Central School roofing bid approved Bus purchases approved at Tuesday meeting

ROCHELLE—At its monthly meeting Tuesday, the Rochelle Elementary School District Board of Education unanimously approved a \$751,700 bid from Sterling Commercial Roofing for repairs to the Central School roof.

A bid opening was held Dec. 1 and yielded two bids. The other bid was for \$865,000 from a company out of Rockford.

"We know that we've had some leaking and some other issues with that roof over recent years and it's time to shore things up," Superintendent Jason Harper said. "We've historically used Sterling Commercial for ongoing maintenance across the district. Their bid was the lowest. That project work is set to take place in the summer of 2023. Our architects reviewed and approved this."

Bus bids

The board unanimously approved a bid from Central States Bus Sales for \$237,420, after trade-in, to purchase two 2024 or newer 77-passenger buses

to be received in July 2023.

District Business Manager Kevin Dale said all of the district's current large buses came from Central State and the cost of them has gone up at least 20-25 percent since the last time the district was at this point in its bus replacement cycle.

"We have a rotation we typically do every three years where we do a major overhaul one year and

upgrade our fleet," Harper said. "In the two off years we do minor purchasing and leasing. We are again at that process. We're doing bus bid approvals sooner due to supply chain issues. This was the low bid."

meeting.

The district's equalized assessed value has seen an increase from \$330 million to \$351 million since this time last year. The amount the district will receive is "near exactly" what it received last year.

"Right now with this recommendation, our projected tax rate is 3.2035," Harper said last month.

HILLCREST—Atits monthly meeting Wednesday, the Hillcrest Village Board unanimously approved an engineering agreement with Baxter & Woodman for services during construction of its priority 1A water main project.

Last month, the board voted unanimously to approve a \$2.54 million loan application to the Illinois **Environmental Protection** Agency for the project.

Baxter & Woodman, the village's engineering firm, is aiming for \$1.25 million in principal forgiveness on the loan. The village would have to pay back \$1.29 million at an interest rate of .93 percent. Hillcrest recently raised its service fees each month from \$5 to \$10 for the application and that and the work will require a future increase in water rates.

Axel will live with Beery and his family going forward.

"It's been emotional," Beery said. "It was harder than I thought it was going to be. Leaving for work every day and him staying home has been strange. He's still getting adjusted to that. It's going to be a good thing. I'm happy with where I'm at and what I'm doing. All good things have to come to an end. It's been a good run." Axel was with the department and Beery for seven years. RPD Chief Eric Higby said it was nice to see Axel into his retirement.

"A lot of departments aren't afforded that opportunity because the dog gets ill or something happens," Higby said. "He had a good long service life and was a good dog for us. It's nice to see him have the opportunity to retire and be with the Beery family."

Beery and Axel had many opportunities over the years to interact with the community including trips to schools, community events and local businesses.

"Those connections and relationships made with Axel are things that I'll always remember and they've grown and will continue to be friendships in the future," Beery said.

"Those will last a lifetime. I'll always remember them and they'll remember me and when we see each other on the street we always say hello. It's been great."

The first 1,000 gallons used would go from \$4.41 per gallon to \$5.70 per gallon in 2023 and \$6.98 in 2024. A Baxter & Woodman representative said the average water bill would need to go from \$31 per month to \$38 in 2023 and \$45 in 2024.

The village still has the opportunity to back out of the venture if it desires. Baxter & Woodman expects to get and approve bids for the project in March or April 2023 and begin construction in July or August and complete it by December 2023.

Solar

Village Building Inspector Casper Manheim presented the village with information on fee structures for future commercial and residential solar permits in the village. Manheim works with other municipalities in the region and gave trustees and the village attorney ordinances to work off of.

"In a year or two we'll be getting the large solar farm that's planned for the village," Manheim said.

"We have really nothing in place as far as fees or limits or anything. Right now I can only charge for fencing and a few minor things. Right now, maybe I could charge them \$600 for a permit. What I've given you today breaks it down by kilowatts. If we get this in place, now we have something to collect fees from them."

