill violates the

Second Amendment, joined the vast majority of Illinois county sheriffs who have said they will not comply with the act. "I believe this is not just my moral duty, but my

constitutional duty to defend the citizens' right to keep and bear arms," he told Illinois Times. The Protect Illinois Communities Act, signed into law

by Gov. JB Pritzker on Jan 10, immediately bans the sale and purchase of a list of semi-automatic firearms and gives owners of those weapons until Jan. 1, 2024, to report their serial numbers with the Illinois State Police. "At this point, I don't see any part of it that I am

comfortable with because all it does is begin to encroach on our Second Amendment rights," he said. "If we don't say, 'no' now, we might find ourselves living in a country we really don't want to live in." It should surprise no one that it is sheriffs that are

making public pronouncements about not enforcing controversial laws. After all, they are politicians wearing uniforms.

But is it appropriate for law enforcement agencies to refuse to enforce laws they don't like?

Well, to a certain extent, they have always done that.

When I was a newspaper reporter in Las Vegas, Nevada was the only state where possession of any amount of marijuana was a felony.

At the time, I asked two cop friends how they went about enforcing the state's Draconian pot law. One a University of Nevada Las Vegas police officer said when she smelled marijuana while patrolling the dorms, she simply ignored it. Another, a constable in Clark County, Nev., said when he found marijuana while serving eviction orders, he'd simply flush it down the toilet but not make any arrests.

Neither believed pursuing felony charges against the scofflaws was a good use of law enforcement resources. Then again, the Nevada Legislature – duly elected by the people - said this was criminal behavior. Should these cops have turned a blind eye on felonious behavior?

Is it their place to pick and choose what laws to enforce? Most civics books would say "no."

When sheriffs announce they won't enforce a particular law they are committing an ethical transgression, said Robert Wadman, a former police chief of Aurora, Ill., and Omaha, Neb., and a professor emeritus at Weber State University

Here is the rub, the Bexar County sheriff said he wouldn't enforce abortion restrictions after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled such laws were constitutional. The Nevada cops I knew cast a blind eye toward marijuana laws that while lousy public policy did pass constitutional muster.

Campbell and more than 70 other Illinois sheriffs say they won't enforce the law before its constitutionality has been considered by a single judge. Could the new law be ruled unconstitutional? Yes. But it's far from a certainty, says Eric Ruben, a law professor at Southern Methodist University, who specializes in the Second Amendment. 'It sends a message to citizens that they don't have

to follow the law. And it sets sheriffs up as the people who decide whether a law is constitutional – and that's not their role. In a way, it would have been more honest to say they weren't going to enforce the law because they didn't agree with it. But they are weighing on its constitutionality and that's not their job."

The right to bear arms, like any right, isn't an absolute. Ultimately, whether the law is constitutional will be decided by the courts.

With the current makeup of the U.S. Supreme Court, it is unclear whether the assault weapon ban will pass constitutional muster, he said.

"I think there are at least three justices who would vote to strike it down – but I'm not sure if there are five," he said

In the meantime, it would be best if sheriffs just enforced the law rather than opine on its constitutionality.

Opening Mendota Lutheran Home – 1952

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Jan. 23, 2002.) By Jessica Nashold

Fifty years ago, on Jan. 17, 1952 Lutheran ladies were preparing the old Harris Hospital for its new life as Mendota Lutheran Home. Women from congregations in Mendota, Compton and West Brooklyn were pictured on the front page of The Mendota Reporter with mops and scrub pails, addressing the task. The date of Feb. 3, 1952, had been set for the "key ceremony" and open house for the new facility. Planning was in the hands of a committee headed by Mrs. Adolph Rave and composed of the Rev. J.T. Meyer of Clarion, Mrs. John Walter, Mrs. John Carnahan of Compton and Henry Sauer.

On dedication Sunday, Dr. A.W. Englebrecht conducted a service at St. John's, after which all proceeded to the Home, where the dedication took place, on the steps of the former Harris Hospital. An open house followed and first residents were admitted soon after Feb. 3.

Mendota Community Hospital had accepted the last patients in the Harris Hospital in June 1951. In January 1952, The Reporter published weekly reports on activities there. A hand rail had been installed along the temporary boardwalk leading to the entrance, a great convenience for visitors. An emergency bell at the ambulance entrance brought medical assistance quickly. Ed Lorack was commended for sending snowplows from his Chevrolet dealership to clear drives for service vehicles, ambulances and visitors' cars.

It was reported that a \$2,000 bequest from Don P. Bowers who had died in December at the age of 102, would be put to good use in his memory. Mendota's oldest resident had visited the hospital during the open house held in conjunction with its dedication the preceding summer.

Christ T. Troupis announced the opening of his law office on Jan. 7, 1952. It was located at 710 ½ Washington St., above the Mendota Candy Kitchen (later

Kitch Inn).

The annual meeting of the Coon, Rod and Gun Club was held in the KC rooms, Jan. 10, 1952. Directors elected that evening were Milton Dewey, Norman Willard, Guy Prescott, Kenneth Sauerssig, Arthur Krenz, John Herbert, Delmar Kaiser, Marvin Schlesinger, Ben Waller, Adolph Rave, Dean Mosher and Raymond Sondgeroth. By-laws were adopted that night, adjusting lengths of terms so that all directors would not, in the future, be elected at the same time.

Sam Carney, chief inspector of State Law Enforcement, told the members that 500 arrests, made in November 1951, had yielded \$13,000 in fines. There had been late shooting, road shooting, shooting of waterfowl out of season, shooting in excess of limit. But, surprisingly, 40 percent of the fines were collected from hunters and trappers who had failed to obtain licenses.