Maintenance

After meeting in executive session, the board voted unanimously to hire Ronald Belmonte-Lopez as its new maintenance employee. The village had previously been without a maintenance employee for a number of weeks.

Belmonte-Lopez has been working for the village since earlier this month and has already undertaken a number of projects, Trustee Rick Rhoads said.

Water

Village Trustee Dan Potter discussed ongoing water projects in the village during the meeting.

Potter said the village recently got an estimate for boring work to add another

water line for the Rochelle Church of Christ in Hillcrest due to the fact that it shares a water line with another building and entity.

The board resolved to purchase three fire hydrants for a total of \$9,000 from Elliott Wood. The hydrants are slightly used and are half the price of new hydrants. The village is currently in need of two hydrants.

The village will have its water tower looked at on Dec. 20 to assess its problems and needs.

Chip seal

The board unanimously approved a resolution for its 2023 chip seal program in the village.

The village chip seals one fifth of the streets in Hillcrest each year.

IPRF

Rhoads said the village is a recipient of the Illinois Public Risk Fund grant program and recently received \$995. Over the last five years, the village has received \$4,364 from the program. The money goes to clothing and safety equipment for village maintenance.

"It was a high honor to be recognized on behalf of the school district's efforts to emphasize agriculture education," Harper said. "The school board and our community has a long history of supporting our agriculture and FFA programs at RTHS, not to mention the phenomenal work that Mrs. Donna Page and Mrs. Deanna Jacobs do as our ag leaders in the building."

At RTHS students can choose from 18 agriculture,

horticulture and technology-related courses as well as four ag-related career track courses through the Kishwaukee Education Consortium. The Ag/Hort Programming also utilizes a 3,600 square foot greenhouse for hands-on experiences in horticulture, hydroponics and aquaculture. Elementary school students are treated to a visit to the greenhouse annually during RTHS Ag Day.

RMU extends energy assistance program



From Dec. 16 through Jan. 2, law enforcement across Illinois will step up enforcement efforts with a high visibility "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" and "Drive High. Get a DUI." traffic safety campaign.

"We want everyone in our communities to enjoy the holidays without worrying about the dangers of impaired drivers," Sheriff Brian VanVickle said. "During the campaign, you can expect to see extra safety patrols. We will show zero tolerance for alcohol and drug-impaired driving to help ensure everyone makes it to and from their holiday festivities safely."

According to the National Highway Traffic

Safety Administration's Fatality Analysis Reporting System, in 2020, a total of 11,654 people were killed in motor vehicle crashes involving an alcohol-impaired driver. On average, more than 10,000 people were killed each year from 2016 to 2020, with one person killed in an alcohol-related crash every 45 minutes in 2020.

Before the holiday fun begins, make a plan for a sober ride home and remember these tips.

Designate a sober driver or make a plan to use public transportation or a ride-sharing service to get home safely.

If you see an impaired driver on the road, pull over and contact The Sheriff's Office.

Have a friend who is about to drive impaired? Take the keys away and make arrangements to get them home safely. They'll thank you later.

"At this same time last year, our projected tax rate was 3.2583. That's just for District 231 and that's a decrease of 5.48 cents. Further along in the process our rates combine with the Rochelle Township High School rate and that is projected to be an even larger savings for our taxpayers."

Central School

Central School Principal Justin Adolph presented an update on recent happenings at his elementary school.

Adolph moved into the principal position at Central before this year after holding the same position at Lincoln School. He said

Central is in the beginning stages of a school improvement plan and hopes to get two or three targeted goals to start at the end of the year or the beginning of next year.

"We have a lot of kids, especially at our third grade level, that have missed a lot of instruction," Adolph said of pandemic impacts. "We're trying to accommodate some kids that are pretty far behind. That's a big part of what we're trying to do. We've made some adjustments to our literacy block to try to accommodate that without holding everybody back." Adolph said student

behaviors recently have improved "a lot."