175 attended the meeting.

No, you can't believe 'The Science'

Copernicus surely had no idea when he got the Scientific Revolution underway in the 16th century that an unintended effect would be empowering agenda-driven bullies and fanatics.

Of course, science is a pillar of modern life for which we should be deeply grateful. It has given us longer and healthier lives, incredible material abundance, and abilities that were unfathomable a few generations ago.

It is "science" -- science used as a rhetorical tactic and ideological weapon -- that is a blight on 21st-century Amer-

This faux science is not dispassionate but fired by a great moral certainty. It is not open to counter arguments and different interpretations but insists on only one answer to complicated or ambiguous questions. It is not rigorously neutral but aims to achieve cherished political goals.

The debate over gas stoves illustrates perfectly the faux

First, researchers conduct flawed studies reaching alarming conclusions. Second, the media generates headlines about the findings that don't note the methodological inadequacies. Third, advocates agitate for changes to public policy based on what has magically become "the science."

A new study, for instance, concluded that a suspiciously precise 12.7% of childhood asthma cases are attributable to gas stoves.

The study relied on findings from other papers that, as economist Emily Oster points out, arrived at widely divergent outcomes, didn't account for other factors in households using gas stoves that might contribute to respiratory problems, and sometimes produced results that weren't even internally consistent.

All of this would have counseled caution that was notably missing in the media coverage. A headline in The Washington Post read, "Gas stove pollution causes 12.7% of childhood asthma, study finds." Yahoo News: "Gas stoves have given 650,000 U.S. children asthma, study finds." And so on.

Yes, the headlines include the caveat of "study finds," but the phrase brings with it the presumed authority of scientific

It is similar to the phrase "scientists say" so often used in stories about climate change and its potential harms.

A report in The Washington Post on the gas stove controversy was a classic in this genre. It related, "Scientists say the world needs to rapidly transition away from fossil fuels, including replacing gas appliances with cleaner versions that emit no pollution, such as electric and induction cooktops." And then added, "Scientists say a growing body of research shows that gas stoves pose a threat to the planet and public health."

That's a lot of sayin' by a mass of mostly unidentified

A more strictly accurate phrase in stories like this would be "some scientists contend," and a less tendentious formulation would be "some scientists say, but others aren't so sure." This would ruin the point, though, which is to imply that research -- and facts and rationality -- all point one way.

If it can be asserted that "science" has arrived at a conclusion -- that gas stoves are a major health hazard, that climate change is responsible for extreme weather, that young kids must wear masks during the pandemic -- then any dissenters or doubters can be marginalized for not "believing the science."

This means that they aren't just wrong or misguided, but dangerous and contemptible. As such, they can be belittled, intimidated, or even -- as we've seen in the debate over COVID-19 policy -- actively suppressed.

It's hard to imagine an enterprise less in keeping with the scientific spirit. The motto of the Royal Society, the storied British academy of sciences, is nullius in verba, or "Take nobody's word for it." As the Society's website explains, "It is an expression of the determination of Fellows to withstand the domination of authority and to verify all statements by an appeal to facts determined by experiment."

For today's self-styled champions of so-called science, that sentiment badly misses the mark. Why bother with the facts as carefully and rigorously established over time, when you can misuse the authority of science to try to dominate instead?



Q: What is Bryan Cranston's new show "Your Honor" about? Does he play a judge? Where can I stream

A: Yes, Bryan Cranston does play a judge in Showtime's "Your Honor," but it's not your



typical courtroom drama. It's about a father who must confront his deepest convictions after his son is involved in a hit-and-run accident and becomes the target of a crime family. In addition to the four-time-Emmy-winning Cranston ("Breaking Bad"), "Your Honor" boasts a stellar cast that also includes Oscar nominee Rosie Perez ("Fearless") as an assistant U.S. attorney.

Season two premiered this January on Showtime, which can also be streamed as an add-on service through existing streamers like Hulu, Prime Video, Paramount+ and AppleTV+.

Q: When is "The Mandalorian" returning with new episodes? I vaguely remember the season two finale having

a very young-looking Luke Skywalker. How did they make Mark Hamill appear so young? -- **D.**A.

A: It's been more than two years since the second chapter of the Disney+ Star Wars saga "The Mandalorian" concluded. Mark Hamill, who has played Luke Skywalker since the first "Star Wars" movie wowed audiences in theaters during the summer of 1978, made a surprise cameo in the season two finale. Richard Bluff, industrial light and magic VFX supervisor, explained to IndieWire.com that they tried to recreate Luke as he looked in "Return of the Jedi," and they used both Hamill as well as a younger body double.

They then used Lola Visual Effect's 2.5D process and compiled photographs and scenes of Hamill from "Return of the Jedi," using Lola's Photoshop-like technique involving skin smoothing and shape warping through 2D compositing. The end result was an astonishingly believable likeness of a young Luke Skywalker.

Season three of "The Mandalorian" premieres on Disney+ March 1.

Q: I was soupset when they canceled "Good Girls." What

are the three female stars doing now that it ended? -- W.C.

A: Christina Hendricks, Retta and Mae Whitman reportedly agreed to take pay cuts if NBC renewed their series, "Good Girls," for a fifth season, but unfortunately, it wasn't enough for the show to avoid the ax. It's been rumored that failed negotiations with Manny Montana, who played fan favorite Rio on the show, were what ultimately ended any chances of another season. Apparently, there was no love lost between Hendricks and Montana either, but Hendricks was disappointed in the show's cancellation.