"You can tell kids have

been in school now," Adolph said. "It's an interesting case study watching the second graders play at recess compared to the third graders. You can tell they've had more of that. We're working through a lot of that, but things are improving on that front."

HarpersaidthatAdolph and the Central School staff deserve credit for their work on reshaping behaviors and expectations with students that missed early years of their education process due to COVID-19.

Pay increase

The board unanimously approved a mid-year tiered hourly rate pay increase for non-certified staff members of the district.

Harper said minimum wage increases of a dollar per year have recently led to rapidly increasing hourly rates for least senior non-certified staff members. Those jumps in pay have disproportionately increased for the district's newest employees and the district sought to remedy that by implementing an hourly rate increase based on years of experience.

"We understand that our typical raise in hourly rates in the summer is the same for everyone across the board," Harper said. "We've also noted that the rising minimum wage every year has eclipsed our standard raises that

some of our more experienced staff are getting. At the end of the day with a tight labor market and the rising minimum wage, inflationary pressure and the fact that many of our staff are going to see increases anyways in the two years to come, we thought it was an opportune time to do something based on experience to compensate those who have been with the district longer."

HUB Program

The board approved contracts with three of its HUB Program site coordinators: Breynn Baiocco, Roxanna Contreras and Phoebe Hughes. The contracts reflect the spring semester.

The district recently

received a state grant to continue funding the HUB Program in coming years after uncertainty about the program's status for next semester.

"The board decided to run the program in the fall before we knew we'd have funding," Harper said. "Because of the timing, we did half-year contracts with our coordinators. These individuals have been with the program for multiple years and we just need to make sure they have a contract for the second semester."

The board also approved a contract with its HUB Program evaluator, Jodee Craven. The position of evaluator is required as part of the program's grant funding.

Fuel prices hitting farmers

NHE average price of diesel is \$5.32 per gallon, more than \$1.50 above the same time last year. While prices are below the \$5.81 peak in June, the high cost of fuel is hitting farmers hard as they navigate the fall harvest season.

A ban on U.S. imports of petroleum from Russia, lower domestic production capacity, and seasonal demand are all contributing to higher costs. Russia provided 20 percent of the petroleum imported into the U.S. in 2021, but that was halted after Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Beyond the impact of Russia, since 2019, domestic diesel production capacity has dropped by 180,000 barrels per day. Several plants closed during the coronavirus pandemic and are not yet back online. National diesel prices are expected to average \$4.86 per gallon through the end of the year, according to government projections, and \$4.29 per gallon in 2023. The price difference between diesel and gas has many scratching their heads. On Oct. 31, the average diesel price was \$5.32 per gallon, while the average gas price was \$3.86.

On the supply side, back in March, the U.S. banned imports of Russian oil and Russian petroleum products. While we only get three percent of our oil from Russia, we get 20 percent of our petroleum products from that country. And a lot of those petroleum products that we were importing are used to make diesel fuel. We've also seen some downturn in production as refiners have been taking their plants down for maintenance.

Gasoline tends to peak in the summertime when Americans are out hitting the open road on vacation,

whereas diesel demand tends to increase in the fall and the winter with increased trucking as retailers are stocking their shelves for the holidays. Of course, farmers are using more diesel during harvest. And as folks are using

a lot more heating oil as the temperatures drop. So, it's a combined supply and demand issue really going on here with diesel that is separating it from gasoline prices.

Nationwide we're down about 17 percent relative to the same time last year, but on the East Coast, they're down 37 percent; the Midwest is down 15 percent, the West Coast and Rocky Mountain regions are down

11 and nine percent, respectively. So, certainly feeling a pinch in multiple regions across the United States, but the East Coast far and away having the biggest supply constraint, followed by the Midwest.

RTHS Boys Basketball Hubs overwhelm G-K Luxton, Aguirre each score 25 points as Rochelle cruises over Cogs 92-75

ROCHELLE — Looking for its second straight win, the Rochelle Hub varsity basketball team utilized its full-court pressure on defense and its fast-paced ball movement on offense to wear down the Genoa-Kingston Cogs during Wednesday evening's nonconference matchup.

Leading 41-40 after the first half, Rochelle elevated its intensity on the defensive end, using full-court pressure while playing aggressive manto-man defense and jumping into passing lanes to force several second-half turnovers from the Cogs. The Hubs outscored Genoa-Kingston 25-9 in the third quarter, allowing the purple and white to build a healthy double-digit lead for the remainder of the game and cruise to a 92-75 victory at home.

Junior Eli Luxton and senior Raul Aguirre each scored 25 points to lead the Hubs (4-4, 1-2 Interstate 8) in the win. Juniors Jack Tracey and Jack Lodico each finished with 12

Moore combined for 10 points. Rochelle will host an Interstate 8 Conference matchup against the Morris Redskins on Friday night at 7 p.m.

"We were able to tire them out during the second half and we capitalized on the offensive end," senior David Gerber said. "Raul and Eli are great scorers and when we can tire the defense out, they're able to score a lot easier. We're a good second-half team because we're able to wear other teams down. We're building on each game and we're getting better and better. We struggled during our first few games, but we've played much better over our last two games."

Both teams played with tremendous pace on offense, using long passes and quick ball movement to push the ball up the court quickly and create open shots. With Aguirre using his 6-foot-5 frame to draw double teams down low, Luxton took advantage of one-on-one matchups, hitting two 3-pointers and capitalizing on offensive rebounds for two more baskets around the

RTHS Boys Bowling Rochelle scores nonconference win over Streator Odle rolls team-leading 607 series as Hubs take down Bulldogs 3,239-3,037

ROCHELLE — Four of the six starters on the Rochelle Hub varsity bowling team recorded at least one score over 200 during Thursday evening's nonconference match against Streator. Senior left-hander Evin Odle led the Hubs with a 607 series over three games, overcoming an injured wrist and leading Rochelle (6-6, 3-3 Interstate 8) over the Bulldogs 3,239-3,037.

Freshman Andrew Powell fired a 588 series for the Hubs, while sophomore Logan Frye followed with a 568 series against the Bulldogs. Brady Grabowski recorded a 644 series and Anthony Dominic totaled a 575 series to lead the Streator side on Thursday. Rochelle opened the match with a 1,069-962 win in the first game, where Odle threw a 211 and Frye added a 205.

"The kids are playing really well right now,' head coach Jim Lyles said. "Evin's throwing the ball really well and our freshmen are coming along nicely. Evin's worked a lot on improving his hand position and even though he injured his wrist this evening, he finished the

match really well." The Hubs surged ahead in the team series with

a 1,165-1,038 victory in the second game, where Odle rolled a match-best 220 and freshman Owen Tooley fired a series-best 214. Junior Jonathan Alanis added a match-best 189 for the purple and white, while Grabowski and Dominic led the Bulldogs with scores of 224 and 200. Streator avoided the shutout with a 1,137-1,005 win in the third game, where Grabowski shot a 248 and Dominic added a 217.

"I think our kids are hitting their targets a lot better than they were at the start of the season," Lyles said. "They're throwing a lot more strikes as a result. We're still missing too many spares, but we've been able to make up for that with more strikes. Making our spares will be the biggest key for the kids moving forward and that's what will allow them to find those big games."

Powell's series-high 221 and Frye's 180 were the high scores for the Hubs in the third game. Rochelle's next meet will be the Freeport Sport Shot Invitational on Saturday afternoon.

RTHS Wrestling Hubs defeat Kaneland, LaSalle-Peru Rochelle reaches 13-0 after Thursday win at Ottawa

MAPLE PARK — The Rochelle Hub varsity

wrestling team continued its dominance with two Interstate 8 Conference road wins over Kaneland and LaSalle-Peru on Wednesday. Rochelle (12-0, 3-0 Interstate 8) crushed the Knights 62-4 while downing the Cavaliers 76-6. The Hubs conceded only two bout losses in the conference triangular meet.

Kaneland

Rochelle's only loss during the dual match with the Knights came during the 126-pound bout, where Kaneland's Alex Gochis recorded a 13-5 major decision over freshman Frank Nasca. Sophomore Joseph Nadig and senior Weldon Nay gave the Hubs a 6-4 lead in the dual with consecutive decisions during the 132-pound and 138-pound bouts, where Nadig outlasted Caden Grabowski 8-6 and Nay earned three near falls to fend off Kyle Rogers 6-4.

Rochelle won the next four bouts by fall to surge ahead 30-4. Freshmen Brenden Voight and Roman Villalobos recorded first-period falls over Max Woodward and Apollo Gochisto claim the 145-pound and 170-pound bouts, while sophomores Grant Gensler and Erich Metzger earned fall victories against Christian Duffing and Nate Harper in the 152-pound and 160-pound bouts.

Junior Brock Metzger notched three takedowns and one reversal in a 9-0 major decision over Nolan Hosking to win the 182-pound bout. Senior Jorge Driggs and sophomore Kaiden Morris followed with victories in the 195-pound and 220-pound bouts, with Driggs holding off Max Pietak for a 5-3 decision and Morris scoring a 11-2 major decision against Nate Diaz. Senior Jaden Cook recorded a first-

period fall over JR Warfel to take the 285-pound bout for Rochelle.

Freshmen Keagan Albers and Anthony Milburn received forfeits for the 106-pound and 113-pound bouts to give the Hubs a 59-4 lead in the dual. Sophomore Xavier Villalobos scored six third-period points to beat Kamron Scholl by 6-3 decision in the 120-pound bout.

LaSalle-Peru

Xavier Villalobos kicked off the match against the Cavaliers with a first-period fall over Zach Znaniecki in the 120-pound bout. Frank Nasca added five points to the team score for Rochelle, compiling two takedowns and four near falls in a 17-0 technical fall over Griffin Hummers in the 126-pound bout. Joseph Nadig and Weldon Nay extended the Hub lead with back-to-back falls over Kaleb Vela and Zach Pocivasek to claim the 132-pound and 138-pound bouts.

Junior Abel Huerta took a forfeit for the 145-pound bout, making the score 29-0 before Rochelle rallied off five consecutive fall victories. Grant Gensler and Erich Metzger recorded first-period falls over Josh Bickford and Walter Haage to win the 152-pound and 160-pound bouts, while Roman Villalobos and Brock Metzger followed with first-period falls against Ethan Pohar and Jace Wallgren in the 170-pound and 182-pound bouts. Jorge Driggs added a first-period fall over Reid Currier to take the 195-pound bout and give Rochelle a 59-0 lead in the match.

LaSalle-Peru's lone win came during the 220-pound bout, where Connor Lorden held a 9-6 lead over Kaiden Morris before securing a third-period fall. Jaden Cook fired back for the Hubs, taking a 7-1 lead over Gunnar Wright before finishing with a first-period fall to win the 285-pound bout. Keagan Albers and Anthony Milburn won the final two matchups, with Albers earning a firstperiod fall over Sylvester St. Peter in the 106-pound bout and Milburn totaling four near falls and two takedowns in a 16-0 technical fall over Franc Knap in the 113-pound bout.

The Rochelle Hub varsity wrestling team remained undefeated on Thursday, earning a 51-28 road win against Ottawa after sweeping an Interstate 8 Conference meet with Kaneland and LaSalle-Peru on Wednesday. Rochelle (13-0, 4-0 Interstate 8) will compete at the Oak Forest Mega Duals this weekend.

The Pirates claimed the first match of the conference dual, with Nico Stanfill surging ahead 13-4 before recording a thirdperiod fall over sophomore Weylin Nay in the 132-pound bout. Rochelle tied the score after senior Weldon Nay fired back with third-period fall over Malachi Snyder to take the 138-pound bout. Freshman Brenden Voight gave the Hubs a 12-6 lead after earning a second-period fall over Marek Duffy in the 145-pound bout.

Rochelle continued to extend its lead over the next several matches.
